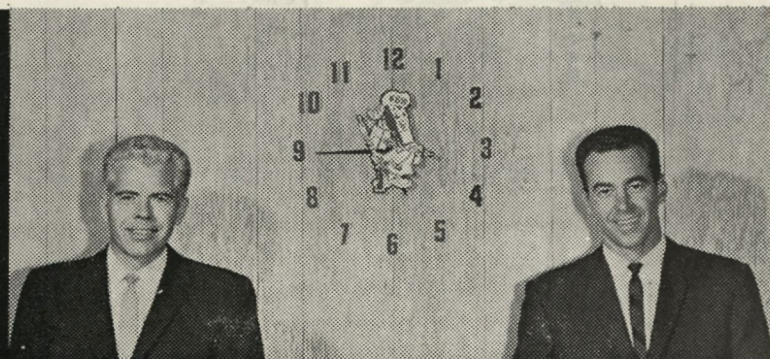

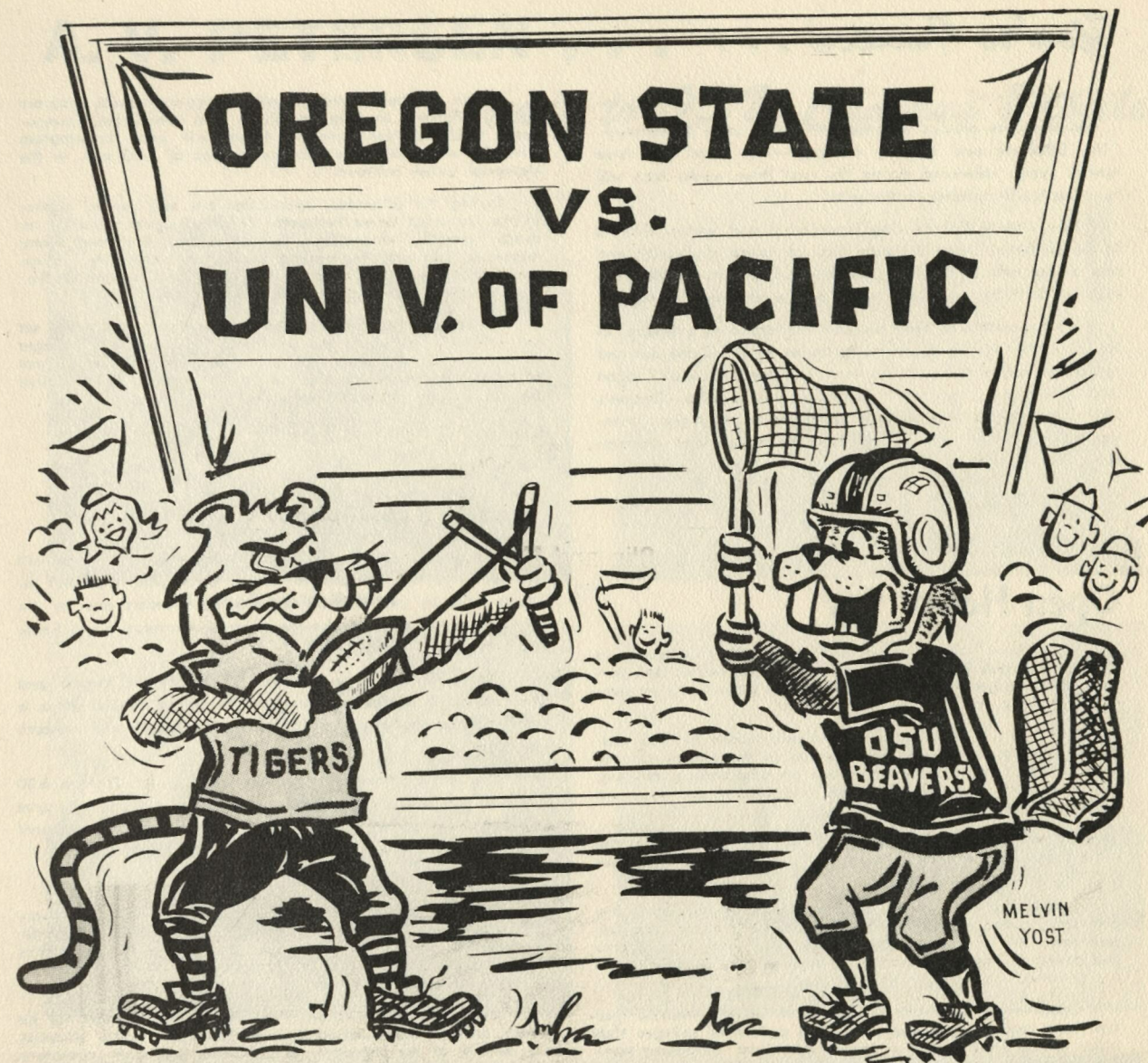

You're invited!

Visitors are always welcome at Oregon State University—"The Scholarly and Friendly Campus"—but there are three special events scheduled during the next three weeks that will have particular interest to the public.

They include Charter Day convocation and special exhibits in the Memorial Union Ballroom Oct. 24; public dedication and tour of the new \$5,000,000 OSU Physics-Chemistry Building the night of Oct. 26; and Open House on the afternoon of Nov. 3.

It's impossible to send personal invitations to everyone, of course, so let this be a general invitation to all. Come out and get better acquainted with the work and the people of Oregon State University. Then you'll better know why OSU—Oregon's oldest and largest state-supported institution of higher learning—is ranked as one of the top universities and research centers in America.

We'll be watching for you.

Open House Set

Open House has been scheduled for Nov. 3 at Oregon State University to give high school students, their counselors and parents, and the general public as well, an opportunity to hear about and see work underway at OSU.

The 11 to 5 p.m. program will include reports on OSU academic offerings and career opportunities in the various schools; tours of the campus; and discussions on scholarships, housing, part-time work and loan programs, and student activities and government.

All members of the OSU staff will be on hand in the various buildings and departments to greet visitors and answer questions.

School meetings will be held on the hour throughout the afternoon, giving students a chance to visit the schools and departments they are interested in and learn of study requirements and programs. Special educational displays and demonstrations are planned.

