*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Derry qualified to vote in
Town Affairs.*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Adams Memorial Building in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, building and repairing bridges and for other necessary charges arising in said Town.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Upton Post No. 45, Department of New Hampshire, Grand Army of the Republic, to defray the expenses of Memorial Day.

4. To hear the reports of agents, auditors or committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the improvement of the highways in accordance with the provisions of section 4 of chapter 35 of the Laws of 1905, and pass any vote relating thereto.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of books for the Derry Public Library and for the maintenance of said Library and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To see what action the Town will take relative to the salaries and recompense of town officers and pass any vote relating thereto.

8. To see if the Town will vote to exempt from taxation for a period of ten years the capital in business of the Derry Shoe Company, the Moody, Emerson Company, the Emerson, Pennington Company and the Woodbury Shoe Company and pass any vote relating thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to sell the interest in the Parker Homestead at East Derry which it acquired under the last will and testament of Edward T. Parker, late of said Derry, deceased.

TO THE CITIZENS OF DERRY:—

The Board of Water Commissioners present herewith their third annual report.

The year 1910 was a fairly prosperous one for the water works. During the year we paid the running expenses of the plant, interest on all bonds, \$1538.94 in outstanding bills, that were due January 1, and paid a note of \$1000.00 borrowed of the town, making a total of \$2538.94 paid out above the running expenses.

The large pump that was thoroughly renovated and repaired at the beginning of the year, has done good service to the present time. The auxiliary pump was also repaired and placed in as good condition as possible. These pumps have done long service and are showing evidences of wear as time

goes on. It is only a matter of a few years at the longest when a new equipment will be an absolute necessity at the pumping station.

We have made investigation and are convinced that by putting in a modern steam equipment we can save at least one half of the present cost of coal for pumping the same amount of water. We think that such an equipment should be installed as soon as possible.

The past year did not see so many extensions of services or main pipes as the previous year, still some good work was accomplished.

There were 375 feet of six inch pipe and 350 feet of 4 inch pipe laid last year.

The large well completed in 1909 did such excellent service and gave such valuable returns, in labor and coal saved, that two smaller wells were sunk last year and they have given most satisfactory results. Although the entire year was marked by a prolonged drouth, we had an abundant supply of water and were able to give pure well water, and did not pump from the brook a single gallon. This fact is most satisfactory to the board as well as to the water takers themselves. The last analysis of the water made by the state board of health was very satisfactory.

The necessity of a larger standpipe is manifest especially in the summer time when so much water is required. It is hoped that another one as large or larger than the present one may be installed ere long as an auxiliary.

We have placed metres on many services and the plan is giving complete satisfaction to the Water Works and to the consumers as well. It prevents a wanton waste of water, and

on the other hand requires the consumer to pay only for the water he uses.

On account of the slackness in business, locally, during the year, the water revenue was somewhat reduced. Notwithstanding the new extensions added in 1909 and 1910, the receipts were nearly \$900.00 less last year than the year previous. But to offset this in a measure, the cost of labor and coal was about \$300.00 less. The financial condition of the plant is better today than it has been since the town took control of it.

Last fall the bonds issued by the old company matured, and it was found necessary to take them up and to replace them. This was done by the selectmen in accordance with a vote passed at the March meeting one year ago. The chairman of the board, Alden G. Kelley, gave his personal attention to the matter, and to the board, through his untiring efforts, much credit is due, as the new bonds were replaced at a lower rate of interest, thus affording a saving to the town of some \$11,000 for the term of 20 years during which the new bonds will exist.

The Water Works office in the Adams Memorial building is open every afternoon from 2 till five o'clock for business. The commissioners and superintendent meet in the same office every Friday evening throughout the year from 7 till 9 o'clock and oftener when necessary.

BOARD OF HEALTH REPORT.

