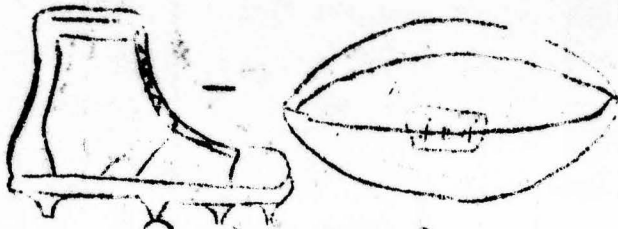

IN FULL SWING...

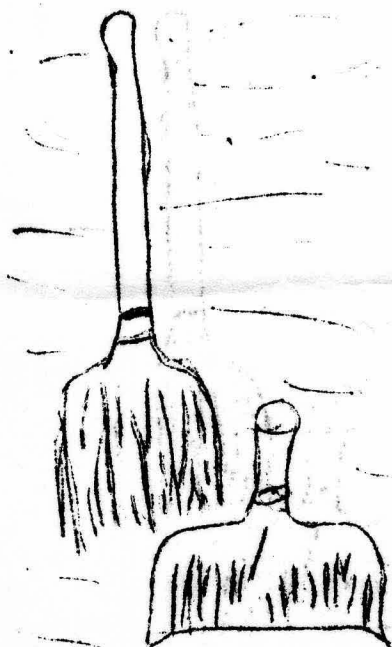
