AMHERST TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire
March 11, 2008

To the inhabitants of the Town of Amherst in the County of Hillsborough and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified that the Annual Meeting of the Town of Amherst will be held, in accordance with "Senate Bill 2" (NHRSA 40:13). The first session, to transact all business other than voting, is on Wednesday, February 6, 2008 at 7:00 PM at the Souhegan High School Auditorium. The second session, voting by official ballot at the polls is on Tuesday, March 11, 2008 at the Souhegan High School from 6:00 AM to 8:00 PM.

Article 21: To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing terms as follows:

- 1 Selectman for 3 Years
- 1 Town Moderator
- 1 Town Clerk
- 1 Supervisor of the Checklist
- 2 Library Trustees for 3 Years
- 2 Zoning Board of Adjustment Members for 3 Years
- 1 Trustee of the Trust Funds for 3 Years
- 1 Cemetery Trustee for 3 Years

Article 22: Operating Budget

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth herein, totaling \$9,486,986. Should this article be defeated the default budget shall be \$9,508,375 which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the town or by law, the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee supports this article by a vote of 6-1.)

This article has a tax impact of \$.05.

Article 23: DPW Replacement Loader

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a five (5) year municipal lease agreement for the sum of one hundred ten thousand dollars (\$110,000) for the purpose of acquiring a fully equipped front end loader replacement for the Department of Public Works and to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty five thousand two hundred thirty one dollars (\$25,231) for the first year's payment for that purpose or take any action relative thereto. The lease agreement contains a clause (escape

clause) which will allow the town to invalidate the lease if the town fails to approve this annual rental in subsequent years. This is a special warrant article in accordance with RSA 32. (Majority Vote Required)

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this Article.)

This article has a tax impact of \$.01.

Article 24: Construction of DPW Salt Shed

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eighty nine thousand dollars (\$89,000) for the purpose of site preparation and erection of the 72' X 100' salt / sand mix shed, the purchase of which and appropriation relating to such purchase were authorized by the passage of Article 10 of the March 2006 annual town meeting and authorize the withdrawal of five thousand three hundred dollars (\$5,300) from the Salt Shed Capital Reserve fund. The balance of eighty three thousand and seven hundred dollars (\$83,700) to come from general taxation.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee supports this Article by a vote of 5-2.)

This article has a tax impact of \$.05.

Article 25: Impact Fee Implementation

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of twenty five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for the purpose of retaining professional services to determine and set impact fee standards and set rates relative to the Capital Improvements Program or take any other action relative thereto. *This is a special article in accordance with RSA 32.*

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this Article.)

This article has a tax impact of \$.01.

Article 26: Update of Utility Assessments

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-two thousand dollars (\$32,000) for the purpose of hiring a consultant to update the assessment of all public utilities in the Town of Amherst or take any other action relative thereto. *This is a special article in accordance with RSA 32.*

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this Article.)

This article has a tax impact of \$.02.

Article 27: Highway Vehicle Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of eighty-five thousand dollars (\$85,000) to be added to the Highway Vehicle Capital Reserve Fund previously established.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee supports this article by a vote of 5-2.)

This article has a tax impact of \$.05.

Article 28: DPW Replacement Vehicle

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) for the purpose of purchasing a fully equipped one ton dump truck for the Department of Public Works and authorize the withdrawal from Highway Vehicle Capital Reserve Fund established for that purpose. This is a non-lapsing Special Warrant Article in accordance with RSA 32.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. As this article has no tax impact, the Ways and Means Committee takes no position on this article; however as individuals the majority support this article.)

This article has no tax impact.

Article 29: Fire Department Utility Vehicle

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-six thousand and three hundred dollars (\$26,300) for the purpose of purchasing and outfitting a one ton four wheel drive extra cab pickup truck to replace the current 1996 four wheel drive vehicle for the Fire Department or take any action relative thereto. This is a non-lapsing Special Warrant Article in accordance with RSA 32.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee supports this article by a vote of 6-0-1.)

This article has a tax impact of \$.01.

Article 30: Department of Public Works Land

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) for the purpose of purchasing 2+/- acres of land from Robert and Susan Heaton for future expansion of the Amherst highway facility, and further to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into any agreements and execute documents necessary to conclude said transaction. Further, to authorize the Board of Selectmen, pursuant to RSA 79-A:25-a, (II), to withdraw said funds from the Land Use Change Tax Fund, or take any action relative thereto. This is a non-lapsing Special Warrant Article in accordance with RSA 32:7 VI and will not lapse until expended or June 30, 2010, whichever is sooner.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. As this article has no tax impact, the Ways and Means Committee takes no position on this article; however as individuals the majority support this article.)

This article has no tax impact.

Article 31: Recreational Facilities Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35, which shall be known as the Recreational Facilities Capital Reserve Fund, for the purpose of purchasing, developing, refurbishing and maintaining new and existing recreational facilities and equipment, and to raise and appropriate the sum of up to two hundred fifty thousand (\$250,000) Dollars, to be placed into this fund, said sum to be raised from the unexpended fund balance, (surplus), to the extent that funds are available in said fund balance, and no amount to be raised from taxation, and to further appoint the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from this fund in accordance with RSA 35:15 II or take any action relative thereto.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. As this article has no tax impact, the Ways and Means Committee takes no position on this article; however as individuals the majority support this article.)
This article has no tax impact.

Article 32: Ambulance Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-two thousand dollars (\$22,000) to be added to the Ambulance Capital Reserve Fund previously established.
(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this article.)
This article has a tax impact of \$.01.

Article 33: Assessing Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) to be added to the Assessing Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund previously established.
(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this article.)
This article has a tax impact of \$.01.

Article 34: Town Computer System Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand five hundred Dollars (\$7,500) to be added to the Town Computer System Capital Reserve Fund previously established.
(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this article.)
This article has a tax impact of less than \$.01.

Article 35: Communications Center Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the Communications Center Capital Reserve Fund previously established.
(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this article.)
This article has a tax impact of less than \$.01.

Article 36: Town 250th Anniversary Celebration Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the Town 250th Anniversary Celebration Capital Reserve Fund previously established.
(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this article.)
This article has a tax impact of less than \$.01.

Article 37: Forestview Cemetery Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) to be added to the Forestview Cemetery Capital Reserve Fund previously established.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this article.)

This article has a tax impact of \$.01.

Article 38: Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to be added to the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this article.)

This article has a tax impact of \$.01.

Article 39: Appointment of Capital Reserve Agent

To see if the Town, pursuant to RSA 35:15, will vote to appoint the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established in 1976.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. As this article has no tax impact, the Ways and Means Committee takes no position on this article; however as individuals the majority support this article.)

This article has no tax impact.

Article 40: Change the Purpose of the Library Land Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will vote to change the name of the existing Library Land Capital Reserve Fund to the Library Facility Expansion or Renovation Capital Reserve Fund, and to change the purpose of said fund, in accordance with RSA 35:16, so that the original purpose, 'of acquisition of land and any buildings thereon for future expansion of library space' shall be expanded so that the purpose will also include, 'the expansion and renovation of existing library facilities'. Two Thirds (2/3) vote required

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. As this article has no tax impact, the Ways and Means Committee takes no position on this article; however as individuals the majority support this article.)

This article has no tax impact.

Article 41: Keystone Hall Funding

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) to support the Keystone Hall in providing outpatient programs to Amherst residents in need of critical substance abuse services.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this article.)

This article has a tax impact of less than \$.01.

Article 42: Milford Counseling Funding

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500) to support the Milford Regional Counseling Services Inc. in providing subsidized counseling services to Amherst residents.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this article.)

This article has a tax impact of less than \$.01.

Article 43: Harbor Homes Inc. Funding

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) to support Harbor Homes Inc. in providing services to Amherst residents who are homeless and/or have mental illness.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this article.)

This article has a tax impact of less than \$.01.

Article 44: Amherst Climate Change Resolution (By Petition)

In keeping with Petition Warrant article #26 passed by the voters in 2007, Be it resolved that the Amherst Board of Selectmen take a pro-active approach in developing a Amherst climate change initiative by appointing an advisory committee in 2008 to create a plan that will provide guidance to the Board of Selectmen and Department Heads so that the Town of Amherst and it's citizens will become a more energy efficient and reduce emissions.

Article 45: Elderly Local School Tax Credit (By Petition)

To see if the Town will vote to adopt an Elderly Local School Tax Credit from property tax in the Town of Amherst. This credit shall represent a twenty-five percent (25%) reduction on the Local School Rate portion of the annual tax assessment per year, for qualified taxpayers to be as follows: For a person 65 years of age and up to qualify a person must have paid property taxes to the Town of Amherst for five (5) years or more directly preceding date of application, own real estate, individually or jointly, and resided at the real estate within the Town of Amherst for at least five (5) years, citizen must continue to own, individually or jointly, and reside at the real estate in which the credit is applied. This credit is only applicable to one property per year per citizen and only one credit per year per property shall apply.

Article 46: Creation of a Transportation System for Town Residents Unable to Drive Themselves to Necessary Appointments (By Petition)

To see if the Town of Amherst will work with interested community members and neighboring towns to develop a plan for providing reliable, affordable, handicapped accessible transportation to town residents unable to drive themselves to necessary appointments.

PROPOSED ZONING ARTICLES

Article 47: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance which amendment, if adopted, would: Revise Art. IV, Sec. 4-3, Para. C1; Sec. 4-4, Para. C1; and Sec. 4-5, Para. C1, so that a building that has a non-conforming front setback in the three Residential Zones can be expanded with certain limitations.

Article 48: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance which amendment, if adopted, would: Add additional words to Art. IV, Sec. 4-3, Paras. A and C; Sec. 4-4, Paras. A and C; Sec. 4-5, Paras A and C; and Art. IX, Sec. 9-1, for defining structures, buildings, and dwellings in the three Residential Zones; and to clarify the size of a dwelling in the Northern Transitional Zone.

Article 49: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance which amendment, if adopted, would: Change and add words to Art. VIII, Sec. 8-5, Sixth Para., No. 5, to clarify the size limitation of an Affordable Housing dwelling.

Article 50: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance which amendment, if adopted, would: Add to Art. III, a new Sec. 3-14, Renewable Energy Systems, to allow small renewable energy systems in any Zone subject to certain limitations.

Article 51: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance which amendment, if adopted, would: Delete the present Art. VIII, Sec. 8-4, Impact Fee Ordinance, and replace it with a revised Ordinance that is in conformance with the present State Statues.

Article 52: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 6 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance which amendment, if adopted, would: Delete the present Art. III, Sec. 3-15, Home Occupations, and replace it with a revised Ordinance that clarifies certain uses and requirements.

