# FALCON STADIUM



#### Stadium Information

#### LOST AND FOUND

If you have lost or found an article before or during a game at Falcon Stadium check with the concession stand nearest your seat. If you find or have lost an article after the game check with the main concessions stand under the press box on the west side of the stadium. After game day, please contact the stadium office at 472-1151.

#### FIRST AID

Trained medical personnel are in attendance at all Air Force home games. In case of any emergency, report immediately to the head usher in your seating area. There are two first aid rooms and two first aid stations located at Falcon Stadium. There rooms are located on the east side building and on the third tier of the west side, directly under the press box. The stations are located off the walkways of the first and second tiers in the vicinity of the 50-yard line. These areas are marked with a red cross.

#### **EMERGENCY CALLS**

Individuals expecting emergency calls should file their seat section, row and seat number with the command post, which is located in the west side of the stadium in the press box. Their office number is 472-2415. A call number will then be used. No special announcements are made over the public address system except in cases of gravest emergency. Please do not request this service needlessly.

#### STADIUM FACTS

For natural beauty, Falcon Stadium is hard to surpass. Built into the base of the Rampart Range mountains, the modern facility also is one of the most functional sports structures in the country.

The concrete structure, built in a natural bowl, has 49,068 permanent seats and can hold up to 50,800 spectators with additional temporary bleachers. There is one level of seats on the east side and three tiers of seats on the west, each serviced by two concession stands and restroom areas. All seats are within easy walking distance of the 11,400 vehicle capacity parking lot which surrounds the stadium on three sides.

The stadium is easily accessible from the divided U.S. Interstate 25 and the Academy's Stadium Boulevard which leads directly to the parking lot. (The stadium is approximately six miles from the South Gate entrance and about four miles from the North Gate entrance to the Academy.) There is also ample parking space for commercial busses, plus a rail siding located just a few hundred yards from the bowl for special trains.

A Will Call booth is located at the east side of the stadium.

#### LOST CHILDREN

All lost children should be turned over to an usher. Those people seeking a lost child should contact the command post, 472-2415.

#### WHY THE FALCON NICKNAME?

In September 1955 the first class of cadets to enter the Air Force Academy, then in its temporary quarters at Lowry Air Force Base in Denver, selected the Falcon as the official mascot of the Cadet Wing. No one par-


ticular specie was selected; thus all falcons can serve as the mascot.


In making the choice, the class of 1959 considered only those nominees possessing characteristics typifying the U.S. Air Force. The eagle, tiger and falcon were among the final choices. In the final vote the facon was selected over



the eagle and tiger. The eagle was not selected as it was already the national emblem.




AIR FORCE ACADEMY CADET CHAPEL

It may be accurately described as a school of general education for professional Air Force Officers — a school which endeavors to give each cadet the knowlege and qualities of leadership required of an officer in the United States Air Force and a basis for continued development throughout a lifetime of service to their country, leading to readiness for responsibilities as a future air commander. A cadet who completes the four-year course will graduate with a Bachelor of Science degree and a commission as a second lieutenant in the Regular Air Force.

# University of Pacific

The University of the Pacific, as California's pioneer institution of higher learning, has been in the forefront of academic innovation since its beginning in 1851.

As a relatively small, privately-funded institution, Pacific has developed an academic program geared to the constantly changing needs of a 5,000-member student body.

The College of the Pacific is the main liberal arts college of UOP which includes three "cluster" colleges — Raymond College, which features a three-year degree program and no "required" classes; Elbert Covell College, for spanish-speaking students interested in inter-American studies, and Callison College, featuring Asian studies and overseas programs in Japan and Indian.

#### **Well-Rounded Institution**

The McGeorge School of Law in Sacramento; the School of Dentistry and Graduate School of Medicine in San Francisco and the Stockton-based Conservatory of Music, Graduate School and schools of pharmacy, engineering and education make Pacific a well-rounded institution.

In all branches of the University there are opportunities for inter-disciplinary study, independent work and individual research.

Students on the campus are represented on nearly all the policy-making committees. The faculty members, although engaged in some research, are primarily teachers.

#### Student Involvement

In the area of community involvement, there are many programs that reach both the cluster colleges and professional schools. Students work in migrant worker camps, detention facilities, mental hospitals and public schools. Many of these projects carrry course credit.


New facilities on the Pacific campus include the \$3 million University Center; the \$1 million Covell Student Health Center and \$4.4 million School of Pharmacy. The \$120,000 Donald B. Wood Bridge spans the Calaveras River to link the other two new developments with the main campus.

