U.S.-Soviet Relations Focus of Recent Conference

"U.S.-SOVIET RELATIONS" was the topic of a national strategy conference held April 18-19, at the University of Missouri-St. Louis campus. Over 80 college and university educators from Missouri and surrounding states attended the annual conference, co-sponsored by the Center for International Studies, UM-St. Louis, and the National Strategy Information Center, Inc. of New York.

Discussions included "SDI and East-West Arms Negotiations," by Dr. James E. Dougherty, Professor of Politics, St. Joseph's University; "Containment Revisited," by Dr. Earl C. Ravenal, Distinguished Research Professor,

Georgetown University and Senior Fellow of the Cato Institute; "Continuity or Discontinuity," by Dr. Jerry F. Hough, J.B. Duke Professor of Political Science, Duke University, and staff member, The Brookings Institution; and "Soviet-American Relations in the 1980s," by Dr. John M. Thompson, Consulting Associate, Universities Field Staff International.

The "U.S.-Soviet Relations" Conference was the seventh national strategy conference held at UM-St. Louis since 1975. Each conference focuses on a major issue of national defense or strategic importance.

June Teachers Conference for Japan Week to Feature Japanese Literature

Teaching about Japan in the elementary and secondary classroom is the focus of the Japan Conference for Teachers to be held Friday, June 20, 1986 on the UM-St. Louis campus. The conference is co-sponsored by the Community Education Office of the Center for International Studies, UM-St. Louis, and the Consulate General of Japan in Kansas City.

The conference keynoter will be Katherine Paterson, award-winning writer of children's literature and historical fiction about Japan. She will speak on "Japanese History: Fact and Fiction." There will also be a special presentation of kabuki (traditional Japanese theater) by Dr. Andrew Tsubaki, Professor of East Asian Language and Culture, University of Kansas-Lawrence.

The teachers conference is part of Japan Week, sponsored by the Consulate General of Japan in Kansas City. There is a \$25 registration fee. Teachers interested in attending the conference should contact Kathy Pierson at the Center for International Studies, 553-5801.

Student Cluster to Promote International Studies

UMSL recently organized an INTERNATIONAL STUDENT CLUSTER to bring together students and faculty with a shared interest in international studies and careers. The seminar series began on October 7 with Dr. Thomas Sanders, of Universities Field Staff International (UFSI) speaking on "The Changing Role of the Catholic Church in Latin America." The series continued on October 31 with Dr. Lina Fruzzetti of UFSI, who spoke on "Conducting Field Research in Middle Eastern Countries;" "Preparing for a Career in International Business," with Kathy Vaenberg, November 19; "Faculty Colloquium on International Experiences," by UMSL faculty, February 19; "Student Colloquium on International Experiences," with UMSL students, March 6; and "The Philippines After Marcos," with Dr. James Rush, of UFSI, a Southeast Asia specialist, April 3.

The Cluster also encourages students to enroll in common courses of international studies, to work towards one of the undergraduate international certificates, and to participate in study abroad programs such as the Missouri London Program.

Workshop Last Fall Brought Area Teachers Russian 'Insight'

"BEYOND THE ARMS RACE: INTERNATIONAL PERSPECTIVES FOR TEACHING ABOUT RUSSIA AND THE SOVIET UNION" was the topic of this year's annual international relations conference sponsored by the Center for International Studies, November 12, 1985.

Jack Thompson, Associate for Soviet Affairs, Universities Field Staff International, opened the conference with a speech entitled, "Through Red-Colored Glasses." Workshop topics covered during the one-day conference included Russian art and literature, growing up in the USSR, geography, comparative economic systems, U.S.-Soviet relations, and recommended teaching resources on Russia and the Soviet Union.

Over 100 teachers from St. Louis city and county schools attended the conference which was held on the UM-St. Louis campus.

UMSL Professor Finds Material Benefits in USSR Not Key to Satisfaction

A series of studies on the "Quality of Life in the Soviet Union" was recently completed by a group of scholars involved in the Soviet Interview Project (SIP) at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. DR. ELIZABETH CLAYTON, Professor of Economics at UM-St. Louis and Research Associate for CIS, was Managing Director of this five-year project from 1983 through 1985.

In the project, 2800 former Soviet citizens now living in the U.S. were interviewed about their lives in the Soviet Union. Many were part of the migration that brought 125,000 Soviet citizens to the U.S. from the USSR beginning in 1970 when the USSR allowed thousands of its citizens, predominantly Jewish, to leave the Soviet Union for the West. The group included white and blue-collar workers as well as lawyers, doctors, engineers, and teachers, of diverse ages, incomes, education, and gender.

Of the findings, the most startling was that those who had enjoyed the most

material benefits in the USSR--the best housing, jobs, incomes and education--were generally the least satisfied with life there. Another clear pattern in the survey was that the younger members of Soviet society were the most alienated and most critical of the Soviet system. They tend to judge the Soviet leadership on current performance and conditions and look for material and measurable progress.

With today's push for progress in science, technology and the economy, the Soviets have an increasing need for an educated populace. Yet, according to the survey, as education advances, support for state power declines and support for ideas of human and labor rights increases. Thus, the resources needed to modernize the Soviet economy may, in fact, undermine and threaten the Soviet system.

The Soviet Interview Project was funded by the National Council for Soviet and East European Research under contract with the U.S. State Department, with support from the Defense Department and the Central Intelligence Agency.

PIERSON PROMOTES COMMUNITY EDUCATION

The University of Missouri-St. Louis is the only higher education institution in St. Louis and in the University of Missouri system that supports a comprehensive community international education program with a full-time program director--KATHERINE C. PIERSON, Assistant Director for Community Education in the Center for International Studies.