**AMENDMENTS TO THE WARRANT ARTICLES
AS VOTED ON AT THE DELIBERATIVE SESSION
FEBRUARY 6, 2008**

Article 22: Operating Budget

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth herein, totaling ~~\$9,486,986~~ **\$9,543,986**. Should this article be defeated the default budget shall be \$9,508,375 which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the town or by law, the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

Article 23: DPW Replacement Loader

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a five (5) year municipal lease agreement for the sum of one hundred ten thousand dollars (\$110,000) for the purpose of acquiring a fully equipped front end loader replacement for the Department of Public Works and to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty five thousand two hundred thirty one dollars (\$25,231) for the first year's payment for that purpose or take any action relative thereto. The lease agreement contains a clause (escape clause) which will allow the town to invalidate the lease if the town fails to approve this annual ~~rental~~ **lease** in subsequent years. This is a special warrant article in accordance with RSA 32. (Majority Vote Required)

Article 25: Impact Fee Implementation

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of ~~twenty five thousand dollars (\$25,000)~~ **one dollar (\$1.00)** for the purpose of retaining professional services to determine and set impact fee standards and set rates relative to the Capital Improvements Program or take any other action relative thereto. *This is a special article in accordance with RSA 32.*

Article 26: Update of Utility Assessments

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of ~~thirty-two thousand dollars (\$32,000)~~ **one dollar (\$1.00)** for the purpose of hiring a consultant to update the assessment of all public utilities in the Town of Amherst or take any other action relative thereto. *This is a special article in accordance with RSA 32.*

Article 45: Elderly Local School Tax Credit (By Petition)

To see if the Town will vote *not* to adopt an Elderly Local School Tax Credit from property tax in the Town of Amherst. This credit shall represent a twenty-five percent (25%) reduction on the Local School Rate portion of the annual tax assessment per year, for qualified taxpayers to be as follows: For a person 65 years of age and up to qualify a person must have paid property taxes to the Town of Amherst for five (5) years or more directly preceding date of application, own real estate, individually or jointly, and resided

at the real estate within the Town of Amherst for at least five (5) years, citizen must continue to own, individually or jointly, and reside at the real estate in which the credit is applied. This credit is only applicable to one property per year per citizen and only one credit per year per property shall apply.

Article 44: Amherst Climate Change Resolution (By Petition)

In keeping with Petition Warrant article #26 passed by the voters in 2007, Be it resolved that the Amherst Board of Selectmen take a pro-active approach in developing **a an** Amherst climate change initiative by appointing an advisory committee in 2008 to create a plan that will provide guidance to the Board of Selectmen and Department Heads so that the Town of Amherst and ~~it's~~ *its* citizens will become **a** more energy efficient and reduce emissions.

Article 46: Creation of a Transportation System for Town Residents Unable to Drive Themselves to Necessary Appointments (By Petition)

To see if the Town of Amherst, *in partnership with the Town of Milford*, will ~~work~~ *establish a commission of* ~~with~~ interested community members and neighboring towns to develop *and propose* a plan for providing reliable, affordable, handicapped accessible transportation to town residents unable to drive themselves to necessary appointments.

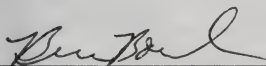

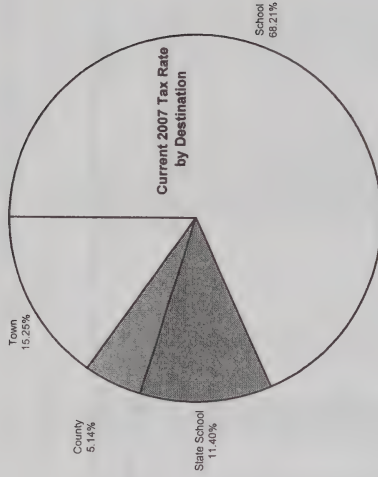

It should be noted that even though the warrant article for the 2009 operating budget is asking the voters to approve \$9,486,986 the actual amount that will be raised through taxation is considerably less. After reducing the \$9,486,986 by the revenue to be received by the town in the amount of \$4,580,303 the net amount of \$4,906,683 is the amount to be raised through taxation. Should all warrant articles pass the amount to be raised through taxation is \$5,290,914 before calculating war service credits and abatements. This is slightly more than half of the proposed 2009 operating budget.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The Board of Selectmen is pleased to report that your Town government continues to keep making progress in several areas. All this is possible because of the dedicated and hard working employees and volunteers that we have here in Amherst.

Many changes occurred during the year. After serving six years on the Board of Selectmen, Jay Dinkel decided not to seek re-election. Replacing Jay on the board was Brad Galinson and George Infanti was re-elected for his second term. In February, Deputy Chief Steven Bair resigned to take a fire position in Pennsylvania. On the recommendation of Fire Chief John DeSilva, Captain Brian Disco was promoted to Deputy Chief. In August, Chief DeSilva resigned to take a fire chief's position in another town. After a search to replace Chief DeSilva, the Board hired Captain Rick Todd of the Merrimack Fire Department as the new Chief.

The Town continues to have a dedicated group of volunteers that head up the Communications Infrastructure Committee who have committed to broadcasting the Selectmen meetings, Amherst School Board meetings and several Planning and Zoning meetings on Channel 20. They were also instrumental, along with Selectman Galinson and former Selectman Jay Dinkel, in negotiating a new cable contact with Comcast. With this new contract, Comcast will provide funding to construct a new video studio with equipment. Students and citizens will have the apparatus to develop television shows, interviews or documentaries to air on public access television. If you have any interest in serving on this Committee, they are always looking for more volunteers to help televise meetings.

With the continued commitment of the Recycling and Waste Reduction Task Force Committee, the Town voted to support the renovations that were needed at the Transfer Station in order to increase recycling. It is their hope that all work will be completed this fall. It needs to be mentioned that this also would not be possible without the cooperation of the Souhegan Regional Landfill District. The District committed \$200,000 towards new equipment and some supplies. The SRLD constitutes four towns - Amherst, Brookline, Hollis and Mont Vernon.

In March, the residents voted to help fund the new building at the Peabody Mill Environmental Center. With the additional funding and the grants that PMEC was able to secure, the building is nearly finished. When completed, the center will be a showpiece for the Town and will be able to offer more environmental programs, as well as a place for civic groups to hold meetings. Don't forget to stop by the Joe English Reservation at the end of Brook Road to view this terrific asset.

This past year, the Recreation Department was able to construct three flat practice fields, a game field and a 60 foot baseball diamond on the Bean Property owned by the Amherst School District. This was accomplished by using Land Use Change Tax money and money from the Recreational Capital Reserve Fund. The Selectmen would like to express

their thanks to the Amherst School District for working with the Town to make this all possible.

The Planning Board continues to work on the new Master Plan for the Town. Deirdre Rogusky, along with a professional consultant firm, lead the Steering Committee through the process of writing the various elements that will make up the total document. We would like to thank and acknowledge the members of this team who have put in hundreds of hours of their time and hope to have a final draft of this valuable document this summer.

Last year the Selectmen proposed a warrant article in order to begin addressing our roads in town, but at the Deliberative Session, it was decided to add the amount of \$400,000 into the operating budget. With this funding, along with the State road aid money, Director Berry set out to start the long process of repairing our roads. Several hundred feet of Lyndeborough Road was completely rebuilt, and asphalt was laid down on other sections. On Horace Greeley Road from Route 101 to the Bedford line, DPW did some grinding and shimming of the road surface before completely overlaying asphalt on the entire road. The DPW also did ditch and shoulder cleaning and placed an overlay of asphalt on approximately 2,000 feet of Baboosic Lake Road. In the spring, Director Berry plans to continue with his plan of doing more work before the start of the next budget. As we said last year, the condition of our roads did not happen overnight and will not be completed overnight.

The proposed FY 09 budget is another bare bones budget. The Selectmen, Town Administrator, Ways and Means and the Department Heads spent hours developing and reviewing the budget that will be presented to the voters in March. It is a constant struggle year after year to propose a budget that will allow the Department Heads to continue to provide the same or better level of service that everyone expects, while being mindful of the taxpayer. Each year we look at creative ways to save money in different areas. This past year, we were able to make some changes in our health insurance plans we offer and increased the percentage that our employees contribute to the cost.

The Board of Selectmen would like to express our sincere appreciation to all our Town employees and volunteers who make Amherst the Town it is today. We also would like to thank our outstanding Town Administrator, Gary MacGuire, for his guidance and tireless dedication to the Board and the Town.

WAYS & MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

The Ways & Means Committee thanks all of the Department Heads, the Town Administrator, and the Board of Selectmen for their open communication, timely responses to our questions, willingness to meet again and again, all of their valuable time spent giving tours of their facilities and equipment, and their creativity and collaboration with regard to interdepartmental solutions to equipment needs.

This year the Ways & Means Committee worked diligently researching all departmental operating budgets and approached each warrant article as if it were a major research project. Each member met with their respective department heads on several occasions, took tours, walked sites, and maintained open lines of communication throughout the entire process. In addition, we used the Internet for additional research, contacted surrounding town department heads for comparison data, and established a graphical view of budget/warrant versus residential growth over the last nine years as seen at the end of this report.

Significant differences in the 2009 operating budget include the following but are not limited to: All capital reserve funds have been removed from the operating budget and must be voted on as a warrant each year; there is no more line item for the Amherst Master Plan as that project is assumed to be completed in 2008; the Zoning and Planning department budgets have been combined into one and reduced.

Gary MacGuire has done additional research regarding medical benefits, researching competitors and competitive plans. Although medical expenses are up, that is consistent across all industries. It is important to note that the Town of Amherst only has 51 participants in the current medical plans offered which makes it difficult to find cost effective plans outside of the three competitors that provide insurance in a municipal pool.

It is important to note that the \$400,000 put in the 2008 budget for road repair has remained in the budget for 2009. It has not been placed in one line item; it has been appropriately divided between four lines to reflect accurate spending for labor and materials. In addition, gas prices continue to be volatile and the best judgment has been used to estimate \$2.65 per gallon across all departments based on previously negotiated competitive bids.

Budget recommendations for 2010:

1. Our graphical representation below illustrates that the population, although on an upward trend, varies little, while the operating budget and warrant articles are on a steeper upward trend. It is an appropriate top-down approach which provides an historical view helping us to equate the cost of running the town to a cost per person. This graphical representation should be continued to provide trend analysis for future committees.
2. Recreation uses a revolving account to fund the programs offered each year. Although review of this fund is beginning in 2008, we recommend that a detailed

audit of the fees charged, number and demographics of program participants, and programs paid for be completed to ensure that appropriate fees are being charged. Since program fees have not changed in a couple of years, we should make sure the fees are appropriate. We also recommend investigating to see if the revolving fund can be used to offset the operating budget for recreation in any way.

3. PMEC has traditionally been stating that they will become self-sustaining. That has yet to occur. The town subsidy has remained flat from 2008 to 2009 by negotiation. We encourage the PMEC to find a grant writer to bring on staff. Based on what other grant writers are doing for local non-profits, we believe there to be many financial opportunities the PMEC could be taking advantage of with the right skillset on board. Another area to review, as with Recreation, are the program fees. Everyone is in support of Recreation and PMEC programs, however, given the economy and the fact that not all residents participate, the thought is that the taxpayers should subsidize less while the participants pay for the privilege of having the programs available locally being careful not to price the programs above what the market will bear.

