The Select Board is pleased to report continued progress within our Town for the benefit of our citizens.

We have paved one of the last dirt roads in Windsor. The Reed Road will now be able to remain open all year round.

The proposed budget for the coming year is presented to you in the following pages. We hope that you will review it and agree with us and the Budget Committee that while there are some increases in various areas, like you at home we had to face the reality of inflationary pressures. We did receive some unexpected funding this year from the State and Federal Government (ARPA Funds) due to continuing Covid pandemic. We plan to use some of that money to provide an upgraded communication system for the Fire Dept and Public Works in the future.

We have also asked our Planning Board to work on an ordinance to set standards for large solar facilities in our Town. That work has begun, and they will be holding meetings to work out details to be presented for your review and ultimately a vote probably in the fall of this year.

As noted in the title, this is our Bicentennial year! A group of citizens have combined their efforts and energy to put together various events throughout the year to celebrate our birthday. Please join them and make this a memorable year!

As always, we welcome you to our regularly scheduled meetings every other Tuesday night beginning at 6 pm. The schedule is posted on our web site ([www.windsor.maine.gov](http://www.windsor.maine.gov)) and on the electronic sign in front of the Town Office.

# TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

Over the past few years, we have faced so many challenges including the Corona Virus global pandemic. Throughout 2021 the Town Office, Transfer Station and Public Works Department stayed open with precautions and stayed focused on the residents and Town's needs. I am honored to have such devoted, dedicated and committed staff. The normal times may never happen again but we as a Town will move forward and do our best to help and look out for each other.

With the financial challenges we are all facing the Select Board Members, Budget Committee Members, and Department Heads, have looked for ways to help with the financial burden we all are facing. What you are facing in today's challenges with the price of Fuel Oil and Gas increasing it is a ripple effect on everything we purchase and do. We are proposing an increase of 6.59% which is \$121,538.00 increase from last year which we are anticipating receiving an additional \$190,000.00 in Revenue which would cover these expenses. (Our biggest increase in Revenue is from the proposed Maine State Revenue Sharing.) Our biggest goal the Town's mil rate as low as we can and keep taxes down without losing critical services. The Town of Windsor's Financial Condition ending June 30, 2021, was \$1,428,362.00 and is in good standing to comply with the auditor's recommendation of unexpected emergencies.

Voting day will be Tuesday, June 14, 2022, from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. at the Windsor Town Hall. DON'T FORGET TO VOTE!! ABSENTEE BALLOTS ARE NOW AVAILABLE!

The Town Meeting will be on Thursday, June 16, 2022, beginning at 6:30 p.m. at the Windsor Elementary School. We hope to see you at the Town Meeting.

Let us all stay strong, work together, check in on our neighbors and have a healthy year. I am honored to be your Town Manager working with this Town over the past 17 years.

## **SAFETY COMES FIRST!!**

**PLEASE** be considerate when driving by any Work Zones and **SLOW DOWN** for flaggers and workers within the Work Zone Areas. In the past year we have done Major Road Construction on the following roads per Town approval.

1. Legion Park Road – 1.79 miles with 1 ¼" Overlay
2. Lamson Road – .31 miles with 1 ¼" Overlay
3. Erskine Road – .82 miles with 1 ¼" Overlay
4. Maxcy's Mills Road – 1.34 miles with 1 ¼" Overlay and increasing the shoulder area by Resthaven Cemetery
5. Reed Road – .50 miles of 2" Base, .40 miles of Overlay with a Double Chip Seal and 1.13 miles of Overlay with a Single Chip Seal
6. \$14,161.50 worth of Road lines

In the 2022/2023 budget we are looking to work on the following roads: Windsor Neck Road, Jones Road, Shuman Road, Weeks Mills Road, and Crosby Road. We are planning to do additional shoulder work, ditching, brush cutting and replacing culverts as needed.

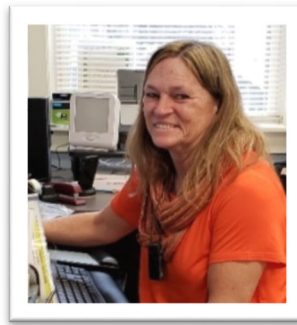

Keith would also like to thank our local contractor, Marvin Clark, for his work on our Town roads by changing cross culverts, fixing shoulders, ditching, and getting roads ready for our Major Road Construction projects.

# Town Clerk's Report

Citizens of Windsor,

It has been my pleasure to serve the residents and greater communities of Windsor. I appreciate the support of the public and collaboration with our Town Manager, Select Board, fellow colleagues, departments, board and committee members, and election personnel.

The municipal clerk's office primary responsibilities include the care and preservation of municipal records. We record vital statistic information such as births, deaths, and marriages. Birth records from September 1995, death records beginning in 2011, and marriage records beginning January 1, 2017, are kept electronically in the State of Maine's DAVE system. The following is a fee schedule for these records:

Marriage License.....\$40.00  
Birth, Death, or Marriage Certificate.....\$15.00  
Each Additional Copy of Certificate.....\$6.00

Hunting and fishing licenses, snowmobile, ATV, and boat registrations are also issued in the Clerk's office using Inland Fisheries and Wildlife's MOSES system. You must have proof of having held a previous hunting license or having taken a Hunter's Safety Course to purchase a Hunting license.

There were 373 dogs registered and 2 kennel licenses issued in 2021. Dogs 6 months or older that reside in Windsor for longer than 10 days must be registered annually by December 31st.