Open House will take the place of Senior Weekend that has been held in past years by OSU, and other colleges that make up the State System of Higher Education. Increasing numbers of students prompted the change to the Open House plan. Announcement of the new program came from the High School-College Relations Committee of the State System of Higher Education.

Because no meals or housing will be provided, there will be no registration fee or campus expense involved for visitors participating in the OSU Open House, Dallas Norton, director of admissions, said.

Charter Day Coming

On Oct. 24, Oregon State University will observe its 95th Charter Day and the centennial of the Land-Grant Colleges and Universities and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The public is invited to join in both.

Speaker for the campus Charter Day convocation at 11 a.m. in the Home Economics Auditorium will be Dr. Richard Sullivan, president of Reed College. Classes will be dismissed for the convocation and the public is invited.

OSU's Charter Day is Oct. 27, but because that is a Saturday, the observance was moved to Oct. 24.

Theme of the afternoon and evening centennial program will be "Partners in Progress—USDA and Land-Grant Universities." OSU President James H. Jensen will open the program when he welcomes visitors to the campus at 1:30 p.m. in the Memorial Union ballroom.

During the afternoon, special exhibits will be on display in the Memorial Union ballroom. They will cover radiation research, genetics, entomology, disease control, land and water resources, nutrition, engineering production technology, utilization technology, U.S. Forest Service, U.S. Soil Conservation Service, electrical power development, and economics.

It was in 1862 that the Morrill Act was signed which set up America's system of the Land-Grant or "people's" colleges of which OSU is a part. That same year, the U.S. Department of Agriculture was established to serve the people of the nation and to provide leadership in agricultural advances.