With regard to process, we have implemented consistency with regard to warrant articles with no tax impact. You will notice, in the commentary that we have not taken official positions or votes on any warrant articles that do not have a tax impact. However, because we have extensively researched all warrant articles, including those with no tax impact, we felt it important to provide information to the voters on where our research led us.

In order to keep our report clear and concise, our positions on each warrant article are listed below. The research and supporting statements delivered at the deliberative session can be found on the town website under the Ways & Means minutes.

Important notes:

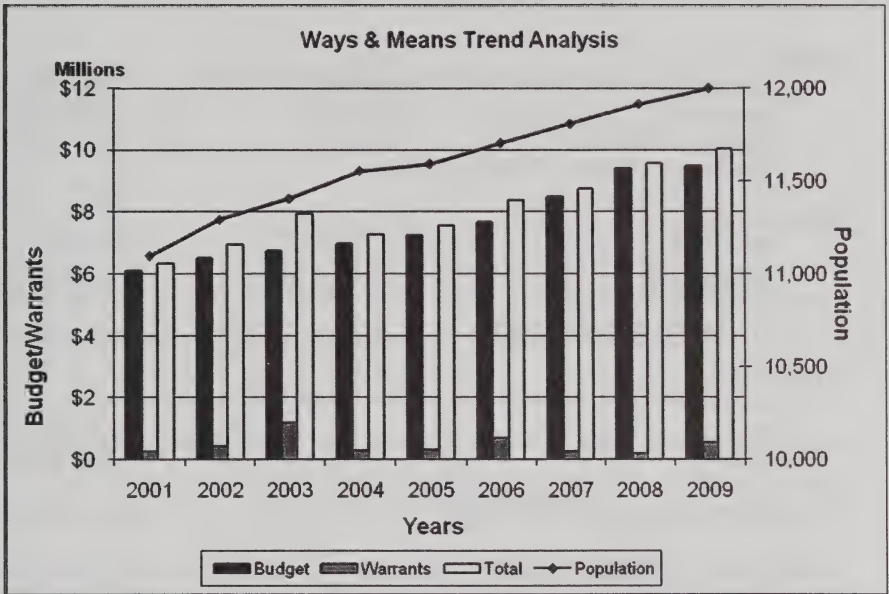
1. Funding capital reserve funds is important to sustaining vehicle replacement plans, the town reassessment, and other expenditures that are costly in accordance with the capital improvement plan and all planned replacements. These funds help the taxpayers avoid a major increase in the tax rate for the year those items must be purchased. We recommend that the Fire Department Capital Reserve fund be reinstated in 2010 so that the established vehicle replacement plan can stay on track.
2. The DPW Vehicle Replacement Capital Reserve Fund has traditionally been underfunded which gives the appearance that it is being treated as a checking account rather than a savings account. We will at some point need to fund this reserve account appropriately to build up a reserve. Otherwise we will not be able to stay on track with the vehicle replacement plan as outlined in the Capital Improvement Plan, and could potentially have a large tax impact in a single year should we need to purchase a vehicle without having a reserve.
3. Impact fees and Utility Reassessments are revenue opportunities for Amherst. There is a relatively small cost associated with both that can be recouped very quickly.

Regarding impact fees, based on the fact that a town typically has 6-8 years from the date of collection to spend the impact fee revenues or the funds get returned to the fee payer, we recommend that the appropriate parties begin planning as early as possible to ensure that the funds can be spent appropriately within the allotted timeframe.

4. The total incremental tax impact should everything pass is .26 cents which is equivalent to \$52.50 for property valued at \$250,000.

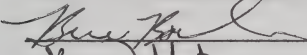
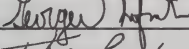

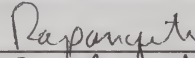

This program also involves a statewide database so that we can issue these records providing the event occurred in New Hampshire. Currently, events from 1988 to the present can be located through this system. Data entry for prior years is conducted at the State level so that older records will become available. AMHERST POLICE DEPARTMENT 2007 TOWN REPORT

The year 2007 was another busy year for the men and women of the Amherst Police Department. The department successfully recruited and hired a new officer to fill the last remaining vacancy. After going through a comprehensive selection and background process, Officer P. Derek Mahoney began employment in August. Officer Mahoney spent the Fall attending 14 weeks of police academy training. After completing several additional weeks of field training, Officer Mahoney was deployed to full patrol duties.

Over the year, two promotions took place which has allowed the department to return to its original organizational structure. About a year ago, in December of 2006, Officer Ciampoli was promoted to the rank of sergeant in the patrol division. Effective February 2008, Sergeant Brace has been promoted to the rank of Lieutenant, in charge of Operations. In that position, he will direct the patrol arm of the department, in addition to other responsibilities. Both officers have displayed the aptitude and ability to provide the supervision and leadership needed to maintain a professional police department.

The department also acquired some significant new equipment at very little cost to the Town, to include six new portable radios valued at \$18,000. The radios were part of a federally funded communications grant administered by the New Hampshire Department of Safety. Additionally, the department acquired new electronic packages for all the marked cruisers at very little cost to the Town. These packages, obtained under the University of New Hampshire Project-54 program, include emergency lighting, siren packages, mobile data terminals, and hands-free software. In addition to the benefit of replacing aging equipment, the new packages allow officers to control radios, lights and sirens via voice command rather than manual switching, providing greater safety. The portable radios and Project-54 equipment total approximately \$60,000 in value, and cost the town approximately \$2,500.

In August the department and Officer Piotrowski had a scare when he was struck by a car on Route 101. Officer Piotrowski was on foot, in the midst of a car stop on the side of the highway when an oncoming vehicle crossed the center of the roadway and struck him from behind. Although the impact was enough to vault him through the air several feet, remarkably Officer Piotrowski was not seriously injured. However, the incident certainly serves as a reminder of the dangers of the job and the need for constant vigilance toward safety.

Unfortunately, the year also included three fatalities in two separate accidents on Route 101 and Route 13. In April, a vehicle traveling on Route 101, well in excess of the speed limit, struck three other cars, resulting in the tragic death of the driver and passenger of the speeding vehicle. Less than a month later, a single car left the roadway on Route 13 and rolled over causing the death of the driver. These incidents, as well as the second year in a row of significant Spring flooding, however, did demonstrate the proficiency of the Town's police, fire, EMS and Public Works departments in working very well

together. The spirit of team work, coupled with the improved communications interoperability provided by the Town's emergency dispatch center, has proven very valuable to this town.

As we look into the future, I expect that the department will be researching and pursuing the need for additional manpower. The addition of several hundred thousand square feet of retail space along the Route 101-A corridor over the last two years has increased the demands on the patrol division of the department. Additionally, the possible benefits of adding a canine patrol to the department seem obvious and worth researching further.

Although the department statistics indicate a sizeable increase in accidents over the year (15%), and car stops (5%), arrests and criminal reports are down. These two downtrends are more a result of procedural changes than actual decreases. Because some of the town's larger retailers have changed internal investigative procedures, fewer thefts and fraudulent transactions are being reported than in previous years and the statistics reflect this change.

Our special programs, such as the bicycle patrol, motorcycle patrol, and school resource officers, continue to be popular and helpful in addressing the community's needs and concerns regarding traffic and school safety issues. We will continue to use these resources throughout the coming years, in addition to trying new and innovative ideas to address the concerns of the community. We also value your suggestions, criticisms and input, and encourage you to call, e-mail or stop in at any time.

As in the past, our goal will be to continue providing the highest quality policing available at the lowest possible cost to the Town. Given the excellence our staff brings to their jobs every day, and the continued support of the community, I look forward to meeting this goal.

I would like to offer my sincere thanks to the citizens of Amherst, as well as the town employees for your continued support of the police department.

AMHERST PUBLIC SAFETY COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

The Amherst Public Safety Communications Center's mission is to provide the highest quality, cost effective Emergency Dispatch Services for the Public Safety Agencies protection the residents of Amherst. In addition to emergency dispatching, the department serves the general public 24/7 with matters of customer service. The Amherst Public Safety Communications Center maintains a variety of in-house records management & system status management data for each of the Public Safety Agencies.

Over the last three years the town has realized the cost effective benefits of having its own Communications Team. We continue to receive positive feedback from the citizens of Amherst in addition to our Police, Fire, EMS and DPW public safety agencies.

EMS Director Brian Gleason serves as a department head liaison to the Communications Center which is overseen daily by Communication Supervisor Shawn Brewer. Our center is located in Police Headquarters and is comprised of two multi-station "Computer Assisted Dispatch" consoles, a video surveillance station, state & county communications, fax/copier machine and kitchenette. This year the center has completed total VHF radio interoperability with the Department of Public Works.

The Amherst Public Safety Communications Center cares for our community 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Each Amherst PSCC specialist makes a major commitment to our community and is ready to respond to any emergency. Amherst PSCC specialists undergo regular training in all aspects of emergency dispatch communications and are required to complete continuing education courses in order to meet state and national Emergency Medical Dispatching licensing requirements. During 2007, the Amherst Public Safety Communications Center handled over 60,500 calls for service.

PUBLIC WORKS REPORT

In April, long time employee and four year Buildings and Grounds Foreman Fred Salisbury retired. We wish Fred best of luck.

Town Buildings

Besides normal routine building maintenance on nine town buildings, this year's major repairs, focused on our Library. We improved heating efficiency by replacing the forty year old furnace, and next year's plans will include upgrading heating pipes to air handlers.

For several years, we have chased and repaired leaks in the Library's flat roof. While in the process of replacing the Ethylene Propylene Diene Monomer (EPDM) material it was discovered there were two layers of roofing under the one exposed. This was all removed. The roof was reinsulated, and covered with a new rubberized skin and new flashing.

With the guidance of Claudia Everest, Anne Krantz, and Buildings and Grounds Foreman Perry Day, the bushes at the Police Station were trimmed after which Charlie Duval washed and painted the front.

Roads

For the second year in a row, we were challenged with heavy early spring rains. Any savings realized from a relatively storm free winter became invested in repairing thirty-six roads water damaged roads. With a lot of paperwork and supporting documentation the town will eventually be reimbursed for seventy-five percent of the repair costs by FEMA, and the State of New Hampshire for twelve and one half percent. Repairs were completed by the very end of June.

With voter support in March, this past July additional budget funds became available for planned road repairs. With the trust you placed in our department, the number one Public Works priority, became road repairs. It was important to show you what we were capable of prior to the start of the next budget cycle. We will complete the remaining scheduled repairs for this budget cycle in the spring of 2008.

I wish to thank the Amherst Road Commission for their assistance and guidance during the previous year.

Baboosic Lake Septic

The General Contractor (CSSI) completed Phase II of the Community Septic in October.

Force Main construction runs down the middle of each road often effecting area traffic and daily lives. Already, lake water quality has shown improvements making this a worthwhile short term disruption. I want to take this opportunity to thank everyone for their assistance and cooperation. Twenty-two homes are now supporting this system.

