TODAY'S GAME

Big Strong. Experienced. Sound.

Those adjectives describe the University of the Pacific Tigers, today's Band Day opponents.

Add to those vivid words the fact UOP has won 10 of its last 11 games, including three in a row, and you have a picture of a tough opponent. The Pokes already know that for sure.

The tigers' only loss dating back to the second game of the 1972 season was to San Diego State, 20-7, in San Diego. That decision, along with losses to Pacific-8 power Washington (13-6) and LSU of the Southeastern Conference (31-13), were the blemishes on an 8-3 record in coach Chester Caddas' first year at Stockton. This year's edition is off to a fine start with 22-0 and 34-9 wins over Sacramento State and Texas-El Paso, respectively.

The Tigers offensive unit is led by quarterback Bruce Keplinger who threw for three touchdowns at El Paso last week and who owns a 42.7 punting average. He's also fourth in rushing with 67 yards in 28 trips, making him one of the rarities in modern football... the triple threat. Backing him are running backs Willard Harrell, averaging 4.3 yards a carry on 33 tries, and Mike Davis, 6.8 average on 20 trips. Their Houston-veer has accounted for 491 yards aground to date.

The mammoth defensive unit is paced by tackle Larry Bailey, a 6-4, 250-pound senior who earned 10 unassisted tackles and sacked the quarterback four times last week in El Paso. The scrambling split-four defense has limited opponents to only 220 yards rushing and but 183 passing.

So, UOP's debut in the high country could be mighty impressive.

But coach Fritz Shurmur's Cowboys were pretty impressive in their own right in defeat last week. The Pokes won all the statistical battles but the score in the Western Athletic Conference opener against Arizona.

Sophomore backs Lawrence Gaines and Andy Dixon powered for 102 and 101 yards, respectively in the opener, giving Wyoming its best running tandem in many seasons. The ground pounders accounted for 212 yards against the Wildcats, a fine start.

Defensively the Cowboys showed tremendous pursuit, limiting Arizona to only nine first downs and 212 yards total offense (122 aground, 90 aloft). Linebackers Dan Fedore and Frank Erzinger and tackle Scott Fairclough led the forward charge. Veteran safety Al Duyn was the ringleader in the secondary.

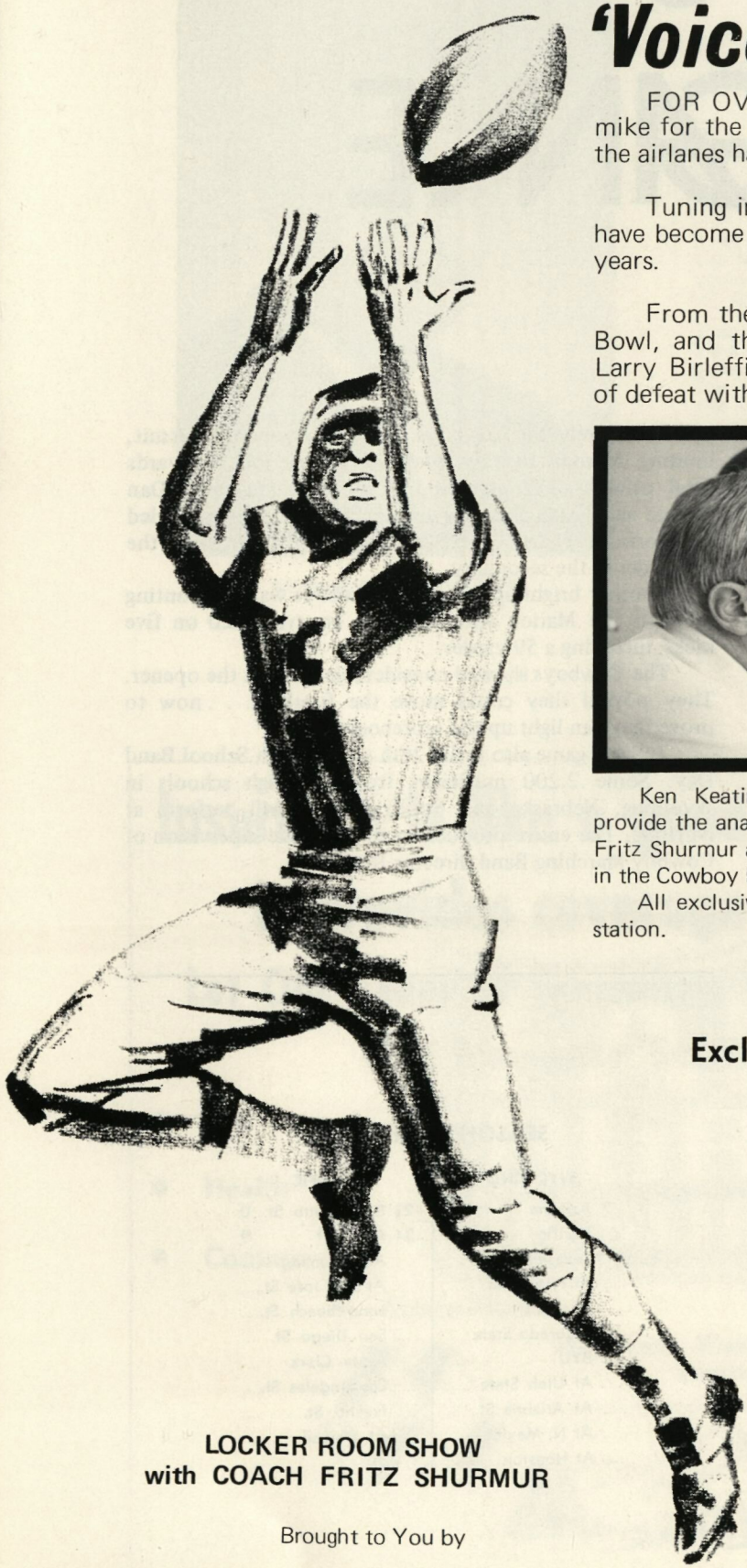
Another bright spot for the Cowboys was the punting of soph Joe Marion who averaged an even 50.0 on five kicks, including a 59-yarder.

