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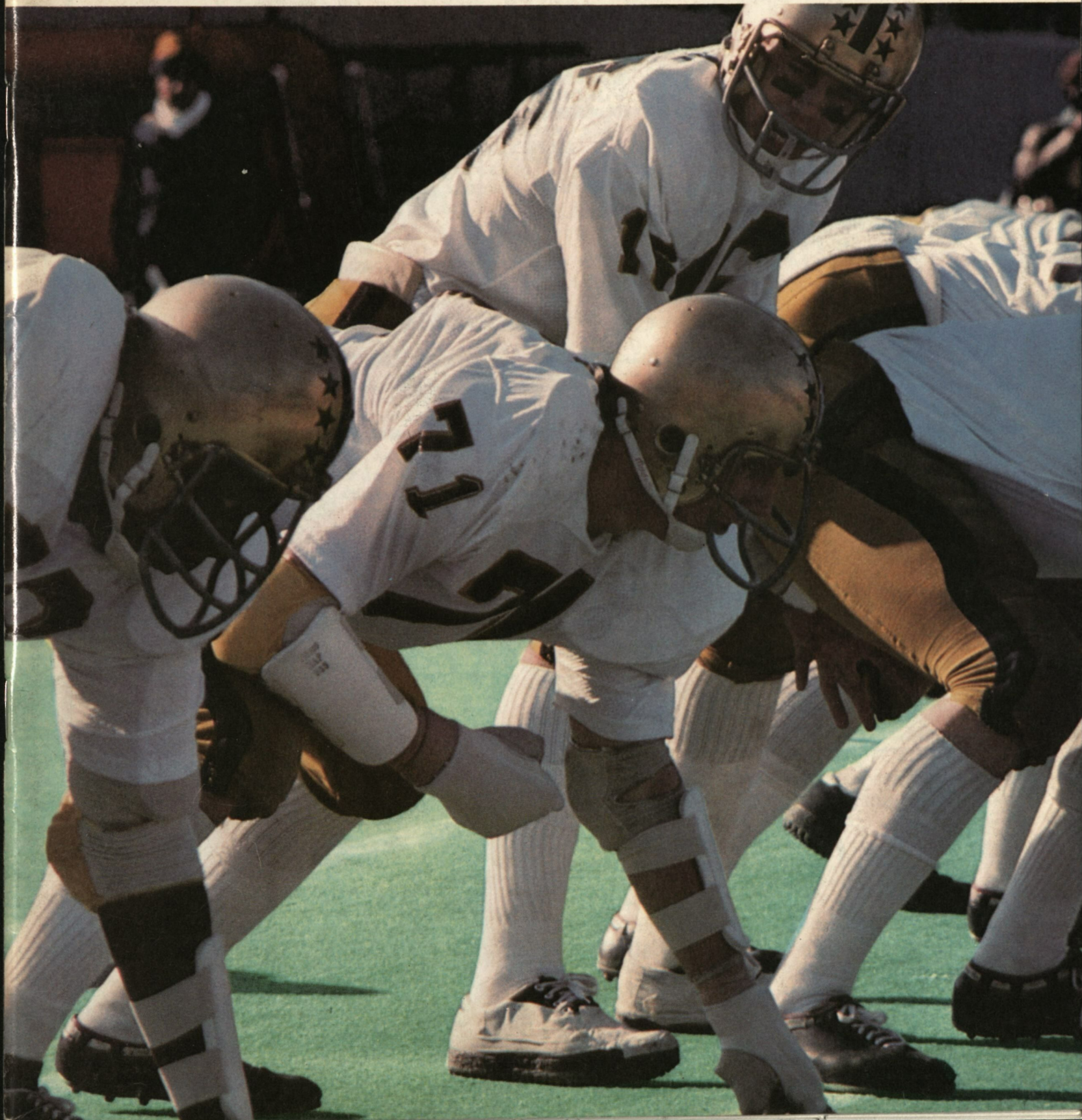
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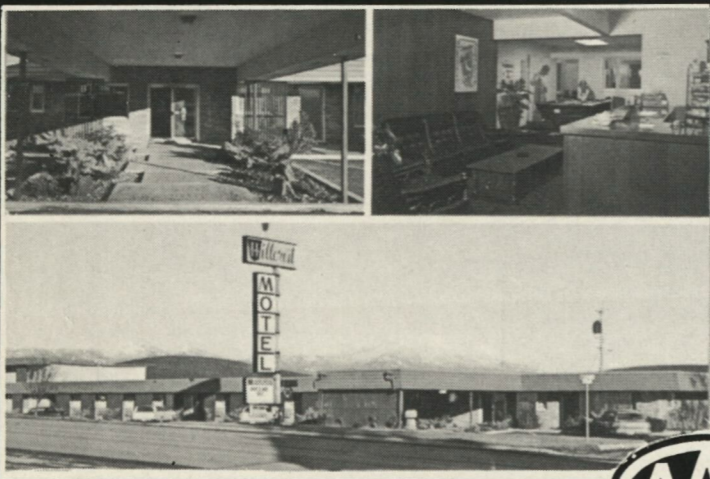