You will see a second warrant article for Phase III. We were denied grant funding this past budget cycle, have reapplied, and have every indication of approval this upcoming year.

Town Commons

After years of concern, and with the cooperation of the Historic District Commission, the electrical power to the holiday, memory trees went from aerial to underground. The project started in late November and will be completed in the spring.

Once again, my sincere thanks to Charlie Duval and other town employees who continue to maintain and improve our heavily used commons in pristine condition.

Transfer Station

Concentrating on road repairs, construction, and reconstruction our attentions were diverted from producing a visible showing of Transfer Station renovations in the first half of the 2008 budget cycle. Some of the many blocks needed to retain the change in elevation are stockpiled and waiting for spring.

We have completed the following;

- Engineered design work with layout plans
- Driveway permit approval by New Hampshire DOT
- Notice of Intent permit from EPA

The list of accomplishments found in the previous pages came together with the dedication and commitment of my staff, crew, other town department heads, their staff, and of course the guidance, assistance and support of the Town Administrator, and Board of Selectmen. Finally none of this works without the cooperation, understanding, and support of you the taxpayers.

AMHERST EMS

The Amherst Department of Emergency Medical Services mission is to provide the highest quality, cost effective Basic and Advanced Life Support Emergency Medical Services, for the communities of Amherst and Mont Vernon. In addition to emergency medical transportation, the department has created the Amherst Academy of EMS. The Amherst Academy of EMS provides a variety of in-house Advanced Life Support and Basic Life Support EMS Education. During this past year the Academy held several formal EMT-Refresher Training Programs and credentialed 16 EMT's, including 5 members of the Amherst Fire Department. Additionally, this year Amherst EMS intergraded 12-Lead ECG Telemetry directly from the ambulance into the 4 major area hospital emergency departments via cell phone communications.

Director Brian Gleason manages Amherst EMS, the Amherst Academy of EMS and is a member of the Amherst Fire Department. As a member of the Amherst Fire Department, Director Gleason is responsible for providing "cross-training" opportunities for AFD members to become certified EMT's. Amherst EMS is currently made up of approximately 16 EMT's, 7 EMT-Intermediates, 11 Paramedics and 1 Paramedic Student. All of our paramedics are certified in (ACLS/PALS) Advanced Cardiac Life Support & Pediatric Advanced Life Support, (CPAP) Continuous Positive Airway Pressure administration and the placement of (IO) Intraosseous Needle Insertion.

Our station is located on the lower level of Police Headquarters and is comprised of a complete living quarters, academic training center and vehicle storage facility. Our Paramedic Fleet includes two 2001 Ford F-350 4X4 Emergency Ambulances, a 2005 Ford Explorer 4X4 Paramedic Response Vehicle donated by *the Amherst Rescue Squad Association* and a 2005 Ford Explorer 4X4 Directors Incident Command Vehicle which is equipped with Mass Casualty Advanced Life Support EMS equipment and Fire Suppression protective gear.

During 2006 - 2007, Amherst EMS responded to the needs of 723 patients. Amherst Police respond to all EMS calls as our 1st Responders and have equipped two police units with Automatic External Defibrillators and Oxygen supplies. Amherst Fire responds with Amherst EMS to all motor vehicle accidents, industrial accidents and responds on other medical calls as required to assist Amherst EMS.

Amherst EMS cares for our community 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Each Amherst EMS member makes a major commitment to our community, spending on average, approximately 48-72 hours a month on our call department, ready to respond to any emergency. Amherst EMS crewmembers undergo regular training in all aspects of emergency medical treatment and are required to complete continuing education courses in order to meet state and national EMT licensing requirements.

AMHERST FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Town is fortunate to be served by a Department that is primarily made up of paid-on-call personnel. Not only does this group of individuals handle emergency response to fire, rescue and hazardous materials incidents in the community, in addition to their fulltime jobs, they also average two evenings per month for Department meetings and training, as well as additional time devoted to obtaining higher levels of education and certification.

The Department and its members play a large part in community events such as the 4th of July celebration as well as the lighting of the towns Christmas tree, annual breakfast and greeting Santa at the fire station.

Deputy Chief Matthew Conley handles the prevention and investigation duties of the Department. In 2007 the Department conducted 445 inspections. Included are life safety inspections, site and building plan reviews, residential propane, oil and woodstove/fireplace inspections, seasonal burning permit inspections and fire drills. During the month of October, the dedicated members of the department visited all of the schools to educate the children on fire safety.

This year, the Amherst Fire Department experienced a resignation of a very dedicated individual. Deputy Chief Steve Bair. Deputy Bair gave countless hours to the Town of Amherst in the protection of life and property and he was the primary instructor for many of the training programs that the department conducted. Steve was very active as a State of New Hampshire Staff Instructor and course coordinator. Deputy Chief Bair took a position as Director of Fire Services in Pennsylvania.

2007 was a year of transition for the Amherst Fire Department. In September John DeSilva resigned as the first full time Fire Chief and accepted a job as the Fire Chief in Sanbornton NH.

Rick Todd was hired as the new Amherst Fire Chief. Chief Todd comes to the Town of Amherst Fire Department with 27 years of experience in the fire service.

In October, Firefighter Ray Anderson completed his position as an Emergency Response Corps-Firefighter with AmeriCorps. This position was assigned to the Amherst Fire Department. Firefighter Anderson was responsible for recruitment and retention of members of our department. Ray will be pursuing his career goal within the fire service and going to the New Hampshire Community Technical College in Laconia for Fire Science. Firefighter Anderson will be staying on as a call firefighter with the department.

Several promotions took place as well. Captain Brian Disco was promoted to Deputy Chief, Lt. Dan Barton was promoted to Captain, Lt. Bill Campbell to the position of Training Captain. Firefighter Brennen McCarthy was promoted to Lieutenant and Firefighter Lenny Brown was promoted to Lieutenant.

The Department maintains its data management software system called FIREHOUSE. The software now allows for the electronic record keeping of all areas of the Department in one system. This allowed us to report all of our incidents to the NH State Fire Marshal's office, which then gets forwarded into a national database. This reporting is a requirement of obtaining future federal grant monies. The Department plans to continue to expand the use of this system to its fullest capability.

The Department completed the year handling 553 calls varying in nature. The routine calls were: Car Fires, Brush Fires, Appliance Fires, Motor Vehicle Accidents, Fire Alarm Activations, Carbon Monoxide Incidents, Hazardous Condition Investigations and Service Calls. We were also faced with some more severe incidents of major magnitude. These incidents included; A One Hundred Year Flooding Event within the community, four major accidents that the Hydraulic Rescue tools had to be utilized due to major entrapment, the most catastrophic a four vehicle accident on Rt. 101 that involved multiple victims with fire and entrapment as well as two fatalities, a large brush/woodland fire that raced up a hillside that threatened structures that required multiple towns for manpower and equipment and lastly a three alarm structure fire that occurred in November on Amherst Street.

In November, the Department held its annual dinner and awards night. This year's "Top Responder" went to Firefighter Ray Anderson. We also had two individuals that received years of service awards. Captain Ed Hanlon received his 20 Year Service Award and Firefighter John Crowley received his 15 Year Service Award.

The Department continues to enjoy a cohesive working relationship with the Amherst Police Department and Amherst EMS as well as Amherst DPW. I wish to thank my fellow Department Heads, as well as Town Administrator Gary MacGuire, the Board of Selectmen and the citizens for their support.

Lastly, I wish to thank the members of the Amherst Fire Department for their support, dedication and hard work. I am fortunate as Fire Chief to have the quality of members that I do serving and protecting their community.

AMHERST EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

The Emergency Management function of the Town serves to prepare our community to address disasters, both natural and manmade, in a manner that minimizes personal injury and damage. In addition, the Emergency Management team, comprised of key elected and appointed officials in town, opens the Emergency Operations Center whenever necessary to manage events that arise during the year. For the second year in a row, Amherst suffered through unusually severe spring floods. The additional emergency management planning conducted following the 2006 flooding seemed to serve the community well, as the management of this emergency was coordinated professionally and smoothly.

Another component of Emergency Management this past year was a mock Pandemic Immunization program conducted in the region. This program, capably managed by Deputy Director Holden, concluded with flu shot immunizations at Souhegan High School to mimic the issues that would arise should mass inoculations ever be required for a pandemic event.

The team continues to work to improve the town Emergency Operations Center, located at the public safety complex. We have visited other centers around the state to incorporate some of their ideas to create, in a cost effective manner, a facility that will capably serve Amherst for any disaster that could befall us. Should we determine that substantial improvements to our facility are required, we will seek grant assistance to minimize the impact to the taxpayer.

The past two years of work that produced the Amherst Hazard Mitigation Plan was rewarded with final approval by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). This plan serves as a template to proactively address issues in our community prior to an emergency event, minimizing damage and injury. The plan is also a prerequisite to seeking any federal grants that may be required to finance these improvements.

In closing I would like to recognize and thank the individuals who have worked so hard to prepare our town for emergencies, and been there when these events have occurred. Deputy Director Don Holden has served many years in this position, and has donated countless hours to making Amherst a safer community. Our current emergency service department heads (Peter Lyon –PD, Bruce Berry – DPW, Brian Gleason – EMS, and Rick Todd – FD) work flawlessly as a team in smoothly managing events that occur. Our employees in all of these departments, as well as our Public Safety Communications Center employees, are the ones who actually make it happen during these emergencies. Finally, our Selectmen have always stepped up in time of need and been of great assistance in executing our plan. Emergency Management is a team effort, and we are very fortunate to have such a great team!

PEABODY MILL ENVIRONMENTAL CENTER (PMEC)

The mission of PMEC is to foster an awareness, understanding and appreciation of the natural world, by offering environmental, conservation, and science programs to all ages. PMEC strives to foster diligent stewardship of our environment so that future generations may inherit and continue to be inspired by the wonders of a protected and natural world.

Located at the end of Brook Road on the Joe English Reservation, the Peabody Mill Environmental Center is a community environmental and nature education center owned and operated by the Town of Amherst. Under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen and the Town Administrator, the Center is staffed year-round by the part-time Director, a part-time Public Relations Assistant, a part-time Educator-in-Residence, on-call Naturalists, and an Artist-in-Residence as well as many volunteers. An appointed Advisory Board provides vision and fund raising. During the past summer, the PMEC employed numerous local teachers and approximately 81 student volunteers for the yearly Hartshorn Summer Programs

The PMEC offers a variety of year round environmental, conservation, and science programs such as the Leave No Child Inside initiative, children's evening and school vacation day programs, guided hikes, fishing programs, art workshops, fireside chats, preschooler and parent nature exploration, outdoor survival and safety programs and many more. Snowshoes are available for rent on winter weekends. The PMEC is the location for the Hartshorn Summer Program attended by hundreds of local children. Amherst and Mont Vernon school districts take advantage of the programs the Center offers. Programs are also being offered to local private schools, preschools, and school districts outside of Amherst on a limited basis. PMEC complements existing educational programs and supplements the school science curriculum. PMEC's lessons follow state educational curriculum standards and are an inquiry based experiential complement to the science curriculum. The Center also offers programs and events to families, adults, senior citizens, teachers, foresters and landowners. All educational programs are fee based.

