TODAY'S GAME

With the 1933 season all but over, Fresno State's Bulldogs and Pacific's Tigers meet today in the annual Homecoming Day game which invariably brings out the best in both teams. Last year's 35-0 victory by Pacific is still remembered by Fresno State, and the Bulldogs will be seeking revenge, while the Tigers will seek their second straight victory.

The two new coaches of the Far Western Conference, Amos Alonzo Stagg of Pacific and Leo Harris of Fresno, will pit their respective wiles against each other, with Stagg calling on all his vast experience, gained in over forty years of coaching, to match the resourcefulness of the youthful Harris, who but only a few years ago was a much-talked-of player at Stanford.

The winner of today's game will end up in third place in the Far Western Conference standings, as San Jose State and Nevada have tied for the championship again this year. However, a conference title need not be at stake in a Fresno-Pacific game. The traditional rivals always put on a good show—and with a wide open style of play employed by both teams, a game replete with thrills is in the offing.

The season of 1933 found two new coaches taking their places in the Far Western Conference. At the College of the Pacific, Amos Alonzo Stagg, the "grand old man" of football, started anew after having left the University of Chicago. The well-known mentor, veteran of over forty campaigns as a head coach, has taken his place as the oldest coach, not only in the Far Western Conference, but also on the entire coast.

In the meantime, Fresno State has also acquired a new coach in the person of Leo Harris, who is the youngest coach in the conference. Starring as a tackle on Pop Warner's national championship team of 1926, Harris had coached at Fresno High School for five years and at Fresno State for one year as frosh coach before assuming the varsity reins this fall.

To say that Harris has been the sensation of the conference is not an exaggeration. Taking over a squad that had ended up last in the conference last year, Harris has turned out one of the strongest teams in the circuit, despite heavy losses by ineligibilities and withdrawals from school—losses that took away thirteen men who had been expected to carry much of the burden of a nine-game schedule against strong opposition.

To date, the Bulldogs have won five games and have lost three, a very creditable showing in consideration of the opposition faced. To Line Coach Roy Niswander goes much credit for the powerful line of Fresno State. A star guard at California in his playing days, Niswander has been of constant aid to Harris and the Bulldogs. Walter Glenn, Bulldog captain and quarterback last year, has also served on the coaching staff this year as an assistant backfield coach.

Bulldog Prospects for the 1934 Season

No coach was ever blessed with a finer bunch of fellows than represent Fresno State College today; and, whether they win or lose, you may be sure that they have played the game to the best of their ability.

From this year's squad we lose four valuable players whose absence will be keenly felt. The losses of Captain Jack Horner, Horace Niswander, Marty Kaufman and Blair White will be hard to fill; but a bunch of fighting reserves, augmented by a host of this year's frosh, should plug up these holes.

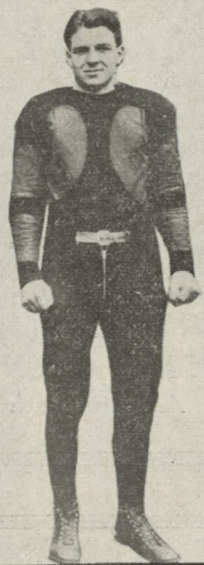

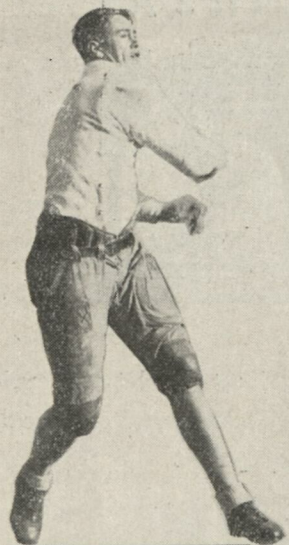

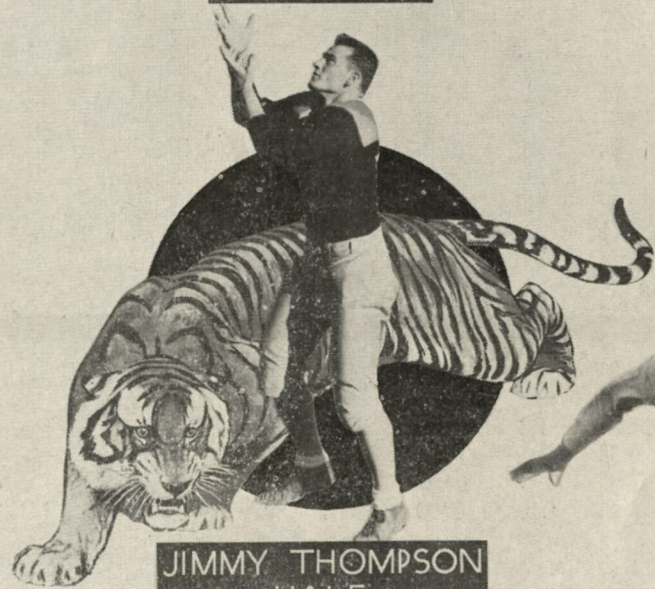

LOSS OF A DOWN

1. Forward pass from less than 5 yards behind line of scrimmage, or second forward pass on same play.
2. Incomplete forward pass.
3. Interference by passing team with defensive player in position to catch.