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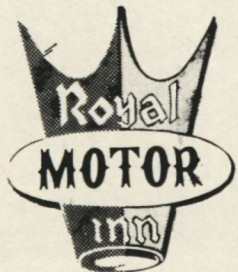
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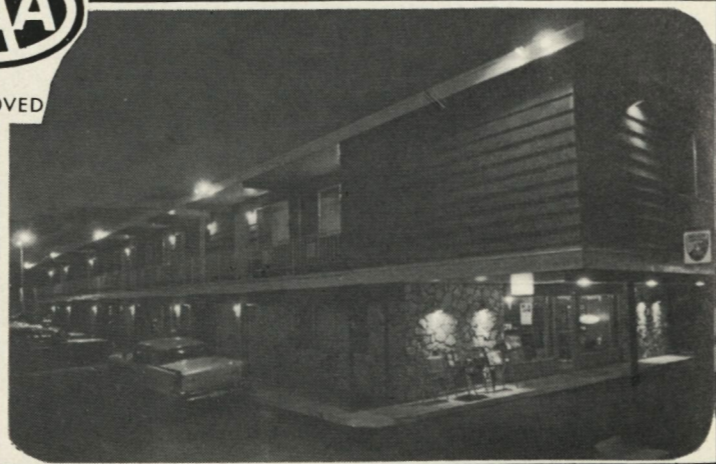
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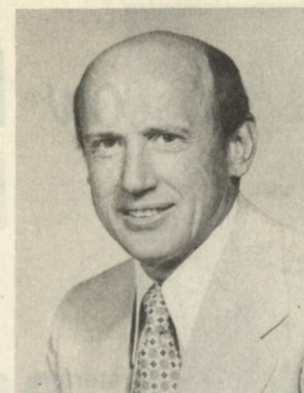


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Dear Football Fans,

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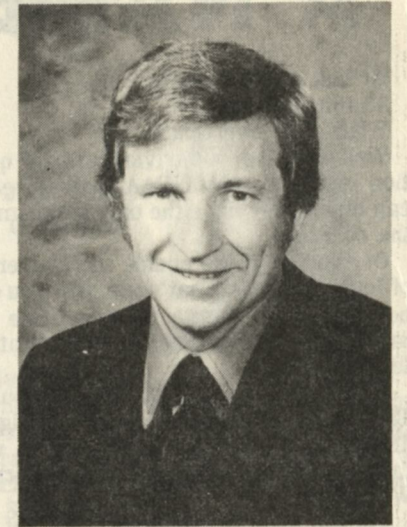
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It's Good To Be Back Home

It's good to be home in the Dome. Tonight's game is the home opener for the University of Idaho Vandals as they go against a rugged University of Pacific team from Stockton, Calif.

The game has all the earmarks of being a good one as both teams will be fighting for their first win of the season. Both Vandal head coach Ed Troxel and Pacific coach Chester Caddas are expecting a tough physical battle — just like the one they had last year in California.

Both teams are coming off season-opening defeats as the Tigers from Pacific dropped a 20-3 decision last week to Colorado State University at home, while the Vandals lost to Rice University, 31-10, in a hot and humid Houston, Texas.

Tonight's game will be the 18th meeting between these two ballclubs with Pacific holding a 10-6-1 edge in the series that dates back to 1953.

The Tigers must be coming into tonight's game with the memory of last year's game which saw the Vandals win with eight seconds left in the game as Ralph Lowe kicked a 44-yard field goal.

Final Score: Idaho 31, Pacific 28.

Idaho also remembers a few things about Pacific, particularly, the running of 6-0, 225-pound fullback Bruce Gibson. Gibson scored three touchdowns in last year's game while rushing for 187 yards on 23 carries.

His longest run from scrimmage was 31 yards.

Gibson is being touted for All-American honors this season, and even though he got off to a slow start last week (81 yards on 18 carries), he is highly thought of by his coach.

"He's a great blocker and an exceptional runner," Caddas said. "He loves to run the football. I think if he has a good year there's no telling how high he might go in the pro draft."

"If he's sound, if his knee holds up — he will be the finest fullback we've ever had."

Caddas has even changed his offense to accommodate his star runner. Last year, the Tigers ran a Veer offense, but now they run most of their plays out of the I. The coach has also changed the defense from his multiple front last year to a five-two-four alignment in 1977.

Tabbed as Pacific's starting quarterback is Bruce Parker, a 6-1, 185-pound junior college transfer out of Modesto, Calif. Parker threw for more than 1,800 yards last season while at Modesto and was ranked third nationally in passing. He is expected to take some of the pressure off Gibson this year.

As for the Vandals, well what is bad news for the University of Idaho is good news for the Big Sky Conference — not to mention Pacific. Last week, Idaho lost star running back Robert Brooks for the season when he sustained a knee injury in the first quarter against Rice.

Brooks, who had his sights set on setting a new single season rushing record this year (1,329 set by Ray McDonald in 1966), will be missed by his teammates and Idaho fans.

Idaho also had two other running backs injured during last week's game — Robert Taylor and Lance Hubbard. But both are expected to start tonight.

There's little doubt that the heat and humidity in Houston had an effect on the Vandals, but despite the defeat there were some bright spots.