To the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Derry, N. H.:

For the year ending Feb. 15, 1911, there have been 3 cases of diphtheria, 2 of scarlet fever, 2 of typhoid and a few cases of measles. No deaths from any of these cases.

The water has been examined from time to time and found good.

The slaughter houses have been looked after, but were generally found in good sanitary condition.

Several complaints have been received by the Board regarding the Garvin Pond, so called—but upon consulting the State Board it was not deemed advisable to fill it, as it would entail considerable expense upon the town. If the public would dump coal ashes and other unobjectionable matter in there it would soon be a thing of the past.

The Board wishes to call the attention of the public to the law regarding leaving dead animals upon the ground. The Board is tired burying dead dogs, cats, horses, etc., and if the owners of such are known they will be prosecuted.

DERRY PUBLIC LIBRARY.

Report of the Trustees:

The accompanying report of the Librarian shows the work and condition of the library for the past year.

We would call attention to the largely increased number of books loaned, 25,243. When it is remembered that there are but a few more than 3000 volumes on our shelves it will be seen that such a circumstance necessitates the constant handling of some of them, requiring careful usage, and much repairing to keep them in good condition. It may surprise some to learn that our circulation is more than one fourth that of the Manchester City library, while our number of books, and expense of maintenance is very disproportionately small. From the town's appropriation, with the money received from fines, after the salary of the Librarian and other expenses are paid, about 400 volumes are purchased annually. At that rate it will be years before we shall have as many books as the Taylor, or other neighboring libraries having a much smaller patronage.

The number of books and magazines donated this year is less than that of some previous years. A larger number of such gifts, at little cost to the donors, would be greatly appreciated, and if of the right kind would enable the library to more fully meet the demand for the latest books. Of some of the more popular books, several copies are now purchased, and

for a time are loaned for seven days only, that more people may have the opportunity of an early reading.

One interesting feature of the work of the library is that of furnishing reading matter of an unobjectionable character not only at the tables in the reading room, but by the loaning of books. Many young boys have cards and use them regularly, thus better employing their time and minds than if such privileges were not available.

It is the purpose of the trustees to so administer the affair of the library that it may be of the best possible service to the entire reading public.

The same librarian and assistant have served us as in previous years, and with the same faithfulness, and such increased efficiency as enlarged experience would naturally bring to the discharge of their duties.

The term of Mrs. Low, who was chosen to the vacancy on the board occasioned by the resignation of Mrs. Quimby, expires this year. She has served well and has also made a very efficient treasurer. It is the unanimous wish of the other members that she shall be elected to succeed herself.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE DERRY PUBLIC LIBRARY:

The sixth annual report is herewith presented:—The

Library and Reading room have been open the same hours as in former years. Also on Saturday, October to May inclusive, the Library has been open continuously from 2 until 9.30, the assistant, Florence M. Nichols, being on duty from 6 until 8 o'clock.

The year has been one of unusual growth. There has been an increase of circulation for each month over the corresponding month of last year and the gain during the year has been 4,259 volumes, more than twice the gain made in any year since the library opened in 1905. This is a gain of 22 per cent over 1910 and of 52 per cent over the first year I had charge of the library.

The above facts easily show that there has been a large increase in the work of the library. There have been 690 more books repaired this year, making a total of 3073. Besides these 51 volumes have been rebound at a bindery. The extra assistance given me since December 1st, has been of much value and I believe it would be for the best good of the Library that the same assistance should be continued through the coming year.

Another double bookstack was added this year. This will give us sufficient shelf room for one more year.

The back numbers of several magazines have been put into permanent form by the use of multi-binders. This work has been done at the library. We have now 14 different magazines which as soon as each volume is complete are bound and can be had for reading or reference. These, with the aid of the periodical index for which the library subscribes make a valuable collection.

The bulletin of new books added to our shelves has been issued twice during the year. These are for distribution to

our patrons and in a measure take the place of a printed catalog. I feel sure the convenience thus afforded has more than repaid the expense and work of issuing the lists.