Dedication Slated

Oregon State University's \$5,000,000 science building will be dedicated Oct. 26 and 27 during a program that will include talks by two Nobel Prize-winning scientists and by the director of space science for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

The giant five-story structure is one of the largest and best-equipped science buildings in the United States. It is a multi-purpose building, serving both instructional and research purposes.

The public is invited to tour the building Oct. 26 from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. Faculty members and graduate students will serve as guides to explain the uses of the various scientific equipment and to discuss OSU's role as "Oregon's Center of Science."

Speakers for the two-day program will include:

Dr. W. F. Libby, 1960 Nobel Prize winner for his discovery of carbon 14, or radiocarbon, which makes it possible to determine the age of prehistoric plant and animal remains. Libby is professor of chemistry at University of California at Los Angeles. His topic—"Impact of Chemistry on Society."

Dr. Edwin M. McMillan, 1951 Nobel Prize winner, for his work on element 94, plutonium. McMillan, a nuclear physicist, is director of the University of California Radiation Laboratory, Berkeley. His topic—"Elementary Particles."

Dr. Homer Newell, director of space science for NASA and one of America's top experts on space research. He will discuss "Opportunities for Universities in the Field of Space Science."

Housed in the new building, officially known as the Physics-Chemistry Building, are the Departments of Physics, Chemistry, Science Education, Agricultural Chemistry, Oceanography and General Science; the Science Research Institute; and the Dean of Science offices.

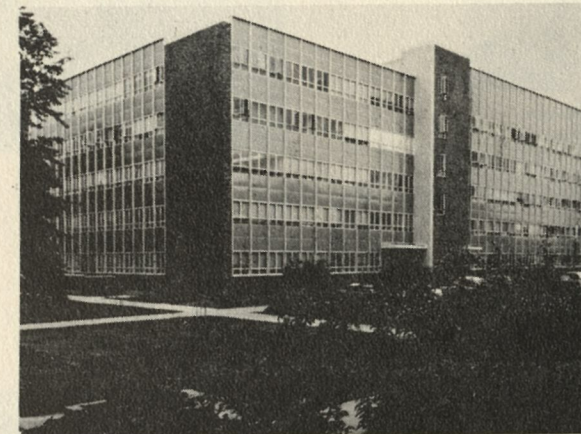
The giant structure has 203,939 square feet of floor space. The first of the two units in the finished building was completed in 1960; the second early this year. On the roof are greenhouses, small animal laboratories (for research use) and weather equipment.

Specialized equipment in the new building is valued at \$1,221,000, according to Dr. Vernon H. Cheldelin, dean of science. Included are an electron microscope, optical spectrometer, high-powered centrifuges, electron paramagnetic resonance spectrometer, and x-ray machines.

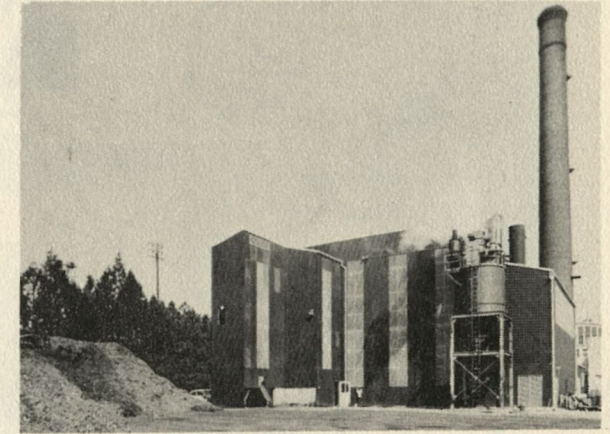
Types of research underway in the building include studies of ocean salinity and marine and animal life, heart muscle chemistry, steelhead trout and silver salmon migration, tree bark chemicals of economic importance, rain and hailstone patterns, and allergy producing materials from grass pollen.

Vern Burke, National Leader . . .

A year ago Vern Burke was an unknown "redshirt" on the Oregon State football squad, waiting out a year of eligibility due to the transfer rule from junior college.

