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

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



Senior Paul Tippets will finish his varsity football career at Utah State University today. Tippets has been a key player at the wide receiver spots, flanker and split end, since 1973.

He missed one season due to a fractured jaw (1974) but has overcome other injuries along the way and put in three full seasons on the Aggie varsity.

Although most of his varsity experience has been when the Aggies were running with the ball much more than passing, Tippets has caught 46 passes to date. One of his best games was against Utah in 1975 when he caught five passes for 76 yards.

Probably no two teams meeting in a college game today have more in common than Pacific and Utah State. Both teams are 2-8 and both teams can look back at several games and wonder "what if."


Utah State and Pacific wrap up the 1976 campaign today with hopes of adding another figure to the win column. USU came within an eyelash of winning at San Diego State last week but lost, 7-6. Pacific was not playing so close in losing to San Jose State, 50-30. However, the Tigers totaled 440 yards of offense.

The last time Pacific was in Logan the Aggies sported a promising sophomore tailback in John Strycula. Today, John's brother Bill Strycula, may have some influence on the outcome of the ball game. Strycula has been the starter most of the season and is the leading passer for UOP. However, coach Chester Caddas has decided to start senior Bruce Keplinger who has the best completion percentage (.571) of all the Tiger quarterbacks.

Bruce Gibson, a fullback at 225 pounds from Redlands, Calif., is the leading rusher for UOP. Gibson is only a junior but with his six yards per carry average he is being compared with former UOP stars Dick Bass and Willard Harrell. Gibson generally carries the ball around 14 times per game.

Over the years the USU-UOP series which started in 1947 has been very even with the Tigers leading, 5-4, in nine games and winning the last outing, 36-3 in Romney Stadium in 1969.

1976 Football Rules Changes

DENVER—Safety Fist. Familiar words heard in connection daily with highway safety, safety in your home and safety at work.

Being a member of the NCAA Football Rules Committee, we are another group which stresses safety—and that was the major item of concern with rule changes for the 1976 season.

For example, here is the criteria we put all proposed rule changes through. If it passes, the rule is changed:

1) It must be safe for the young men playing the game.

2) It must be applicable to all institutions.

3) It must be a coachable rule.

4) It must be administrable by officials.

5) It must maintain balance between offense and defense.

6) It must be interesting for spectators.

With that background in mind, here's what went on at our last meeting and what you will see on the field this season.

The status of the college game shows a great variety and a solid balance existing between the number of rushes, rushing yards, percentage of pass completions and percentage of successful field goals all at an all-time high. However, the kick return game is at a record low.

Trainers reports continue to show knee injuries as the most common injury, although the number is decreasing.

Safety was foremost in our minds when the following rule changes were adopted.

—Hip pads and thigh guards are required equipment,

—Use of the head in an attempt to punish an opponent is being restricted. This will make it possible for spearing of an opponent before his momentum has stopped to be called a foul. No player shall intentionally strike a runner with the crown or top of his helmet. This change is designed to protect the tackler from head injuries as well as the recipient of the

—Blocking rules have been liberalized. Hands and arms must be parallel to the ground, arms shall not be extended more than one-half of a full extension, and hands shall be cupped or closed with the palms not facing the opponent.

—Fouls by the defensive team against the passer on a completed pass are now penalized from the end of the run

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

LaDell Andersen

Head Coach Bruce Snyder

When he became the 15th head football coach in Utah State football history—inheriting a football legacy which has become one of the country's "winning-est" since 1960—Bruce Snyder made it clear he was ready.

"I've prepared every day of my professional career for this opportunity," he said.

With that, and his pledge to continue the program which brought Aggie football into national prominence, Snyder succeeded his former boss—Phil Krueger—on December 15, 1975.

Snyder, 36, took over when Krueger left Logan to re-join John McKay with the expansion Tampa Bay Buccaneers of the NFL. Ironically, Snyder left McKay's staff after two years to re-unite himself with the Utah State program. He was the offensive coordinator in Logan on Krueger's first staff, the 7-4 team of 1973.

Snyder's ascent to the USU job has been a trail marked with success in a variety of coaching situations, including 11 years as an assistant on the collegiate level.

Born in Santa Monica and educated in El Monte, Calif., Snyder graduated from the University of Oregon in 1963. A fullback and linebacker, he played on Len Casanova's 1960 and 1962 Duck teams (7-3-1 and 6-3-1). He redshirted during the 1961 season with an injury. He was a starter on the school's 1960 Liberty Bowl team and, interestingly, was on McKay's USC staff when the Trojans won the same game last December.