You must have a current rabies certificate to license your dog. You will also need to provide proof of spaying/neutering. A spayed/neutered dog license is \$6.00, and \$11.00 for an unaltered dog. We now offer on-line dog licensing, through the state's website at [www1.maine.gov/cgi-bin/online/dog\\_license/index.pl](http://www1.maine.gov/cgi-bin/online/dog_license/index.pl). Please be aware that you must be able to submit your current rabies vaccination to us if requested when using the on-line licensing. Per state law, a \$25 late fee applies to any dog registration as of February 1<sup>st</sup>.

Please visit our website [www.windsor.maine.gov](http://www.windsor.maine.gov) for the most up-to-date information. Here you will find public notices, calendar of events, tax maps, meeting minutes, election information, office hours, and contact information.

The Town of Windsor does accept payments by debit/credit cards. There is a convenience fee of \$1.00 minimum, or 2.5% of the total balance. We do not currently accept payment online.

The following page contains records of deaths and marriages from January 1, 2021, to December 31, 2021. There were 37 recorded births in the Town of Windsor.

# Registrar of Voters

You may register to vote during regular business hours or at the polls by filling out a voter registration card. To vote you must be a citizen of the United States, a resident of Windsor, and eighteen (18) years of age. You must show proof of residency such as a Driver's License, current motor vehicle registration, hunting/fishing license, or any official document showing your current address. If you are planning to be out of town on Election Day, you may request an absentee ballot. The request must be made at least three business days prior to voting day unless you have a special circumstance. Ballots will be available up to 30 days prior to an election.

Due to COVID restrictions, the 2021 Elections polling place was located at the Windsor School Gymnasium. We were able to follow the State guidelines in this larger area and feel we have created a safe voting environment.

As of 12/30/2021 there are 1,941 Registered Voters in Windsor. There are 445 Democrat, 762 Republican, 115 Green Independent, and 619 Unenrolled.

I would like to thank the following people for their help and hard work during the elections this year. Whether you were a moderator, warden, ballot clerk, election clerk, deputy registrar, or even just helping set up booths, I really appreciate all you have done and are willing to do to help make our elections run as smoothly as possible. Thank you!

\* The \$25 late fee for dog licenses applied for after January 31<sup>st</sup> is imposed by the State statute, and nothing in the law vests any discretion in a municipal clerk or any other official to waive this fee (*see 7 M.R.S.A. § 3923-A(4)*) The late fee is in addition to the annual license fee before any license applied for after January 31<sup>st</sup> can be issued.

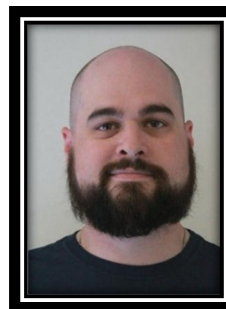
**PLEASE NOTE:**

- Your dog reaches the age of 6 months.
- You become the owner or keeper of a dog aged 6 months or more.

**September 11, 2021** – The Town of Windsor held a Dedication Ceremony for the New Veterans Memorial. It was a beautiful day and a wonderful service. Theresa Haskell, Town Manager welcomed the Honorary Veterans and their families and friends.

The State Commander Deb Couture presented the Honor Guard from the American Legion Post 4 in Gardiner, Maine. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Bill Appel, Select Board Member and the National Anthem was sung by Susan Worcester. Pastor Brandon Dyer of Windsor Christian Fellowship did the Innovation.

The Keynote Address was presented by the State Commander Debra Couture of the American Legion Department of Maine followed by Dwight Tibbetts on the trumpet playing God Bless the USA.

Theresa Haskell, Town Manger thanked the supporters followed by Susan Worcester singing “This Land is Your Land.”

Steve Ball said the Benediction followed by Carson Appel playing TAPS on the trumpet.

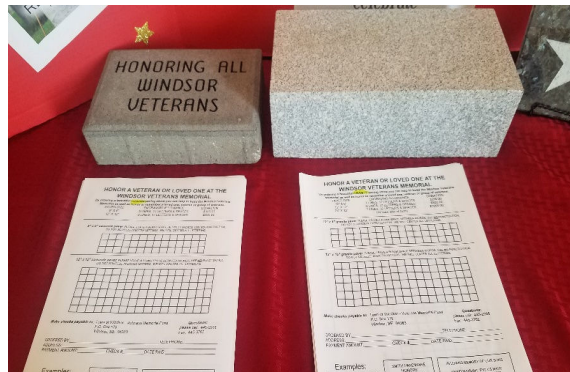

The EMT’s of Windsor Rescue are pleased to report to the Town of Windsor and to the citizens the Annual Report of Windsor Rescue. As stated, before we continue to be active in both our rescue efforts and our community service. We continue to respond to 200+ EMS, Fire, and Mutual Aid calls. Our Professional growth continues with our monthly training sessions both on and offsite. These programs help to expand our knowledge base and enhance our learning opportunities.

Our specialize equipment continues to be certified and up to date, especially the Defibrillator. We replaced our AED this year with a much more technical model that gives us an ability to see what we are dealing with in a cardiac episode. We also invested in what is called a Bender Lift for l from the floor and awkward positions. In the hopes it will be safer for staff and patients.

## 2022 Assessors' Agent Report

There are several programs available to assist property tax owners in Maine. The Maine Homestead Exemption allows for a reduction in the assessed value and is probably the largest exemption program. To qualify, you must be a legal resident of the State of Maine, have owned a residential property in Maine for at least the past twelve months as of April 1 and the homestead must be your permanent place of residence. You can only claim the exemption for one property in Maine and cannot claim a similar exemption in any other state. Applications for this program are available at the Town Office and must be filed by April 1. Once your application has been approved, it is automatically renewed each year that you qualify for the exemption. When a property is sold, the exemption is removed, and the new homeowner must apply for the exemption.

