The apparatus under my charge is in good condition with the exception of hose, and I would respectfully recommend the purchase of 1000 feet.

The electric apparatus and lines have been kept in good repair and are all working in a satisfactory manner.

It has been our aim to make such repairs as are necessary to keep everything in perfect working order, in advance of any trouble that would be likely to occur from poor equipment or lines.

Agreeably to a vote at the last annual meeting a new fire alarm box, No. 56, has been installed at the hospital. A new loop in the circuit was built through Highland street



from Portsmouth avenue to connect the same, and we are pleased to say that there has not been any occasion to use it. This is installed inside of the building, but can be used for any occasion if it is the nearest box.

About three miles of wire and 25 cross-arms will be needed for repairs and improvements the coming year.

It is our desire to have a new machine installed at the whistle to cost about \$350, and to have a bell with a striker at No. 3 Hose House, as there are a number of complaints of not being able to hear the whistle. As the firemen are all call men, it is very important that they hear the alarm in case of fire.

At the last annual meeting \$350 was appropriated to enlarge Hose House, No. 1; this was done by cutting the building open and building ten feet in the middle. This has made a much needed improvement and is greatly appreciated by the members of the Company.

In conclusion I desire to extend my sincere thanks to the engineers and firemen for the faithful discharge of their duties and promptness at fires; to the superintendent of the fire alarm, George B. Shaw; to Reginald C. Stevenson for the many ways in which he has assisted with his automobile; to Chief of Police Gooch and his officers; and to the superintendent of lights of the Electric company for kindly assistance and courtesy shown.

# The Robinson Seminary.

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## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT.

*To the Honorable Board of Trustees of Robinson Seminary:*

In the lower classes of the Seminary working conditions have been immeasurably enhanced during the past year by reason of the changes for which the board of trustees has been responsible.

The removal of the first class from the room formerly occupied by the first and second classes has relieved the overcrowded condition, which formerly obtained in this department, and has made possible a degree of proficiency in the work of the three lower classes, which was previously unattainable. This change was expected to produce excellent results, but that the immediate improvement should be so marked and so gratifying, could hardly have been imagined by the most sanguine enthusiast. Intensive work is now done which is calculated to engender proper habits of study and concentration. Lesson hearing is vanishing and real teaching is taking its place.

The entering class occupies a room by itself, and is in charge of a competent teacher who devotes to the class her entire time. During the present year it has shown a degree of advancement which would have been impossible under the conditions which existed a year ago.

Adjustable desks and chairs, so placed as to give proper light, have contributed in no small measure to the good health and effective work of the pupils.

The change from a dark to a light tint on the walls of one room has greatly increased the amount of illumination, and has demonstrated the desirability of like changes in other rooms.

An adequate system of ventilation is greatly needed. It is not possible in the cold weather to provide a sufficient supply of fresh air through the windows without cooling the rooms below the point of safety.

The giving up of the art room to the entering class has embarrassed the work in the art department, and has been a disadvantage to the higher classes in some other lines of work.

There is need of one or two recitation rooms for the upper classes, with a larger seating capacity than can now be had. If accommodations for the two lower classes were provided, so that the rooms now occupied by these classes could be used as recitation rooms for higher classes, the arrangement would be mutually advantageous.

A business course still seems desirable, but as it has been mentioned in detail in former reports, no extended reference to its value need be made at this time.

In the opinion of the principal, no course could be more practical or more fully meet the wishes of the founder of the Seminary than a course in home economics. Its introduction would enable a girl who will not go to a higher institution to learn the things most women need to know. In place of some work which is now being taken it would provide for cooking, including the chemistry of cookery and dietetics, the serving of food, marketing, household management, elementary physics, physiology and hygiene, some knowledge of dress making and millinery, the study of home decoration and music.

With the proceeds of the Harriett M. Merrill Reference Library fund the valuable addition of a full set of the works of Francis Parkman has been made to the library, which now numbers nearly 1500 volumes. A full card catalogue of the library has recently been completed.

During the past year five changes have been made in the teaching force. To fill the vacancies caused by the resignations of Miss Helen F. Tredick, Miss Clara E. Kimball, Miss Martha C. Moulton, and Miss Alice M. Kilbourn, the follow-

ing were elected: Miss Elizabeth L. Mayo, Miss M. Louise Jewell, Miss Bertha M. Fisher and Miss Marian Gage. As additional teacher to take charge of the first class, Miss Edith M. Holmes was elected.

An unusual amount of enthusiasm for school work, combined with mutual harmony and co-operation, is manifested among the members of the faculty and has been a strong factor in giving to the school the most successful year within the knowledge of the present principal.