Pierson works directly with primary and secondary educators in providing programs and curricula that give students a global perspective in all fields of study. Her most recent project was the CHINA RESOURCE NOTEBOOKS, a collection of six lesson books written by St. Louis elementary and secondary teachers in collaboration with university faculty. The project was part of a partnership program that allowed elementary and secondary teachers to consult with

university faculty in developing new curricula on China. The teachers presented their projects at a one-day conference for 60 St. Louis area educators held last October.

Some of Pierson's other projects include planning teacher training conferences on international studies, coordinating activities for the Missouri China Council, and providing educators with a resource library of current international teaching materials. She also works with the St. Louis Sister City Committees of Nanjing (China) and Suwa (Japan), and other St. Louis institutions in coordinating international programs and events.

Pierson began working at UM-St. Louis in 1974 after receiving her M.A. in Asian Studies from Washington University.

Recent Publications by CIS Faculty

Women's Suffrage and Social Politics in the French Third Republic

by Steven C. Hause with Anne R. Kenney, Princeton University Press, 1984.

This book surveys the political rights of French women from the middle ages through the elections of 1981. It focuses on the period between the 1890s (when a mass suffrage movement began to appear in France) and the 1920s (when the French Senate firmly rejected women's suffrage). This study seeks to explain why the land of liberté and égalité was one of the last countries in the western world to grant women the vote (1944) and to understand the suffrage movement in the context of French society and politics.

The analysis presented includes a comparison of French suffragism with that in other countries, a geographical examination of regional attitudes in France, and evaluation of the social,

religious, cultural, legal, and political factors intrinsic to France. The term "social politics" in the title indicates an attempt to understand the linkage between suffragism and French society, ranging from issues such as alcoholism and depopulation through French mores and attitudes (mentalités).

This book has been selected as one of the Year's outstanding academic books by CHOICE.

The Byzantine Amomos Chant of the Fourteenth and Fifteenth Centuries

by Diane H. Touliatos-Banker, Thessaloniki, Greece: Patriarchal Institute for Patristic Studies, 1984.

The book is an historical and musical analysis of Psalm 118 of the Septuagint Psalter in the Byzantine rite, which is commonly referred to as the "Amomos." Psalm 118 has always been held in high regard throughout the ages by both Synagogue and Church and has the extraordinary distinction of being the longest psalm in the Psalter, containing 176 verses.

The importance of Psalm 118 is demonstrated with its use in many services of the Byzantine liturgical rite. Being so important, its verses were set to music

by the most important of the Byzantine composers of the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries. The book examines the following aspects of the Amomos chant: 1) its historical origins, content, structure, and transmission in the services in which it is used; 2) its usage and function in each of the services in which it appears; and 3) its musical art form and development of stylistic families.

VIETNAM WAR COURSE

Teaching about the Vietnam War was the subject of a course for high school teachers offered by CIS, the Political Science Department and Continuing Education-Extension at the University of Missouri-St. Louis. The course ran eight consecutive Thursday afternoons, from March 20-May 8, on the UM-St. Louis campus.

Course topics included: the pros and cons of teaching about the war, how to teach about the war from four perspectives (U.S. foreign policy, the view from Vietnam, the legacy of the war in Asia, and the impact of the war on American society), and recommended teaching materials. Joel Glassman, Associate Professor of Political Science at UM-St. Louis, and James Rush, Associate for Southeast Asian Affairs, Universities Field Staff International, were the instructors.

The Vietnam War course was supported by funding from the Missouri China Council and offered in cooperation with the College of Arts and Sciences, the Political Science Department, and the Center for International Studies at UM-St. Louis.

"CHINA RESOURCE NOTEBOOKS"

The **CHINA RESOURCE NOTEBOOKS**, a six volume set of lesson books for grades 4-12, are now available to teachers free of charge from the Center for International Studies. Written by local elementary and secondary educators in consultation with university faculty, the lesson books combine both effective teachers' strategies and up-to-date scholarship. The notebooks are a product of the China Partnership Project, which promotes the collaboration of elementary, secondary and university faculty in the development of new teaching materials about China.

The topics of the notebooks are Chinese folklore, modern Chinese history, contemporary Chinese literature, a scientific view of food and agriculture in China, a comparison of U.S. and Chinese economic systems, and agricultural modernization and reforms.

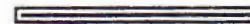
STUDY IN LONDON

Students interested in studying in London for a summer, semester or full academic year can participate in the Missouri London Program (MLP), a study abroad program developed by the University of Missouri-St. Louis and six other Missouri universities. Each participating university sends a faculty member to London each semester. Students can receive UMSL undergraduate credit for study in a variety of liberal arts courses (typically, about 17 courses are offered in a regular semester and 8 courses in the summer).

The academic year or fall semester program begins August 22. Early application is advised as enrollment is limited.

The participating universities are Central Missouri State University, Southwest Missouri State University and the Universities of Missouri at Columbia, Rolla, Kansas City and St. Louis.

In TEACHING, the Center offers programs in international studies and student/teacher opportunities for study or teaching abroad. Special undergraduate certificate programs are available to students who want to specialize in East Asian, European, international, or Latin American studies.

RESEARCH by UMSL fellows is a high priority of the Center. Since 1980, CIS affiliated faculty have produced more than 28 books and 135 articles and chapters covering a variety of fields with an international perspective.

Through COMMUNITY SERVICE the Center opens its resources to the St. Louis community. We sponsor art exhibits, displays, conferences, and seminars on international topics. We support a

comprehensive global education program that improves the quality of international education in elementary and secondary schools in the St. Louis area. The Center conducts teacher training conferences on global education and makes available an international resource library to teachers.
