IN AUTO ACCIDENT

OCCURS HILE TWO MEMBERS OF THE FRESHMAN STAFF ARE IN ROUTE TO BASKETBALL PRACTISE

Miss Margaret Sewall and Miss Libby Philbrook, both of Old Town, prominent members of the Freshman Class of the U. of Maine, were severely injured in a severe automobile accident on the Old Town-Orono road last Wednesday evening, while on their way to basketball practise from their home in Old Town.

The car in which they were rading crashed into a truck parked beside the road. Much difficulty was experienced by police in extricating the girls from the wreck. They were taken to the Deering Hospital. Miss Sewall was later removed to the Eastern Maine General Hospital at Bangor. Their present condition is reported as being very satisfactory.

Miss Sewall sustained a fractured thigh and severe cuts. Wiss Phillrook was painfully lacerated about the face. (cont. on page two)