The Cowboys showed considerable poise in the opener. They proved they could move the football... now to prove they can light up the scoreboard.

Today's game also is the 26th annual High School Band Day. Some 2,200 musicians from 35 high schools in Wyoming, Nebraska and South Dakota will perform at halftime. The entire production is under the supervision of Cowboy Marching Band director Ron Kuhn.

WYOMING MEMORIAL STADIUM INFORMATION

PUBLIC TELEPHONES: Public telephones are located under the East and West Grandstands near the center of the stands, on the concourse level of the upper deck near the center of the stands and in Memorial Fieldhouse at each of the four corners of the building on the first floor.

"WILL CALL" TICKET BOOTH: If for any reason known to the Ticket Manager you have tickets to pick up prior to game time and cannot do so before 9:30 a.m. on the day of the game at the Athletic Ticket Office, your tickets may be obtained at the "Will Call" booth any time after 9:30 a.m. on game day. The "Will Call" booth is located at the Southwest corner of the fieldhouse and is plainly marked.

FIRST AID ROOM: An attendant is on duty during games in Room 16 located under the West stands between sections C and D.

LOST AND FOUND: All found articles should be turned in to the pressbox doorman. Lost articles may be claimed at the Athletic Ticket Office, Room 215, Memorial Fieldhouse. Telephone 766-2345.



EMERGENCY CALLS: Individuals attending games at Wyoming Memorial Stadium should record their Section, Row, and Seat number of tickets at home or in their office. The public address system will not be used for calling spectators from the stands. In case of emergency, telephone the Press Box, 766-2222. Individuals will not, however, be paged over the loud speaking system.

REST ROOMS: Rest room facilities are located immediately under the stadium in both the East and West Grandstands either to the right or left as you leave your portal and on the concourse level of the upper deck under sections EE, CC and GG. Additional facilities are located in the North and South lobbies of Memorial Fieldhouse.

Walt Miller, the (P.A.) Voice Everyone Knows

This fall makes the 22nd successive year that Cowboy football fans will hear home games announced by Walt Miller, of Cheyenne, University of Wyoming Football Stadium announcer. (Uncle Walter to me).

Uncle Walter first came to Wyoming in the summer of 1941 as a student at the S. H. Knight Science Camp. A native of Webster City, Iowa, he'd already attended the Junior College there for one year.

"At first I was flatly opposed to attending Wyoming. I had a maiden aunt on the faculty (Laura White, department of history. White Hall on the UW campus is named for her). The campus was pretty small then, about 1,200 students, and I didn't like the idea of her monitoring all my extracurricular activities. But at the end of the summer, I'd changed my mind. I called my mother in Iowa and told her I was spending the rest of my life in Wyoming."

