FRESHMEN REGISTER

410 Students Enrolled in the First Year Class---Number is Slight Decline

A total of four hundred and ten freshmen students registered at Alumnae Hall Wednesday, September 13th. Registration began prompt ly at nine A.M. and terminated at five in the afternoon, with new students arriving all day.

Although registration was slightly smaller than last year's due to economic conditions, the University authorities consider this number favorable.

Registration figures by states were led by Maine, naturally, with Massachusetts coming second. Thirty-six students registered from Dangor, this being the largest group from any one city. In the colleges, Arts and Sciences had 172, Tech. 159, and Agaies 99.