Forms are also available at the Town Office for a Veteran Exemption for all veterans who served during a recognized war period and is 62 years or older; or is receiving 100% disability as a Veteran; or became 100% disabled while serving. The Veteran exemption is also available for the widow, widower, minor child, or widowed parent of a veteran. An important change was made to the Veteran's Exemption eligibility. The law eliminated the requirement that a veteran of the Vietnam War must have served on active duty for a period of more than 180 days. If you are a veteran of the Vietnam War who would otherwise qualify for the exemption in the past but did not because of the 180 days of service requirement, this change would allow you to apply for the Veteran Exemption. Like the homestead exemption, once this is approved it will automatically be renewed each year that you are eligible.

Newly passed legislation created the State Property Tax Deferral Program. This is a loan program that can cover the annual property tax bills of Maine people who are ages 65 and older or are permanently disabled and who cannot afford to pay them on their own. The program allows certain individuals to defer (postpone) payment of the property taxes on their homesteads until they pass away, move, or sell their property. During the period when the taxes are being deferred, the State reimburses the municipality for the deferred taxes. The deferred tax, plus interest, is then required to be repaid to the State by the individual or their estate when they pass away, move, sell the property, or move the property (if mobile or floating home) out of Maine. To be eligible for the program, you must be at least 65 years old or unable to work due to a disability. In addition, you must have income of less than \$40,000 and liquid assets of less than \$50,000 (or \$75,000 if filing a joint application). To be eligible for the program you must own and occupy the property as your principal residence, and you must be receiving a homestead exemption on the property. A handout of frequently asked questions (FAQ) that explains the program in more detail and lists additional restrictions is available at the town office. 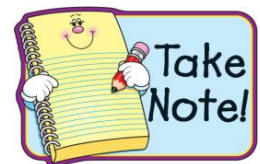

### **Report on the Financial Statements**

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of Town of Windsor, Maine, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2021, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

### **Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements**

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

### **Auditor's Responsibility**

My responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on my audit. I conducted my audit in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. **Other Matters**

Required Supplementary Information

Management has omitted Management's Discussion & Analysis that accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require to be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such missing information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. My opinion of the basic financial statements is not affected by this missing information.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the budgetary comparison information be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. I have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge I obtain during my audit of the basic financial statements. I do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide me with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

