And I was just fascinated in all with this airplane.

But March of 64, I was terrified to death because I didn't want to have anything to do with airplanes or with flying because I was just completely terrified, in pure terror, 55 minutes. But this morning I have a very special hero in my life, that challenged me, to say to me, Nard, one of these days we will not be welcomed in your country. You got to go learn to do what I'm doing, so that you can come back and fly. And I thought he was joking, but deep in his heart, he was the one that started me to point me into missionary aviation. And this morning I want to say thank you to Uncle Bill Foster. I still call him Uncle Bill Foster. His grandson Patrick is in here. I'm going to embarrass him. Come on, Uncle Bill, you stand up.

This is the guy. When I think of the heroes of our lives, you think of those very special people in your own personal lives, and these are the heroes. Bill is one of those heroes that I've never forgotten because the bell still rings in my ear one of these days. And this morning I'm going to do that to you. But let me take you to my village and just think for one moment what it would feel like to be holding the Bible in your own heart language. It's a second revision or the first revision of the Bible in there with Genesis and Exodus. But I wanted to take you back to my village in there where today you either go by airplane, missionary airplane, or you go to the end of the road and travel 3 hours by canoe going upstream.

Ernie: [Speaks a different language] Hello to Jose. Thank you very much for allowing us to live and work in your home. I am sorry I have forgotten my Isnag, so I have to speak to all of you in English. I remember the long canoe trip from Apari to Cabugao and then from Cabugao to Dubaga. Elmer Wolfenden and I were accepted to live as tenants by Jose's father. We spent many hours learning Isnag words and doing linguistic research. I remember carrying bundles of grains of rice on Apole. After harvest, Elmer would get married, and Dick Rowe and I became partners. Unfortunately, I left the Philippines in 1958, never to return to Apayao. Dick stayed, learned Isnag and with Rudy Barland's help, translated the entire New Testament by 1982. It will be my joyful task to pray for you before our Heavenly Father. You can help pray for Dr. Rudy Barland as he translates the Old Testament into Isnag. God bless you as you do.

Dave: Greetings to my friends from Dubaga. I'm Dave Blood. I was with some of you quite a few years ago and really loved the place where you live and the people especially. privilege for me to fly in the first 500 copies of that book to Dubagat.

Community Chapel. Changed lives, fruit of God's word, all orchestrated by God to bring honor

and glory to Himself among the Isnags and all our visitors, government officials, Isnags young

and old, colleagues and team, all giving their praise to the Lord.

wife and my two sons to Manila there. June 27, I was doing one more flight, and then my wife

came on the radio, and we communicate by radio, and she says, I got to take your father, your

missionary dad, to the hospital because she's really sick.

over there and just exalting the God of heaven on earth and watching in awe. And I said, God,

grandkids, his grandkids, he called them my children were his grandsons. And I said, when God

speaks to us, I don't know how he speaks to you, but at the moment, there sitting there

controlling the helicopter right there.

You travel by canoe, 3 hours upstream, or you could fly in that little airplane.

I looked at his plate, and he had a whole chicken in there. And I looked at the chicken, I looked at him, I said, dad, is this all mine? And he said, son, that's all yours. I said, Wow. I thought I was in heaven. I've never had whole chicken in my life. And there I was. I said, Enjoy. In the village, you cut up all the chicken. You might get a little piece, but you share it with everybody. And there was my moment, and I remember that. And I said, Lord, I remember that restaurant. I was smiling. I said, please.

And the director said to him, Richard, we got to send you back to the US with Nard, Sandy, and the boys. And my dad said, No, I'm okay. I can stay here. The doctor said, no, you got to go. And then he said, are you firing me? And she said, in essence, I am. And tears is coming down his eyes because that was life to him. He gave the word to us. It's like God was saying to Joshua, hey, you got to take the word. You got to go take the promised land. That's what we promised. You got to go.

My man, there is an awesome life beyond this body. For me to live is Christ said Paul, and to die is gain. Sometimes I just wish that God would just come now. I mean, Jesus would just come now. I wish he would. And I was holding his hand and he said, Son, I've been faithful all these years. We started back in 1956, carrying me to death right in the village of Dubagat. It was the most difficult time for me, was to actually believe that he was going to go.

And the most difficult thing to do is when you love somebody in there and you really know that they have impacted your life, the most difficult thing is to be able to be the one to disconnect all the machines, because it says so on the wheel that says there was no machine that was going to be hooked up to this guy. And for over seven years, it haunted me in my life if I disconnected the machine. And the thought that came is that what if he lives? What if he's going to live for ten years, 15 years, not being able to function? Then what are you going to do? You can just take a pillow and suffocate them, right? It was hard, but the grace of God is so awesome because within 7 hours he was gone just like that.