Prior to transferring to Oregon, Snyder was most valuable player his sophomore season at Citrus College (Glendora, Calif.) as a fullback.

Following graduation he taught and coached at Sheldon High School in Eugene for two years. He returned to Oregon to work on a master's degree and became an assistant coach in

LaDell Andersen Director of Athletics Utah State University

USU's "Winningest" basketball coach ever during his 10year tenure, LaDell Andersen has carried that atmosphere of excellence into his fourth year as the Aggie Athletic director.

His appointment was made in December of 1972 and became effective immediately upon completion of his second year as head coach of the ABA's Utah Stars.

His two-year, regular season record with the Stars was an almost unheard of 115-53. He won two Western Division titles and coached the West both years in the ABA all-star game.

A Malad, Idaho, native, "Andy" first became an Aggie in 1947 when he came to USU on a make-good scholarship basis. Four years later he had twice been named all-Skyline guard.

Following his 1952 graduation and a playing career with the AAU Denver Bankers, he worked as an assistant to Jack Gardner at Utah for five years and in 1961 began his brilliant 10-year career as the USU head coach. During that time his teams went 176-95. Six of those clubs won 20 games or more and went into post-season play.


1965. As offensive backs coach for six years under Jerry Frei, Snyder twice had athletes win NCAA statistical titles.

Oregon offenses of the late 60s and early 70s were among the country's most explosive. Snyder's 1970 offense, for example, was among the top ten in passing and total yardage and broke 56 school records.

After a year as the offensive coordinator at New Mexico State (1972) he joined Krueger's staff for one season in the same capacity.

After the Ags' 7-4 season of 1973, Snyder left in May of 1974 to join McKay's USC staff. The 1974 Trojans (10-1-1) beat Ohio State in the Rose Bowl and Snyder was on McKay's staff which directed the College All-Stars in the annual game in Chicago. Soon after his appointment in Logan, Snyder re-joined the USC staff in preparation for the Dec. 22 Liberty Bowl in which the Trojans defeated Texas A & M.

Snyder and his wife—the former Linda Riswald—have two daughters, Jennifer (6) and Tracy (2).

(UOP, 1952) Offensive Line Coach

(USU, 1973) Defensive Line Coach

Terry Shea

(Oregon, 1969) Defensive Backs Coach

One of the nation's top junior college teams—Mt. Hood of Oregon—made a major contribution to USU's new football program when Terry Shea joined the staff along with three fine defensive backs.

He handles players' academics and is the staff's public relations liaison.

Terry and his wife, Susan, recently became parents for the first time with the birth of a daughter, Jennifer.

Denny Schuler

(Oregon, 1969) Quarterbacks—Wide Receivers Coach

In charge of Utah State's quarterbacks and wide receivers, 30-year old Denny Schuler is in his first year on the Aggie coaching staff.

He coordinates the staff's video taping program and handles the production of a special slide presentation for recruits.

An all-PAC 8 performer at Oregon during Bruce Snyder's coaching tenure there, he was a two-year starter at wide receiver.

Lannie Julias

(San Jose State, 1964) Offensive Line Coach

Lannie Julias is in his first year with the USU coaching staff as Doug Smith's associate handling offensive linemen. He's also the staff's resident sports nut. He is particularly knowledgeable in the areas of track and field and he has attended virtually every NCAA basketball championship the past decade.

Lannie was recently married (Sandi) and he is USU's out-of-state recruiting coordinator and is in charge of the dormitory which houses most of the Aggie football team, Lund Hall.

Steve Peck

(Cal-Riverside, 1969) Running Backs Coach

As USU's new backfield coach, 28-year old Steve Peck inherits an area of the team which was a strength during the 1975 season. But the graduation of Louis Giammona leaves him without one of USU's major offensive weapons the past three years.

Football Terminology

AUDIBLE—A vocal signal by the quarterback at the line of scrimmage that changes the play called in the huddle. A key phrase, word or number inserted into the starting commands called when the quarterback feels the defense is stacked against the first play or is vulnerable in some area. Also called check off or automatic.

BLITZ—Commitment by defensive backs and/or linebackers to rush the passer. The defensive player tries to crash through the offensive line into the rival backfield before the play has a chance to develop. Also called Red Dog or shooting the gap.