So began Uncle Walter's college career at UW. World War II intervened, he joined the Army Air Corps, spent time in China, and returned to graduate in 1947.

Following graduation, Uncle Walter worked for Fred Goodstein of Tri-Good Oil in Casper; returned to Laramie to work for the manager of the Student Union, Mrs. Robert Tichac; and in 1949 became director of the Union and remained there until 1951.

Prudential Insurance Company hired Uncle Walter, followed by Massachusetts Mutual Life Insurance Company, for whom he still works. He is a member of Mass Mutual's Life and Quarter Million Dollar Roundtable and is a Certified Life Underwriter. He and his family make their home in Cheyenne.

Uncle Walter got his start in the public address world while he was still in school, and it was with basketball rather than football.

"In 1949, Athletic Director, the late Glenn J. "Red" Jacoby, and Wiles Halleck, Sports Information Director,

were using all student help for the games . . . ticket takers, ushers, and the like. They asked me if I wanted to work for them, and I told them 'No, because I wanted to be able to watch the games'. They said they had ONE job where I could watch, but it didn't pay anything. It was the public address job in the Half Acre. I took it, and sat in the top row of the balcony."

"Then in 1951, Wiles (Halleck) asked me if I would announce the football games and I said yes. That's how I started."

In these 22 years Uncle Walter has missed only one game. That was about six years ago.

"It was snowing like crazy and I was sitting in the middle of an intersection in Cheyenne where a lady had run into me."

Uncle Walter prefers announcing football to any other sport because the average spectator needs more help at football than any of the others.

"I think football is more fun because there's more going on and you have more things to comment on that many of the spectators might not understand."

"We try to treat the visiting team and fans as our guests and not say anything discourteous. There are a few words that I use when I'm displeased with the officials, but it IS hard to remain objective and calm at the mike. About one-half the time during football season, I feel I have to announce that pass interference is 'alleged'."

"In basketball when I would say that the player was stepping up to the charity line, I meant just that."

The funniest thing that ever happened while he's been at the mike?

"In 1967 when Larry Nels was a sophomore, Wyoming had partially blocked the opponents' punt. We didn't see who had done the blocking, but we knew from the position that it had to have been a defensive tackle or defensive end, and I had announced that we hadn't seen who had done it. Players say they never listen to what is coming over the public address system,

but when I looked down on the field, there was Nels, jumping up and down, hitting himself, and hollering 'It was me, it was me!!'"

"One time," he remembers, "at a Wyoming-Utah baseball game, between announcements, G. D. Humphrey, then University president and I were 'assisting' the umpire and criticizing his calls."


"We didn't realize that for about two innings our comments were coming over the air in low but audible tones. Finally the umpire came up and offered to switch jobs with us. To this day I still shudder when I visualize headlines in the newspapers that could have read something about President and Public Announcer being thrown out of the game for unsportsmanlike conduct."

"I still maintain that there is one game in UW history that was decided by the public announcer. The 1955 Wyoming and Denver University game is still recorded with an asterisk, indicating that the official score was unacceptable to UW fans."

"The Wyoming team heard the whistle, stopping play, and quit chasing the DU ball carrier who kept running right into the end zone. The public announcer said the play was good and recorded the score at 3-6. In the confusion the refs went along with the announcement, because it's always easier to do nothing than something."

"The major danger in announcing football is anticipating the referee's calls. We often discuss plays before we announce them, and try to keep from talking too much. To me, there's nothing as irritating as some guy giving a running commentary throughout any game."

College Football "Plays It Again" Sunday

As it is popularly conceived, the instant replay is a split-screened, isolated, slo-mo, stop-action piece of art which lets you see the play you didn't see a few seconds earlier.

But popular conceptions are far too confining. An instant replay—in every sense of the term—takes place every Sunday morning on most ABC stations. It even has a name—ABC College Football Highlights Show.

Putting the Sunday morning highlights show together is a game in itself; and when you consider that the "working day" in Chicago for the show is 11 p.m. Saturday until 11 a.m. Sunday, you can bet it's the only game in town.

For at least three members of the Highlights Show team, it's an away game. Dick Snider, director of NCAA Films and executive producer of the show, checks into Chicago Saturday night from his home in Wichita, Kan. Kemper Peacock, the producer-director, journeys from New York; and Bill Flemming, the host, comes from his assignment on ABC's college football telecast of the week.

