Scoring nine firsts and eight seconds in twelve events, the Freshman track team finished its indoor season undefeated as it easily overwhelmed Serron Academy, 77 1/2 to 30 1/2, at the Armory Saturday afternoon.

Collette, O'Connor, Thompson, and Huff were high scorers of the meet for the frosh team, each one of them scoring 10 or more points. Marchall and Dow scored sight points each for Hebron.
