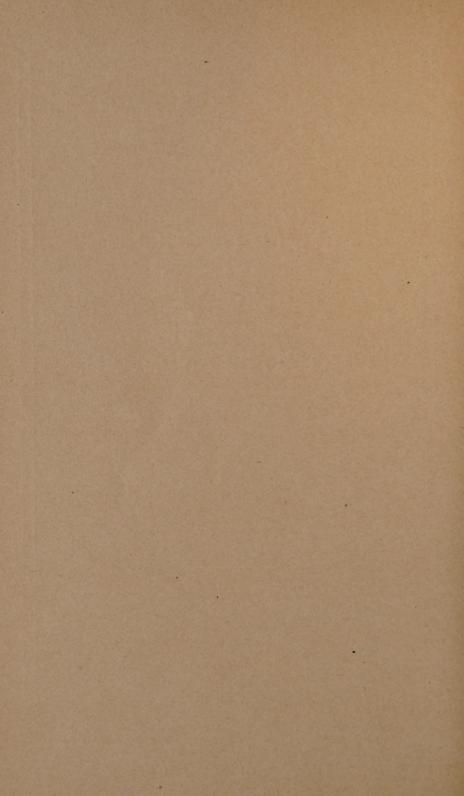

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Westmoreland in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Westmoreland on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
- 3. To bring in your votes for the election of delegate-atlarge, alternate delegates-at-large, district delegates and alternate district delegates to the national conventions of the Democratic and Republican parties to be held for the purpose of nominating candidates for president and vice-president of the United States.
- 4. To see what sum of money in addition to what is required by law the town will vote to raise for the support of highways and bridges.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to apply for state aid for state road maintenance and raise money for the same.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to apply for state aid for trunk line maintenance and raise money for the same.

- 7. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 117 Laws of 1917 on a section of the Monadnock road so-called and raise money for the same.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to apply for state aid and federal aid for trunk line construction and raise money for the same.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise \$400.00 for the purpose of eradicating white pine blister rust.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise \$100.00 for the support of library.
- 11. To see what disposition the town will make of the income from the Jothan Lord fund.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to have two chemical toilets installed in the town hall and raise money for the same.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to elect a commmittee to investigate the feasibility of establishing a town forest and to report at March meeting, 1925.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to accept the Agnes B. Pierce legacy of \$50.00 to be held in trust and the income to be used for the care of the Walter Pierce and Alexander MacKay lots in East Westmoreland cemetery.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to accept the Sabina Aldrich legacy of \$100.00 to be held in trust and the income used for the care of their lots in East Westmoreland cemetery.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway leading past the Keth places so-called beginning opposite the house of Arthur H. Chickering at its point of intersection with the road leading from Park Hill to Westmoreland Depot to its intersection with the Monadnock road so-called at Grange Hollow bridge, subject to gates and bars.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Westmoreland:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report on your schools.

The total number of children registered in the schools last year was 100. Of these 10 had previously been registered in some other district. Leaving a net total of 90. 42 of these were boys and 48 girls. The average attendance in per cent was 91.3. It was 93.46 per cent for the state over the same period. The schools were in session 345 half days on an average out of a possible 360. This with the bad winter we had last year and the holidays set aside is not a bad record.

### REPAIRS

No general repairs were made on any of the buildings this summer, due in part to the greater activities at the new building. I hope that much can be done this summer at the East Westmoreland school. The people there have been patient. That building needs shingling. That sort of repair interests me somewhat but only to the extent that it uses money which could otherwise be put into remodeling the building to meet modern conditions. If asked to say what ought to be done at this building I should enumerate thus: Shingle it, revamp or relay the foundation, make the approach to the girls' toilet less exposed. The room itself should have the light on two sides of the pupils at the most instead of three as now. This would call for a change of windows and rearrangement of windows. The stove should be set in the northwest corner of the room and jacketed. The ceiling and

walls need to be refinished and I suggest a steel sheeting for this with the proper paint to cover. This would put the building in permanent repair so that it might be forgotten in this respect for some time. It looks like a large program for a district already loaded but I should feel derelict if I did not lay down the facts.