Snider minimizes his role in the production, but the five-year reign of the show is to his credit. "You know, the whole thing's impossible," he confesses. "The good thing is that we never have time to stop and think about that when we are putting the show together."

Snider's involvement with the show really begins the Monday before. That's when he huddles with ABC executives to determine what games will be featured.

"We'll film on the average of 12 games a weekend, and then pick the five or six top games. Those games are determined on the importance of the contest, logistics or even if one of the teams has a player everybody would like to see.

"The most important thing about the show," Snider continued, "is getting the film into Chicago. When I get there Saturday night, I contact the cameramen and find out what flights the film's going to be on. Then I make sure that our messengers—who race to O'Hare and Midway airports on motorcycles—get out there and get the film.

Important Motorcycles

"Kemper Peacock has been all over the world and has to be one of the best in the business, Bill Flemming has covered every major sporting event in the world, and I've been around a little, too; but we all are helpless if one of those guys in a helmet and leather jacket can't get his bike started."

In the five years the show has been on the air, only one shipment of film has been lost in transit. "I know the plane schedules into Chicago better than the airlines," says Snider, "but sometimes things go wrong. We had an important game coming in from the South on Piedmont Airlines. It arrived on time, but the messenger didn't, and Piedmont closed down its baggage counter. We had to call Piedmont's home office, get the manager's name

in Chicago, get him out of bed and down to O'Hare."

Kemper Peacock is the head of a production company by the same name. "I know I'm good with deadlines but this is ridiculous," Peacock said as he sat at a desk surrounded by some of his own photography. "It's tough, but we get it done. I work with three editors in Chicago on the show. I'll edit the main game—the one we spotlight—and the rest of the work is parcelled out to the others. We have roughly four hours to do the work . . . and we do it. That's all."

Each cameraman provides a play-by-play account of the game with the film. It's up to Peacock to edit the footage into an exciting, five-minute piece.

"At 4:30 a.m. we transfer the material from film to video-tape and have our first run through. Bill Flemming arrives on the scene between 5:30 and 6 a.m.; and we must have the show completed by 10 a.m. We have roughly three hours to get everything right. We have the edited film and any other features that I might have worked on in New York that we have to get into the show. But, Bill's got to get his narration in; and we have late scores to include. You know, it just might be impossible."

WLS, the ABC affiliate in Chicago, has to have the show by 10 a.m. to insure at least one run through. But, the station has been persuaded to take the show later.

Show Must Go On

"Our record is 10:57," Peacock admitted. "WLS had 'Water Skiing from Cypress Garden' all racked up, ready to run. But, we made it. We've made every show."

The "interior linemen" of the show are the writers. Jeff Elliott, who doubles as the assistant director of the Big Ten Service Bureau, and Kay Schultz, Chicago journalist, spend their time looking over shoulders and getting people out of bed.

"I just try to compile as much information as possible," Elliott explains, "and when you work through the night, that means disturbing some people."

Flemming is the man up front. According to Snider, "He is super. He's one of the few sportscasters who could do this show. He knows the game, and you can't shake him up."

Flemming smiled at this comment and said, "They do call me 'one-shot Flemming.' Let's face it, that's my strength. I can get the thing done in one take. And fifty per cent of the time, that's all we have time for."

Flemming is on the college football scene every Saturday afternoon working a game for ABC. After the game he hops into his own plane and heads for Chicago.

"Flying my own plane is the only way to do it," says Flemming. "Even so, sometimes I have to leave at half-time, or before, to make it. It's amazing, but I've never been weathered out. I've had some bumpy flights, but Chicago has always been open for me."

Upon arrival in Chicago, Flemming reads the first edition of the Tribune to get a bead on some of the games. Preparation is his hallmark. He compiles information throughout the week on the games which will probably be used then adlibs this information during the taping of the show.

After getting a wake-up call at 4:30 a.m., Flemming heads over to begin the taping. He gets the script outline then the cameras roll. Often the narration is material Flemming is seeing for the first time.

"I think this is an advantage," he says. "I put everything into the present tense. It's like I'm announcing the game for the first time. To us, the game isn't in the past."

Flemming Cares

Flemming is a perfectionist. "With Bill you have to be prepared," says Elliott. "If he sees a name he's never seen before, he wants to know how to pronounce it. His standard line is 'Are you sure?' I'd hate to tell you how many times we've run to a phone at 6 a.m. to check out a pronunciation, a statistic, a record or even a home town."