The inventory was taken as usual this year and all books accounted for. This is the third year that I am able to report that no books have been lost from the shelves. Only one book has been lost this year through circulation and that has been paid for.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

In compliance with the law the following report with a financial statement for the year ending Feb. 15, 1911, and an estimate for the coming year to end Feb. 15, 1912, is respectfully submitted:

Our supervisory district was enlarged the past year by the admission of Londonderry, Mr. Arthur W. Reynolds was re-elected Superintendent at a salary of \$1400, apportioned as follows:

The remaining half of the salary is paid by the State.

This arrangement continues until Sept. 1911.

The number of pupils in our schools has been somewhat smaller than last year and by combining two grades at Oak street school we have been able to do with one teacher less than last year thus saving several hundred dollars.

We have discontinued the school at District No. 9, the pupils who live this side Peppermint Corner, walking, and those who live beyond, being conveyed to the graded schools. This is quite a saving of money and at the same time gives the children better school advantages.

In accordance with the vote of last year, we raised the

pay of our teachers, making our maximum salary \$12 per week for grade teachers, below the principal, who have taught five years or more. Eight of our teachers are now receiving this maximum salary. Twelve of our 21 teachers are Derry girls. Ten are graduates of P. A.

At Oak St. school the experiment of a woman principal is working well and we think we are getting more efficient management and teaching than we have had in the past. During the summer vacation extensive repairs were made in the basement of the Oak St. school, the toilet arrangements and drainage being entirely reconstructed in accordance with sanitary principles. A fine flag pole set in cement was placed in the center of the school yard, adding greatly to the appearance of the school grounds. Some grading has been done on the West side grounds. Some necessary repairs were made at District No. 4. In several of the other District school houses repairs are much needed, which we hope to be able to make the coming year.

A larger number of pupils than ever before has taken advantage of the opportunities offered at Pinkerton Academy. Our bill for High School Tuition was very large, but under the existing law we received a rebate from the State of the entire amount. (See Treasurer's Report.)

The number of pupils at the Academy this year is larger still, 92 being registered from the Town District for the Fall term.

This tuition must be paid in August in order that we may be entitled to the rebate.

A new law regarding the raising of the school money went into operation last March, and owing to a misunder-

standing, for which no one can be blamed, the money for books and supplies, the payment of the \$1200 note and interest due in 1910, and a few minor items was not assessed by the Selectmen. By most careful economy we have paid the interest and part of the book bill, but we have outstanding bills of more than \$450 for books and supplies and there will be two notes of \$1200 each and interest to be paid this coming year.

As the report of the Treasurer of the Building Committee shows we were obliged to borrow \$2420 over and above the sum voted for the remodeling of the West Side school house. At least \$1300 of this should be paid this year.

For the above reasons the sum which we estimate as necessary to be raised the coming year is very large.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE DERRY-TOWN
DISTRICT :

This, my second annual report, is the sixth of the series of similar reports issuing from this office.

There have been few changes in our teaching force during the year. At the East Side Nellie A. Hanson and Alice McDougald have succeeded Joseph H. Hartley and Florence B. Proctor; at the West Side Margaret Hodsdon, Marion H. Blood, and Florence B. Proctor have succeeded M. Anna Fifield, Gertrude Yeats, and Louise E. Reynolds; and at District No. 5, Clarissa G. Hall has succeeded Marion E. McLellan. Our present teachers are in general doing satisfactory work, and no changes are now in prospect. Permanency of teachers is something worth striving for, it costs more money than a policy of frequent changes, but I believe it pays. And nowhere does it pay better than in the rural districts, where children are enabled to have the same teacher year after year. The success of permanency depends however on having teachers good enough to retain.

It is a matter of relief this year that our accommodations are not overcrowded. Owing to business conditions we have fewer children in school than last year, and these

happen to be so distributed as to make it advisable to combine two grades at the East Side and save the cost of one teacher.