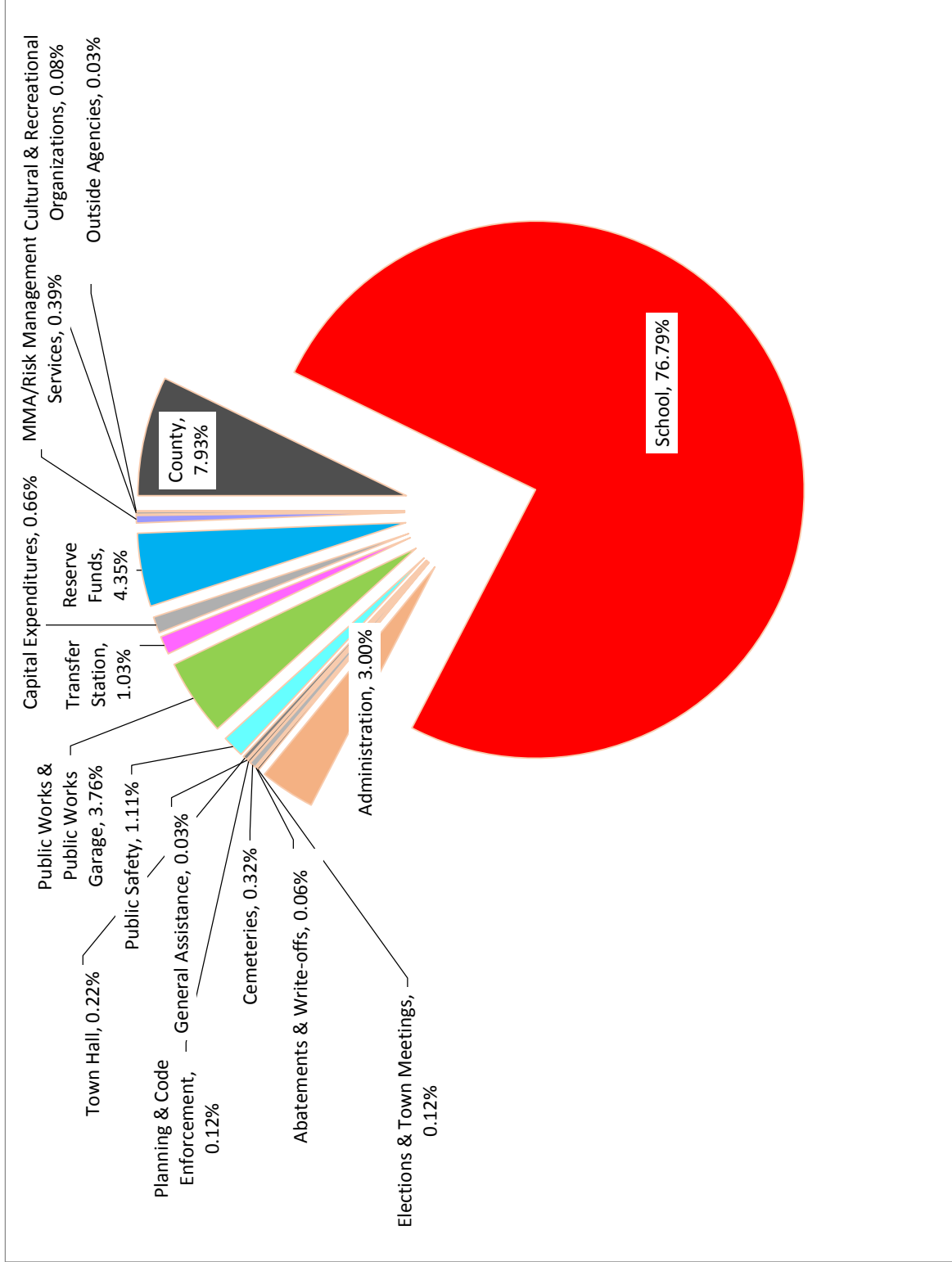

I hope this letter finds you well. It is an honor to represent you and your family during these challenging times, and I am thankful for the opportunity to update you on my work in Washington and Maine.

The COVID-19 pandemic continues to cause challenges for people in Maine and across the country. Please know that the health and safety of you and your loved ones, as well as the economic recovery of our communities, remains the driving force behind legislation I have pushed for in Congress.

In early 2021, Congress passed the American Rescue Plan, historic legislation that makes investments to crush the virus, create millions of jobs, provide direct relief to working families, and help schools remain safely open. Not only did this legislation give 90 percent of American households a stimulus check, but it also helped local and state governments better respond to the pandemic, put food on families' tables, got more vaccine shots into arms, cut child poverty in half through the expanded Child Tax Credit, and so much more. The American Rescue Plan is one of the most important pieces of legislation Congress will ever pass, and I'm so proud to have supported it from the beginning. Our economic recovery from the pandemic will be accelerated even more thanks to the bipartisan Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, which Congress passed in November. This legislation marks the most expansive infrastructure investment since the construction of the interstate highway system. From funding to repair our aging roads, bridges, and ports to high-speed broadband expansion and legacy pollution clean-up, this law is a once-in-a-generation investment in our future.

In addition to working on COVID-19 relief legislation, my Congressional colleagues and I are also collaborating on legislation that addresses the climate crisis, supports voting rights, and—through my role on the House Appropriations Committee—supports programs important to Maine.

After seven years on the House Appropriations Committee, I took the gavel and lead the subcommittee that oversees discretionary spending for the Department of the Interior, the Environmental Protection Agency, US Forest Service, and several agencies related to the arts and humanities. In my new role as Chair, I have fought to secure significant funding for Maine's tribes, environmental preservation programs, our cultural economy, and our forests.

I will keep pushing legislation to support America's long-term care needs, lower prescription drug costs, expand Medicare benefits, cut taxes for working people, make our workforce competitive with the world, and fight climate change.

So, as we reflect on 2021, let us welcome 2022 with a renewed sense of optimism. There is a lot to fight for, and I assure you I will continue to fight for Maine in Congress. I want you to know that my staff and I are doing all we can to support Mainers through this public health crisis and all the challenges that come with it. Dear Friends:

I am deeply honored to serve the people of Maine in the U.S. Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share some of the areas I have been working on over the past year.

The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic continues to pose enormous challenges for our state and our country. When the pandemic began, I co-authored the Paycheck Protection Program that helped small businesses remain afloat and keep their employees paid. In Maine, our small businesses received more than 47,000 forgivable loans totaling \$3.2 billion. I also led efforts to provide relief for loggers, lobstermen, and bus companies.

In addition, I helped secure \$700 million to assist Maine's overwhelmed hospitals and nursing homes, and a new law I led prevented Medicare payment cuts to help further ease the financial strain on our hospitals. I also urged the CDC to update its recommendations so that our students and teachers could safely return to their classrooms, and I pressed the Administration to end the closure of the U.S.-Canada border.

While addressing the pandemic has been a major focus, I've also worked hard to ensure Maine's other needs are met. A group of 10 Senators, of which I was a part, negotiated the landmark bipartisan infrastructure bill that was signed into law in November. I co-authored the section of the bill that will provide Maine with as much as \$300 million to expand high-speed internet in rural and underserved areas.

Soaring inflation is another crisis, particularly when it comes to the cost of heating oil. I have strongly supported federal programs that help Maine families stay warm. In November, Maine was awarded \$35 million to help low-income Mainers pay their energy bills. And the bipartisan infrastructure bill included \$3.5 billion to help families make energy efficiency improvements that would permanently lower their heating costs.

As a senior member of the Appropriations Committee, I have supported investments in Maine's communities. This year's funding bills include \$265 million I championed for 106 projects across Maine. These projects would help create jobs, improve workforce training, address the opioid crisis, and increase access to childcare and health care services. In addition, I worked to reverse proposed cuts to our Navy in order to help protect America and keep the skilled workers at Bath Iron Works on the job. The bills also include \$475 million for the construction of a new dry dock at Maine's Portsmouth Naval Shipyard that will allow the Navy to continue to carry out its submarine missions. I will keep working to get these important bills enacted.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and this year I honored that work ethic when I cast my 8,000<sup>th</sup> consecutive vote, becoming the only Senator in history to do so without ever having missed a roll call vote. The Lugar Center at Georgetown University once again ranked me as the most bipartisan Senator for the eighth year in a row.

In the New Year, I will keep working to solve problems and make life better for the people of Maine and America. May 2022 be a happy, healthy, and successful one for you, your family, and our state.