LOSS OF FIVE YARDS

4. Request for time out more than three times during a half.
5. Delaying the game.
6. Second, third, or fourth incomplete pass in same series of downs.
7. Player taking more than two steps after a fair catch. Also for crawling.
8. Illegal use of hands by defensive player.
9. Use of flying block or flying tackle.
10. Running into the kicker.
11. Offside.

LOSS OF FIFTEEN YARDS

12. Substitute communicating before ball is put into play.
13. Failure to stop one full second after shifting.
14. Tackling player who has made a fair catch.
15. Illegal use of hands by offense.
16. Roughing the kicker.
17. Clipping.
18. Side-line coaching.

DISQUALIFICATION FROM GAME

19. Flagrant unsportsmanlike conduct.

HALF THE DISTANCE TO THE GOAL LINE

20. When the ball is too close to the goal line of the team being penalized to permit the infliction of the full penalty.

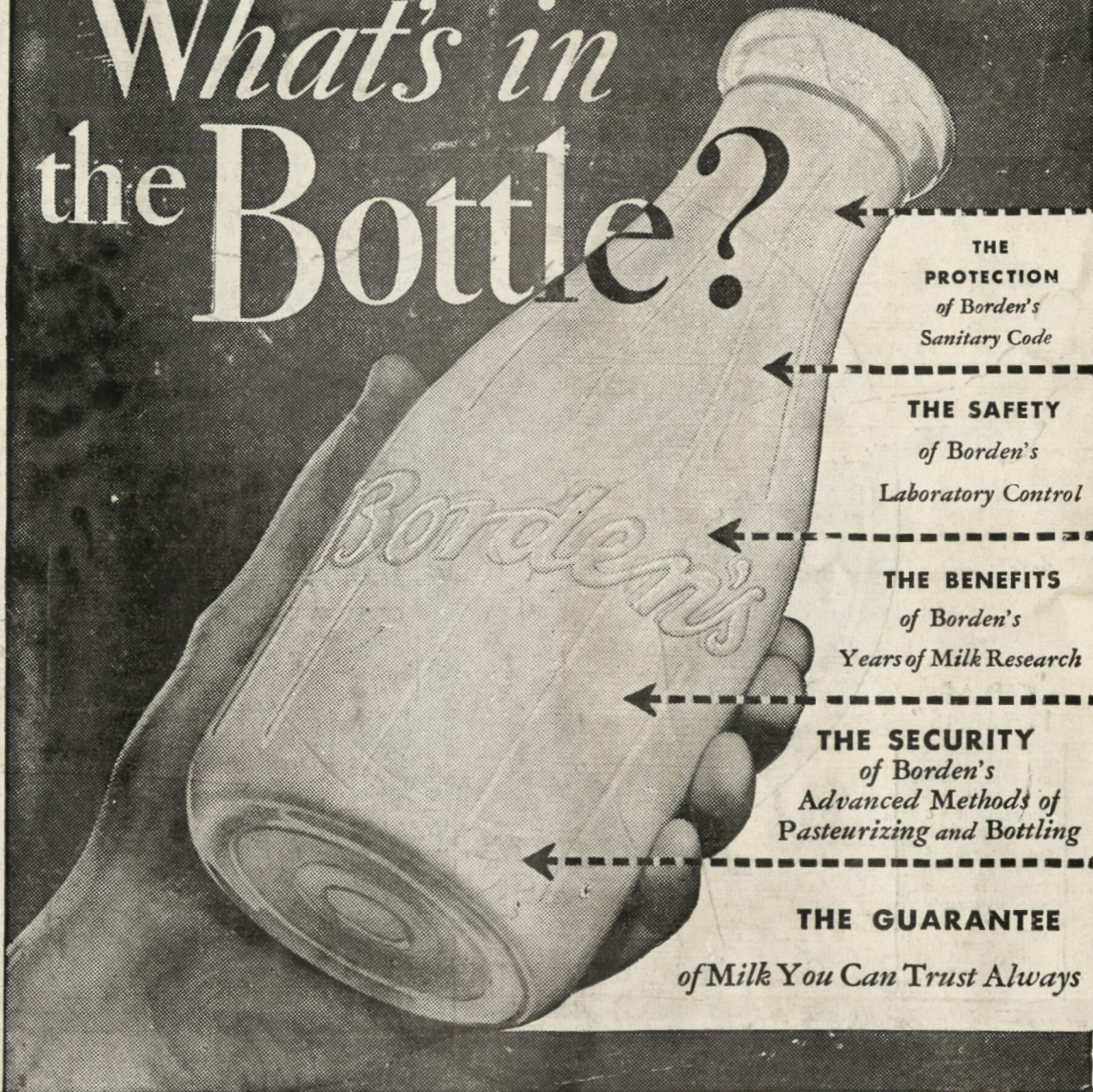
