PRINCIPLES FOR WHICH LEN. SMALL STANDS

(Minority Report of Resolutions Committee of Illinois Republican State Convention, held at Springfield, Ill., May 10, 1920, which Mr. Small and the Kankakee County delegates unanimously

We congratulate the people of the United States on the prospect of their early deliverance from the misrule of the Democratic party, whose success in the last national campaign was born of a lie; which subsequently entered into an unholy alliance with Mammon to betray the sacred trust the Democratic party had assumed to "keep us out of war" which collected in the name of patriotism from trustful people staggering sums of money under a pledge and promise to secure freedom of the seas, but which squandered the money in criminal extravagance and completed its miserable record by atempting to barter away the sovereignty, of the United States; which, in spite of its pledges to the contrary, has increased the cost of living until the average American income does not equal living expenses; which is oppressing the American people with an amount and variety of Federal taxes with out precedent in this Nation; which has imposed upon our country a national debt, appalling in its extent, that will be a burden to generations yet unborn: and which, as a result of its bungling, its incapacity, its treachery to the people, and its waste and extravagance is responsible for the spirit of unrest in our land, and has brought our proud Nation to the verge of bankruptcy and our commerce and industry to a condition perilously near to chaos.

We maintain that citizens have a right to seek, by lawful means, the repeal of laws which seem to them unwise or obnoxious and to urge a change of any public policy they do not approve

We stand squarely and unequivocally for the Americanism of George Washington and for the Republicanism of Abraham Lincoln.

We are opposed to any permanent alliance with any part of the foreign world; we endorse the declaration that we should get out of Europe and stay out; we demand the repeal of obnoxious war time legislation; we declare against compulsory mil itary training and service, and we desire to make the Republican party the agency for the establish ment of human rights.

We submit to the thoughtful consideration of our fellow Republicans in the State and Nation that Republican candidates for office in the elections of this year, advocating these time-honored and time-tested principles will not only reinstate the Republican party in power and authority. would thereby bring the party back to the people and make it the champion of human welfare as against special privileges for organized wealth and

We are opposed to the United States joining the League of Nations, with or without reservations. and pledge our unyielding opposition to our coun try entering into any permanent foreign alliance. We favor a continuation of this wise foreign policy established by President Washington, which has been subscribed to upheld and enforced by every President of the United States, Woodrow Wilson

We appeal to Congress to adopt without fur ther delay a resolution declaring the United States at peace with the world, to repeal immediately all war-time legislation, and to demand of Presider Wilson that our American soldiers now in Europe and Asia be brought home forthwith.

We demand that the Republican party pledge ts nominees for State and National offices to up hold and preserve the people's right of free speech a free press and peaceable assembly as guarantee in our National and State Constitutions. We de mand the prompt repeal of all legislation that in any way interferes with the free exercise of such

We charge that the ratio of representation of the several states in Congress and in the electoral college is wholly disproportionate under state—laws regulating the right of suffrage. We, therefore. favor such Federal legislation as will reduce the representation in Congress and in the electoral college of all states where the right of suffrage is den ied to any person eligible to vote under the Consti tution of the United States, in the proportion which such number of persons shall bear to the whole number of inhabitants so eligible to vote in such

We favor the highest efficiency in naval preparedness to defend our country against any and all foreign foes. We condemn militarism and compulsory military training. We demand that the Republican party in its national platform pledge the fathers and mothers of America that if it is en trusted with the national government, there will be no conscription of their sons for foreign military service unless submitted to and approved by a vote of the people. The history of the world shows that compulsory military service always leads to depot iam and tyranny, government by force, increase taxation, poverty of the masses, bloodshed and war. The propaganda to enact laws under which the able-bodied American boys would be drafted for military training and war service in order to prepare them for peaceful pursuits is rank deception nd is merely an attempt to sugarcoat the discredited European policy of conscription and mili-

We believe that American citizens should be exempt from Federal taxation on incomes less than

The great governments of the world which have disintegrated were brought to their ruin through the monopoly of their national wealth in the hands of a few. So in this country, the accumulation of vast wealth in the control of a few persons creates financial dynasties which imperil our representative government and menace the very life of our Repub-