In 2007, we were awarded a multi-year grant by the Bean Foundation to expand our program offerings to children and their families. The Board is currently working to found a "Friends of Peabody Mill" organization to fund raise and assist with the work of the Center. Although still in the planning stages, the NH Charitable Foundation has given us a generous grant to start this initiative. Additionally, PMEC has formed a financial and educational partnership with PSNH to install geothermal heating in the new building.

The PMEC is in the process of expanding. A 5,200 square foot addition is almost completed and has been the focus of the all-volunteer Advisory Board for the past several years. The Advisory Board, especially Jim Bowen who has acted as general contractor, has been instrumental in accomplishing the expansion of the building. The expansion adds classroom space, meeting rooms and offices which will support program growth.

Through private fundraising, the Center's first two phases have been completed. A warrant article requesting that land use change tax fund money (money paid to the town when land is taken out of its current use and developed) be used to finish the inside of the building (heat, electrical, wiring, plumbing, interior finishes, etc.) passed at the Spring 2007 Town Meeting.

With the opening of the building scheduled for the spring of 2008, The P MEC would like to expand the year-round programs and maximize its revenues. The additional space will allow the P MEC to host more than one school class at a time, provide shelter for Hartshorn during inclement weather, expand school vacation programs, provide more than one bathroom, and have additional space for a science nature library, a classroom science lab, a nature art room, an administrative office, meeting rooms, a snowshoe rental area and a gift shop.

Expansion of the building is expected to contribute additional revenues by providing space for new programming and the opportunity to better serve Amherst and the surrounding communities. Starting in the summer of 2008, non-residents will be charged a higher fee. Future facility plans include furnishings, educational equipment, the creation of a small, professional, experiential environmental museum, and a library within the expanded building.

PLANNING AND ZONING DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT

The Planning and Zoning Department has seen a steady decline in the construction of single-family homes on single-family lots this year. However, the Building Department has had a steady flow of additions, renovations, and remodelings that has kept the Building Inspector busy throughout the year. The amount of repaired or replaced septic installations has remained stable this year. The present economic indications for the residential construction industry are very dismal in that the sub-prime loan problems will continue and exacerbate in 2008.

The present year has produced the construction of the final retail stores at the Lowes site (Meadow Brook Crossing) on NH Route 101A. In addition, on the other side of the street, the KFC / Taco Bell has been completed and will be open just before Christmas. The Sports Authority, Circuit City, and Starbucks, etc. (Amherst Crossing) is under construction and will be open in the late spring of 2008.

The Zoning Office continues to provide support for the Planning Board, the Zoning Board of Adjustment, and the Historic District Commission. In addition, the Zoning Office has continued to work with and assist the Department of Public Works on the second and third phase of the Baboosic Lake Community Septic System.

The Planning and Zoning Office is available for record research, for individual homeowner construction planning, and for consultation with land developers for residential, commercial, and industrial development planning. The Building Inspector is available Tuesday through Thursday between 8 AM to 9 AM for building plan review, construction, and scheduling questions. The Zoning Office inspects all test pits for septic repairs and all new installations. Septic plans are reviewed and approved, and then the construction is inspected by the Department in two phases. This includes residential and commercial-industrial facilities.

A continuing reminder to all Amherst Citizens in Town that Building Permits are required for all construction in Town. In addition, any disturbance of a buffer to a wetland must be approved by the Amherst Planning Board.

AMHERST RECREATION

The year 2007 was an exciting year of change and steady growth for the Department. We were fortunate to add two new staff members, Program Assistant, Diana Jones and Park Foreman, Keith Trott. Their experience along with our 10-year veteran, Candy Shirey, support staff, instructors and numerous volunteers helped us in obtaining our goals of quality programs and facilities.

The Recreation Commission worked closely with the community by way of their sub-committees:

- ❖ Administration: Comprised of 3-4 members who meet as needed to review policy and recommend program policy/procedure to the Executive Committee and Recreation Commission.
- ❖ Executive: Comprised of 6 members who meet monthly to review policy and the day to day operation of the Department and make recommendations to the Recreation Commission.
- ❖ Facilities Committee: Comprised of 3-4 members who meet as needed to review and evaluate short and long term facility needs, assist in developing a Recreation Master Plan and make recommendations to the Executive Committee and Recreation Commission.
- ❖ Program Committee: An ad-hoc committee whereby the Director will call on members as needed for program input.

The twelve-member Commission during their quarterly meetings continued their work on establishing and updating the Department's policies. The Commission:

- Developed and initiated a pet-free environment by posting signs on all town athletic fields to assure the area is a clean and safe facility while using them.
- Developed and initiated a program policy that defines and provides guidelines for recreation programs as well as privately sponsored recreation programs.
- Established a Facilities needs inventory to be used in conjunction with a recreation master plan.
- Worked cooperatively with the Amherst School Board and the Amherst Board of Selectmen in developing a warrant article to establish and fund the development of the Bean athletic fields.
- Worked cooperatively with the Amherst Board of Selectmen in developing a warrant article to establish a Recreation Capital Reserve Fund.
- Worked cooperatively with private community sports groups and Souhegan to study the need for artificial turf on existing athletic fields.

- Developed and initiated a user fee for tournaments, jamborees, or special events held on Amherst athletic fields.
- Adopted the National Youth Sports Coach's Association (NYSCA) training program and initiated a training program for volunteer coaches.
- Initiated or co-sponsored new programs to include:

To date our web-site has recorded over 212,000 hits since May, 2006. The Recreation Commission is pleased to report the completion of the development of athletic fields on the Bean Property. Three flat practice and game fields plus a 60' baseball diamond will be ready for teams sports in the fall of 2008. Thanks to the cooperation of the Amherst Board of Selectmen, the Amherst School District, our residents and the contractor, JGE Enterprise we have athletic fields that we can be very proud to own. As a reminder the Department will release the fields in late summer for fall sports. In the meantime we are following our outlined maintenance plan to provide safe playing fields with healthy turf.

The Recreation Commission and Department holds in high regard the significance and importance volunteers bring to our programs. Without the support of over 300 citizens we would not be able to deliver a quality and diverse program. We are indebted to them and thank them for their contribution

REPORT FROM THE CEMETERY TRUSTEES 2007

By state law, only “interest” from Cemetery Trust Funds (without Court permission) or tax dollars can be used for Cemetery maintenance. After several meetings over a two year period and with the development of a new cemetery on the horizon, approximately eighty-five percent of the maintenance costs have been phased into the town budget. This will allow the excess interest income to accumulate for future development of Forestview Cemetery (Cemetery Fields).

The layout of Forestview Cemetery (Cemetery Fields) is progressing with the assistance of a Landscape Architect. We have selected a design concept, and await an estimated cost using the Capital Reserve fund appropriated for design purposes. The next step is to petition the courts for permission to expend monies from accumulated interest income. This process may take as much as two years. At which point, funds will be available to start developing the site.

During the months of July, August, and September a new part-time employee dedicated to cemetery maintenance, worked at Meadowview Cemetery resetting flat markers to ground level, loamed and seeded depressed areas, and assisted in removing granite posts (no longer used) from Cricket Corner Cemetery. We plan to reuse these granite posts at Meadowview when we replace the chain link fence.

We wish to remind everyone, cemetery rules and regulations are posted on the town webpage at www.amherstnh.gov click Department, choose Public Works, and select “Cemetery”.

The Cemetery Trustees gratefully appreciate the work of the Sexton, Bruce W. Berry, Secretary Margaret H. Drobat, Perry E. Day, Foreman, Grounds and all the members of the Department of Public Works.

AMHERST COMMUNICATIONS INFRASTRUCTURE COMMITTEE

The Board of Selectmen appointed the Amherst Communications Infrastructure Committee (CIC) on July 15, 2002. Since that time the committee has worked in five strategic areas:

1. Communication Services for Residents:

To promote successful relationships with high quality providers of competitive, secure, and reliable cable TV, internet, and wireless communications services to Amherst residents.

2007 Results: Comcast has completed the takeover of Adelphia in Amherst. The committee has finished the process of renegotiating the contract with Comcast. We now have a ten year non-exclusive agreement with Comcast to supply cable tv service to the town. This contract defines what services that Comcast will supply to Amherst. What this contract does NOT cover is internet services. Internet services are expressly left off this contract due to FCC regulations.

2. Public, Educational, Government Access

To enable local public access to the production of and broadcast of Amherst activities and meetings as well as other electronic “communities” that may develop in the future.

2007 Results: Amherst Community Access Television has been established to coordinate public/education/government channels in town. ACTV channel 20 has been established for public/government access. ACTV20 currently broadcasts live meetings of the selectmen, planning board, zoning board of adjustment, and the Amherst School Board. In addition, selectmen’s meetings are rebroadcast several times during the week. Programs of public interest are also broadcast several times during the day and airtime has been reserved for any member of the public that would like to produce and broadcast their own program. A community notice bulletin board also runs on ACTV20 whenever there is no other programming being broadcast. Any organization within the town is encouraged to make their public notices available on ACTV20.

3. Support of Economic Growth

To meet the needs of existing businesses and home offices, and to attract new businesses into Amherst by promoting successful relationships with high quality suppliers to provide a competitive, secure and reliable business class communications infrastructure both now and in the future.

2006 Results: Business class internet service is available to all commercial and industrial areas of town. The remaining concern is for home based business usage in areas where cable broadband is either unavailable or unsuited to specific needs, and DSL is unavailable.

4. Support of the Selectmen

To advise the Board of Selectmen on all regulatory, contractual, technological and competitive matters regarding the communications infrastructure of Amherst.

2006 Results: The Adelpia cable franchise expired in July 2006 and an extension for 1 year was signed to allow for renegotiations. The committee is advising the Board of Selectmen in the renewal process. The committee has also crafted a proposed franchise agreement to replace the one currently in place. Negotiations are underway with Comcast.

5. Forward Looking

To continually evaluate new developments in communications technology and recommend options to the Selectmen for incorporation into our infrastructure.

2006 Results: The committee is following with interest developments in high-speed wireless service, broadband over power lines, and the impact Verizon's sale of its NH landlines to Fairpoint will have on expectations for deployment of fiber to the neighborhood/curb/home.

The CIC committee is actively recruiting volunteers to act as producers of public meetings (selectmen, planning, zoning board of adjustment, school board). The committee is also able to broadcast locally produced shows from citizens of Amherst.

The committee website is accessible from the town home page, or directly at www.amherstnh.gov/communications. This web page contains program schedules for ACTV20, agendas for upcoming meetings, complete minutes of meetings, answers to Frequently Asked Questions, and other information.

CIC meetings are usually held on the second Tuesday of the month at Town Hall. All CIC meetings are open to the public. Please consult the website for the meeting times, places, and agendas.