Today he's a well-known figure in the OSU football picture—and the nation's leading pass receiver.

The 6-4½, 188-pound junior from Bakersfield Junior College has hauled in 32 aerials in four games, far and away the best mark among major college pass receivers in the country.

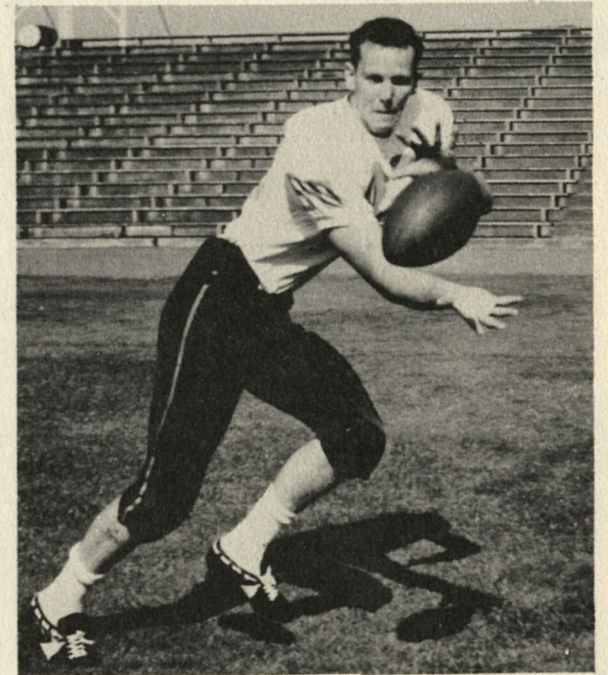
He's well on his way to breaking the one-season pass catching mark of 66 set two years ago by Hugh Campbell of Washington State, who performed here last fall.

Another Campbell record Burke is threatening is the pass receiving yardage mark for one season of 869, also established in 1960. Burke has 439 in four games.

Burke's varsity debut was a brilliant one. Against Iowa State in Portland he hauled in 12 Terry Baker passes, two for touchdowns, in a thrilling 39-35 Beaver victory.

Iowa held him to 5 receptions, but he followed with 8 catches against Stanford and 7 last Saturday against nationally-ranked Washington, two of them for touchdowns.

He's already broken several OSU pass catching marks, and today could become the all-time one season record holder. He needs only five catches to shatter the standard of 36 set by John Thomas in the 1950 season.

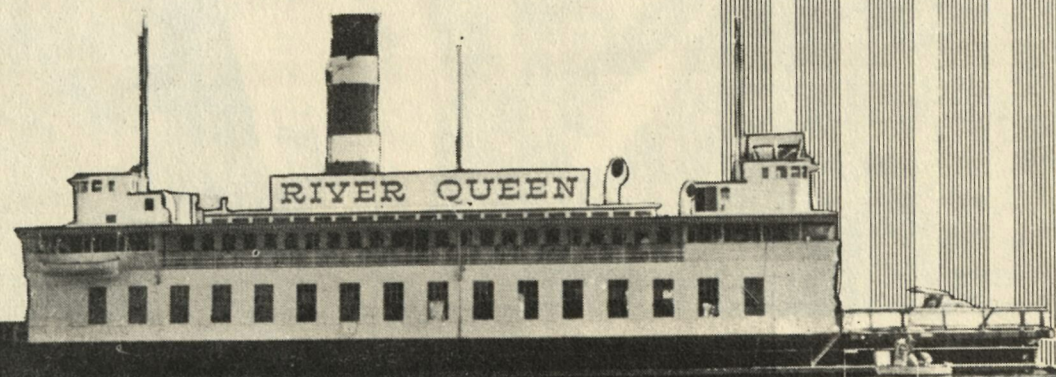

PENALTIES

1. **OFFSIDE** by either team; Violation of scrimmage or free kick formation; Encroachment on neutral zone — Loss of Five Yards.