BOOTLEG—A sneak sweep by the quarterback, who fakes a handoff, then takes off around end alone with the ball concealed against his hip.

BUTTONHOOK—A pass pattern in which the receiver goes downfield and U-turns back sharply to face the passer and receive the ball.

CLIPPING—An illegal block in which the player runs or dives into the back of an opponent, or throws his body across the back of the leg or legs of an opponent other than the ball carrier.

DIVE-TACKLE PLAY—A quick handoff running play over tackle.

DRAW PLAY—A trap play in which the quarterback lures in defensive linemen by dropping back apparently to pass the ball. When the linemen are screened to the outside, the quarterback or another ball carrier takes the ball up the gap cleared by the onrushing defenders.

FLANKER—A back stationed wide to either side, used primarily as a pass receiver.

FLIP-FLOP—The practice of offense of moving players from one side of the center to the other.

FREE KICK—A kick made with each team restricted from advancing beyond a fixed restraining line until the ball is kicked.

FRONT FOUR—Four-man defensive line, the tackles and the ends.

"I" FORMATION—An offensive formation in which all four backs line up in a straight line behind the center. Usually one back will move out to a slot or wing position. This gives a balanced attack to either side with minimum advance notice to the defense.

LINEBACKER—A defensive player operating immediately behind his line where he can either aid linemen in stopping a running play or cover a receiver if a pass develops.

MAN-TO-MAN DEFENSE—Plan of pass defense wherein defensive backs cover receivers wherever they go, rather than field areas.

MONSTER—A floating linebacker, positioned either in or out of the line, on either side, or in any spot. His purpose is to confuse the offense, varying his tactics from play to play.

NEUTRAL ZONE—The space between the scrimmage lines of the offense and defense about 11 inches (the length of the football).

PLAY ACTION PASS—A forward pass thrown from an offensive formation simulating a running play.

POCKET—Area of protection for the passer formed by blockers. Passer drops straight back from scrimmage behind the blocking shield into what resembles a "cup" or pocket.

POST—A pass pattern in which the receiver goes downfield to a predetermined depth, then cuts at an angle toward the goal posts.

PREVENT DEFENSE—A strategy replacing linebackers with additional backfield pass defenders, sacrificing strength against short gainers to prevent a long pass completion. Most often used by a team protecting a lead late in either half.

ROLL-OUT—A sweeping run by the quarterback who, instead of dropping straight back on getting the ball, swings out in a wide area to one side or another, ready to run or pass as the situation demands.

SCREEN PASS—Pass to a receiver behind a wall of blockers, who have allowed defenders to penetrate.

SLOT—The gap left when an end is moved out from the tackle on his side. A back stationed in this space is called a slot back. When the back is stationed outside the end he is called a wingback.

SPLIT END—A lineman, who, like the flanker, is set wide for pass receiving purposes.

STRONG SIDE—Overbalance of either offensive or defensive linemen to either side of the center.

STUNTING—Defensive players changing positions as the ball is snapped to confuse offensive strategy.

TIGHT END—Offensive player who lines up in close formation where he can either block or be used as a receiver.

TRAP—A play permitting a defender to penetrate quickly, only to be blocked from the side by pulling guard or tackle.

ZONE DEFENSE—Plan of pass defense wherein areas are covered rather than individual receivers. Opposite of man-to-man.





Head Coach Chester Caddas

Beginning his fifth season as head coach at UOP is Chester Caddas, a man who had helped the Tigers get back to winning ways on the major college level.

Although suffering through a 5-6-1 season in 1975, a year during which the Tigers faced four nationally ranked opponents (including Arizona State which finished second nationally), Caddas' four-year record of 26-16-2 (.616) is the third best of any coach in school history. The two ahead of him are Larry Siermering (35-5-3, .875) and Ernie Jorge (13-8-1, .619), who took two Tiger teams to the Sun Bowl.

In his first three seasons, he gave the school three straight winning seasons for the first time since the 1950s. Inheriting a rundown program in 1972, he quickly notched an 8-3 record to earn Northern California Coach-of-the-Year honors. He followed that in 1973 with a 7-2-1 campaign, for the best back-to-back seasons since the 1949-50 teams parlayed 11-0 and 7-3-1 efforts. In 1974, an injury-wracked team still compiled a 6-5 record for another winning season.

