



### ... The Teams ...

When the College of Pacific and the Sacramento Junior College football teams take the field today, one may be assured that they both will be giving everything they have and possibly a little bit more in an effort to score a victory. There is nothing that the College of Pacific hates more than to be defeated by the junior college. Also, as this is their coach's last year at C. O. P. they are striving harder than ever to make it the most successful he has enjoyed in his long reign at that institution.

In order to do this they must beat the local aggregation. They were dealt a serious blow when their all-conference halfback "Ham" Hamilton was injured last week. Hamilton was one of the mainstays of the team last year when they defeated the junior college 14 to 0. And in this year's game with the California Aggies it was he who was responsible for such an overwhelming score. However, his ability has apparently been transferred to one Tom Wilson, who stole the show in the Santa Clara Bronco-C. O. P. game.

The personnel of the visitors is made up largely of all-conference men of last year. In Stocking at tackle one will see one of the greatest tackles to ever grace the local stadium turf. He has everything. Gould at quarterback is another all-conference man and his steady calling of plays has won more than its share of contests. In Biff Strobridge, a product of Lodi, C. O. P. has a marvelous fullback who was all-conference fullback last year and will easily be again this. Bob Wicker at half was not an all-conference man last year, but the wise ones are predicting the recognition this year.

In regards to the balance of the team, anyone who saw the game with the Aggies realizes that they have a truly great forward wall. The ends are fast and get down on the punts. Corson at center is a good passer and a bulwark on defense. Kjeldsen and Seeber are reliable guards with the former being mentioned as all-conference prospects. Hoene at tackle is a sure and steady tackle.

Reading this account might lead the reader to believe that the local college has not a chance. But they are an Applequist coached varsity with stars of their own. At center Captain Olver will be found and that boy can and does play football. McComber and Womble at guards are reliable and steady. Culjis at tackle is one of those boys that can't be kept off the team. Anderson, the other tackle, will probably be the fastest man on the field and he can sure go down on punts.

Sacramento will have the best end on the field in Harvey, and Remmel is not far behind him. The local backfield although not as flashy on open field running as former J. C. teams, has power and a pass attack that may cope with Pacific. In Peterson at fullback the college has one of the best triple-threat men ever developed in this region.

Wynne and Stafford are ideal running mates for the line-crushing Peterson. Woerner at quarterback has come along nicely and has shown good judgment at all times.

In conclusion one might say regarding the game that the local college can win if they have perfected an adequate pass defense and will lose if they have not.

A number corresponding to those listed here will appear on the scoreboard as the penalty occurs. The numbers do not indicate the player responsible for the penalty.

#### LOSS OF FIVE YARDS

#### OTHER PENALTIES

- 36 Illegal return to game: loss of twentyfiv yards.
- Team not ready to play at scheduled time: loss of twenty-five yards. Foud within one-vard line: half distance
- to goal line. Interference with forward pass by defense: loss of ball.
- 40 Slugging: half distance to goal and disqualification.
- 41 Flagrant roughing of kicker: 15 yards and disqualification.
- 42 Any act committed by an outsider but affecting the game: the referee is empowered to impose such penalty as justice may require.

#### THE NEW RULES

- 1. The ball becomes dead when any portion of the player in possession of it, except his hands and feet, touches the ground, except a player holding the ball for a place-
- 2. A player withdrawn from the game may return at any time except the quarter in which he is withdrawn. Substitutions may be made only when time is out for some other purpose except for the replacement of an injured player.
- 3. Five players of the team receiving a kickoff are required to remain within five

- vards of their restraining line (40-yard line) until the kick is actually made.
- 4. Players on the defense are allowed to use the palms of their hands only above the shoulders of opponents to ward off or push them in order to get the ball or the player carrying it. Striking with hands on head, neck or face of an opponent is prohibited.
- Knee and elbow pads and other protective equipment must be made of or covered by a soft outside surface.