Most notably was the performance of Craig Juntunen who scored Idaho's lone touchdown enroute to having his best rushing day of his career at Idaho. Craig, who rushed for a total of 309 yards in nine games last season, produced 123 yards on 11 carries against the Owls. His longest run of the night was 46 yards and was instrumental in setting up a 30-yard field goal by Ralph Lowe for Idaho's first score of the game.

As was said earlier, both teams need to win tonight. The season is still young but coach Troxel would like to gain some pre-conference victories to build some momentum for Idaho as they fight for the Big Sky title.

So don't be afraid to stand up and cheer, sing and yell as Idaho hosts the Tigers from Pacific in the climate-controlled confines of Kibbie-ASUI Dome.

A NAME FOR ALL SEASONS

At last count there are 149.
That's the answer!

What's the question?

Well, for all of you trivia buffs, the question is: How many NCAA football teams can claim they have the only nickname in the country?

Of course, we'll concede the University of Idaho Vandals. That's one, now you only have to come up with 148 more. See how many you can name before looking at the list below.

Which nickname is the most popular? The winnah—by a wide margin—is Tigers. There are 28 NCAA football teams with that nickname—ranging from Auburn to Wittenberg.

You probably guessed that one, but can you name number two? It's the Bulldogs, 18-17 over the Bears. Then come the Wildcats (12), Eagles (11) and Indians (9).

Eighteen other nicknames are listed by at least five teams—the Cardinals, Rams

and Panthers eight each; Huskies, Pioneers, Raiders and Vikings seven each; Aggies, Bisons, Broncos, Lions, Scots and Yellow Jackets six each; and Bobcats, Colonels, Crusaders, Devils and Dutchmen five each.

The funniest or most unusual? That's strictly in the eye of the beholder — if you're a fan of that team it probably isn't either funny or unusual to you. You can do the picking in this category — and answer the irate fan letters.

If you're looking to tune up your voice and diction, though, the P's provide precise practice — Pacers, Paladins, Peacocks, Penguins, Pioneers, Pipers, Pirates, Plainsmen, Poets, Presidents, Profs, Pumas, Purple Aces. Try those at high speed.

How many different nicknames ARE there among the country's 473 NCAA football teams? That's a good question, and

there's no perfect answer. By our system, probably not a bit better than yours, there are 218, counting as one each those with slight variations (Hurricane singular and plural, Wolfpack one word and two, Bison-Bisons and Broncos-Bronchos). So many different nicknames start with "Fighting," "Golden" and various other colors, we decided to list them under the second part of the name, as in Bears (Golden), Irish (Fighting), Tigers (Blue), Devils (Red), Eagles (Bald) and so on.

But it would never do to list the Ragin' Cajuns of Southwestern Louisiana as the "Cajuns (Ragin')," and the one-and-only Battling Bishops of Ohio Wesleyan as the "Bishops (Battling)" — would it? Of course not. And in case you're wondering why the Sun Devils of Arizona State aren't listed with the various other Devils, well, the Sun Devils are just too hot (102 in the shade is a cook day there).

Thank you, "Morey"

EDITOR'S NOTE: J.M. "Morey" O'Donnell, a prominent Moscow attorney and UI alumnus, died Jan. 9, 1977, in Spokane, Wash., several days after surgery. Morey's contribution to the University and Moscow will long be remembered. This story is in tribute to him.

Few universities can claim their fight song was originally composed for their school. But the University of Idaho can and does make such a boast about its spirited fight song, "Go Vandals, Go."

First heard on the UI campus at the 1930 Song and Stunt Fest, an annual event sponsored by the Associated Students during the late '20s and early '30s, "Go Vandals" was the freshman class entry. Each class entered a song and then performed some stunt to go along with it.

Chairman of the freshman class song committee, J.M. "Morey" O'Donnell, wrote the words and music for what was to become the university's most spirited song.

A 17-year-old freshman at the Moscow campus, O'Donnell had decided a simpler, more original fight song was needed, something students could learn easily and remember for years afterward. So he sat down at a piano and plunked away until he had produced "Go Vandals, Go," which was presented at the songfest.

The ASUI had sponsored the annual Song and Stunt Fest with the purpose of finding just such a song. At that time, the UI students were singing a song called "On Idaho," which was simply the song "On Wisconsin," with a substitution of some very obvious words.

As with almost every O'Donnell effort then or since, "Go Vandals" was an immediate "hit" by college standards. The undergraduate gave the copyright for it to the university in 1931.

While the history of the fight song may be well known to most UI sports fans, its composer has an equally fascinating background.

"Morey" O'Donnell, born at Granite, Idaho, north of Coeur d'Alene, was a child prodigy who began playing the piano at age six-years-old. Everyone and no one in particular taught him — his mother, his grade school teachers who played hymns, a railroad brakeman who only played black keys, a banjo player and finally a music teacher from Spokane, Wash. O'Donnell stopped the music lessons at 12, was in an orchestra at 13 and at age 17 was traveling halfway around the world from Seattle, Wash., to Singapore with a dance band.

While a UI student, Morey had a dance band on campus and also collaborated on

arrangements for a rising young band leader from Spokane named Bob Crosby, brother of Bing Crosby.

On the night of the 1930 songfest, O'Donnell directed a 10-piece orchestra in a rendition of "Go Vandals, Go."