Caddas and his coaches approach the strategic part of the game with characterisitic logic. When, after three years of relative success, the triple-option veer offense stopped producing yards last season, Caddas recognized the necessity to open up the offense and installed a drop-back passing game to complement the veer's potent ground attack. On defense, he employs a 4-4-3 alignment with a simplified system of rushing assignments and zone pass defenses.

The UOP challenge is the biggest one Caddas has faced. But, he's no stranger to head coaching. He started his career as an assistant football and basketball coach at Harrisburg (III.) High School in 1957. After two years there, he moved on to Waggener High School in Louisville, Ky., as an assistant football coach.

In 1961, he got his first head coaching assignment. It was a dual role and Caddas responded to that challenge by compiling a 16-10-1 record in football and a 68-24 record in basketball during three years at Fulton (Ky.) High.

From there, Caddas moved on to Danville (Ky.) High in 1964, notching a 15-14 record as head football coach during this threeyear stint.

He made the jump to collegiate coaching as freshman and "B" team tutor at Vanderbilt for two years. From there, he moved on to Pacific, beginning his career on the staff of Doug Scovil.

Caddas, who earned his Bachelor's Degree from Murray State in 1957 and got his Master's from Illinois in 1960, was named Western Kentucky Coach-of-the-Year at Fulton in 1963 and served as Vice-President of the Kentucky Football Coaches

The 40-year-old native of Memphis, Tenn., is married (wife Bette) and has three children (Lynn, 19; Chris, 16; and Rachel,

Aggie Football Review

Retired Jerseys

Tackle Merlin Olsen, 270, 6-5, Logan . . . now a perennial all-pro defensive tackle with the L.A. Rams. Honored as the outstanding male student in the College of Businss (3.64 4-year GPA), twice the winner of the ROTC superior cadet citation and was junior and senior class president at USU. Was named to Helms Foundation Hall of Fame and won prestigious "Outland Trophy" exemplifying America's top collegiate lineman. Played 1959-61.

Halfback Tom Larscheid, 173, 5-8. Pleasant Hill, Calif . . . a "one-in-ten-year" find who is USU's all-time leading scorer: 248 points. A darter — not a runner — who used blockers to perfection. The most efficacious collegiate back in 1960, he averaged 8.42 yards a carry. Carried the ball 124 times that year, picking up 1,044 yards, second nationally. Gained 2,206 yards in three years, an amazing 7 yards a carry average. Played

Tackle Bill Staley, 250, 6-4, Walnut Creek, Calif...now retired after being a standout defensive tackle with the Chicago Bears. "The Spoiler" made his first big noise when he won the respect of Nebraska's fans during the 1955 game in Lincoln. From then on he became a charter member of USU's football heirarchy at "Tackle U." Named to several all-American squads after the 7-2-1 1967 season. Played 1965-67.

Quarterback Tony Adams, 196, 6-1, Riverside, Calif...Adams started every game in three years at USU (1970-72) before joining the San Diego Chargers. Now a member of the Kansas City Chiefs. A volume could be written on his accomplishments; he entirely rewrote the Aggie passing records. During his career he passed for an amazing 6,266 yards, completed 455 passes and was responsible for 62 TDs. As a senior. he finished second nationally in total offense and third in passing and established an NCAA single game record: 560 yards passing vs. Utah. He was named to four All-American teams.

Tackle Phil Olsen, 260, 6-5, Logan . . . now a center with the Denver Broncos. A first round draft choice of the Boston Patriots who later joined the Rams. Named to six all-American squads and played on winning teams in the East-West Shrine and Hula Bowl games. A knee injury before the 1970 Chicago College All-Star game erased his 1970 pro debut. Played 1967-69.

Tailback Louis Giammona, 176, 5-9, Calistoga, Calif . . . a draftee of the New York Jets, Giammona completed three years with the Aggie varsity in 1975 by rushing for 1,454 yards, giving him a three-year total of 3,499 yards, the top career rushing mark at USU. The nation's rushing and all-purpose running leader in 1974, he repeated the all-purpose national title in '75. In addition to career records, he holds school rushing marks for a game (247) and season (1,534), and his career total leaves him among the alltime top 15 NCAA rushers. Very quick and amazingly durable, he accounted for 63% of USU's rushing offense his last two years. Played 1973-75.

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




Paul Stephenson, Defensive Tackle

USU vs. Weber State Rick Parros, Running Back


A freshman from Granite High School in Salt Lake City, Rick Parros is the first freshman to receive the KTVX football player of the week at Utah State in 1976.