On the heels of 2020's challenges, 2021 brought us both amazing progress and frustrating setbacks. The incredible rollout of several effective, FDA approved COVID-19 vaccines helped reduce the risks of this deadly pandemic – but vaccine hesitancy, combined with the dangers of new variants, have prolonged this crisis and created new risks for Maine people. The challenges raised tension levels to boiling points during the fallout of the 2020 presidential election and the January 6<sup>th</sup> Capitol attack. But despite that, Congress was able to deliver for a nation gripped by an unprecedented pandemic. As we reflect back on the year, we see the important action that will make a difference for Maine people – as well as work still unfinished.

As COVID-19 continued to impact communities across our state and the country, Congress's first priority this year was to confront the pandemic's health threats and economic toll. We immediately got to work on the *American Rescue Plan*, crafting an emergency bill to meet the moment and get our nation back on stable footing. The legislation delivered essential support to businesses facing crises, households in need, and the medical professionals on the front lines of this fight. The funds helped get vaccine shots in arms, while also confronting the damage done to our economy. All told, the *American Rescue Plan* is bringing billions of dollars to Maine, helping the state continue to push through this crisis and bounce back stronger than ever.

After passing the *American Rescue Plan*, Congress turned its attention to a longstanding but unfulfilled priority: infrastructure. Through hard work and compromise, both parties came together to pass a bipartisan bill that finally addresses key infrastructure needs. For Maine people, the bill means an estimated \$1.5 billion to repair crumbling roads and out-of-date bridges, \$390 million to improve access to clean drinking water, and more. I am most excited about the significant funding for broadband – because, as we have seen during the pandemic, broadband is a necessity to succeed in the 21<sup>st</sup> century economy. The historic investments in the bipartisan infrastructure bill, combined with additional funding I pushed for in *the American Rescue Plan*, will bring an estimated \$400 million for broadband home to Maine. These funds will be nothing short of transformational, creating new opportunities across our state.

These two bills have made and will continue to make a real difference for Maine people, helping to both address the challenges of COVID-19 and lay a foundation for long-term success. I am proud of what we've accomplished this year – but I know there is still a lot of work to do and that the road ahead is challenging. Even still, I am filled with optimism because I know the true nature of our citizens, though challenged, has not changed. Despite every hardship, people in towns and communities have stepped up with strong local leadership, a willingness to help, and a Maine 'neighborhood' spirit. It is why I truly believe we can and will get through anything together. Mary and I wish you a happy, healthy, and safe 2022.

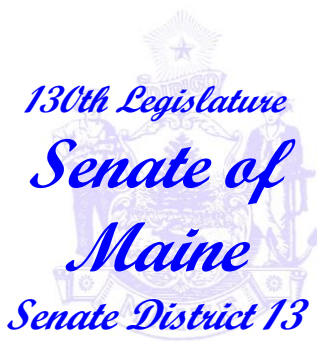

Dear Neighbors in Windsor,

Thank you for the opportunity to represent you in the Maine Senate; I am truly humbled that you chose me to be your voice in Augusta during this unprecedented time.

In our first session, the Legislature focused on laws that would make a real difference in the lives of all Maine people. We passed laws to help improve access to affordable, high-quality medical care and lifesaving medications like insulin. We invested in senior living and nursing facilities and in our direct care workers, who have been so vital during the pandemic. We passed a two-year bipartisan budget that, for the first time, meets the state's obligation to fund 55% of K-12 public education. We also restored municipal revenue sharing and increased property tax relief programs, all of which will help reduce property taxes for Maine people.

In the Legislature, I have been appointed to serve on the Marine Resources Committee and the Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry Committee. These committees are responsible for overseeing matters that directly impact our communities and heritage industries, like farming and fishing. We know that the coming years will present these industries with real challenges if we do not prepare, and the survival of these industries is essential. Protecting our environment and natural resources is a priority for me because of the impacts it has on our health, our culture and our economy.

On January 5, 2022, the Legislature began the second regular session, which is scheduled to continue until mid-April. Our committee work will be conducted remotely for the time being, but we will be meeting in person at the State House to vote on legislation. Every committee meeting is streamed live and archived at [www.legislature.maine.gov](http://www.legislature.maine.gov), and you can also testify during public hearings from the comfort of your own home. The State House is open to visitors, and I encourage you to visit any time.

I know many in our community are still struggling, and I want to remind you that I'm here as a resource for you and your family. If you need help finding resources, sorting out an issue with a state agency, or just want to talk something through, please reach out any time. Dear Friends and Neighbors of Windsor,

As we start the new year, I wanted to express my appreciation that you have once again entrusted me with the responsibility of being your State Representative. I continue to proudly serve on the Labor and Housing Committee.

The first session of the 130<sup>th</sup> Legislature convened in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic, which meant we met in the Augusta Civic Center every few weeks through May 19 to preserve social distancing for safety. This enabled us to begin voting on over two thousand bills that were before us. Committee meetings and hearings were and continue to be streamed on "Zoom". We did finally get back to our chamber in the State House and finished business on July 19. We met again briefly this fall to vote on redistricting.

The Kennebec County Sheriff's Office is pleased to make the following report regarding the services we provided to the people of Kennebec County in 2021. These services include the Law Enforcement Division, Corrections' Services, Civil Process, Court and Transport Division. We provided many regional assets to our communities including two K-9 Teams, Dive Team, Sex Offender Registry, Veterans Advocacy, Accident Reconstruction and Drug Recognition Experts (DRE) and a School Resource Officer for MSAD 49.

Despite the continued challenges that COVID presents to us all my entire staff continues with its mission of serving the citizens and visitors of Kennebec County, as well as the safe keeping of incarcerated individuals within our Correctional Facility.

In 2021, Law Enforcement Deputies logged thousands of calls for service. Our calls for service increased to near normal levels we experienced before the pandemic.