We have not however lost so many children as we expected; with the exception of last year there are more children in our schools than ever before, as may be seen by a glance at the accompanying table that shows the average attendance for the past eight years.

It is evident that most of those who have left Derry within the year were men and women without families. We have every reason to expect that, with improved business conditions, we shall soon have more children than ever before.

There is a strong conviction among educators today that children are entering school too young, and I am heartily in accord with this belief. The child, until he is six at least, is far better off at home; he gains more by free and unrestrained activity in the open air than in the cramped and confining conditions of the schools. What little mental gain he makes at such a tender age is not noticeable by the time he is ten or twelve; his playmates who stay out until they are six or even seven are ready for the high schools as soon as he. This is no idle theory, but rather a well demonstrated truth.

A result of this fact is to be seen in the rule very common nowadays that children will not be admitted to the first grade younger than six. In some places the idea has gone even farther; in Cambridge, Mass., for example, the first grade has only a half-day session, and no number work at all is taught in the first and second grades.

Last fall we accepted seven children under five; this was, I am certain, a serious mistake, and we must not make it again. If parents would in more cases keep their little folks at home until they are six, we should be spared the cost of giving a lot of teaching that is now put out to little or no purpose.

During the past eight years our per cent of attendance has been as follows:

With an attendance thus far of approximately ninety-four percent, the truancy question is not a serious one this year. Almost without exception absence has been for sickness, which is, of course, the only reason excusable. Great praise is due to parent, teachers and pupils for this excellent showing. Our teachers especially have been very faithful in looking up cases of absence, and our truant officer, Mr. Benson, has been patient and willing in cooperating with them.

Most parents are glad to help us by sending word to the teacher when it seems wise to keep a child at home, and all ought to be. If a note of explanation goes to school with every pupil who has been absent or tardy, all uncertainty is at once cleared away, and misunderstanding is made impossible. In almost every bad case of truancy the parent is at fault, and the fault usually lies in the failure to have an understanding with the teacher.

I wish to record to the honor of the following rooms their high record of attendance up to February 1st: East Side, Grade 8, 98 per cent; Grade 5, 97 per cent; West Side, Grade

5, 98 per cent; Grade 4, 98 per cent; Grade 3, 97 per cent.

The following table, showing the cost of teaching and of books and supplies per pupil of average enrolment, may be of interest:

In my figures for 1911 I have included the amount of unpaid bills for books and supplies.

For the State at large the figures for 1907 and 1908 are as follows:

Teaching, 1907, \$15.09; 1908, \$15.84. Books and supplies, 1907, \$1.69; 1908, \$1.61. It is plain that although the cost of educating our children has for the past eight years been steadily increasing, we are paying as yet only the average rate.

An interesting feature in connection with every school system is the annual promotion of pupils from one grade to another. Our record for 1910 is as follows:

Our schools are, I believe, so organized today that the educational progress of the child is secure; from the first grade through the high school he is assured of a steady and unbroken advance if he will do his part. The old condition of repeated work and wasteful arrest of progress, due to the

frequent changes of teachers and the lack of a system of studies, is a thing of the past. This alone is worth all the increase in the cost of educating our children.

Last June 38 of our pupils were admitted to Pinkerton Academy on the Superintendent's recommendation. Thirty of these entered, three being residents of Londonderry who had attended our schools. I have noticed these young people with great interest, feeling that their success in the Academy would throw valuable light upon the quality of our school system with the Principal of the Academy. I have carefully talked over the work of these pupils, and I have concluded that at least two points should be impressed strongly upon us all.