A leader in campus music sessions, O'Donnell could play anything on a piano or organ that anybody could hum. Though he chose to become a successful attorney — having graduated from UI with a law degree in 1936, O'Donnell continued to contribute his musical talent to his alma mater at many alumni gatherings and post-football parties. He also performed in the late evening at the piano for the Elks Club and in the early morning at the organ of St. Mary's Catholic Church where he was a communicant.

During his legal career, O'Donnell served as Latah County prosecutor for 10 years and was a longtime member of the State Board of Bar Examiners.

While "Go Vandals, Go" became an immediate success at sporting events, O'Donnell did not quit with one triumph. He decided other Idaho songs needed revising.

"All of the school's songs were sung by rote then," he recalled in a 1957 newspaper article. "They were passed from class to class and were changed every time some song leader got the whim. I thought we should get them consolidated into musical compositions that would survive."

In 1932, he rearranged two more tunes,

"Silver and Gold" and "Come, Fellows." Both of these are still sung in the O'Donnell version. In all, during his six years at UI, he produced 12 songs, three of which he wrote himself — including "Vandal Sweetheart."

A member of the Vandal Boosters, O'Donnell was a longtime member of the organization's national board of directors and served as vice president of the board. In honor of his service to the university, O'Donnell was made a lifetime member of the Associated Students University of Idaho several years ago.

The whole O'Donnell family, in fact, is intimately tied to the university. O'Donnell's wife, the former Virginia Marian Adams, attended for two years before their marriage in 1933. She resides at the family home in Moscow and is still a booster of the university. Their two daughters also are UI graduates — Dr. JoAnne O'Donnell, Washington State University assistant dean of student affairs, Pullman, Wash., and Valorie G. Tresnit, Carson City, Nev.

Go Vandals, Go

First sung at a UI football game in 1931, "Go Vandals, Go" was soon afterward adopted as Idaho's only fight song.

Though completely original in its composition, parts of the song have some very significant relationships and meanings. The eight drum beats which always precede the musical playing signify the marching footsteps of the Vandal hordes as they swept over Europe in the 500s to complete the downfall of the Roman Empire.

The introductory lines of "Go Vandals" have the same type of chord progression as found in the song "There's going to be a Great Day" which is from Jerome Kern's musical "Great Day." Needless to say, O'Donnell used this similarity to imply the greatness of the Idaho football team.

The chorus in "Go Vandals" was written in whole notes and half notes so that it could be easily sung by a large crowd. Many schools have songs which are difficult to sing because of the fast beat used to make them spirited. "Go Vandals" seems so spirited because of the words and the heavy drum beat, which continues from the beginning throughout the entire song.

A very triumphant note was added to the ending bars of the song. The music which goes with the words "So all bear down for Idaho, Come on you Vandals Go" was taken directly from the song "Marseilles" — from the French Revolution in the 1790s. Because the French nationalists were victorious, it should be evident why the inclusion of part of their song into "Go Vandals."



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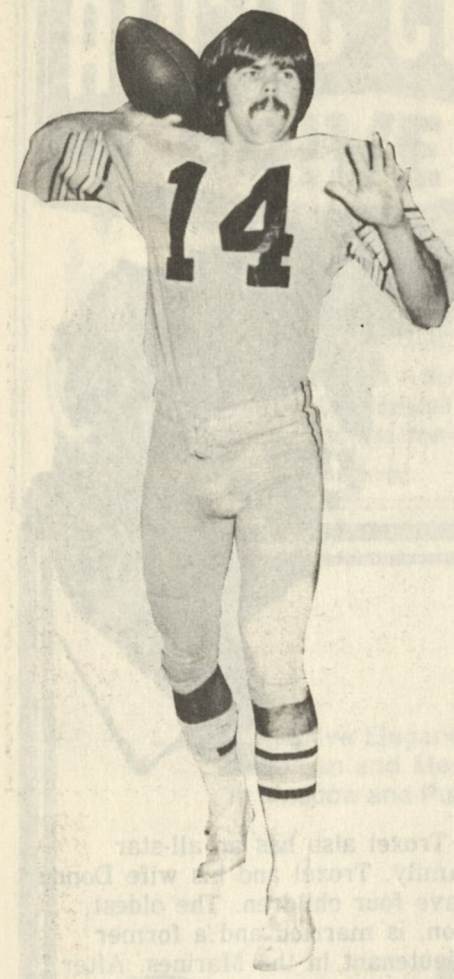

"Craig was really accidental to our program. We were looking at film on an offensive center we wanted to recruit here and saw Craig on that film. By chance, I asked the center who the quarterback was. We lost the center, but Craig walked on.

"He came here on a promise. He's made good. He's one of the better student athletes majoring in pre-law. Some of his greatest assets are his enthusiasm and team leadership and his attitude toward work. He is going to give you his best effort all the time.

"He has improved tremendously. He knows the veer offense very well. He's a fine passer and he's

the type of person that we are going to win with.

"He was injured in the Montana State game last year (seventh game of the season). He suffered a punctured lung and three weeks later he was playing again. By the end of the year he regained his poise and confidence.

"But the biggest thing, when he left the field in the last ball game last year against Northern Arizona he went right to the weight room and he started developing himself and building himself up. I think he's determined to be a very physical player as well as a mental player. He has worked very hard. He's just one of those players that's a real pleasure to have on your squad." — head coach Ed Troxel.