One type of call has increased dramatically: overdoses of prescribed medications or illicit substances. As the problem continues to increase, I wish to make it clear that we at the Sheriff's Office will always support our citizens with substance dependency disorders by providing avenues that can assist with their recovery.

Starting in 2021 a shift in the balance of call taking we had shared with the Maine State Police required my office to expand the Law Enforcement Division by two Deputies. These two positions were filled, which completed the staffing levels agreed to by the Budget Committee.

Our Patrol Division welcomed Deputies Dan Ross, Stephen Gould and Racean Wood as full-time staff on our team. Each of these men bring at least four years of experience as career law enforcement officers. Deputy Ross comes to us from the Gardiner Police Department, Deputy Gould worked with the Livermore Falls Police Department, and Deputy Wood served with the Somerset County Sheriff's Office. We also welcomed Reserve Deputy Nathaniel Sparling to our patrol division as a part-time Deputy.

In December of 2021 our office saw the resignations of Deputy Kulakowski and Deputy Carey. We wish them great success as they transition to new challenges and growing families.



My agency has been receiving federal funds to conduct patrol details specifically related to motor vehicle violations throughout the county. To date, the effort of Kennebec County Deputies in those federally funded programs excel statistically for the number of interdictions for drug related criminal activities.

Our Civil Process Deputies serve legal documents on behalf of attorneys, the courts, citizens, local, and state government, landlords and other entities. In 2021, the three civil deputies received over 7,124 requests for service in Kennebec County. This is an increase from 2020. Some of the services include, civil summons & complaints, foreclosures, evictions, small claims, child support notices from the State and enforcement of court orders and writs to name a few.

During the past year, our Correctional Facility managed 1738 inmate intakes. The offenses committed by defendants included everything from Trespass to Homicide. Substance abuse and the proper treatment of citizens with mental illness continue to be two primary concerns at the Correctional Facility.

My staff at the correctional facility should be very proud of the way they have handled the COVID issue, containing those testing positive with the virus and stopping it from spreading.

Inmates at the Kennebec County Correctional Facility are asked to work and earn time off their sentences if applicable. Inmates who are a risk to the community work inside the facility cleaning and cooking, while others are supervised on outside projects. One may think that this only benefits the county, or our local municipalities, but it does not. It also benefits the inmate population as well.

We are committed to providing innovative programs to reduce crimes, assist victims, and to provide enhanced public safety. We acknowledge the ever-growing opiate addiction problem nationwide and have committed to partnerships at the Federal, State and Local levels to combat this problem. Our approach is aggressive enforcement, education, treatment and recovery for those afflicted with this horrible addiction.

I would like to thank all my administrative staff who support the patrol division, detective division, correctional division and the civil deputies. The amounts of paperwork that is handled by these individuals is staggering and their work is greatly appreciated. Job well done by all.

As your Sheriff, and moving forward into 2022, my focus will remain the same. Serve the people of this county and our visitors honorably and professionally through good common sense and good judgement.

Delta Ambulance, founded in 1972, is the leading provider of high quality, compassionate emergency services and medical transportation in central Maine. Our superior training, experience and state-of-the-art medical technology sets us apart from other ambulance services.

We are pleased to be able to provide emergency Paramedic care to the people of Windsor and to continue supporting your First Response Rescue at no cost to your community. As a regional, community-based organization, we continue to fund our operations solely by reimbursement directly from the patient and the patient’s insurance. This is currently possible due to our economy of scale. A significant portion of our patient charges, annually, are written off as charitable giving to the uninsured and underinsured. Additionally, we continue to support community events throughout our coverage area.

According to state data, in 2021 (January 1 – December 31), we responded to over 17,000 calls, 212 911-calls were in Windsor. Additionally, we serve your community by regularly providing non-emergency care and transfer services for patients as well as standby for fire calls.

Our average response times, the time between our receipt of the call and our arrival, for delivery of paramedic care was 13.6 minutes for emergencies.

Dear Residents of Windsor,

Erskine Academy hoped that this year’s message to all of you would have COVID behind us, or nearly so. As we approach two years now with this pandemic, we are hopeful for the promise of a safer, healthier, and brighter 2022 nonetheless. Although we’ve yet to defeat the pandemic, it has not beaten us. The last year was challenging as we navigated in-person, hybrid, and fully remote teaching and learning; still, our response to the circumstances and the lessons learned strengthened our resolve to emerge a stronger and better Erskine Academy from this crisis.

Of the odd lessons taught by the pandemic is that change can happen quickly and forcefully. With little notice or time to prepare, every aspect of our educational approach was affected, dramatically changing schooling as we knew it. This traumatic year reminded us of the significance of community and empathy as the glue to keep us together. We met expectations and stressors by reconfiguring our physical space; adhering vigilantly to health and safety measures; investing in protective factors such as PPE, ventilation, and air filtration systems; and retraining and retooling with adaptive technologies and computer software. This is how we were able to return to school then, and this is how we are now able to stay in school one good school day at a time.

In Erskine Academy’s 139<sup>th</sup> year, we continued to be a high school of choice that combines an independent education with the democratic ideal of quality education for all. Our core values—***Scholarship, Leadership, Stewardship, and Relationships***—were at work to produce results and deliver the highest educational experience possible while mitigating corona virus risks. A few facts about Erskine Academy today attest to our vitality and value:

- With 528 students in grades nine through twelve, we are the largest town academy in Maine to serve a nearly 100% local student body on a 100% school choice basis
- A 13:1 professional teacher to student ratio
- A 100% graduation rate; a 98% four-year graduation rate
- A dropout rate of less than one percent
- Of 120 graduates in 2021, 71% were accepted to higher or continuing education (now a nine-year trend), many to highly selective colleges and universities.