Multiple openings exist on the committee for residents who are interested in participating in the process of defining and operating communications services in Amherst.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Amherst Conservation Commission manages town properties acquired by donation and town warrant, then set aside for conservation purposes. We make recommendations on dredge and fill applications to the State Wetlands Board, and on real estate developments to the town Planning Board and the ZBA. We attempt to preserve the rural character of the community by conserving wildlife, habitat and water quality. The ACC meets monthly on the second Sunday of the month at 7:00 PM in the Town Hall. The public is welcome.

Acquisitions: One conservation property was acquired this year – Lot 8-17, a gift from the Odell family of 17 acres on Horace Greeley Road behind the Cider Mill named the Odell Preserve.

Trails: A new trail, the half-mile “Josiah Parker Trail” was created connecting Pond Parish through the Fells conservation easement to Baboosic Lake Rd.

Land Management: We now have a “Meadow Management Plan” for the ACC meadows including purpose, goals, description of each property, guidelines for management considering soils, fertilizer requirements, weed control, invasive problems, and re-seeding guidelines. Also, we began a timber harvest in the Boutelle property following our consulting forester’s recommendations in the “Forest Management Plan”.

Conservation Education: We placed articles in the Amherst General about the Natural Resources Inventory process, the ACC Forest Management Plan, and on the Odell donation.

Outreach: Two ACC members serve on the Open Space Advisory Committee, charged with figuring out which acquisitions make the most sense and with landowner negotiations. Another serves on the Planning Board and we have a strong presence on the Amherst Master Plan steering committee.

If you are interested in pursuing conservation values and projects in town, please attend our meetings, join an ACC Friends group, or consider offering your professional services as a commissioner by contacting the Town Selectmen for an interview.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. Fire Permits are available at the Amherst Communications Center located at the Police Station. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the Amherst Fire Department at 673-1545 or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603) 271-2214, or online at www.nhdf.org.

Fire activity was very busy during the spring of the 2007, particularly late April into early May. As the forests and fields greened up in later May the fire danger decreased. However, a very dry late summer created very high fire danger again from August into September, with fire danger reaching very high on Labor Day weekend. Even with the dry conditions, the acreage burned was less than half that of 2006. The largest forest fire during the 2007 season burned approximately 26 acres on the side of Wantastiquet Mountain in Chesterfield during the month of May. Our statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers is credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2007 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. AMHERST HERITAGE COMMISSION

The Amherst Heritage Commission was established in 2002 for the purpose of properly recognizing, using, protecting, and preserving the historic and heritage resources of the town of Amherst that are valued for their historic, cultural, aesthetic or community significance within their natural, built or cultural environments. The Amherst Heritage Commission shall have advisory and review authority to:

- a. Survey and inventory all historic and cultural resources within the town, conduct research and publish findings, assist and advise Amherst boards and commissions in supporting issues which address cultural and historic resources, coordinate activities of local agencies and reviewing matters affecting cultural and historic resources town-wide
- b. Receive gifts of money and property, in the name of the Town, subject to Selectmen approval, and manage such gifts for its proper use
- c. Establish partnerships with individuals, schools, local businesses, Town boards and organizations who share like interests in the preservation and conservation of the town's heritage resources

Accomplishments and Project Updates During the Past Year (2007)

- a. Continue to work with the Department of Transportation, Transportation Enhancement Program, for the Town Hall Landscape and Traffic Pattern project, Phase 2 and 3. The Engineering phase of the project is expected to commence in 2008. Currently raising funds for the 25% match.
- b. Received a grant of \$18,000.00 from the Norwin S. and Elizabeth N. Bean Foundation for the Brick School Front Porch repair. This is in addition to funds from the Bertha Rogers Trust Fund and from the Amherst Villagers Chapter of Questers for a total amount raised of \$33,000.00. Currently working with the Amherst School District School Board to finalize plans and resources for the completion of the project. Anticipate work to commence in April 2008.
- c. Continued activities with multiple town organizations and offices in forming a Town of Amherst 250th Anniversary Celebration (1760-2010) Committee- initial planning is underway. A nationally known keynote speaker has committed to the celebration in 2010. Exploring possibilities of giving a special gift to the town as part of the celebration.
- d. Supported the Amherst Planning Board's effort for the update to the Town Master Plan- the Heritage Commission will be focal point for all Amherst historic and heritage resources input
- e. The Heritage Commission is progressing on with the town-wide survey of historic resources. Project will start in earnest in the spring of 2008. Looking for volunteers from the town to assist with data collection, photography, and historical research.
- f. Completed the work with the Board of Selectmen, Department of Public Works, and the Amherst Cemetery Trustees in finishing implementation of the Phase 1 of the Town Hall Landscaping and Old Burial Grounds curbing project.
- g. Worked with Amherst School District School Board in installing two benches for the playground area of the Brick School- made possible by donations of the Amherst Garden Club and an anonymous donor.

- h. Coordinated activities with the Freedom's Way Heritage Area Association and congressional staff in obtaining state and national heritage area designation for nine towns in southern New Hampshire, of which Amherst is included. The state formally designated and recognized Amherst as part of the Freedoms Way Heritage Area.

HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION REPORT

The Historic District Commission currently consists of five members and four alternates who are appointed by the Board of Selectmen. In addition, there is one *ex officio* voting member each from the Board of Selectmen and the Planning Board. The Commission meets the third Thursday of every month and is charged by ordinance with the responsibility of reviewing all applications for Certificates of Approval for any exterior changes, renovations or additions to properties located within the District. Applications to be reviewed by the Commission are due in the Zoning Office at the close of business twenty-one days prior to the meeting date. This allows the agenda to be posted, placed on the Town web page and also allows for abutter notification.

In early 1991, Historic District Commission "Guidelines" were completed, reviewed by Town Counsel, and placed in the Town Library along with the reference material the Commission used in drawing up the guidelines. This reference material includes the Secretary of the Interior's "Standards for Rehabilitation - Guidelines for Rehabilitating Historic Buildings" as well as "Preserving Community Character" which is published by the New Hampshire Association of Historic District Commissions. Both manuals are excellent sources of information and are especially important if one contemplates making changes to an historic house. Copies of the Commission's Guidelines are also on file in the Town Hall Zoning Office. In addition to these resources the library's books relating to preservation and restoration have been updated and added to over the past two years. A flyer describing the guidelines has been prepared and is now available to citizens to help them understand the process of applying to the Commission. Flyers are available at the Zoning Office and the Library. We encourage all citizens to make use of all these resources.

This year the Commission dealt with requests for renovations, signage, fencing, tree removal, and new construction. As we work to render fair and reasonable decisions to the applicants while maintaining the very characteristics which make the Historic District unique we spend a good deal of time reviewing our Design Guidelines and Rules of Procedure for clarity and consistency. We continue to look for ways to make them clear, fair, and consistent.

We keep in close contact with the Heritage Commission and expect to work with them on the survey of the town. This will assist everyone in maintaining structures and open spaces. We also work closely with the Public Works Department on issues relating to the Village. The Selectmen this year created the position of Tree Warden under the PWD. In addition to recommending trees on town property that should be removed, the Warden is developing a plan for replacement of trees where needed.

TRUSTEES REPORT FOR THE AMHERST TOWN LIBRARY

This past year the Amherst Library saw a significant increase in the overall circulation of books, audio and video recordings and online access to our subscription databases. We also had dramatic increases in the number of programs for children and adults. We were particularly pleased with the large number of participants in our children's programs. The children's Summer Reading Program, *Reading Road Trip USA*, was wildly successful with 354 girls and boys participating and far exceeding our reading goal.

Despite national trends that show a decline in adult recreational reading, we have seen an increase in the circulation of our adult fiction books. Part of this increase may be due to our first adult community reading program, *The Big Read*. We wrote a proposal and received a \$10,000 grant from National Endowment of the Arts by partnering with the Northeast Cultural Coop, the Friends of the Amherst Library, and public libraries in Bedford, Milford, Wilton, Brookline, New Boston and Mont Vernon. Another factor in this increase is the number of informal book clubs that have recently formed; the Library supports about 30 book clubs by getting background information on authors, subject matter, book reviews and extra copies of books.

Some of the expanding and diverse programs for adults include our Sunday @ 4 music series, and educational and recreational Tuesday evening programs such as *Hiking the Appalachian Trail*, and *Cooking With Oonagh*.

To better serve our teenage patrons, we use a teen advisory group to suggest programs, books, games and even the types of furniture that we added in our teen area. The furniture included a loveseat, beanbag, and an area rug to make teen section more hospitable. The funds for the furniture were provided by the Friends of the Library.

Our remotely accessed web services continue to improve and expand. Our online electronic information services saw an increase of 21% in remote subscription database usage and 34% increase in general website use. A new service is now available called Library Elf. Library Elf is software program that notifies our patrons when items are ready for pickup (holds) or overdue or when checked out material is one or more days prior to its due date. You can

- Consolidate your family's library accounts
- Get email or notices on your cell phone or RSS.

In November, we continued our annual "Food for Fines" program. This year our patrons responded by donating several hundred non-perishable food items that were given to SHARE.

We introduced some additional museum passes and new "playaway" audio books that combine an audio player with the audio book. We continue to add to our book, audio and

video collection due to the generous donations from numerous local organizations and individuals. We thank the various organizations and individuals that have contributed to the library. These contributions help us continue to improve the services we offer to our patrons.

RECYCLING AND WASTE REDUCTION TASK FORCE

During the past year, the Task Force proposed and promoted a warrant article to provide funding for renovating the Transfer Station. In March, 2007, the voters of Amherst approved the renovation. Significant progress has been made since then, though most of it isn't visible. All required drawings have been generated, permits applied for and some of the blocks for the retaining wall have been purchased and are stored at the Transfer Station. Had the weather been as cooperative this fall as it was in 2006, construction of the new driveway would have already begun. Instead, construction will begin this spring, as soon as the snow is gone.

At the Town celebration on July 3 and 4, the Task Force arranged to borrow two "Recyclemobiles" from the Northeast Resource Recovery Association. One was situated at Souhegan on July 3rd during the fireworks display and then joined the second recyclemobile on the Town Common on the 4th. They worked out quite well. The Task Force feels that with all the events in town during the spring, summer and fall, it would be useful to have one closer than the NRRA offices in Epping. Toward that end, the Task Force is investigating the possibility of acquiring one for the Town.

STORMWATER PHASE II YEAR FIVE OF THE MANDATED EPA FIVE-YEAR PLAN

Flooding of devastating magnitude occurred in Amherst during the past two springs; on Mother's Day in '06 and Tax Day in '07. Amherst experienced the power and destruction of Stormwater runoff. Stormwater discharges are generated by runoff from impervious areas such as roads, rooftops, parking lots, and frozen or compacted soils. Often these discharges contain pollutants adversely affecting water quality. The Environmental Protection Agencies (EPA), Federal mandate, through "best management practices" utilizing a five year permit process is to minimize adverse water quality from runoff.