Led the team in total offense last season with 686 net yards... was second in passing with 380 and fourth in rushing with 306... also scored six touchdowns... received several weekly Vandal awards for offensive player of week... suffered punctured lung in Montana State game and returned three weeks later... walk-on from DeAnza JC, Cupertino, Calif. ... broke most of Atlanta Falcon Steve Bartkowski's high school and JC records... was a standout student at Lynbrook HS... won about every athletic award available at high school and for league... most coveted is scholar-athlete award for LHS... born 12-12-54 at Los Angeles... son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Juntunen.

CHRIS TORMEY

LB... Senior... 21... 6-4... 230

"Chris Tormey has been a starter since he was a sophomore. He had several fine games as a soph but was injured in the final game against Boise State and was red-shirted a year and came back off a serious knee injury and played very well.

"He is an all-Big Sky Conference defensive end. I think Chris is one of the real blue chip athletes we have on our football team. He has

the type of attitude and desire that every coach wants in a young man. He is a very competitive player and does not know anything except 100 per cent. That's the way he practices and that's the way he plays.

"He should be one of the outstanding defensive players in the league. He will represent the conference in a very fine manner when we are playing outside competition. He could be one of the finest players on the field. Also, in my own mind, Chris is a pro prospect and probably will not get a chance to play because of his knee injury.

"He is also an excellent student majoring in business. He's just an excellent field leader." — head coach Ed Troxel.

As defensive end last year he ranked second in statistics with 106 total tackles (58 assisted tackles and 48 unassisted)... also had nine pass deflections... was all-conference... one of the most physical players on the team... scholastic standout from Gonzaga Prep... named all-city as junior and senior... captain of team... born 5-1-55 at Omaha, Neb. ... son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Tormey.



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ED TROXEL - HEAD FOOTBALL COACH

When you talk about football in the state of Idaho, you talk about Ed Troxel.

Since taking over the head coaching job for the Vandals in 1974, the personable Troxel has steadily built the Vandals into a competitive team which was proved last season when UI finished with a 7-4 overall record and a second place finish in the Big Sky Conference (5-1) — one of the best records in the school's history.

The Caney, Kans., native has a career coaching record of 173 wins, 45 losses and 6 ties. His record spans 14 years in scholastic circles, two years at the College of Idaho and the past three years at the University of Idaho.

Troxel is not only a proven coach, but was a proven athlete as well.

He first showed his athletic prowess as a freshman at Kingman, Kan., but attended Colorado Springs (Colo.) High (now Palmer High) as a sophomore, junior and senior, winning all-state honors in 1942 as a center.

Following his high school, Troxel served in the U.S. Navy for two years before attending Denver University for one season (1946). He then went to Western State College of Colorado, Gunnison, where he was a guard and tackle for the Mountaineers. He was chosen All-Rocky Mountain at the tackle position his senior year.

Following graduation in 1949, Troxel began his coaching career at Manzanola (Colo.) High School where he was football, basketball, track, baseball and wrestling coach. His grid squads won back-to-back titles in 1949 and 1950 (Class B). His overall football record there was 42-6-0. During the summer months he attended Western State where he obtained his master's degree in 1952.

His first introduction to coaching in Idaho came at Caldwell High School in 1952.

There Troxel coached football, track and wrestling. In football his overall record was 14-2-1 for three years. In 1955 he became the College of Idaho's football coach where, operating on a limited scholarship program, he compiled an overall record of 15-14-0.

Next came the legendary coaching stint in Boise where in 1958 he took over the head football coaching job at Borah High School. He led his Borah teams to eight state titles in football in nine years and four in track. His overall football mark was 78-6-2.

That same high calibre program has been started here for the Vandals by Troxel. He's developed one of the best off-season weight programs in the nation and has been sought after as a clinic speaker on his development of athletics.

The 52-year-old coach joined the University of Idaho staff in 1967, serving as an assistant under then head coach Steve Musseau. During ensuing years he also served under YC McNease and Don Robbins. In 1971 he also assumed the head track coaching post and did an outstanding job with limited talent.

When UI Athletic Director Dr. Leon Green was searching for a replacement for Robbins after the 1973 season, the players said they wanted Troxel as their coach.

Since then Troxel has steadily built the UI program from the ground up, relying mostly on freshmen to build a strong foundation for the year's to come. After going 2-8-1 his first year, 4-5-2 his second and 7-4 his third season, his commitment to bring the Vandals back to a respectable football level has begun to pay off.

Not only did Idaho enjoy a winning campaign last year, but it also produced an All-American in center John Yarno while honorable mention All-American honors went to offensive tackle Wil Overgaard and linebacker Kjel Kiilgaard.




Troxel also has an all-star family. Troxel and his wife Donna have four children. The oldest, Lon, is married and a former Lieutenant in the Marines. After he was discharged in 1975 he joined his father's program as a student assistant. He is now defensive coordinator at the University of California-Northridge.

Melissa is married to a former Vandal and Whitworth College quarterback, Bruce Cole, a Moscow native. They reside in Burley where he is baseball coach and assistant football coach at the high school.

Van, also married, completed his degree this year at the University of Montana where he played the past three years.

The youngest is Andrew Borah, a fourth grader who keeps the house jumping.