Having no enrollment contracts with any community for a whole or portion of their high schoolers, we operate independently and exclusively on a school choice basis. This structure provides us with stability, enables us to be nimble in our operation, and expedites problem-solving and decision-making. At the same time, we focus on essential teaching and learning processes.

Although independent, we commit to our publicly-funded students by admitting all students from our eight sending towns who have completed the eighth grade and can benefit from our programs. Our enrollment generally exceeds 60% of the students from our collective eight sending towns.

Regardless of differences in residence, prior learning, interests, abilities, or personal circumstances and backgrounds, all of our students matter and belong. All who attend here experience a school program that blends traditional values with new programs and best practices to become the most academically and personally prepared young people in our region.

We have always considered industry certificates, two-year degrees, apprenticeships, and military service as higher education and, as such, viable pursuits. Therefore, we have created and sustained a comprehensive academic program to reflect and facilitate access to these experiences and four-year degree programs. We are one of the few high schools in the state to continue to offer shop technology, family and consumer economics, culinary arts, and business courses for exposure and entry-level work. Additionally, with 64 students pursuing a certificate in a craft or trade at the **Capital Area Technical Center**, Erskine's enrollment at CATC is second only to its host, Cony High School.

Staffed by three teachers and two educational technicians, Erskine's **Special Education** program educates and provides specialized support to students eligible for such services through an Individual Education Plan (IEP). Valuing all students and believing they deserve a welcoming school and professional teachers who will build on their strengths, 33% of our students receive academic assistance or special education services to support their learning.

Now in its tenth year, our **Jobs for Maine Graduates (JMG)** program has increased student exposure to various forms of higher education and vocational trades programs and has taught essential work seeking, training, and employment retention skills.

Last year, we offered 12 **Advanced Placement** courses, enrolling 152 students; 235 students enrolled across our 13 **dual enrollment courses** with nearby colleges—including Kennebec Valley Community College, Thomas College, the University of Maine, the University of Maine at Farmington, Eastern Maine Community College, the University of Maine at Augusta, and Husson University—taught here by our teachers. For their efforts in these early college experiences, nearly one-half of our graduates earned college credits while in high school. From 2018 to the present, Erskine Academy students received college credit in a total of 1032 courses and realized substantial savings in college tuition to them and their families.

With 27% of our students receiving free and reduced breakfast and lunch, our student body is socioeconomically diverse. We were fortunate this year and last to participate in the Maine Department of Education's **Extended Summer Feeding Program**, which provided all students with tray breakfasts and lunches daily and at no cost to them. However, because our most vulnerable students live and learn in poverty, we continue to operate a school-based clothing and supplies cupboard and the "**Eagles Nest**," an open-access food pantry and backpack program from which students can obtain food for after school and weekends.

Pandemic conditions required our reimagining of favored traditions and activities. With masks, personal hygiene, and distancing in place, we enjoyed Homecoming, Winter Carnival, in-person Senior Week activities (including Baccalaureate, Class Night, and graduation), and the first Lobster Roll to provide financial and moral support for Maine Special Olympics. We also won the first regional competition "**The Cereal Box Domino Challenge**," raising and donating over 3,500 boxes of cereal to our local food pantries.



Other examples of our school community's goodwill are the thousands of hours of community service and substantial fundraising for important causes such as the Home for Little Wanderers, the Ronald McDonald House, the Center for Grieving Children, and the United Way's Day of Caring. Through our embrace of volunteerism and stewardship, we engage meaningfully with our communities, and we experience giving back with appreciation and humility.

Since our founding in 1883, Erskine Academy has remained true to its mission while evolving to meet new demands, challenges, and uncertainties. Because there is no limit to what we can do, pursuing excellence and implementing our mission are continuous and unyielding works in progress. Our school accrediting agency affirmed this, *The New England Association of Schools and Colleges, Inc. (NEASC)*, who, in response to our Five-Year Interim Report, stated, "...the Commission wishes to note the level of attention which the school gives its students. You have developed a truly extensive and effective program—one that is singularly focused on students maximizing their experience and on the post-secondary experiences available to them."

We have heartfelt gratitude for our alumni and friends who believe strongly enough in our values and results that they give their time, talents, and financial donations. Their investment enables us to invest in programs and enhancements that state-set tuition alone cannot support and raises our expectations for ourselves.

We are grateful to our students, families, and sending communities for their confidence in and support for Erskine Academy. Together, we create a school and legacy that adheres to what we know is right and good for our young people and aids them to construct a strong start for adulthood.

Thank you, Windsor residents, for sustaining high school choice for your young people and families, an opportunity for learning available to only 3% of Maine students. Those families who have chosen Erskine Academy—entrusting us with their children's intellectual, social, and personal development—inspire, honor, and motivate us to make an excellent school even better. In partnership and engagement with you, we look forward to new challenges and accomplishments in the year ahead.

The 2021-2022 school year has been a challenging one in RSU 12 due to the COVID-19 Pandemic. However, the Windsor staff, students, and the community continue to rise to the challenge. Our priority has been to provide in-person learning as well as a safe, healthy environment for students and staff. Thank you to RSU 12 families and the community for your patience and collaboration and for following our safety protocols this year. We feel proud that thanks to the perseverance and creativity of the Windsor staff we have been able to provide five days a week of in-person learning since September 2020.

