
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

SOME BENGAL BRIEFS

After tonight's contest with Stanford the Tigers take off for two weeks in a row, meeting Washington State in Spokane on September 25 and University of Indiana in Bloomington on October 2. COP returns home to meet its next opponent, Idaho, in Pacific Memorial Stadium on October 9.

The trips to Spokane and Bloomington are only half of Pacific's lengthy road schedule in 1954. The Tigers journey to Fort Collins to meet Colorado A & M on October 16 and to Cincinnati to meet the University of Cincinnati on October 30.

All told the Bengals will fly over 12,000 miles before they are finished with the current campaign.

A flock of All America and All Sectional candidates will be throwing their player excellence at the Tigers on coming weekends. Texas Tech's Quarterback Jack Kirkpatrick and Tackle Jerry Walker are considered among the best in the southwest. Kirkpatrick was a special standout as a sophomore last year, operating the split T with maximum efficiency and returning five kickoffs all the way for touchdowns.

San Jose State has Joe Ulm, who tallied 11 touchdowns in four games last year and was leading the nation in ground gaining until he was cut down for scholastic reasons. And don't forget Roy Hiram, the Hawaiian boy who sunk the Tigers in the final 24-seconds in 1952.

Marguette's Ron Drzewiecki is about as good a running back as there is in the nation. Four times in the last two years he has chilled the Tigers with runs of 40-yards or more for touchdowns.

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Not to forget Quarterback Dick Shockey, who wound up among the top ten in total offense last season as a sophomore.

On the road, Indiana's Florian Helinski operates a mean split T for the Hoosiers, both as passer and runner. A sophomore they are all high on in the middle west is Milton Campbell, 210-pound right half who was runnerup to Bob Mathias in the decathalon at the last Olympic Games. He's rated as no worse than a new Ollie Matson. Plenty big and plenty fast!

There are many less heralded ball players who will probably give the Tigers some bad moments during the season but those eight will do well enough to keep Jack Myers reaching for the headache powders.

Pacific can field probably the smallest backfield in major college football in the nation. Take a look as some of the sizes of front line backs who will be playing in 1954 for the Bengals.

Quarterback Bill Jacobs is 5'7" and 156. His sidekick, J. B. Girard is 5' 8" and 165. At left half, Don Cornell is 5' 11" and 168, Ken Swearingen is 5' 9" and 161 and Billy Swor is 5' 7" and 155. At right half, Dewey Tompkins is 5' 8" and 149 and Joe Delgardo is 5' 7" and 159. Fullback Lynn Swanson is 5' 11" and 170.

Coach Myers can throw a little beef in there if need be, with such as Left Half Ernie Lindo (179), Fullback "Dutch" Grose (185) and Fullback Ted Case (186) and Fullback Tom Perry (176), but its not too much larger.

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THE GAME

Tonight's game marks the first time a Stanford football team has ever played in the San Joaquin

It is also the first night engagement for the Indians since their nocturnal tilt with UCLA back in 1930 at the Los Angeles Coliseum.

The game tonight will also see Stanford outfitted in its first new offense since Coach Clark Shaughnessy amazed the football world back in 1940 with the introduction of the T formation.

Coach Chuck Taylor this year has equipped the Indians with a style of attack which he calls the spread-T.

According to Chuck, the big difference in his present offense over that of the Shaughnessy-T is the wide spacing of linemen. Taylor is putting twice as much daylight between the men up front as there is under the tight-T setup.

Taylor also plans to spread out an end and a back as flankers on every play. This is intended to loosen up the defense.

In addition to these new wrinkles in the Stanford attack Taylor has added some split-T option run-pass plays for his quarterbacks.

Another phase of the new Stanford offense which should add spice to the game tonight is Taylor's decision to go all out in the passing department.

He said: "Last year we averaged 23 passes a game. If everything goes right, we hope to get that up to 30 this season."

Taylor might have added that if Pacific doesn't cooperate better than they did last year the Indian's time table will be thrown out of kilter right at the beginning.

The Stanford football chief is still of the opinion that last year some of his players took the Tigers too lightly and in doing so ended up on the short end of a 25-20 score.

Talking with members of the Stanford squad these past two weeks, we found that their attitude towards the Tigers is just the opposite of that of last year.

If the Indians lose tonight you can be sure there will not be any talk afterwards that they were looking past the men from Pacific.

As for last year's contest: it might not go into the books as the best played game of the year but it certainly packed a lot of thrills for the spectators.

We have a feeling that tonight's contest will be another game with crowd appeal.

This is one series we hope continues for many vears to come.

Over KGDM, the Columbia Broadcasting System outlet for the area, Irv Schwartz does a scoreboard show and Bill Hill and Carroll Doty pick the games around the nation each week, in addition to presenting an interview with the advance man from the visiting school on COP games.

Ellis Lind and Ray Golden cover the Pacific football picture thoroughly on their daily disc jockey shows, presenting several interviews each week over KSTN. Golden and Lind also have KTVU-TV programs and broadcast the Stockton College Mustang and Colt games.