Peacock rolls the cameras at 6 a.m., and Flemming begins reading. If he makes a mistake, the film is still rolled because the important item is to get all the film onto video-tape. After that is accomplished, then the backtracking is done. When Flemming is happy with the script and is sure that everything is correct, he proceeds in his one-shot fashion.

The result is an exciting football show, which provides information—an entertaining news show. "The show is good," Flemming claims, "and I can tell you why. We have a great team, and we all 'dig' college football."

The 12-hour period which spawns the Sunday Morning College Football Highlights Show is summed up by Flemming: "Physically exhausting."

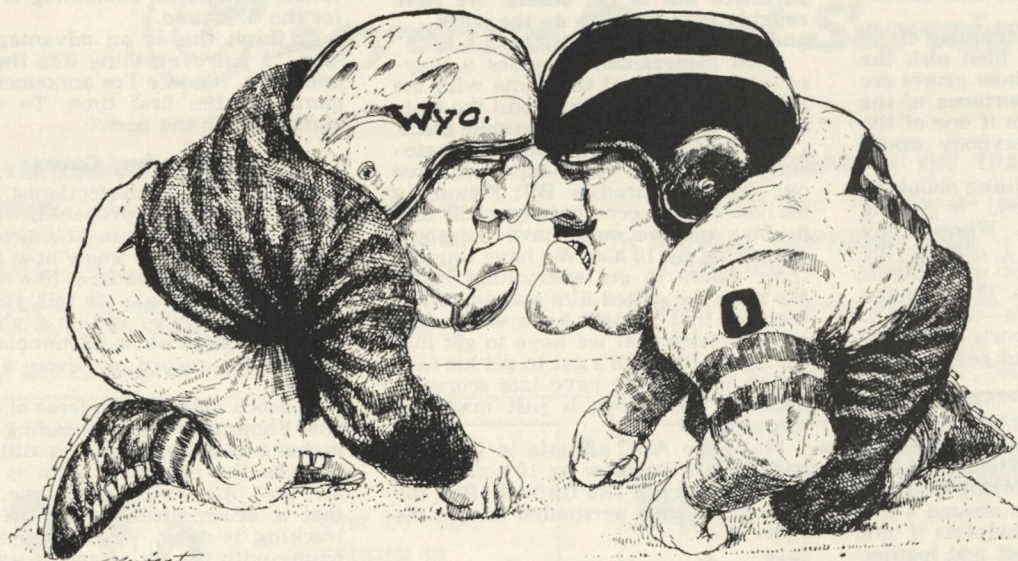

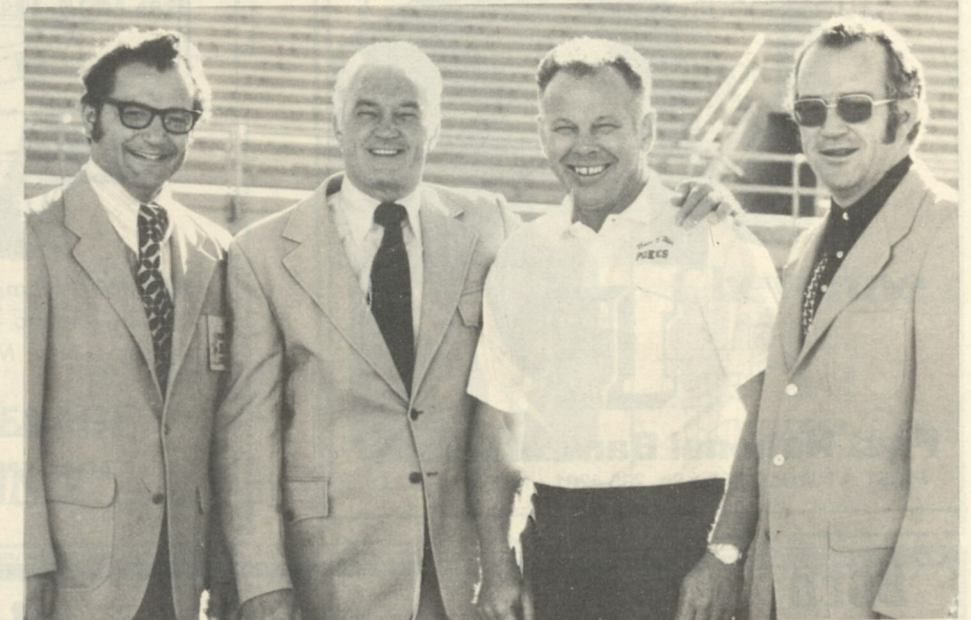

Strannigan Heads Cowboy Joe Club

Bill Strannigan, long time UW coach, has taken over as executive secretary of the Cowboy Joe Club, booster group for the University.