Windsor School welcomed a few new staff members this year. Kristel Anuszewski joined us as our new Learning Commons teacher. Kristel was previously an English teacher and librarian in Winthrop. Beth Choate joined us as our new middle school ELA teacher. She comes to us from RSU 3. Melissa Gosselin joined us midyear as our new interventionist. Melissa had previously taught primary grades in China. Josh Stanley is our new head cook, coming to us from Granite Hill estates. Other new staff members this year include Donna Parker, Abigail Haskell, and Allison Hutchins who are all Educational Technicians.

The RSU #12 School Board of Directors has been an integral part of our ongoing success. Windsor has three board members on the school board. They have all been pivotal in providing leadership to the school board during these difficult times. Ryan Carver, Kimberly Hutchinson, and Dustin Mellor currently serve on the RSU 12 School Board representing the town of Windsor. Their commitment and dedication to the students of RSU 12 are greatly appreciated.

The proposed 2022-2023 RSU 12 school budget is finalized. The RSU 12 student count districtwide is down about 4% from pre-pandemic levels which hampered district subsidy moderately. Information about the budget is available on our website. The overall district local cost increase for the school budget is 2.5%. The increase is due to inflation, increased energy costs, and an increase in the mandated minimum teacher salary.

Please attend the RSU 12 District Budget meeting in the Chelsea Elementary School gym on **Wednesday, May 25th at 6:30 pm**. The RSU 12 District Budget meeting is a town meeting-style opportunity to hear about and approve the budget to send to the district-wide referendum on June 14th. **GREETINGS:**

In the Name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Windsor, qualified by law to vote in Windsor affairs, to meet at the WINDSOR TOWN OFFICE, in said Town of Windsor on TUESDAY, the FOURTEENTH day of JUNE 2022 A.D. at 8:00 a.m. in the morning, then and there to act on Article 1 and Articles 2 are going to be voted upon at the polls by secret ballot. **The Polls shall be opened at 8:00 a.m. and closed at 8:00 p.m. Absentee ballots will be processed at 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.**

And, to notify and warn said inhabitants to meet at the WINDSOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOL in said Town of Windsor on THURSDAY the SIXTEENTH day of JUNE 2022 A.D. at 6:30 p.m. and then and there to act on Articles 3 through 36 will be voted on at the open Town Meeting.

All articles being set out below to wit:

**ARTICLE 1. ELECTION OF MODERATOR:** To elect a moderator to preside at said meeting.

**ARTICLE 2. ELECTION OF TOWN OFFICIALS:** To elect all necessary Town of Windsor Officers/Officials by Secret Ballot.

***ARTICLES 3 THROUGH 13 DEAL WITH TAX & FISCAL ADMINISTRATIONS***

**ARTICLE 3. TAX ADMINISTRATION:** To see what method the Inhabitants of the Town of Windsor will adopt for collection of taxes in FY2023.

- A. The payments, as stated on the bills, shall be due and payable on September 30, 2022, and March 31, 2023, or as otherwise approved by the Select Board.
- B. The Tax Collector shall accept no advance payments, except as provided in section C below before commitment of taxes.
- C. The Town will treat all overpayment of taxes as prepayments on next year's taxes pursuant to 36 MRSA §506 and shall pay no interest on such payments.
- D. The Town will pay interest at the rate of 1.0% per annum on abated taxes for any period, pursuant to 36 MRSA §506-A.
- E. Charge interest at the rate of 4.0 % per annum, on any taxes owed after the due dates.
- F. The Town Report will list all taxes outstanding as of April 1, 2023.
- G. Administration of Tax Acquired Property:
  - 1. Authorize the Select Board to dispose of tax acquired property as they shall deem to be necessary and in the best interests of the Town, except that the Select Board shall use the special sale process required by 36 M.R.S. § 943-C for qualifying homestead property if they choose to sell it to anyone other than the former owner(s).

2. Authorize the Select Board to execute and deliver quit claim deeds, without covenant, for the conveyance of such property.
3. Give delinquent taxpayers a thirty (30) day grace period in which to buy back their property upon payment of all taxes, liens, interest, and other applicable costs.

**ARTICLE 4. ESTABLISHMENT OF TAX CLUB:** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to enter into a standard agreement with taxpayers establishing a "tax club" payment plan for property taxes, whereby:

- A. The taxpayer agrees to pay specified monthly payments to the Town based on his/her estimated and/or actual tax obligation for the current year property taxes.
- B. The Town agrees not to charge interest on timely payments made pursuant to the tax club agreement (which is the same as in Article 3 C).
- C. The Town authorizes the Tax Collector to accept tax club payments for current taxes which may be due prior to the commitment of those taxes.
- D. The agreement is automatically terminated if a scheduled payment is late, and the taxpayer then becomes subject to the same due date(s) and interest date(s) and rate as other taxpayers who are not participating in a tax club.
- E. Only taxpayers who do not have outstanding tax obligations for prior tax years are eligible to participate in the tax club program; and
- F. Taxpayers wishing to participate in a tax club for a particular property tax year shall enter into an agreement with the Town by a publicly advertised deadline determined by the Tax Collector.

### **Notice of Rabies Clinic**

The Windsor Voluntary Fire Department will “**NOT**” be sponsoring a **Rabies Clinic** at the Windsor Fire Station until further notice. You can contact your local Tractor Supply Store and ask about PetVet for your pet’s vaccination needs.

All dog owners are reminded that **dog licenses expire at the end of each calendar year** and should be renewed at the earliest possible date.

**New tags are available by the middle of October.**

A rabies certificate is good for three (3) years, (*unless it's the 1<sup>st</sup> rabies shot*) and owners **must** bring a **current** certificate to the Town Clerk, as well as the **spaying/neutering certificate** if applicable, when they wish to renew their pet’s license.
