

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
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

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The University



Galifornia State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing. Having first offered classes in 1959, the university has grown to 23,000 students and achieved national distinction.

In 1984, the university will host team handball competition at the Summer Olympics. It also will begin its 25th anniversary observance with the theme "Honoring the Past — Creating the Future."

The university's students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and other nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes: many come to classes only in the evening.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 750-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The university enjoys full accreditation for its overall program. In addition, national recognition has been accorded to programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, education, engineering, communications, music, nursing, speech and hearing, and theater. All told there are 82 degree programs — 40 of them at the graduate level.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is the largest university level internship and cooperative education program on the West Coast. The program allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their regular studies. Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours on a year-round basis. Extended education offerings are open to the community without the formalities of regular admission to the university.


Still another strong point is the university's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances and the Cabaret Repertory Theater Company, which performs regularly in Brea.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the 7,000-person network of community support organizations. The Titan Athletic Foundation is one of these support groups.

Further examples of community outreach are the Fullerton Arboretum and Tucker Wildlife Sanctuary. Opened in 1979, the Arboretum is a 25-acre oncampus preserve that was established jointly by the university and the City of Fullerton. Tucker Wildlife Sanctuary is a half-hour from campus in a canyon of the Santa Ana Mountains.

To reinforce the university's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State has embarked on an ambitious campaign called "Commitment to Mindpower." Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great university.

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
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
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




Today's Game

Titans Reach for Unprecedented PCAA Heights

It should be a highly motivated band of Titans that takes the field today against the University of the Pacific Tigers in what might be called the "Blue Cross Bowl." Depending on your viewpoint, take your choice of these reasons for the Titans to get excited:

• PCAA Standings — Fullerton never has won as many as three PCAA games in a single season and the Titans need a victory to hold onto first place.

• Revenge — A Gene Murphy coached Fullerton team never has beaten Pacific and all three losses have left lingering memories. In 1980, UOP scored a touchdown in the final seconds. In 1981, UOP stopped Fullerton's try for a game-winning two-point conversion in the final seconds. In 1982, the Tigers presented outgoing head coach Bob Toledo a 31-0 thrashing of the Titans for coach Murphy's worst Fullerton defeat.

• Momentum — Fullerton wants to get the bad taste of a 37-10 loss at Arizona out of its mouths and get back on the plus side of their most impressive start as a Division I-A competitor. A winning season would be a more reachable goal with a win today.

• Homecoming — The alums should be out in force to see if the Titan football program really has come of age in 1983. For sure there will be numerous former Titan players on hand rooting for their successors.

The visiting Tigers, who are playing Fullerton in southern California for only the second time in the nineyear history of the rivalry, also have some reasons to play well. After an impressive season-opening win at the University of Oregon, they have fallen on hard and painful times and there's nothing like a conference win to salve some serious wounds. They have a new coach in Bob Cope, a proven motivator, and also feature numerous Orange County products on their roster who are playing a "homecoming" game of sorts, too.

Pacific's season got off to an unfortunate start when receivers Greg Thomas and Kurt Heinrich suffered seasonending injuries in pre-season drills. Second-time All-PCAA tight end Tony Camp pulled a hamstring which has lingered so long that the former Estancia High School star is going to sit out the year and try it again in 1984. And in the season opener, quarterback Paul Berner and all-PCAA safety Kevin Greene went down with knee injuries requiring major surgery.

But the Titans know the feeling. When they ventured into No. 4-rated Arizona last weekend, they were minus eight players who were on the two-deep rosters on opening night at Boise State. Starters Sean Foy (DE) and Al Krueger (OT) were out for the year with knee injuries and Terry Hubbard (LB) sat out the Tucson game with a shoulder injury. Reserves John West (LB) and Irv Teeboom (CB) also are out for the year and line mainstays Hank Goebel (OT), Dave Martinez (C) and Paul Taeleifi (DT) are out for a week or two with assorted leg ailments.

Today's combatants thus head into action very equally matched with two glaring exceptions — turnovers and placekicking.

Pacific has yet to come up with a pass interception while the young Tigers' quarterbacks have thrown five balls into enemy hands. UOP also trails in the fumble department to opponents, losing four while recovering

only two.

Fullerton, meanwhile, is a "plus 10" in takeaways with eight pass interceptions and eight loose ball recoveries vs. only one thrown interception and five fumbles lost.

Pacific kicker Scott Kinney is undergoing what Fullerton's Greg Steinke saw most of 1982 — too distant goalposts. The senior punter and placekicker has made 20-of-29 field goal attempts in his career but that includes only one fruitless effort in 1983 as the Tigers haven't found themselves in range or need of very many three-pointers.

