The freshman A basketball team returned from the annual Aroostook trip Saturday morning with three more wins and two defeats to add to its season's record. The team had been gone a week, and played quintets at Houlton, Presque Isle, Caribou, Fort Fairfield, and Mars Hill.

The first game was played Monday night against Houlton High, and marked the first defeat the freshman hoopsters have received throughout the season. Although the small court and low ceiling bothered the Maine team, they led for three periods. A last quarter

The last game of the trip was played Friday night and resulted in a second defeat of the season for the freshman team, when they were beaten by A.C.I. at Mars Hill 32-18.

SPORT BRIEFS

Harold Woodbury of Doering, blond frosh hoop ace, was unanimously elected honorary basketball captain for the 1932-33 season by his team-mates Saturday while en route home from the Arcostock trip.

Woodbury scored 175 points in fifteen games, giving him an average of approximately twelve points per game. Woodbury is without doubt one of the finest forwards to ever represent a Maine hoop quintet. Besides his exceptional scoring ability, he was the fastest man on the team, and seemed to supply the scoring punch which is so vital to any winnign team.

Woodbury scored more than double the points of any other of his team-mates. The next highest scorer was Kenneth Johnstone, who tallied a total of 70. However he was out of the line-up for three games due to a severe attack of the grippe. He averaged six points a game.

The freshman team had one of the most successful seasons in recent years, winning thirteen out of fifteen starts. It is interesting to note that the freshman defeated such teams as Kent's Hill and Rumford, on the frosh home floor, who were stronger than the quintets by whom they were defeated while on the Arcostock trip. When hopes are running high for an undefeated season, it is a rather bitter pill for the team and its coach to swallow to be defeated in its last few contests. However, it's all part of the game. Both of their defeats came while they were away from home, and were largely due to small playing surfaces which hampered the fast passing attack which has been used so successfully in all the home games.
