### TOWN WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Washington, County of Sullivan in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the town hall in said town on Tuesday the Fourteenth day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects.

- Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, Treasurer, one Selectman for three years, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Auditor, one member of Trust Fund Committee for three years, one member of Library Committee for three years, Overseer of the Poor, Police Officer, Fire Chief, and any other necessary town officers.
- Article 2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of its highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$214.41 and accept State Aid of \$857.64 Town Road Aid.
- Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and set aside a sum of money to be used for the construction of S.A.C. highways after the war.

- Article 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges for the ensuing year.
- Article 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Shedd Free Library.
- Article 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Fire Department.
- Article 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting.
- Article 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the control of Blister Rust.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for town hall repairs.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Non-Partisan Ballot system for the election of town officials, as provided in the revised laws of New Hampshire.

- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and make an appropriation for same.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of printing Town Histories.
- Article 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell or administer any real estate coming to the town through Tax Collector's deeds.
- Article 17. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 and perpetually care for the A. W. Crane lot in the East Washington cemetery.
- Article 18. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 and perpetually care for the C. W. J. Fletcher lot in the East Washington cemetery.
- Article 19. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 and perpetually care for the F. P. Fletcher lot in the East Washington cemetery.
- Article 20. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$300.00 from the estate of Aiden W. Vickery, the income only to be used for perpetual care of the Aiden W. Vickery lot in the East Washington cemetery.
- Artcle 21. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$3,262.70 from the estate of Mary F. Ellis, the income only to be used for the purchase of books for the Shedd Free Library.
- Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the purpose of publicizing the natural advantages of the town in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

Article 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

#### THE DARTMOUTH-LAKE SUNAPEE REGION

---0----

The Legislature of 1397 authorized the establishment of six Regions, each comprising a group of towns suggested by the State Planning and Development Commission. The Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region comprises this town and 37 others in this section of the state. The Region is incorporated as a non-profit corporation and its affairs are supervised by a group of officers chosen annually. The Region employs a full time secretary who is paid by the state (not by the towns). Thus your Region is a setup established by law and the matter of whether or not it has sufficient financial support to render real service to your community rests with the voters of the towns. During its existence the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region can point to the following accomplishments. Through the publicity it has issued it has brought visitors to every town, some have established summer homes and others have become permanent residents. It has been instrumental in bringing industries to several towns. It has inaugurated plans that have saved historic landmarks. It has sponsored paying summer attractions. It has been active in bringing about a survey of our mineral resources that has resulted in revenue to many towns and has conducted studies of new agricultural products.

By an appropriation not exceeding 1-100 of 1% of the assessed valuation the Region now asks the support of your town in continuing the program that

has brought about the aforementioned results and to institute the following three projects which if carried through must result in added income to each of the 38 towns of the Region. (1) A research of the possibilities of establishing industries that will use as raw materials, minerals within our area and make a study of the feasibility of the production, processing and sale of several agricultural products that in the past have received but little attention. (2) To cooperate with each of the towns in preparing descriptive pamphlets showing the attractions, natural advantages and resources of the community with the idea of eventually incorporating such material into a book descriptive of the whole Region. (3) To establish a system of Recreation Trails following back highways and little used roads leading to scenic areas and desirable locations in each of the 38 towns in the Region. As it is not deemed proper to devote more space in your Town Report to this subject, details have been omitted, however, letters of inquiry regarding any matter here mentioned will be welcome and given careful reply. # REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

### WASHINGTON

To the School Board and Citizens of Washington:

I hereby submit my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

### ORGANIZATION

School Board: Perley H. Crane, Chairman; John V. Dyer; Amy Farnsworth.

Superintendent of Schools: Howard F. Mason, Hillsboro.

School Nurse: Margaret E. Harris, R. N., Keene.

Teacher: Louise Murdough, Dole school, \$1,050.00, N. H. Approval certificate.

Miss Katherine Shea is Music Supervisor at a salary of \$200.00.

### PUPIL DATA

The following pupil was graduated from the eighth grade of the Washington Schools in June 1943: Ruth Cornell. She is now attending Hillsboro High School.

The following pupils maintained perfect attend-

ance during the school year 1942-43 for the terms indicated. For the full year, Jean Crane; for three periods, Donald Crane, Robert Crane, Harry Drew, Lilla Woodrow and Sally Woodrow; for two periods, Theodore Drew and Gloria Woodrow; for one period, Sidney Blanchard and Mildred Crane.

When the Dole school opened in September there were 19 pupils. Since then two pupils have left so that the present enrollment is 17. Of these 17, Windsor sends six as tuition pupils and 11 are from Washington.

### GENERAL REPORT

In times like these when big wages draw people to the cities, rural sections show a great drop in population. This seems to be the case in Washington for at this time there are only 11 pupils of elementary school age in the town of Washington. Because of this fact it became evident that it would be uneconomical to continue with two schools this year. Therefore the Center School was temporarily closed until such time in the future as the number of pupils in this area would warrant reopening it.

Three children from the Center area and one from the East Washington area are transported to the Dole School by Mrs. Drew. The remaining seven Washington children live in the Dole School area.

We were indeed fortunate last Spring to obtain the services of Mrs. Louise Murdough as a teacher for the Dole School. She has had many years experience in various kinds of schools and had left teaching a few years ago to enjoy her family. As her part in the war effort she agreed to return to teaching to

help out during these times of teacher shortages. Everyone seems very pleased with her work. The room and the pupils are neat and clean. The work of the school is carried on in a pleasant and effective manner.

The pupils are doing their part by buying War Savings Stamps and participating in various programs suggested by the "Schools at War" magazine.

An attempt is being made to operate the school as economically as possible and at the same time provide the pupils with all the necessary books and equipment to obtain a well rounded education. Their attitude seems to show that they appreciate our efforts.

It is pleasant to note that all of the recent graduates of the Washington schools are attending high school. In the specialized and technological age which will follow the war, a high school education, at least, will be a requirement for advancement in most fields of endeavor.

It has been a pleasure to work for Washington and I wish to extend my sincere appreciation to the School Board and Teacher for their efforts in assisting me to maintain a good school in Washington.