## Secretary's Report.

The books in the library, excluding the Perry collection, number at present 15,547.

The total number of books given out during the past year was 27,020, classified as follows: Fiction, 16,803; juvenile department, 4,631; historical, scientific and general literary subjects, 5,586. Three hundred and twenty-four new books have been added, 202 of these being credited to the Merrill funds; also 97 books have been replaced, and 25 volumes of magazines bound.

Five hundred and one cards have been issued during the current year, 225 to townspeople and 276 to students of the Academy.

# Committee Report.



*To the Legal Voters of the Town of Exeter:*

The committee appointed March 9, 1909, "To consider from all points of view all questions pertaining to the Town Library Building and its location, the Spring Street School House and Yard, and the interests of the Academy and the old Academy Campus," submits the following report:—

Your committee has endeavored to secure full information from all points of view by holding two public hearings, at which many parties interested appeared, and by consulting with the officials in charge of the several institutions named in the resolution. After due consideration of the information obtained, we deem it inexpedient to sell or change the location of the Library Building, and believe that with careful economy of space no enlargement of the building is needed at this time.

With respect to the sale of the Spring Street School House and lot, which your committee does not consider legally within the scope of the town's authority, we would advise that, in case of any sale of this lot by the school district, the town acquire a sufficient portion thereof to provide for any future enlargement of the Library Building.

We are impressed with the need of a public playground for the growth of the town, and, if at any time the old Academy Campus could be secured by purchase or negotiation, your committee would recommend that it be acquired, either in entirety by the town or in conjunction with the school district, for this purpose.

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## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Exeter, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall, in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1st. To choose by ballot and major vote a town clerk.
- 2nd. To choose by ballot and major vote three selectmen.
- 3rd. To choose by ballot and major vote one trustee of the Robinson Female Seminary, for the term of seven years.
- 4th. To choose all other necessary town officers, auditors or committees for the ensuing year.
- 5th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, for the maintenance of the poor, for repairing the highways, for repairing and building bridges, for repairing and building sidewalks, for building drains and sewers, for payment of the town debt, for the lighting of the streets, for defraying the expenses of decorating the graves of Union soldiers, for preventing the spread of the brown tailed moth within the town, and for the other charges arising within the town, and for the payment of the firemen for the ensuing year.
- 6th. To hear the reports of committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7th. To see if the town will appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars for the purchase of a high power spraying pump to be used for destroying the brown-tail and gypsy moths and the elm beetles.
- 8th. To see if the town will vote to renew the contract of the Exeter Water Works, and raise and appropriate money for the same.



9th. To see if the town will vote to make a contract with the Exeter and Hampton Electric Company for lighting the streets of the town by electricity, and raise and appropriate money therefor.

10th. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to sell or lease the interests of the town in land on Newmarket road, so called, lying between the highway and the river, and between the land belonging to the estate of George W. Furnald and the land belonging to the estate of John P. Smith.

11th. To see if the town will vote to accept the legacy of four hundred (\$400) dollars given in trust to the Town of Exeter in the will of Mary G. Williams, late of Newfields, deceased, the income to be used in the care of the Williams lot in the Exeter cemetery.

12th. On petition of Fred H. Gray and thirteen others: To see if the town will appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) to erect on its own land a new building for the road roller.

13th. On petition of Arthur F. Cooper and ten others: To see if the town will vote to amend the By-Laws for the management of the Town Library by reducing the number of the Library Committee so that the said Library Committee shall consist of three members.

14th. On petition of John S. Pike and seventeen others: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1000) for the exclusive repair of the Epping Road, so called.

15th. On petition of John H. Symonds and ten others: To see if the town will vote to accept and maintain at the town's expense the hydrant which has been already installed on the corner of Rockingham and Harvard streets, opposite the Charles S. Bates shoe factory.

16th. On petition of Charles E. Robinson and eleven others: To see if the town will appropriate money for the extension of the Kossuth street sewer to the corner of Garfield street, a distance of about one hundred eighty feet.

17th. On petition of Edwin G. Eastman and sixteen others: To see if the town will vote to install an electric light at Gardiner street in said Exeter, and appropriate money for the same.

18th. On petition of Daniel Sanborn and sixteen others: To see if the town will vote to place an electric light at the junction of Columbus avenue and Spruce street, opposite the north-west corner of Daniel Sanborn's house, and appropriate money for the same.

19th. On petition of L. O. Thompson and fourteen others: To see if the town will make a sidewalk on the north side of the so-called Spruce street, from Washington to Winter street, and to make a plank walk across Winter street from end of said sidewalk, and also to make a plank walk across Winter street from end of sidewalk on Columbus avenue, and appropriate money for the same.