Steinke, however, has provided a clutch toe. His 51-yarder with nine seconds left beat Boise State, 13-10, on Sept. 3 and he made a 45-yarder with 13 seconds to go to beat Utah State, 25-24, on Sept. 17. He's six of 11 on the season including a career best of 54 yards.

Heading the list of Tigers to watch is defensive end Thomas Cowling, a senior from Sacramento, and Kevin Einck, a senior linebacker from Anaheim's Servite High School. Cowling was the PCAA Player of the Week for his performance in Eugene where he recorded eight unassisted tackles, had two fumble recoveries, batted down two passes and recorded a pair of sacks.

Einck is an all-PCAA contender and follows in the tradition of fine UOP linebackers, which recently featured Mike Merriweather and Kirk Harmon.

Offensively, senior Kirby Warren from Las Vegas has been the key weapon in the UOP attack. The 6-0, 185-pounder gained 191 yards rushing last week against Fresno State and has 393 yards on the season for an average of almost 100 yards per game. He spent part of last season on defense after gaining 635 yards over the first three years of his UOP career.

Berner's injury has left quarterbacking duties in the hands of freshman Rich Pelletier, one of the most heavily recruited signal callers last year in southern California. He led his De La Salle High School team to a 12-0 record and accounted for 36 touchdowns (21 rushing, 15 passing) while totaling more than 2,000 yards offense.


Fullerton is hoping a return to the Anaheim Stadium turf will rejuvenate an offensive attack that had its best showing here on Sept. 10 in a 25-19 victory over Long Beach State. Rock-ribbed defenses at Utah State and Arizona also had a lot to do with the absence of sustained drives but the Titans must do something about their inclination to attract penalty flags. They have seen 375 yards marched off on 46 occasions vs. only 164 yards and 25 penalties assessed against opponents.

Damon Allen still is searching for his first touchdown pass of the season, that team honor having gone to holder Todd White who threw to snapper Kelly Ross out of fieldgoal formation in a vintage Murphy "squirrel derby" play at Tucson. Allen has completed 37 of 75 passes (49.3 per cent) for 478 yards with only one interception.

There is no such thing as a "favorite receiver" in the Titans' offensive scheme. Wide-outs Corn Redick and Wade Lockett lead the team with eight receptions each, but a total of 15 players have caught passes including defensive backs Ross, Duane Henson and Dale Thompson.

Among those receivers is tailback Roy Lewis, who has caught only three after leading the team last year with 45. He remains the No. 1 rusher with 222 net yards.

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

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By Kurt Loe hat Division I football program has had to play its home games in two counties and five stadiums?

The answer ... Cal State Fullerton, which has played in the Los Angeles Coliseum as well as the Santa Ana Bowl, Cerritos Community College, Anaheim Stadium and Titan Field.

While that is a lot of moving around for a major football program there is hope on the horizon. The Titans will have a permanent home field within the next couple of years as the long awaited Youth Sports Complex will be completed.

In the meantime, they have taken a step forward by moving to Anaheim Stadium for three games beginning this afternoon against arch-rival Long Beach State.

"I feel great about the move," said Titan Coach Gene Murphy. "When I came here in 1980, before we put up the bleachers, we were going to play three home games - one at Santa Ana Bowl, one at Cerritos and one at Fullerton Union High School and there is no home feeling there whatsoever. Especially when you are moving from place to place. "My feeling is that is we can't play our home games on

campus then we should be playing in a first class facility and when you are talking about top-notch facilities you are talking about the Big A.'

Making the move to Anaheim does create some concerns from a marketing standpoint. However, a lot of work is being down to keep those worries to a minimum.

The biggest concern appeared to be how the Titans were going to fill a stadium of such size. However, thanks to a little teamwork between CSUF Athletic Director Lynn Eilefson and Director of Anaheim Stadium Operations Tom Liegler, the concern has been lessened.

In previous years, when teams rented the Big A, they had to rent the whole stadium. That won't be the case this time as a package deal has been worked out which allows the Titans to rent half the stadium, putting all the fans on one side of the field.

"It is just a matter of necessity being the mother of invention, Eilefson said. "We had to have a Division I quality facility to play in and when you say Division I that means a 30,000 seat stadium and from a quality standpoint you are talking about the Big A. So it was a natural to get together with the people at Anaheim.

"The only thing that would be better would be to have a stadium on campus, but due to the fact that we don't have one this is an extremely good move for us," he added.