McMACKIN -
DEFENSIVE
COORDINATOR**

Greg McMackin joined the Idaho program in March 1976. The 31-year-old native of Springfield, Ore., came to UI from Oregon College of Education where he served as defensive coordinator. Prior to taking over the job as defensive coordinator for the Vandals, he was in charge of the Idaho secondary.

He helped coach OCE to the national playoffs in 1975 against Texas A & I. Defense was the main reason for the school's first undefeated season in 30 years.

The 1967 graduate of Southern Oregon College was a four-year letterman as a defensive back and was an all-league honoree. Upon graduation he went to Medford (Ore.) High where he stayed as grid aide and track coach for two years. Aloha High in Beaverton, Ore., was his next stop on the professional ladder. McMackin was defensive coach for a year before becoming head coach for 1971-1973. His '73 squad established the school's first winning record.

He served as a graduate assistant at the University of Arizona from 1968-69 during which the Wildcats appeared in the Sun Bowl. He completed work on his master's at UA in the spring of 1970.

McMackin and his wife Heather, also from Springfield, have a daughter, Shannon, 7.

John McMahon came to the University of Idaho in 1974 after serving two years in the Army, McMahon became head wrestling and assistant football and track coach at Great Falls High, serving until 1967. In 1968 and 1969 he was assistant football coach at Butte High School. From there he moved to Montana Tech where he was assistant in football and head coach in wrestling for two years.

Upon taking over the head football coaching job and the athletic directorship at Montana Tech, the football team produced a 29-6-0 record and won three straight league titles, making the national playoffs once.

McMahon took over the Vandal offensive coordinator's duties in addition to his offensive line work in January 1976. Last season he helped coach All-American center John Yarno. He also coordinates recruiting for the Vandals.

He and his wife Francie, a Chinook native, are the parents of three children — Mike, 12, Carol Jo, 10, and William, 2.

Sprinkle and his wife Danette have a 3-year-old daughter Erin and a year-old son Dan.

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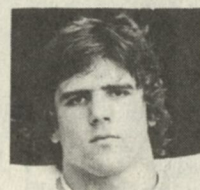

About the University of Pacific

The University of the Pacific, as California's pioneer institution of higher learning, has been in the forefront of academic innovation since its beginning in 1851.

As a relatively small, privately-funded institution, Pacific has developed an academic program geared to the constantly changing needs of a 5,300 member student body.

The College of the Pacific is the main liberal arts college of UOP, which includes two "cluster" colleges — Raymond Callison College, which features international studies and Elbert Covell College, for Spanish-speaking students interested in inter-American studies.

Well-Rounded Institution

The McGeorge School of Law in Sacramento; the School of Dentistry and Graduate School of Medicine in San Francisco, and the Stockton-based Conservatory of Music, Graduate School, and schools of pharmacy, engineering, and education make Pacific a well-rounded institution.

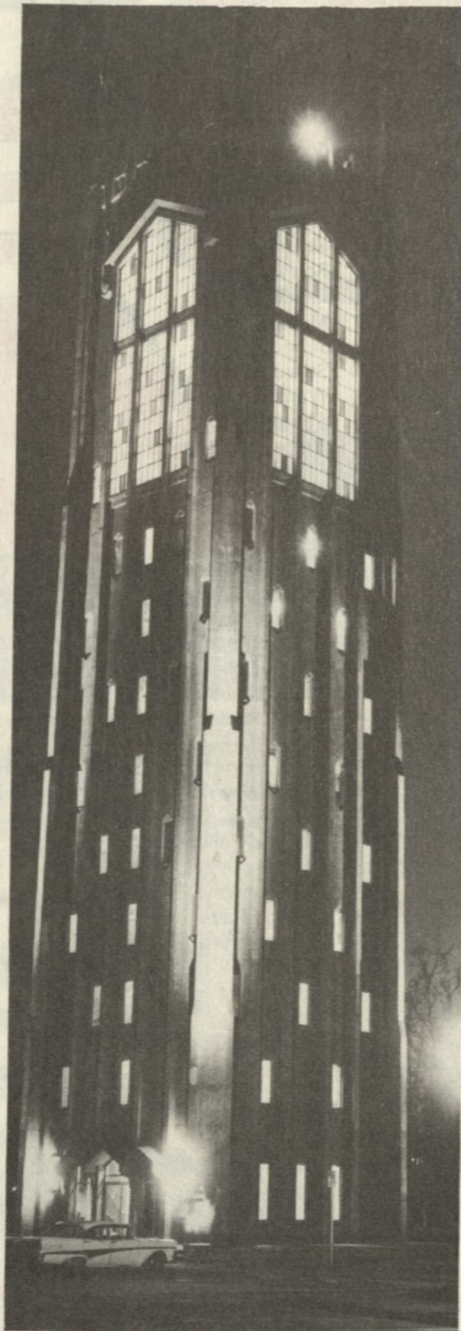
Student Involvement

In the area of community involvement, there are many programs that reach both the cluster colleges and professional schools. Students work in migrant worker camps, detention facilities, mental hospitals, and public schools. Many of these projects carry course credit.

New facilities on the Pacific campus include the \$3 million University Center; the \$1 million Covell Student Health Center and \$4.4 million School of Pharmacy. The \$12,000 Donald B. Wood Bridge spans the Calaveras River to link the other two new developments with the main campus.