In the first place we have a tendency to wish some pupils to enter the Academy before they should. We do not sufficiently take into consideration the extreme difficulty of such studies as Algebra, Latin and Ancient History to the immature mind; we are too prone to regard it as a sort of injustice or disgrace for our child of twelve or thirteen not to be sent along with the rest of the class. Now of course the real facts of the case are these; children differ greatly, especially at the age of entrance to the high school. One child of twelve or thirteen may be in every way fitted to enter, and ought in such case to do so; another of the same age may be entirely unfitted, perhaps because of a rapid physical growth at the expense of the mental. In such cases the teacher knows best what should be done; to keep one child back and send the other ahead is the only right thing to do. The unfitted pupil, if sent into the Academy, is handicapped at the very start. Through no fault of his own he is put into competition with children of greater mental power; in a short

time he begins to loose hope and to drop some of his courses; the result is that the work of the first year has to be repeated. Let this same child spend this year in strengthening himself in the grammar schools, and the next year he will start the high school course with every prospect of success.

The other fact that should be emphasized is that we are still in danger of setting too much importance upon the getting of book learning and too little upon the acquiring of mental strength or power. Our pupils who fail do so not because they have not learned what was set before them, but rather because what they have learned was not set before them in such a way as to develop their minds. There is today in our schools too much so-called studying, often mere memorizing of words, and too little drill. We are not teaching our pupils to think. I sometimes test them by giving a simple problem that presents some unfamiliar or unusual condition, and failure is almost universal. Similarly the high school work staggers pupils at the very start by its newness and strangeness; it takes half a year to get them upon a steady footing. Let us try to develop in our children the power of getting their bearings, of striking out for themselves, of not losing their courage and their senses in the presence of unfamiliar surroundings. At the same time let us abandon a great deal of slavish dependence upon the text book, and put our time on the drill that develops.

During the year we have received two very acceptable gifts, a set of "The New Student's Reference Work" from the Derry Woman's Club, and a handsome flag for each school from the Woman's Relief Corps. Such gifts show a generous interest in our schools, and the kindness of these organizations is appreciated by all.

The School Board has placed in each rural district a proper receptacle, provided with cover and faucet, for holding drinking water. These are already serving a useful hygienic purpose in doing away with the open water pail with its public tin dipper. Many of our pupils carry to school their own private drinking cups, and I urge that this practice be made universal. I also recommend that at our large buildings drinking fountains be installed, so as to do away entirely with the need of cups.

It is a great satisfaction to us all to feel that our schools are efficient; we are probably doing better work today than ever before. But to be content to leave them as they are would be a confession of failure. We have not reached the ideal by any means. School Board, teachers and superintendent must always be looking for the weak spots and trying to make them strong.

Let me in closing this report express my appreciation of the courtesy and kindness that I have invariably met.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

DISTRICT No. 2.

To the Board of Education, Special District No. 2:

I herewith submit my second annual report to the citizens of the District.

We have been fortunate in retaining our teacher in the upper grades for several years, to the great good of the school. It is a valuable privilege for pupils thus to pass the years just preceding the academy in the care of the same teacher; she learns thoroughly their strong points and their short-comings, and is able to build the pupils up by applying to each the proper kind of treatment. The boys and girls who have entered the academy from our school within the last two years have shown a strength of preparation that would have been impossible had we had frequent changes of teachers.

We were saddened last summer at learning of the untimely death of Miss Edith D. Piper, who had been in charge of our primary room. All who had ever been associated with Miss Piper in her work had learned to esteem her highly. She was always kind and cheerful, a pleasant associate and a good teacher. Her place is now filled by Miss Louise E. Reynolds.

With the exception of the heating arrangements for the north room, our school plant is in excellent condition. It seems advisable to appropriate money for whatever changes may be necessary to ensure us sufficient heat next winter.

Probably the end may best be attained by changing the location of the furnace.

For the year ending in June, 1910, we had an average attendance of 49, and our per cent of attendance was 92. It is evident from this high record that we are troubled very little with truancy.

I have no general recommendations to make other than those already embodied in my report to the Town District, and I would ask that the citizens of District No. 2 refer to that report.

I thank the School Board, the parents, and the teachers, for their courteous and kindly support.
