The question will be the same one on which our team has debated against Bates and University of New Hampshire last Thursday and Friday nights, namely: Resolved that Congress should enact legislation providing for the centralized control of industry.

Taking all places except one first, three seconds, and five third places, the frosh track-team swept to an 85-15 victory over the Hebron track squad in the Armory

last Saturday.

Some of the unusual features of the meet were the ties made in the high-jump, 1000 yd. run, and I mile! Three frosh tied for first in the high-jump and 1000 yd, run. while six yearlings broke the tape abreast in the 1 mile run.

Morgan of Maine easily won the high and low hurdle events, with Goddard, also of Maine, placing second in the former and third in

the latter.

Higgins unexpectedly took a first in the 50 yd. dash, while Mullaney took a second in that event and later won the 300 yd. dash.
