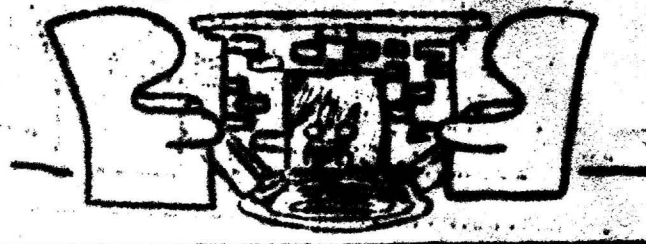

FENCING

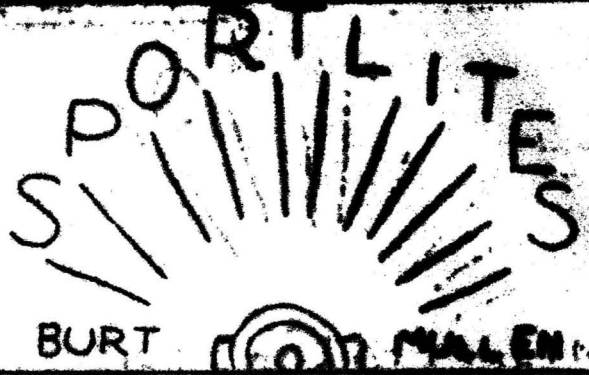
