## LOST AND FOUND

## FIRST AID

Trained medical personnel are in attendance at all Air Force home games. In case of any emergency, report immediately to the head usher in your seating area. There are two first aid rooms and two first aid stations located at Falcon Stadium. There rooms are located on
the east side building and on the third tier of the west side, directly under the press box. The stations are located off the walkways of the first and second tiers in the vicinity of the 50 -yard line. These areas
are marked with a red cross.

Individuals expecting emergency calls should file their seat sec-
ion, row and seat number with the command post, which is located the west side of the stadium in the press box. Their office number is 472-2415. A call number will then be used. No special an-

## STADIUM FACTS

For natural beauty, Falcon Stadium is hard to surpass. Built into one of the most functional sports structures in the country The concrete structure, built in a natural bowl, has 49,068 perma nent seats and can hold up to 50,800 spectators with additional temporary bleachers. There is one level of seats on the east side and
hree tiers of seats on the west, each serviced by two concession three tiers of seats on the west, each serviced by two concession
stands and restroom areas. All seats are within easy walking distance of the 11,400 venicle capacity parking lot which surrounds the stadium on three sides.
The stadium is easily accessible from the divided U.S. Interstate 25 and the Academy's Stadium Boulevard which leads directly to the parking lot. (The stadium is approximately six miles from the South Gate entrance and about four miles from the North Gate entrance to he Academy.) There is also ample parking space for commercial
busses, plus a rail siding located just a few hundred yards from the bowl for special trains.
A will Call booth is located at the east side of the stadium.

## University of Pacific

The University of the Pacific, as California's pioneer institution of higher learning, has been in the forefron of academic innovation since its beginning in 1851. As a relatively small, privately-funded institution Pacific has developed an academic program geared to the constantly changing needs of a $5,000-$ member student body.
The College of the Pacific is the main liberal arts college of UOP which includes three "cluster" colleges - Raymond College, which features a three-yea degree program and no "required" classes; Elbert Covell College, for spanish-speaking students interested in tur-American studies, and Callison College, featuring Asian studies and overseas programs Japan and Indian

Institution
The McGeorge School of Law in Sacramento; the School of Dentistry and Graduate School of Medicine in San Francisco and the Stockton-based Conservatory of Music, Graduate School and schools of pharmacy engineering and education make Pacific a wellrounded institution.

In all branches of the University there are opporunities for inter-disciplinary study, independent work and individual research
Students on the campus are represented on nearly all the policy-making committees. The faculty members, although engaged in some research, are primarily teachers.

Student Involvement
In the area of community involvement, there are many programs that reach both the cluster colleges and professional schools. Students work in migrant worker amps, detention faciities, mental hospitals and pubit New facilities on the Pacific compus include the $\$ 3$ Nillion University Center; the $\$ 1$ million Covell Student Health Center and $\$ 4.4$ million School of Pharmacy. The $\$ 120,000$ Donald B. Wood Bridge spans the Calaveras River to link the other two new developments with the main campus.
UOP is located in Stockton (pop. 117,000), 70 miles east of San Francisco and the Bay Area and 45 miles outh of Sacramento.

Rugged Middle Guard 6-2, 216, Senio Mazon, III.
Mark Kenney may think of himself as a quiet team captain but his playing exploits the last two seasons shout with enthusiasm. A keystone of the defensive line this fall, Kenney wound up with second highest tackle otal last season with 106. In 1975, Kenney's op game was against Rose Bowl winner U.C.L.A. in which he had 18 tackles. Another strong game was against Navy in 1974 when he collared 21 Middie runners. A general studies major, Kenney attended the Air Force Academy Prep School and lettered in football for four years at St. Bede Academy in Illinois, playing enter and linebacker. He also lettered in basketbal and track.

The spirit of the U. S. Air Force Academy is emoodied in the famed "Flight of Sound," the Cadet Drum and Bugle Corps.
Established in August 1971, the group has gained national recognition as the musical representatives of the 4,400 -strong Cadet Wing.
In addition to performing at all Academy football games and cadet parades, the Corps has appeared at professional athletic events and musical shows across
the nation. Past appearances include halftime shows at professional football games from Bronco Stadium in Denver to Three Rivers Stadium in Pittsburgh. Other performances encompass such prestigious events as "Fiesta Days" in San Antonio and the St. Paul (Minn.) Winter Carnival. They were also honored for participating in this country's first official Bicentennial parade at Lexington and Concord, Massachusetts.
This year is no exception as the Corps will travel to New York City for the Macy's Day parade and to Florida for the "Festival of States" in St. Petersburg as well as a
performance at Walt Disney World.
The size of the Cadet Corps has increased original 80 members to its present strength of 100 , making it the largest military drum and bugle corps in the nation.
Replacements for the Corps members who graduate are found through summer auditions with cadets who ande Academy at that time. About 90 percent of perience but all have played in band erience, but all have played in bands.