### NEW BUILDING

This is sufficiently recent to need little comment but that history may be recorded it may be said that it was first used on September 10. It seems large enough to accommodate the pupils now attending and could take care of 15 more. It is found convenient to use and comfortable for pupils to work in. The proper spirit of care for keeping the new appearance seems to be in the minds of the children, due in no small part, as was the excellent care of the town hall while used last year, to the oversight of the teachers. The chemical toilets seem to be both efficient and sufficient and offer little anxiety as to care either in operation or in cleansing. There is a small balance in the hands of the building committee. I would recommend that this be used to finish the job, viz, put in a proper drain from the cellar and surface over one end of it so that manual training equipment might be set up. A sink would be desirable in the building and a plumber tells me that \$35 will put this in and attach it to the cesspool already there. This will be a saving in the long run for inevitably there must some water from drinking cups fall on the floor. The ground is poorly graded and the school yard fence is in a sorry looking condition. I think you will agree that these things while costing not over the money on hand would add much to the surroundings of this already otherwise beautiful little building. If not out of place for me to do so, I would like to commend the spirit which actuated the committee in its efforts for this building. They have taken from their farms many valuable days and evenings to consider details

about which those not immediately concerned can know nothing. A vote of thanks or appreciation is due it at least.

### TEACHERS AND WORK

We have this year two new teachers; one at East Westmoreland, the other at the Corner school. These with the three already with us are doing an excellent piece of work. I know for I am in the schools, at least one or more of the schools, every week. In addition I have had given standard tests in arithmetic, geography, reading, writing, grammar and composition. These have shown standard or better in all places. There are a few slow pupils in school who are behind grade but are now in evidence so that they can get the extra help needed. The plan is for individual assistance. It may not be unfair to say that both this year and last that among the lower grades those of the village school were above the standard set in the tests by the Cleveland survey. This is due in part to the fact that the teacher has just so many less grades than the other teachers but also to the fact that the teaching method from year to year has been the same, up to date and progressive.

### ATTENDANCE AND VACCINATION

The attendance this year is better than ever before. The greatest increase in improvement is at the Depot school. I commend the improvement. Parents should bear in mind that we have only eight grades where formerly we dawdled over nine. Parents should bear in mind that the work is advancing day by day in definiteness both as to purpose and form. Certain amounts are to be covered each year, the first as well as the last. If a child does not make the first year work well, the advance cannot wait and he is liable to have to repeat the grade to avoid trouble farther along the line. For this reason it is well to observe the law which gives the district power to make regulations for the attendance of children from 6 to

Winds !

16 years. This implies that a child under 6 years has not attained sufficient age to grasp the scope of the work laid out for him. He may get some and parrot it back at the teacher but understanding only is a sign of learning.

Twelve per cent of the children in the state are not vaccinated. The per cent in our schools is nearer 40. A figure that is entirely too high. Most of the 12 per cent of the state come from outlying or rural districts where the false impression is that no small pox can reach such places. Witness Dummerston, Putney, Langdon and Sanbornville this year. May we not have the children all in school this next year under legal conditions. Why not get a certificate from a physician stating that the child is unfit for vaccination if such is the case and let us report a clean slate.

### CONCLUSION

I appreciate the spirit of the people in taking the interest in schools that is attested by the purchase of the piano and victrola for the So. Village school. The spirit of the East Westmoreland people is likewise good. That of the patrons of the two other schools is highly commendable. The vote of the town meeting which turned over the \$80 income to the children for noon luncheons is quite in advance of the vote of any other town meeting in the state. It is being well used and is serving a mighty purpose. If it happens again none will rejoice more than the teachers and myself.

The future is not for me to tell about but the present spirit of the people, children and the efficient, thorough work of the teachers bids well for the days to come. The support and cooperation of you all is appreciated and encouraging.
