#### TOWN WARRANT.

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

(L. S.) To the Inhabitants of the Town of Salisbury in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Salisbury on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
  - 3. To elect one selectman for three years.
  - 4. To elect one road agent or more.
- 5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to repair highways and bridges in said town.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for current maintenance expenses.
- 7. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for its state aid maintenance.
- 8. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as the law requires for state aid construction.

- 9. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Day celebration.
  - 10. To elect one Library trustee for three years.
- 11. To elect one trustee for trust fund for three years.
- 12. To hear reports of agents, auditors or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 13. To transact any other business that will legally come before said meeting.

#### SCHOOL REPORT.

The members of the school board in handing you their annual report wish to thank all citizens of Salisbury for their support during the past year.

The work accomplished this year in our schools shows that we are getting more for money expended by securing

more efficient teachers.

Quite a number of new text books have been added by the superintendent which brings our equipment up to date and equal to any in the state. Now that the new school law has become thoroughly established we may expect to get more for our share of the expense of the superintendent's salary owing to the fact that he will now have more time to spend in our school rooms and thus be of assistance to our teachers and benefit to the scholars.

A number of needed repairs have been made this year. The Kaustine toilets have been put in at the South Road school also at the Heights, and have proved a success in every way.

The same system is to be installed at Smith's Corner

school in the spring.

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

February 24, 1922.

To the School Board and Citizens of Salisbury School District:

Under the old system of supervision the districts of the union apportioned the superintendent's time among them. Under the law of 1919 they can make no such apportionment as the whole purpose of the law is to equalize school

privileges.

I have been interested, however, to study how my time has been spent among the several districts. While the superintendent does other work besides visiting schools, that part of his work is easiest to record and may form a fairly satisfactory basis for estimating how his entire time has been apportioned. The following table is for the two and one-half years of the existence of the supervisory union:

To equalize the results of the superintendent's work we may say that roughly the average visits per teacher should be about the same for the various districts. By this standard the table would indicate that Loudon has suffered somewhat, Canterbury slightly, and that Boscawen and Penacook have received somewhat more than their share of the superintendent's attention.

If the *time spent* in a town while visiting schools should be considered, the comparative compactness of the several districts enters into the problem. By such a standard, Penacook would seem to be the neglected district and Loudon would not be below the average. The table also roughly indicates the increasing time available for school room visiting now that the pioneer work in organization has been accomplished and the secretary is held responsible for a great amount of the office work.

Two of our three teachers are new to Salisbury this year. Both are young women of good personality and both considering their experience and training, are to be highly commended for their work. The efficiency of the South Road teacher is too well known to you to need any comment here. While it is becoming somewhat easier to fill vacancies than during the past few years, it is still hard to find and to keep good teachers for remote rural schools.

Great improvements have been made during the past two years at the South Road school and the Heights. If the Smith's Corner school is to remain open it will certainly be necessary to refinish the walls and ceilings both of the school room and the entry and to make the toilet much

more sanitary.

As to the curriculum—we are continuing to teach and to drill on reading, writing, arithmetic and spelling. In History we have added the study of Ancient History and English History in a simple form for immediate grades. In Physiology, less anatomy is taught and more pains are being taken to instill habits which tend towards a healthful life.

New geographies have been purchased for all the schools. Some new arithmetics have been supplied to replace old ones which are wearing out. A second set of language books has been furnished to the upper grades at South Road. Three new maps have been bought but we still need several more. Several new sets of readers have also been added.

Our expenditure for high school tuitions is increasing. The parents and neighbors of the nine young people listed elsewhere in this report will doubtless consider this a good investment. Of the seven pupils who graduated from our eight grade last year, four are attending high school but the

names of three of them do not appear in our list of high

school pupils as they have moved from town.

The attendance table shows an excellent percent of attendance at the South Road School and the Heights. The number of instances of tardiness seems unnecessarily large in all the schools. I wish the parents at the Heights and Smith's Corner might find time to encourage the teachers and children by visiting the schools oftener.

The children of country towns are certainly as worthy of buildings that are sanitary and comfortable as any children in the state. They also need teachers as well qualified as to education, training and maturity. If we desire to improve our schools in Salisbury, we must determine to pay salaries large enough to secure good teachers when vacancies occur, and when we have good teachers to keep them in their positions for several years. As a state aided district we can afford to pay higher salaries if it is found necessary to do so in order to maintain a satisfactory standard.