Strannigan's primary duties involve direction of all activities of the Club and the promotion of additional memberships and gifts. Also, in conjunction with the promotional work for Cowboy Joe, Strannigan is responsible for season ticket drives in football and basketball.

The Cowboy Joe Club was organized in 1970 on behalf of all alumni and friends of the University. Its purpose is to promote and support the University in all its accredited undertakings, functions and programs by providing financial support to the school, its faculty and staff, including specifically the athletic department.

During the first year of its existence the Club raised nearly \$85,000 from 897 members. Last year membership increased to 1,009 people. As of September 1 there were 575 members who had contributed approximately \$48,000 since January 1. Lloyd McDaniel, treasurer of the club, says the football months are always peak period for the Club and he expects membership to exceed that of last year.

There are six levels of membership in the Cowboy Joe Club—Trail Boss for a contribution of \$1,000 or more; Top Hand for a \$500 gift; Wrangler which is given to a person contributing \$250; Century membership for a \$100 gift, and sustaining and associate memberships for \$50 and \$10-\$50 respectively.

The Livestock Club appeals to ranchers who prefer to make contributions in kind. In such cases the value of the livestock donated determines the club level of the donor.

Certain benefits accompany gifts on various levels. For \$250 and above a member receives the option to purchase

season football tickets in the EE section—between the 40 yard lines—a gold Cowboy Joe Club blazer and a pocket patch, and a personalized membership plaque. In the Century Club and below the member receives the option to purchase a blazer and pocket patch. Parking space, coaches' letters and car decals are other benefits.

With a fulltime director, coaches and athletic personnel feel that contributions will increase this year.

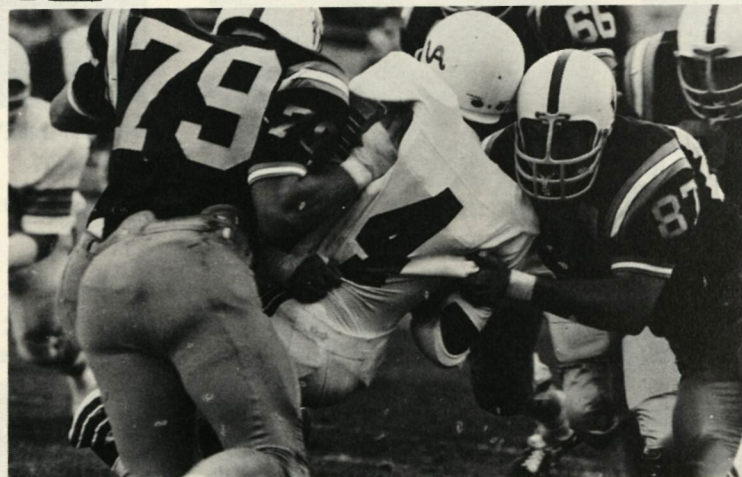

FIESTA'73

Riding the crest of fantastic enthusiasm and public support throughout Arizona, the Fiesta Bowl has provided college football fans with exciting post-season football.

Offense was the watchword in 1971 for the inaugural Fiesta Bowl as Arizona State and Florida State combined to score 83 points, until then the highest point total ever for a major bowl game. In a pulsating finish, Woody Green Scored with 34 seconds left to give the Sun Devils a come-from-behind victory, 45-38.

Fiesta '72 saw defending champion ASU challenged by the "giant-killing" Missouri Tigers, who had posted regular season victories over three bowl-bound teams—Notre Dame, Colorado and Iowa State. Offense again predominated as the Sun Devils and Tigers traded touchdowns until 84 points were registered on the scoreboard. A fourth quarter ASU surge gave the WAC champs a second consecutive Fiesta Bowl championship 49-35, before a stadium record-breaking sellout crowd of 51,318.

The immediate and startling success of the Fiesta Bowl has made an impressive impact on the collegiate football world. Every new bowl record has been challenged and broken. Even more noteworthy though, is the purpose of the Bowl in warning the youth of our nation of the dangers of drugs. By directing more than \$30,000 of game proceeds to the NCAA's fight against drug abuse through education, the Fiesta Bowl has helped tell youngsters to "Get High on Sports, Not Drugs."