The Town of Amherst successfully used the engineering talents of several interns over two summers, (05 & 06) for most of the necessary legwork (field work to collect data on inflows and outflows, etc.) to complete the EPA's requirements of the Phase II permit. Last summer however was a little more challenging, Heather Seitz, our Engineering Assistant who would have supervised the interns work, resigned her position and moved to Ohio, so no interns were hired. Hopefully the intern program will be continuing this summer under the supervision of the new Engineering Assistant, John St. Pierre EIT.

Prior to leaving, Heather consolidated several drafts from consultants and legal counsel as well as impute from many in town to edit "Section I Amherst Stormwater Regulation."

Public hearings were held as required by the Planning Board on Feb 21, and the Selectmen on Feb 22 to add a new Section I to the Amherst Zoning Ordinance. This EPA required document became a legal part of the Amherst Zoning in February. The Zoning Office will now be responsible for administering and enforcing this regulation.

There is still work to be done. Through the efforts of the Nashua Regional Planning Commission (NRPC) progress has been made addressing the educational component on a regional basis. This involves developing curriculum and getting classroom teachers from each community involved. This progress will be recorded in our fifth year progress report to EPA in May.

Being in the fifth year of a five year permit, it is logical to assume this is the end of requirements. Quite the opposite, we await EPA's next round of rules and regulations, something reported to be more stringent.

While we are not aware of any cities or towns being fined for noncompliance, several New England construction companies have. Our responsibility is for Amherst to meet, or show acceptable progress towards meeting, the necessary requirements.

The committee wishes to thank the Board of Selectmen and Town Administrator for their continuous support.

Moderator Robert Schaumann called the meeting to order at 7PM. 137 voters checked in. Selectman Bruce Bowler introduced the department heads: Nancy Macmillan, recreation , Brian Gleason, EMS, Amy Lapointe, library, Peter Lyon, police, John DeSilva, fire, Charlie Tiedemann, zoning, Gail Stout, tax collector, Victoria Laforet, P MEC. The Board of Selectmen were Bruce Bowler, Jay Dinkel, George Infanti, Reed Panasiti, and Tom Grella. The Ways and Means Committee members were Neal Foley, chairman, Rick Crocker, Ted Landon, Robin Warren, John Behn, Deirdre Rogusky, and retiring member, John Lobsitz.

Selectmen Bowler presented a silver commemorative plate to retiring selectman Dinkel. Moderator Schaumann explained SB2 empowering the meeting to discuss each article, maintain original wording, and place the article on the March 13th town meeting ballot or amend the dollar amount and place the amended article on the ballot. Guidelines for the meeting as proposed by the moderator were as follows:

Voters would hold up a yellow card when the vote was called.

No amendment to an amendment was allowed.

Three minute speaking rule.

No voter would be allowed to speak until any other voter had spoken once.

Voter must state his/her address.

No new business would be conducted after 10:45PM unless it was the will of the meeting to do so.

After each vote a motion to restrict reconsideration was requested.

Mr. Schaumann then read the Town Warrant:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Amherst in the County of Hillsborough and qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified that the Annual Meeting of the Town of Amherst will be held, in accordance with Senate Bill 2 (NHRSA 40:13). The first session, to transact all business other than voting, is on Monday, February 5, 2007 at 7:00 PM at the Souhegan High School Auditorium. The second session, voting by official ballot at the polls is on Tuesday, March 13, 2007 at the Souhegan High School from 6:00 AM to 8:00 PM.

Article 2: Baboosic Lake Community Septic Bond

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Fifty Thousand and 00/100 (\$650,000) Dollars (Gross Budget) to construct Phase III of the Baboosic Lake Community Septic System, and to authorize said funds to be raised through the issuance of bonds, bond anticipation notes or serial notes therefore in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes in their judgment, and to further authorize the Selectmen to contract for and expend any State aid that may be available for this project and to further authorize interest earned on this bond to be utilized to pay costs

associated with this project. It is contemplated that the amount to be raised by bonds or notes will be offset by available public or private grants, and other sources of donations including, but not limited to, the following:

- A grant in the anticipated amount of \$250,000 from the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services Watershed Restoration Program;
- A grant in the anticipated amount of \$200,000 from the State of New Hampshire Department State Aid Grant Program;
- Any additional available grants or donations of which the Board may become aware and in its discretion determine to accept;

and the Board of Selectmen is authorized to accept such monies on behalf of the Town. No dollars will be raised through taxation and any cost associated with this project will be assessed in accordance with RSA 149:1-7. This is a Special Article in accordance with RSA 32. 3/5 Ballot Vote Required.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this Article.)

This article has no tax impact.

Selectman Dinkel explained the article which gives the authority to apply for grants. Phase 1 is complete, phase 2 is in progress. Users of the system would pay the costs. There was no discussion. Vote to restrict reconsideration was passed.

Article 3: Operating Budget

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth herein, totaling \$8,993,309. Should this article be defeated the operating budget shall be \$8,843,571 which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town or by law, the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. This article does not include any other appropriation.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports.)

This article has a tax impact of \$.24.

Selectman Bowler spoke to this article. Linda Kaiser motioned to amend the budget by increasing it by \$400,000 of the highway department. She said that money for road repairs should not come out of money from the Land Use Change Tax Fund (LUCT) as this money should be directed to conservation. She was referring to Article 5. Dinkel explained that the money would not come out of the conservation fund but out of the other ½ of the land use change fund money set aside in 1991 for land acquisition which was not under the conservation commission control.

Others spoke in favor of the amendment saying the LUCT money should be used as intended for conservation. James O'Mara said that the amendment would increase the highway line item by over 100% of the currently proposed increase. Others spoke in

favor of the amendment.

The motion to amend the operating budget from \$8,993,309 to \$9,393,309 with a default budget of \$8,843,571.00 passed.

Placed on ballot as amended. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 4: Transfer Station Renovation

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred sixty eight thousand dollars (\$168,000) for the reconstruction of the Amherst Transfer Station to combine recycling and trash collection areas and construct a new exit onto Route 101. This will be a non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7, VI and will not lapse until the project is completed or by June 30, 2009, whichever is sooner. This is a Special Warrant Article in accordance with RSA 32.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee does not support this Article by a vote of 3 to 6.)

This article has a tax impact of \$.09.

Bruce Bowler spoke to this article, Steve Morgan gave a presentation. The vote last year on a similar warrant article failed by 7 votes. He spoke to the advantages of the proposed improvements. There was no discussion. Placed on ballot as written. Motion to restrict reconsideration was passed.

Article 5: Town Road Repairs – LUCT Funding

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000) for the purpose of reconstructing and repairing certain town roads selected by the Director of the Department of Public Works to the minimum standard identified and defined in the 2006 Amherst Road Surface Management Plan, and further to authorize the Board of Selectmen pursuant to RSA 79-A:25-a, (II), to withdraw said funds from the Land Use Change Tax Fund, or take any action relative thereto. This is a non-lapsing Special Warrant Article in accordance with RSA 32.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee supports this Article by a vote of 3 to 6.)

This article has no tax impact.

Selectman Grella spoke to this article. He made a motion to amend this article removing \$400,000 and inserting \$1.00 since this money was placed in Article 3. Ways and means unanimously in favor. Placed on ballot as amended. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 6: DPW Replacement Trucks

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred fifty two thousand four hundred ninety two dollars (\$252,492) for the purpose of purchasing two replacement two axle, six wheeled dump trucks for the Department of Public Works and authorize the withdrawal from Highway Vehicle Capital Reserve Fund established for that purpose. This is a non-lapsing Special Warrant Article in accordance with RSA 32.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means

*Committee supports this Article by a vote of 6 to 3.)
This article has no tax impact.*

Selectman Grella spoke to this article. There was no discussion. Placed on ballot as written. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 7: DPW Loader Replacement

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a five (5) year municipal lease agreement for the sum of one hundred ten thousand dollars (\$110,000) for the purpose of acquiring a fully equipped front end loader replacement for the Department of Public Works and to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty five thousand four hundred dollars (\$25,400) for the first year's payment for that purpose or take any action relative thereto. The lease agreement contains a clause (escape clause) which will allow the Town to invalidate the lease if the town meeting fails to approve this annual rental in subsequent years. This is a non-lapsing Special Warrant Article in accordance with RSA 32.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously does not support this Article.)

This article has a tax impact of \$.01.

Selectmen Grella spoke to this article. There was no discussion. Placed on ballot as worded. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 8: Replacement Generator – Emergency Operations Center

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of forty two thousand dollars (\$42,000) for the purpose of replacing a generator manufactured in 1986 with a new 80KW generator at the Town of Amherst Communications and Emergency Operations Center. This is a non-lapsing Special Warrant Article in accordance with RSA 32.

(The Board of Selectmen recommends (4-1) a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee does not support this Article.)

This article has a tax impact of \$.02.

Selectman Dinkel explained that the current generator was over 20 years old and an upgrade was needed. After short discussion it was placed on ballot as worded. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 9: Fire Department Command Vehicle

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty seven thousand dollars (\$27,000) for the purpose of purchasing and outfitting a four wheel drive Command Vehicle to replace the current 1996 four wheel drive vehicle for the Fire Department or take any action relative thereto. This is a non-lapsing Special Warrant Article in accordance with RSA 32.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee does not support this Article by a vote of 0 to 8 with 1 abstention.)

This article has a tax impact of \$.01.

Selectman Bowler explained that the vehicle is 11 years old. If replaced the old vehicle would go replace a public works vehicle. There was little discussion. Placed on ballot as written. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 10: Recreation Fields Acquisition and Construction Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1, which shall be known as the Recreational Fields Acquisition and Construction Capital Reserve Fund, for the purpose of paying the costs of locating and acquiring property, including costs of due diligence investigation of the same, legal costs associated with purchasing property, etc., which property shall be utilized by the Town for recreational playing fields, and, additionally, for the purpose of paying the costs of constructing and establishing playing fields on such acquired property or other property, and to raise and appropriate the sum of up to Two Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$250,000) Dollars, to be placed into this fund, said sum to be raised from the unexpended fund balance, (surplus), to the extent that funds are available in said fund balance, and no amount to be raised from taxation, and to further appoint the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from this Fund in accordance with RSA 35:15 II or take any action relative thereto. This is a Special Warrant Article in accordance with RSA 32.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this Article.) This article has no impact on the tax rate.

Selectman Panasiti spoke to this article. Amended by Cal Wood to correct it by inserting the word 'be' between 'to' and 'raised'. Amendment passed. Placed on ballot as amended. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 11: Peabody Mill Environmental Center Building Phase III LUCT Funding

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred twenty five thousand dollars (\$225,000) for the purpose of completing construction of the Peabody Mill Environmental Center facility located on Brook Road, and further to authorize the Board of Selectmen, pursuant to RSA 79-A:25-a, (II), to withdraw said funds from the Land Use Change Tax Fund. This is a non-lapsing Special Warrant Article in accordance with RSA 32.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee supports this Article by a vote of 8 to 1.) This article has no tax impact.