2. **ILLEGAL PROCEDURE, POSITION OR SUBSTITUTION** — Putting ball in play before Referee signals "Ready-for-Play"; Failure to complete substitution before play starts; Player out-of-bounds when scrimmage begins; Failure to maintain proper alignment of offensive team when ball is snapped; False start or simulating start of a play; Taking more than two steps after Fair Catch is made; Player on line receiving snap; Free kick out-of-bounds — Loss of Five Yards.

3. **ILLEGAL MOTION** — Offensive player illegally in motion when ball is snapped — Loss of Five Yards.

4. **ILLEGAL SHIFT** — Failure to stop one full second following shift — Loss of Five Yards.

5. **ILLEGAL RETURN** of ineligible substitute — Loss of 15 Yards.

6. **DELAY OF GAME** — Consuming more than 25 seconds in putting the ball in play after it is declared ready for play; Interrupting the 25-second count for any reason other than a free or excess time out granted by Referee; Failure to remove injured player for whom excess time out was granted; Crawling — Loss of Five Yards. Team not ready to play at start of either half — Loss of 15 Yards.

7. **PERSONAL FOUL** — Tackling or blocking defensive player who has made fair catch; Piling on; Hurdling; Grasping face mask of opponent; Tackling player out of bounds, or running into player obviously out of play; Striking an opponent with fist, forearm, elbow or locked hands; Kicking or kneeling — Loss of 15 Yards. (Flagrant offenders will be disqualified.)

8. **CLIPPING** — Loss of 15 Yards.

9. **ROUGHING THE KICKER** or holder — Loss of 15 Yards.

10. **UNSPORTSMANLIKE CONDUCT** — Violation of rules during intermission; Illegal return of suspended player; Coaching from side lines; Invalid signal for Fair Catch; Persons illegally on field — Loss of 15 Yards. (Flagrant offenders will be disqualified.)

11. **ILLEGAL USE OF HANDS AND ARMS** by offensive or defensive player — Loss of 15 Yards.

12. **INTENTIONAL GROUNDING** of forward pass — Loss of Five Yards from spot of pass Plus Loss of Down.

13. **ILLEGALLY PASSING OR HANDING BALL FORWARD** — Loss of Five Yards from spot of foul Plus Loss of Down.

14. **FORWARD PASS OR KICK CATCHING INTERFERENCE** — Interference with opportunity of player of receiving team to catch a kick — Loss of 15 Yards. Interference by member of offensive team with defensive player making pass interception — Loss of 15 Yards Plus Loss of Down. Interference by defensive team on forward pass — Passing Team's Ball at Spot of Foul and First Down.

15. **INELIGIBLE RECEIVER DOWNFIELD ON PASS** — Loss of 15 Yards.

16. **BALL ILLEGALLY TOUCHED, KICKED OR BATTED** — Forward pass being touched by ineligible receiver beyond the line of scrimmage — Loss of 15 Yards from Spot of Preceding Down and Loss of a Down. Eligible pass receiver going out-of-bounds and later touching a forward pass — Loss of Down; Illegally kicking a free ball — Loss of 15 Yards.

OSU Enrollment Highest In School's History

Oregon State University has a record enrollment of 10,026 this fall, highest total ever in the history of the state.

The new record enrollment is 1000 more than a year ago and 2000 more than in 1960.

The record is expected to stand just until next fall, however, President James H. Jensen said, because increases are predicted every year of the next decade.

Men students outnumber coeds, 6918 to 3108 this year, the report released by the registrar's office showed.

Graduate School enrollment jumped 18 percent this fall with 1081 students working for doctor's or master's degrees.

The School of Science is the largest school on campus with 2105 students enrolled, including graduate students in science. Engineering is second largest with 1701 and Education, third, with 1513. Other schools in order of enrollment include Business and Technology, Humanities and Social Sciences, Agriculture, Home Economics, Forestry, and Pharmacy.

The freshman class numbers 2816 this year.