UOP is located in Stockton (pop. 117,000), 70 miles east of San Francisco and the Bay Area and 45 miles south of Sacramento.



**Rugged Middle Guard** 6-2, 216, Senior Mazon, III.


Mark Kenney may think of himself as a quiet team captain but his playing exploits the last two seasons shout with enthusiasm. A keystone of the defensive line this fall, Kenney wound up with second highest tackle total last season with 106. Add to this 103 tackles as a sophomore, the third best total in 1974, and the rugged middle guard starter the last two years becomes a blaring example of a steady, dependable football player. With another good season, he could become the top tackler in school history. Kenney will need 129 this season to break that record. Kenney has good quickness, and Ben Martin's evaluation of "... being right at home at middle guard with the quickness to get around the block at the center," makes him a potent force to be reckoned with in 1976. In 1975, Kenney's top game was against Rose Bowl winner U.C.L.A. in which he had 18 tackles. Another strong game was against Navy in 1974 when he collared 21 Middle runners. A general studies major, Kenney attended the Air Force Academy Prep School and lettered in football for four years at St. Bede Academy in Illinois, playing center and linebacker. He also lettered in basketball and track.

#### CADET DRUM AND BUGLE CORPS



The spirit of the U. S. Air Force Academy is embodied in the famed "Flight of Sound," the 100-man Cadet Drum and Bugle Corps. Established in 1971, this nationally acclaimed group has gained recognition as the musical representatives of the Cadet Wing. The officer-in-charge is Major Robert J. Wilcox, and the Fall 1976 cadet-in-charge is C1C (senior) Dennis Dietz.

The spirit of the U. S. Air Force Academy is embodied in the famed "Flight of Sound," the Cadet Drum and Bugle Corps.

Established in August 1971, the group has gained national recognition as the musical representatives of the 4,400-strong Cadet Wing.

In addition to performing at all Academy football games and cadet parades, the Corps has appeared at professional athletic events and musical shows across the nation. Past appearances include halftime shows at professional football games from Bronco Stadium in Denver to Three Rivers Stadium in Pittsburgh. Other performances encompass such prestigious events as "Fiesta Days" in San Antonio and the St. Paul (Minn.) Winter Carnival. They were also honored for participating in this country's first official Bicentennial parade at Lexington and Concord, Massachusetts.

This year is no exception as the Corps will travel to New York City for the Macy's Day parade and to Florida for the "Festival of States" in St. Petersburg as well as a performance at Walt Disney World.

The size of the Cadet Corps has increased original 80 members to its present strength of 100, making it the largest military drum and bugle corps in the nation.

Replacements for the Corps members who graduate are found through summer auditions with cadets who enter the Academy at that time. About 90 percent of those cadets chosen have no drum and bugle corps experience, but all have played in bands.

Members of the Corps select a cadet-in-charge who handles administrative duties covering travel and performances. The officer-in-charge is Major Robert J. Wilcox, while the non-commissioned officer-in-charge is Master Sergeant James R. McCurdy. The horn instructor is Master Sergeant Rodney M. Stewart and the drum instructor is Technical Sergeant Kenneth A. Tyler. The Fall 1976 cadet-in-charge is C1C (senior) Dennis Dietz, while the drum majors are C1C Mike Levenhagen and C2C Robert Hall.



# AIR FORCE **CROSS COUNTRY**

Since the Air Force Academy first began in 1956, cross country has been an intercollegiate sport claiming 16 winning seasons in 20 years. This fall, the Falcons could have a promising season if some of the younger runners develop enough to add depth to the

Although seemingly a sport of individuals, cross country requires a team effort since the final score is the aggregate placing of the top five team members' finishes with the lower team score winning.

At the Academy, cross country is run on a five-mile designated course at the Eisenhower Golf Course. Cross country's reputation as a "hill and dale" sport truly applies to the Academy's course which is especially slow because of the up-and-down terrain.


While the season opens at home Sept. 25 against Adams State, Falcon runners have been visible for some time training on the green median strips along the Academy roads.

Four lettermen return to lead the Falcons during the 1976 season, including two-year letterman Toby Nichols from Seattle, Wash., and team captain Keith Haines of Tuscola, Mich. Air Force, which has had eight winning seasons in the past nine years, including an 8-4 record in 1975, will also have senior Garry Sheppard of Mobile, Ala., and junior Dan Lentz from Pittsburgh returning as lettermen.

