The small gym and low ceiling proved quite different than the large gym and high ceiling over at the Memorial Gymnasium where the team practices. Coach Bill Kenyon used four different teams in the game, giving each man a chance to show his worth.

Old Town led at the quarter mark by a score of 10-3. At the half Old Town was leading 17-7 due mainly to their superior teamwork. The next period saw them score twelve points to team B's four to lead by the decisive margin of 29-11. The Frosh seemed to find themselves in the last period to outscore their rivals seven to three. The final score being 32-18 in favor of the boys from Old Town. Fox's handling and passing along with Arnie Veague's all-around ability were the bright spots for the frosh team. The game was replete with fouls but was ably handled by our own efficient physical trainer, Wally.
