PUT IT ON YOUR CALENDAR....It's time for seniors to be thinking about the process of assignment to a field placement for Summer and Fall 95. Dr. Dale Smith, Field Coordinator, is responsible for negotiating placements that meet the students' learning needs and CSWE accreditation standards. This process is essentially a negotiation between the student, the social work program, and the agency. Within the next couple of weeks students who think they may be ready to enter field need to follow this procedure:

1. Meet with your advisor to determine that you are indeed ready (i.e. all pre-requisites completed),

2. The advisor then communicates to Dr. Smith that you need a field placement (i.e. this needs to be thoroughly documented in your student file).

3. The student makes an initial appointment with Dr. Smith and brings any suggestions, ideas, questions, etc. (At this point, and continuing through the placement process, the student has a great deal of input into decision).

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4. Dr. Smith initiates contact with agencies to determine their suitability and availability.

5. When appropriate, Dr. Smith refers the student to the agency for a screening interview. (The student is "screening" the agency as well as vice versa.)

6. If it seems to be a good match, a contract is prepared by Dr. Smith for all parties to sign. Obviously, this process takes time. Start early! <u>RENOVATION OF THE</u> <u>R E S T R O O M S</u>