Sheppard has the fastest time of any returnee on this season's team, a 26:04 in a five-mile race against Colorado State. Haines, whose best time was a 26:29 for five miles, earned his first varsity letter last season and is rated as one of the top prospects. Haines earned All-America honors as a marathon runner on the Academy outdoor track team in 1975.

The remaining seniors on the team include Ray Bartlett of Darien, Conn., and Kirk Bodary from Warren, Ohio.

Coach Arne Arnesen, entering his 15th season, said the team will have to obtain some pleasant surprises from the younger runners in order to be successful.

# AIR FORCE SOCCER

Soccer traditionally opens the sports season at the Air Force Academy and 1976 is no exception. While football players are receiving their last minute instructions for today's game against the University of Pacific, the Falcon soccer team already has two games of experience.

The defensive minded Falcons met North Texas State Friday and played another match this morning against Brigham Young University.


Air Force, which yielded only 14 goals all last season in 14 contests, one of the top marks in the nation, have almost always had a winning tradition at the Academy. Last year the Falcons posted a 9-5-0 overall record and a runner spot in the Rocky Mountain Intercollegiate Soccer League (RMISL) with a 7-2-0 mark. The 14 goals surrendered last year was just one over the school record.

First-year coach Rob Judas, assisted by Dan Ulmer, has put together a strong nucleus of fullbacks (defensemen), halfbacks (the key to the fast break), forwards (the Falcon scoring line that netted 41 goals last year) and goalies could again spell a winning tradition.

Heading the list is team captain and three-year letterman Bob Soucy, who moves from halfback to fullback in 1976. Soucy, from Sacramento, (St. Joseph H.S.) Calif., will be flanked on the field by junior letter winner Karl Olsen from Farmingdale, N.Y.; senior letterman Steve Jonak from St. Louis (Cleveland H.S.) and fellow Californian Tony Villalobos, a senior letterman from San Francisco (St. Ignatious H.S.).

Another key position vital to the Air Force defensive strengths is the goalie. The Falcons have in that posi-

tion a possible All-America candidate, according to Judas, in Greg Schulze.

Schulze, a junior from San Francisco, (St. Ignatious H.S.), has already twice been named to the all-RMISL team and was an honorable mention selectee on the All-Far West squad in 1975. He will be backed up by another junior, Steve Riggins, of Newport Square (Radnor H.S.) Pa., a player Judas said could probably start on half of the soccer teams in the country.

Another top returnee at forward is last year's scoring leader (14 goals and three assists) Phil McBride of Garden City, N.J.

The Falcon halfbacks, a unit Judas calls, "the link that ties the offense to the defense, is spearheaded by three-year letterwinner Bob Bartolone of Trenton (Hamilton West H.S.), N.J.

In addition to these players, the Falcons have a strong bench boosted by players off last year's junior varsity team which posted a 9-1-0 record, all of whom who will be seeking the continued winning tradition of Air Force soccer.

# AIR FORCE WATER POLO

Water Polo has been around as a team sport for over 100 years, but at the Air Force Academy it is one of the newest of the 18 men's intercollegiate sports.

Despite the fact the Falcons will only be entering their sixth varsity season, past teams have made themselves a dominate force in that sport in the Rocky Mountain region.

In the five prior seasons, Air Force has always posted a winning record, qualified for the National Collegiate Athletic Association championships, and recorded an overall 77-41-1 mark

A challenging and little-known sport, water polo at the Academy is played in a seven-foot deep pool 30 meters (100 feet) long and 20 meters (67 feet) wide with a netted goal stationed at each end of the pool. Two teams each composed of six field players and one goalie attempt to score by putting the ball into the opponent's net.

The 1976 season, headed by second-year coach Bruce Fisher, opens this month with only two returning starters from last year's team which finished second in the District 7 Championship.

Senior team captain Jeff Heidmous from Lompoc. Calif., will lead the team in what must be considered a

However, there are a number of young players who could make the 1976 season very successful. Among them are seniors Don Magee from Tucson, Ariz., and Armando Costales from La Cresenta, Calif., and juniors Eric Thompson of Des Moines, Iowa., and John Wellsfry from Laguna Beach, Calif. Also donning the caps are two California sophomores, Mike Mullady of Westminster and Frank Snyder from Palo Alto.

Fisher, who will be assisted by Ron Davis, sees the outlook for 1976 depending primarily on finding a satisfactory replacement to another Heidmous brother, Walt, who captained the 1975 team and is Air Force's all-time goalie. Challenging for the spot are junior Dave Wetlesen from Sunnyvale, Calif., and Mullady, with Wetlesen given the best shot based on past experience. However, if either of these two can play consistently, the prospects of a good season could be very