UOP purchased the lands and facilities of the old Delta College campus, immediately adjacent to the University.

UOP is located in Stockton (pop. 120,000), 70 miles east of San Francisco and the Bay Area and 45 miles south of Sacramento.



CADDAS AND PACIFIC

Chester Caddas loves college football — obviously, or he wouldn't be starting his sixth season as head coach of the Tigers.

"There's several things I like about college football. One is the constant turnover of new people. I enjoy working with all the young men that come here," Caddas explained. "It keeps you young. I get a lot of satisfaction, and a lot of fun seeing these guys graduate.

"The second thing I like most is the challenge and variety of college football. You play a passing team one week, a running team the next. You see all types of multiple offenses and defenses. The excitement is always there."

Caddas, 42, has had plenty of excitement at UOP. His teams have compiled a 28-25-2 record. Two of the wins Caddas savors a little more than the rest.

"One win I'll never forget is when we came back to beat San Jose State in 1974," Caddas recalled. "We were trailing 24-6 at the half and came back to win 29-27.

"Another big win was when we came back to beat Wyoming (50-14 at Wyoming in 1974), after they had beaten us so badly the year before (49-14)."

Memories are nice, but they are also something to forget, such as last season's 2-9 record — where everything seemed to go wrong.

Caddas certainly isn't looking back and

has already laid the foundation to return the Tigers to the level they were at in his first three seasons. A new offense built around star fullback Bruce Gibson, a new defense and a batch of junior college recruits could make 1977 a little more tolerable.

The memories of the first three seasons are good ones.

The personable coach inherited a rundown program in 1972 and quickly notched an 8-3 record to earn Northern California Coach of the Year honors. He followed that mark with a 7-2-1 record in 1973. An injury-ravaged team still compiled a 6-5 record in 1974.

Even with the winning marks Caddas hasn't been afraid to change if the need arises.

Caddas and his coaches approach the strategic part of the game with characteristic logic. When, after three years of relative success, the triple-option veer offense stopped producing yards in 1975, Caddas recognized the necessity to open up the offense and installed a drop-back passing game to complement the veer's potent ground attack. Now he has switched to the I-formation that will feature Gibson, the tailback and the drop-back pass.

So it's easy to see Caddas knows what it takes to win. He has had first-hand experience as a player, too.

Caddas never played on a losing team while at Murray State. Caddas had plenty of thrills while playing center and guard on offense, plus linebacker on defense.

"My biggest thrill as a player was just playing. I liked to go to practice. I was the first one out and the last one in. Many of my friends thought that I had some sort of

problem," said Caddas with a chuckle. "There are some players who like every bit of it. They like to practice, and of course they like to play. I just got into the whole operation. I think the biggest thing I learned was the importance of playing hard."

Which explains why Caddas emphasizes fundamentals, simplicity and plenty of hard work by his players.

The UOP challenge is the biggest one Caddas has faced. But, he's no stranger to head coaching. He started his career as an assistant football and basketball coach at Harrisburg (Ill.) High School in 1957. After two years there he moved on to Waggener High School in Louisville, Ky., as an assistant football coach.

In 1961 he got his first head coaching assignment. It was a dual role, and Caddas responded to that by compiling a 16-10-1 record in football and a 68-28 mark in basketball during his three years at Fulton (Ky.) High. He was picked as Western Kentucky Coach of the Year while at Fulton in 1963.

From there Caddas moved on to Danville (Ky.) High in 1964, compiling a 15-14 record as head football coach during his three-year stint there.

He made the jump to collegiate coaching as freshman and "B" team tutor at Vanderbilt for two years. Then he moved to Pacific, beginning his UOP career as an assistant to Doug Scovill.

Caddas earned his Bachelor's Degree from Murray State in 1957 and got his Master's from Indiana in 1960. The native of Memphis, Tenn., is married (wife Bette) and has three children (Lynn 20, Chris 17, and Rachel 14).