Selectman Panasiti commented on this article. Kay May, a PMEC Advisory Board member. This money would complete phase 3. Money for phases 1 and 2 had private donations. This money would complete the building. She stated that the interest in this center has been more than expected. David Micciche motioned to reduce the amount to \$1.00 but failed for lack of a second. Jan Bunker spoke against the article stating that it was originally supposed to be self-supporting not tax payer funded. After more discussion it was placed on ballot as written. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 12: Town Computer System Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of

RSA 35:1, which shall be known as the Computer System Capital Reserve Fund, for the purpose of purchasing major computer system components, critical software updates, and/or emergency computer repairs for all Town Departments, and to raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500) to be placed into this fund, and to further appoint the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from this Fund in accordance with RSA 35:15 II or take any action relative thereto. This is a Special Warrant Article in accordance with RSA 32.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this Article.)

This article has a tax impact of less than \$.01

Selectman Infanti spoke to this article. No discussion. Placed on ballot as written. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 13: Public Access Television Equipment Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1, which shall be known as the Public Access Television Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, for the purpose of purchasing equipment necessary to enhance the capabilities of the local access television network (Amherst Community Access Television), and to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty five thousand dollars (\$25,000) to be placed into this fund, and to further appoint the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from this Fund in accordance with RSA 35:15 II or take any action relative thereto. *This is a Special Warrant Article in accordance with RSA 32.*

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this Article.)

This article has a tax impact of \$.01.

Selectman Jay Dinkel spoke to this article. George Bower said that some residents do not have cable access. Dinkel advised that they were negotiating with Comcast and hope to reach those areas. Article was placed on ballot as written. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 14: Recreation Bean Field LUCT Funding

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250,000 for the purpose of constructing athletic playing fields on property of the Amherst School District, (Map 2, Lots 141-1, 142, 144, 145), commonly known as the ‘Bean Property’, located on Boston Post Road, in return for an agreement to allow the Town to use said fields on terms and conditions acceptable to the Board of Selectmen and, further, to authorize the Board of Selectmen, pursuant to RSA 79-A:25-a, (II), to withdraw said funds from the Land Use Change Tax Fund. This is a non-lapsing Special Warrant Article in accordance with RSA 32.

(The Board of Selectmen recommends (4-1) a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this Article.)

This article has no tax impact.

Selectman Panasiti spoke to this article. He introduced Recreation director Nancy MacMillan who explained the article. \$200,000 will be funding from surplus, and \$250,000 would come from this article. The school district will be able to apply for state aid reimbursement. Dwight Brew said no money would come back to the town. The question was asked regarding bathrooms which are not included in the appropriation. Also Dana Redmond, chairman of Recreation Commission, said that user fees pay for some of field maintenance. Jan Bunker wanted to know if it still was considered a future school site. Dwight Brew said the school board voted 4-1 against this as a school site. After further discussion, was placed on ballot as written. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 15: Veteran's Tax Credit

To see if the Town shall vote to expand the Veteran's Tax Credit from three hundred dollars (\$300) per year to five hundred dollars (\$500) per year in accordance with RSA 72:28.

(The Board of Selectmen recommends (4-0-1) a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee does not support this Article by a vote of 2 to 7.)

This article has a tax impact of \$.05.

Selectman Infanti introduced this article. There was no discussion. Placed on ballot as worded. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 16: Disabled Exemption

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Exemption for the Disabled pursuant to RSA 72:37-b whereby any person who is eligible under Title II or Title XVI of the federal Social Security Act for benefits to the disabled shall receive a yearly exemption in the amount of \$75,000 off the assessed value of their property. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least five (5) years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married for at least (5) years. In addition, the owner must have a net income of not more than \$36,750 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$52,000 and own net assets not in excess of \$150,000 excluding the value of the person's residence.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this Article.)

This article has a tax impact of less than \$.01.

Selectman Infanti spoke to this article. There was no discussion. Placed on ballot as written. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 17: Town 250th Anniversary Celebration Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1, which shall be known as 250th Anniversary Capital Reserve Fund, for the purpose of funding the Town's 250th Anniversary Celebration in 2010, and to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be placed into this fund, and to further appoint the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from this Fund in accordance with RSA 35:15 II or take any action relative thereto. *This is a Special Warrant Article in*

accordance with RSA 32.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this Article.)

This article has a tax impact of less than \$.01.

Selectman Grella presented this article. There was no discussion. Placed on ballot as written. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 18: Authority to Lease

To see if the Town will vote, *pursuant to the authority of RSA 41:11*, to authorize the Board of Selectmen to grant a lease or license, on such terms and conditions as they deem fit, and for such length of time as they deem appropriate, such portion of town owned property at the Amherst Public Safety Center, (said property more specifically known as *Tax Map 6, Lot 94*), as said Board of Selectmen deem necessary for the limited purpose of construction of a telecommunications tower, which will also provide antenna space for Amherst Emergency Services and further provide enhanced and more reliable communication to the aforementioned services, or take any other action thereto. This is a special warrant article and is intended to be non-lapsing.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this Article.)

This article has no tax impact.

Selectman Bowler presented this article. There was no discussion. Placed on ballot as worded. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 19: Discontinue Jones Road Section

To see if the Town, pursuant to RSA 231:43, (I), will vote to discontinue vehicle traffic on that portion of Jones Road between Mack Hill Road and the northeast corner of Map/Lot 19-17-0 keeping a sidewalk on the westerly edge with the balance being added to the existing town common land or take any other action relative thereto.

(The Board of Selectmen recommends (4-1) a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously does not support this Article.)

This article has no tax impact.

Selectman Bowler presented this article. It would be paid for out of the operating budget. After short discussion was placed on ballot as written. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 20: Discontinue Thornton Ferry Road II section

To see if the Town, pursuant to RSA 231:43, (I), will vote to discontinue and abandon that portion of Thornton Ferry Road II between Map/Lot 4-44-0 and Map/Lot 4-45-21 so that all public servitude of said portion of this road is terminated and title of Map/Lot 4-44-0 to the centerline reverts to the prior owners, or their successors, in order to facilitate reengineering the intersection alignment.

(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee does not support this Article by a vote of 4 to 5.)

This article has no tax impact.

Selectman Infanti commented on the article. He said this should be a 'T' intersection. Many agreed that this road improvement is a safety issue. Bruce Beery said an engineer for meridian suggested this solution. Selectman Panasiti wants a study done first. Ways and Means were requested to reconsider there vote on this. There was no further discussion. Placed on ballot as written. Vote to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 21: Child Advocacy Center Funding Request

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) to support the Child Advocacy Center of Southern Hillsborough County in providing services to Amherst children who are victims of sexual or physical abuse. *(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this Article.)*
This article has a tax impact of less than \$.01.

Selectman Dinkel spoke to this article. There was no discussion. Placed on ballot as worded. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 22: New Hampshire Association for the Blind Funding Request

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) to support the provision of low vision rehabilitation services in the Town of Amherst. *(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this Article.)*
This article has a tax impact of less than \$.01.

Selectman Panasiti presented this article. Each year the Association must give an updated report on the Amherst residents using this service. After this, it will go in the budget every year but the welfare officer must determine that it is benefiting Amherst residents. Placed on ballot as written. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 23: Reconstruction of Main Street at Town Hall Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1, which shall be known as the Main Street Reconstruction Capital Reserve Fund, for the purpose of constructing roadway and parking improvements on Main Street in the vicinity of the Town Hall, and to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty five thousand dollars (\$25,000) to be placed into this fund, and to further appoint the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from this Fund in accordance with RSA 35:15 II or take any action relative thereto. This is a Special Warrant Article in accordance with RSA 32. *(The Board of Selectmen unanimously recommends a yes vote. The Ways and Means Committee unanimously supports this Article.)*
This article has a tax impact of \$.01.

Selectman Grella presented this article. There was no discussion. Placed on ballot as written. Vote to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 24: NH Climate Change Resolution (By Petition)

To see if the town will go on record in support of effective actions by the President and the Congress to address the issue of climate change which is increasingly harmful to the environment and economy of New Hampshire and to the future well being of the people of Amherst.

These actions include:

1. Establishment of a national program requiring reductions of U.S. greenhouse gas emissions while protecting the U.S. economy.
2. Creation of a major national research initiative to foster rapid development of sustainable energy technologies thereby stimulating new jobs and investment.

In addition, the town of Amherst encourages New Hampshire citizens to work for emission reductions within their communities, and we ask our Selectmen to consider the appointment of a voluntary energy committee to recommend local steps to save energy and reduce emissions.

The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation, to the President of the United States, and to declared candidates for those offices.

No petitioner was present to speak on this article. Place on ballot as written. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 25: Discontinuation of a Portion of North Street (By Petition)

We the undersigned citizens of Amherst request the discontinuation of a portion of the Class VI section of North Street starting at Lyndeborough Road and continuing south for 2510 feet (+/-).

Tim Farris, the petitioner, spoke to this article. Will be placed on ballot in proper form. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 26: Resolution (By Petition)

To see if the Town will vote to approve the following resolution to be forwarded to our elected officials at the local and state levels:

Resolved: We the citizens of Amherst, NH believe in a New Hampshire that is just and fair. The property tax has become unjust and unfair. "The Pledge" perpetuates a burdensome property tax. We urge our elected officials to reject "The Pledge," have an open discussion covering all options, and to adopt a revenue system that relieves the local property tax burden. *(The Ways and Means Committee does not support this Article by a vote of 1 to 8.)*

Petitioner Jeanne Ludt spoke to this article. Tom Knott motioned to amend it by inserting the words 'majority of the' between 'we, the' and 'citizens'. The amendment failed. After a short discussion, the article was placed on the ballot as worded. Motion to restrict reconsideration passed.

Article 34: (Closing Article)

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting,

A motion was made to adjourn at 10:14PM and passed.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ~~four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000)~~ **one dollar (\$1.00)** for the purpose of reconstructing and repairing certain town roads selected by the Director of the Department of Public Works to the minimum standard identified and defined in the 2006 Amherst Road Surface Management Plan, and further to authorize the Board of Selectmen pursuant to RSA 79-A:25-a, (II), to withdraw said funds from the Land Use Change Tax Fund, or take any action relative thereto. This is a non-lapsing Special Warrant Article in accordance with RSA 32.

Article 10: Recreation Fields Acquisition and Construction Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1, which shall be known as the Recreational Fields Acquisition and Construction Capital Reserve Fund, for the purpose of paying the costs of locating and acquiring property, including costs of due diligence investigation of the same, legal costs associated with purchasing property, etc., which property shall be utilized by the Town for recreational playing fields, and, additionally, for the purpose of paying the costs of constructing and establishing playing fields on such acquired property or other property, and to raise and appropriate the sum of up to Two Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$250,000) Dollars, to be placed into this fund, said sum to ~~be raised from the unexpended fund balance, (surplus), to the extent that funds are available in said fund balance, and no amount to be raised from taxation, and to further appoint the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from this Fund in accordance with RSA 35:15 II or take any action relative thereto. This is a Special Warrant Article in accordance with RSA 32.~~