Returning to the Big A should bring back some fond memories for Titan football followers. It was only 13 years ago, that the first Cal State Fullerton football team took the field against Cal Lutheran. Ironically, it was at Anaheim Stadium. Unfortunately, the outcome wasn't very exciting as the two teams battled to a scoreless tie.

The fortunes of the Titan football team didn't get much better at home as they managed just one win in four games. However, the following season turned out to be just the reverse

CSUF played an exciting and winning brand of football in 1971 as it rolled up four victories in six home games. Those wins brought the team its second of four consecutive winning seasons.

As successful as the season was, it will be remembered for a very tragic accident. Following a game with USIU, assistant coaches Joe O'Hara, Dallas Moon and Bill Hannah were killed in a plane crash on a scouting trip to Cal Poly San Obispo Nov. 13.

Consequently, a benefit game was proposed to help the three widows and 11 children of the three coaches. Initially it was turned downed until some pressure was brought to bear on Governor Ronald Reagan and a former member of the Nixon cabinet, Robert Finch, and the game was approved.

So on Dec. 11, the Mercy Bowl was played between Fresno State and the Titans before 16,000. While it was a sad moment in CSUF football history, the game was a thriller as the Titans pulled out a 17-14 win in the last two minutes on a Mike Ernst touchdown pass.

It was during that year, that the Titans began taking their home games on the road with an appearance at the Santa Ana Bowl, Also included was a game against Grambling, in front of a record crowd of 60,000, at the Coliseum.

The next 11 seasons were not quite as successful at home as CSUF played just barely over .500. So with an eye on the future, they decided to go back to their original home and stay there until an on-campus stadium is built.

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
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
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


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serves as a charitable beneficiary of the game. Last year's donation to the hospital increased greatly over 1981, thanks in large part to the capacity crowd that watched the contest.

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




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Fullerton's Rodney Weber

very summer hundreds of former college football players are found scattered throughout NFL training camps vying for jobs only to have their efforts go in vain. However, the fortunes of Titans are on a upswing. Especially with the inception of the United States Football League.

Two of the most impressive performances in the new league came from ex-Titans Ricky Ellis and Vince Abbott of the Express. Ellis was the team's top receiver with 69 receptions, third best in the league, while Abbott gave them a solid placekicker and their leading scorer with 82 points.

Until this season, Ellis' pro career had been rather unspectacular. A seven-year pro, he started in the NFL with the Seattle Seahawks only to be released on the final cut both in 1978 and '79.

Nevertheless, he managed to catch on with the British Columbia Lions of the Canadian Football League and played five seasons as a tight end and wingback.

Always known as a flashy receiver throughout his collegiate playing days, Ellis said he knew he would have an excellent opportunity coming to the new league.

"I knew I was in pretty good shape when he (Express Coach Hugh Campbell) called me about the Express, since I was one of a few experienced receivers in camp," Ellis said. "He'd seen me play under pressure and knew what I could do."

Campbell had coached Edmondton to five Grey Cup Championships in the CFL.

On the other hand, Abbott had relatively little professional experience. After graduating from Cal State Fullerton in 1981 with All-Pacific Coast Athletic Association honors from his 1980 season, he was signed by both the Miami Dolphins and the San Francisco 49ers.

Unfortunately, he was cut by both teams. However, he did pick up some valuable pointers in the 49er camp.


"I learned a lot kicking with Ray Wersching (49er kicker), but I really didn't get much of a chance at either camp," Abbott said. "I had one day between the two camps. It was tough."

A year later with the birth of the USFL, he got another chance and made the most of it by converting 31 of 34 extra points and 17 of 30 field goals.

"I like being on this team better than some of the NFL teams," Abbott said. "There are a great bunch of guys there and I want to contribute to winning as much as possible," he added.

Thanks to the territorial draft, two other Titans made their mark on the Express roster. Tyrone Justin was a starting cornerback and Rodney Weber was a reserve defensive back. Grady Richardson also landed a spot as a tight end and former Titan linebacker John Bungartz played with the Denver Gold.

The NFL has its share of former Titans. Johnnie Gray is a starting safety with the Green Bay Packers while Bobby Kemp is a starting defensive back with Cincinnati. Lucious Smith spent three years with the Rams as a reserve defensive back before being traded to Kansas City this summer. Late NFL cuts included punter Scott Vernoy (CSF '81) by the San Diego Chargers; linebacker Marvin Smith (CSF '79) and Richardson (CSF '73) by the Rams; and offensive lineman Harris Burnett (CSF '81) by the New England Patriots. Other former Titans who previously played in the NFL include Tampa Bay linebacker Aaron Ball and Kansas City cornerback M.L. Carter, who was also with Boston of the USFL.



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