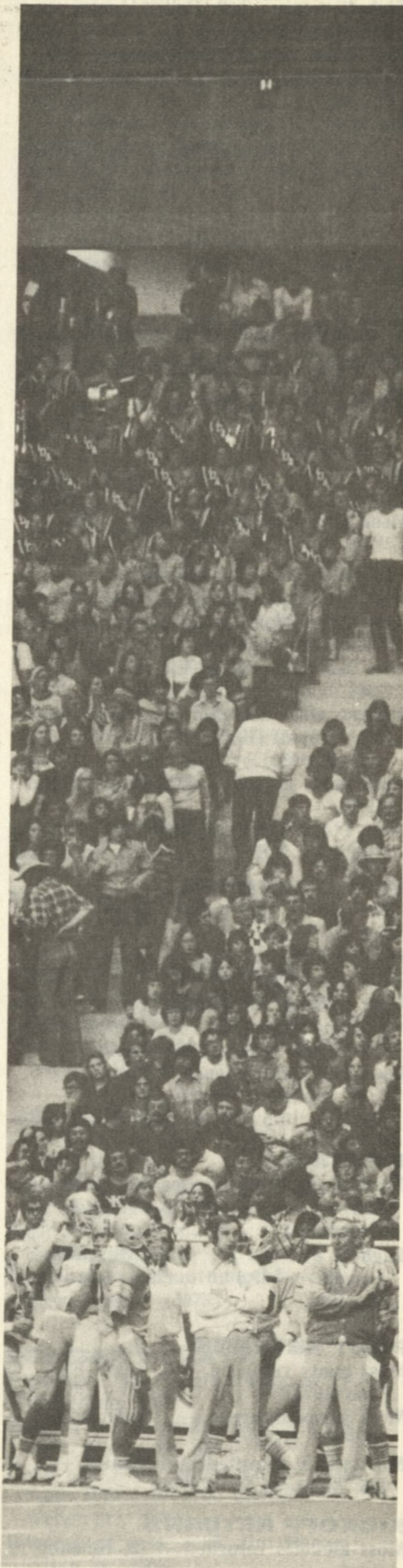

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UI Women's Sports Growing

Growth, increase in stature and change in direction of competition have been the significant achievements made by the Women's Athletic Program at the University of Idaho in the last several years.

Under Kathy Clark, head of Women's Athletics, the program has gone from a budget of \$39,000 in 1974 to \$127,000 for 1977, the personnel has increased by three and the program moved into inter-collegiate competition through the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW), the national governing body.

"Although we have not added any sports to our program," Clark said, "there has been a sizable increase in stature in each of the programs in terms of development of skill level, the expansion of schedules and the integrity of the competition itself."

Clark explained that several years ago the women competed through the extramural program of the Women's Recreation Association. Now, under AIAW, Idaho competes in the Northwest College Women's Sports Association Region IX (NCWSA). The structure of the program allows schools of different sizes to compete against comparable programs in many sports and offer an avenue to national competition.

"We have decided at the present time to maintain a moderate direction in women's athletics," Clark continued. "We're not trying to be a Delta State in basketball or a UCLA in volleyball. We're trying to be the best University of Idaho we can be."

"That means keeping things in perspective, maintaining our athletic program on a sound educational footing and providing our athletes with opportunities they earn and deserve and are capable of handling. We want to avoid pushing to the point where we're creating something the women, coaches and university doesn't want," Clark said.

"We want to maintain integrity of competition, strive to be the best we can be, and foster the pursuit of excellence but not at the expense of anybody's academic career."

"Therefore, we are now channeling our program into stronger competition at the small college level," Clark said. "We will compete in basketball in a league involving Eastern Washington State, Central Washington State, Eastern Oregon State and ourselves. We contemplate a similar league next year in volleyball. In past years, we have competed against large schools such as the University of Washington and Oregon."

The small college division of AIAW is designed for schools with 3,000 or less full time women undergraduates.



"So this means we will be competing with some schools smaller than us," Clark said, "but generally speaking, with schools having programs comparable to ours."

"This could mean, at least in a couple of instances, a significantly greater avenue towards national competition. Specifically, if tennis and volleyball fall into place as they might, we see a very real goal for this year in national competition. This will be on the small college level. Several swimmers have already reached national competition in the last few years as well as the bowling team."

Track and field, field hockey and gymnastics do not have the option of small or large college competition.

The 1977-78 competitive year will be a "pivotal year" in the program for bowling.

"There are essentially no schools in the Northwest that compete in bowling as an intercollegiate sport. We're the only school to support the team through the athletic program. The other schools support their teams through the student unions."

"So this will be the year to determine if

there remains enough interest to support a team in bowling," Clark said.

Concerning personnel, two half-time positions were added to the staff last year. They were a certified athletic trainer and a coordinator of women's sports information. Both women work in cooperation with their counterparts in men's athletics.

Sherry Buickel, a graduate of the University of Indiana, is the athletic trainer and Ann Rice, an Idaho graduate, is the coordinator of women's sports information.

"The athletic trainer for women has always been an extra that we knew was important to the program," Clark said, "but funding was not available for it."

"As competition becomes keener and the athlete becomes more dedicated and more intense, we've got to watch out just that much more for their health and welfare."

"We were very fortunate to find a certified athletic trainer to come to us as a graduate assistant last year. This year she is working full-time in cooperation with physical education."

Ann Rice serves in a part-time position as coordinator of women's sports information. As competition increases, the need for and amount of sports information and promotion has grown tremendously. Mrs. Rice works with Idaho's sports information director to help provide complete sports information coverage for the women's program.

Title IX, which has had an impact on women's sports throughout the country, has also had an effect at Idaho.

"It has created more attention and in some cases allowed and/or fostered more support for the woman athlete," Clark said.

"I think the tremendous surge in women's athletics was on its way prior to Title IX," Clark explained. "It is hard to draw a line and attribute this or that to Title IX. Women's liberation, changing social roles and the changing interests of women have all combined to create the explosion in women's sports."

"I feel the most striking effect is Title IX's help to provide additional funding and in some instances a place to play, particularly in high school situations."

Another change felt by intercollegiate athletics is the caliber of high school graduates coming to college.

"They are now coming to college with the knowledge that they must have had a broad high school experience," Clark continued. "They come to play intercollegiate ball, not as something they do Saturday afternoon but something they do knowing the dedication and sacrifices necessary. Some are pointing towards college competition as a priority whereas before, it may have been something they'd do when they got there if they could work it in."