Jim Ranger has a nightly sports show over KWG in which he brings to his listeners complete information about the Tigers and their opponents, including interviews with Bengal coaches and players. Jim also broadcasts all of the home and road games of the Stockton Ports.

The station which carries Pacific's football games, KXOB, also presents Ed Zuchelli in a nightly sports show with all the latest dope on the Tigers featured strongly. Zuchelli does a 15-minute spot both before and after the broadcasts of the San Francisco 49ers games which also is liberally sprinkled with COP football news and

interviews. Carroll Doty also presents a weekly sports show on Friday nights.

The newest outlet for sports in Stockton is Station KOVR-TV, which features Bob Fouts in a nightly 10-minute sports roundup and a weekly 30-minute preview of the coming Pacific game, with movie clips and interviews.

KTVU-TV has a weekly 15-minute sports show with Carroll Doty on Friday nights and as this was written was planning on presenting the full game movie of COP's previous week's game.

The gentlemen pictured on these pages and mentioned in the above story work hard to bring sports fans of Stockton and the valley complete information about the Tigers and their opponents, not only in football but in all other sports. May we suggest you drop any or all of them a line occasionally to let them know that you appreciate the job they are doing.

THE GAME

When the Stanford Indian begins trying to tomahawk the College of the Pacific Tiger tonight on the field below you, it will mark the first visit of a southern division Pacific Coast Conference school to Pacific Memorial Stadium or inland central California, for that matter.

"Chuck" Taylor's Big Red Machine of 1954 comes into Stockton picked to finish up somewhere in the middle three teams of the PCC. But you only have to hark back one season to 1953 when the Indians were picked to finish in the same place in pre-season ratings. And if you'll remember, Taylor had his team fighting for the Rose Bowl bid up through the final game.

The Tigers pulled a stunning upset by downing Stanford in the opener last season, 25-20, and gave COP Coach Jack Myers an amazing kickoff to his collegiate coaching career. However, it will be twice as spectacular if Myers can pull it off twice in a row.

Pacific has the offensive tools to get on the scoreboard against most anybody, but the problems on defense are numerous. The main one is wrapped up in the Tiger's short defensive backs, who will probably find it difficult to guard against Stanford's tall ends on pass plays.

A more or less veteran team faces Stanford for the Bengals tonight, although it is admittedly thin in some spots. Only three starters from 1953, Left Guard "Bull' Hulsey; Center Jim Timms and Quarterback Bill Jacobs, will open the game tonight. But the Tigers used unit substitution last year, thereby giving several players enough playing time to earn letters who wouldn't have normally.

Lettermen returning are: ends, A. D. Williams Roger Linn and Ed Griffith; tackles Gene Cronin, Bing Downing and Bob Maron; guards, Hulsey, Buzz Williams and Jim Fleming; centers Jim Timms and Ben Cahill; halfback Don Cornell and fullback Ted Case.

Up from last year's freshman team are: ends Reuben Gutierrez and George Lane; tackle Frank Montabana; guard Galen Laack; center Jack O'Rourke; quarterback Al Culp and halfbacks Stan Daniel, Tom Green and Roger Owen.

Junior College transfers include: ends Jim Collins from Yuba JC and Darrell Haynes from Stockton College; tackle John Nisby from Stockton College; guards Bob Lee from East Contra Costa JC and Emil Dattola from Pasadena City College; quarterback J. B. Girard from Stockton College; halfbacks Dewey Tompkins from Long Beach CC, Ken Swearingen from El Camino JC, Ernie Lindo from Pasadena CC, Bob Giardina from Napa JC and Mel Smalley from Orange Coast JC and fullback "Dutch" Grose from Long Beach CC.

Service returnees are: guard Frank DeParsia, halfback Bill Swor and fullback Ted Case. Non-lettermen veterans from last year are tackle Jack Meeks and fullback Lynn Swanson. Fullback Tom Perry was a freshman star in 1952 and sat out last year with injuries.

Tonight pits the one-two passing teams in the nation of last year against each other. Gone are Bobby Garrett, Sam Morley and John Steinberg, the heart of Stanford's aerial game in 1953. Also gone are Roy Ottoson, Ken Buck and Art Liebscher from the Tigers' passing game of last fall. Only returning member of the two starring casts is Jacobs, who pitched nine of COP's 14 TD passes a season ago.

Both Myers and Taylor seem confident, however, that their aerial games will remain effective. Too go with it, both teams apparently have much stronger running games, which should make foir a more wide-open contest. With stronger running attacks, the defensive team won't be able to hang back and look for the pass as much.

Few things are certain in this old life. Certainly picking the winner here this evening would be a hazardous thing. But on thing is sure. It'll be a long night for both "Moose" and "Chuck."


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


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

It was not so many years ago (1946-47 to be exact) that the marching band had less than forty members. Because of its meager proportions, the band was forced to limit its half-time stunts to simple "block letters" and standard march tunes.

Since those embryonic times the band has increased both numerically and in its scope of operations. It is one of a handful of Western states' college bands to play continuously while on the field. Once a performance has started there is no pause in either movement or sound until it reaches a dynamic conclusion.

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

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
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
