Message From The Chair

Dear Colleagues

This past week the cardiology community converged on Paris for the ESC Congress. The audience heard about some amazing science. While I was not physically present in Paris to learn, I was able to follow the congress proceedings through Twitter #ESCCongress. Social media has truly globalized and democratized education.

So here are the highlights from ESC:

- 1. The DAPA-HF trial showed a reduction in cardiovascular death and heart failure hospitalizations with the SGLT-2 inhibitor Dapagliflozin in 4744 study participants with heart failure across 20 countries. Interestingly the benefit was seen in both diabetic and non-diabetic patients. This data has been touted as paradigm shifting for the care of heart failure patients.
- 2. The COMPLETE trial showed that among patients with ST elevation myocardial infarction and multi-vessel disease undergoing primary PCI, complete revascularization (of culprit and non-culprit vessels) was superior to culprit artery only revascularization. It was also associated with a reduction in cardiovascular death/MI accomplished without an increase in major bleeding or contrast induced nephropathy.
- 3. HOPE-4 a large cluster randomized trial was presented and this showed that a comprehensive community package can be successfully implemented using non-physician health workers and lead to meaningful reduction in cardiovascular risk. This is likely the way forward in managing the burden of CVD in LMICs. Here is our editorial on the trial. https://doi.org/10.1016/S0140-6736(19)31995-6
- 4. Data from the PURE cohort gained media attention and showed that CV deaths have declined in high income countries with cancer now being a major cause of death, while globally and in middle and low income countries CVD is the leading cause of death.

In other news, congratulations to the faculty on showing how it's done in the Cricket match last night. I should come and cheer for the students more often....

Women in Global Health (WGH) Pakistan Chapter



WGH Pakistan Chapter was launched on 20th August 2019 in Islamabad aimed towards promoting gender equality at all levels of healthcare in Pakistan.

Women in Global Health (WGH) itself was launched in 2015 as a global movement with the mission to achieve gender equality in global health leadership. Today WGH has members from over 70 countries and established national chapters in Germany, USA, Sweden, Norway, and Somalia.

WGH Pakistan Chapter is the first to be launched in the region. Dr Roomi Aziz at P2impact led the Secretariat for the chapter, Dr Sania Nishtar was the patron to the 'chapter', as well as the keynote speaker and Zafar Mirza was the chief guest at the launch. We, at Aga Khan University, had prominent representation with Dr. Aneela Darbar, Ayesha Mian and Laila Ladak in attendance. Chair, Department of Medicine, Dr Zainab Samad and Chair Women in Medicine (WIM), Dr Sarah Nadeem were invited speakers. It was a great success where prominent figures like Dr Sania Nishtar, Dr Roomi Aziz, Dr Shabnam Sarfaraz, Dr Fauzia Tariq and Dr Tasleem Akhtar (among many others) discussed the significance of women supporting other women, effective communication, consultation, and collaboration. Dr Sania emphatically stated, "We are not looking at gender disparity at entry-level- It is at the highest echelon that there is a problem. That needs to be changed."

Dr Zainab Samad talked about her journey and our local efforts to support women in medicine. Dr Sarah Nadeem discussed premise of Women in Medicine- Pakistan, its objectives, the importance of advocating for oneself and one's mentees and working together to bring about gender equity in academic medicine.

Kudos to the entire WGH Team on pulling together a successful launch which was attended by 2 ministers, 34 speakers, 205 conversants and 1000 women in Global Health in Pakistan.

Faculty Development Workshop Series





On August 16, 2019, Dr. Muhammad Tariq and colleagues from Department for Educational Development conducted a three-hour workshop on "Learning in the Clinical Setting: Workplace Clinical Teaching Models". A total of 15 participants attended the interactive workshop which highlighted identification of various methods for improving clinical teaching in outpatient and inpatient settings that are SNAPPS, One-Minute Preceptor, Mini- CEX and MiPLAN. Participants shared their experiences as clinical teachers and engaged in group discussions followed by role play on different models of clinical teaching. The workshop concluded by providing feedback to participants and evaluation of their learning experiences.

Department of Medicine at National and International Forums



The South Asian Federation of Endocrine Societies (SAFES) biennial summit was held in Colombo, Sri Lanka in August 2019. SAFES is an organization representing Endocrine Societies of Bangladesh, India, Nepal, Pakistan and Sri Lanka. SAFES was conceived to address the challenges of the rising epidemic of diabetes and endocrine disorders faced by societies in South Asia. SAFES has focused on Gestational Diabetes Mellitus (SAFES recommendations and action plan launched in Lahore followed by its publication as a supplement in JPMA) and Diabetes prevention and healthy living (RUN for healthy life campaign, again launched in Lahore). SAFES regional role and efforts have helped define what it is to be an endocrinologist and identified the specialized training, education, and services that are needed in order to diagnose Diabetes and endocrine disorders and care for patients who suffer from them.


