Johnny Murray followed Webb with firsts in the 100 and 220. In the field events, Bell was the outstanding man. In the 440, Jack Gatti and Bob DeWick came home together to win an easy race. Other first for the frosh were taken by Cameron, Smith, Beisel, and Parsons. Bell, Boyle, and Crowell tied for first in the Pole Vault.




