KEN BLACK BREAKS RECORD

TWO FROSH CAPTURE WRESTLING TITLES

REESE AND DEWITT WIN WRESTLING TITLES

Two prominent members of the freshman class, John H. DeWitt and Sam Reese, have succeeded in winning titles in the intra-mural wrestling tourney that was held during the past week. All during the week elimination matches were held in order to determine the wrestlers for the finals held last Saturday afternoon.

DeWitt, of Paradise Lost, gained a fall from Carl Hand, proctor of Hannibal Harlin, in the finals which thus gave him the distinction of holding the light-weight championship of the University.

Sam Reese, of Orono, gained a time advantage of thirty-five seconds over his opponent, Percival of Phi Eta Kappa, which gave him the heavy-weight championship of the University. Reese's match was very closely contested, but the frosh's superior wrestling ability gave him a thirty-second time advantage.

Dick Captain of Oak Hall was the runner-up in the light heavy weight division, but after a strong battle was defeated by Sidelinger of Orono in a five second time advantage.

BLACK SHATTERS GYM RECORD IN HALF-MILE

Ken Black, well known frosh track man, shattered the gym record by two and one-fifth seconds last Saturday evening in an exhibition run held during the Dartmouth-Maine track meet. The record was lowered from two minutes to one minute and fifty-seven and four-fifths seconds.

During practice, Black has been performing exceptionally well. Twice during time trials, he has broken the half mile record, and he once equalled the three hundred yard record.
