WARRANT.

State of New Hampshire.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Milan, in the County of Coos, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are notified to meet at Androscoggin Hall, in said town, on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects, viz:

- 1st. To choose by ballot and major vote a Town Clerk.
- 2nd. To choose by ballot and major vote three Selectmen.
- 3rd. To choose by ballot and major vote a Town Treasurer.
- 4th. To choose Road Agents and all other necessary town officers, including Fish and Game Wardens.
- 5th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintainance of the poor and other necessary charges arising within the town.
- 6th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for laying out and maintaining and building highways and bridges.
- 7th. To raise such sum of money as may be necessary for maintaining State highway.
- 8th. To raise such sum of money as may be necessary for building State highway.
- 9th. To raise such sum of money as may be necessary for breaking roads during the winter of 1913 and 1914.
- 10th. To raise such sum of money as may be necessary for the support of schools.
- 11th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the purchase of books and paying other expenses of the Public Library.
- 12th. To choose a Library Trustee to serve three years.
- 13th. To raise such sum of money as may be necessary for the proper observance of Memorial day, and appropriate the same to the use of the Grand Army.
- 14th. To hear the reports of agents, committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Chairman's Report.

To the Citizens of Milan:

Another school year has closed, and according to custom, at the expiration of my term of office, I enjoy the privilege of making this report. As I look back over the long time during which I have been a member of the board of education, I gladly note some advancement. Then we were having about twenty-eight weeks for the most in any school in a year, and in the rural ones rarely that. From July, 1912, to July, 1913, we expect to have thirty-two in all. The regularity of attendance is greatly increased; tardiness is infrequent in most schools. Schoolhouses are in better condition. There are more maps, globes, dictionaries, pictures, and many other school room helps and beautifiers. The course of study is working very satisfactorily, not only in the village schools, but in most of the rural. Several of our young men and women have been graduated from high schools, and more will this year. We learn that they all have done excellent work, testifying to their thorough preparation in our schools. But yet the goal of our ambitions is not reached. We desire to see still more advancement along all these lines—a longer school year; no absence except for sickness or very necessary cause; hardwood floors and slate blackboards in every school room; well graded and shaded yards; more taking advantage of high school education. I could mention many other things desired, as work rooms for the boys, instruction and practice in cooking and sewing for the girls, such as is given in some rural schools of the state.

But you wish to hear of the work accomplished this year with your money.

Several teachers have been with us for some time, and we appreciate their excellent work. Some have just begun and have made good. We have lost some good ones, who had better offers. You know the successful ones, and we trust you will make their stay in town so agreeable they will wish to return.

The inside of the village school buildings has been thoroughly renovated, but at a greater expense than was estimated. One needless item, it seems, was the replacing of so many doors, destroyed by the rough-and-tumble play which has evidently been indulged in during the absence of the teacher. One room at West Milan had to be sheathed. The tin roof at Milan had to be gone over twice. Only with the greatest care can it be kept along.

There was a balance from the appropriation of 1911, which helped out on the deficiency this year.

Storm windows have been placed on the Milan Hill, the Jewett and the Hamlin schoolhouses.

The stove at Hodgdon hill was unsafe so we replaced with a larger and better one. Sanitary water coolers have been placed in each school room, children furnishing their own cups.

Another device for health's sake—pencil boards have been made for several schools. In this way each child uses only his own pencils, which the teacher cares for.

Sets of outline maps have been hung in the Hamlin and Milan Hill rooms, and we gladly note marked increase of interest in the study of geography. We need now sets of maps for the Jewett and Hodgdon Hill schools, and blackboard maps of our state for each school.

Expense for transportation has been less this year as some families have moved away. This winter we arranged with two parties to convey some scholars who lived at some distance on such days as it was imprudent for them to walk, and such days only. It seems the arrangement was abused, as many scholars walked nearly as far every day.

Please note carefully the tabular report of attendance, etc., at the close of this article. You will see that in five schools the per cent is above 95, but in the other three very different. Many causes have doubtless contributed to the latter; some we know were necessary, but we regret to say some were unnecessary and wilful. Surely every absence injures the whole school, but the great harm is to the absent one. If such children of the latter class fail to be promoted next June, do not lay the fault to the teacher or school board. Sometimes children who are present every day fail of promotion, not because we wish to keep them back, but because after careful consideration we believe it is for their good.

Compare, please, the number of perfect attendance scholars in each school with the number registered. We wish to congratulate those schools in which the proportion has been so large.

Can you tell from this page which schools have been the most wide-awake, advanced the most, and most thoroughly, had the best discipline? Can't you help to make all the schools equal? Occasional, or better, frequent visits to the school would show you what the teacher is trying to do, and if your boy or girl is cooperating with her. Just please get acquainted with your school and the teacher and see if you can't help the discouraged teacher, influence those annoying or indolent scholars to correct their ways, rather than listen to every tale that is told and hasten the ruining of that teacher's work.

Again vaccination broke into our schools, causing absence. You know the law is that all children shall be vaccinated (certain cases

exempted) before entering school. There must be a number of children to enter the first of April, so, parents, please attend to the matter and not wait for the Board of Health to take your child out of school or vaccinate after the term has begun.

The Milan Hill school buildings will need a thorough repairing. The room will need replastering or plaster board, a new floor; the buildings need raising and relaying of the underpinning, also a platform across the front, as well as painting inside and out. As you see, the people have petitioned for the enlargement of the lot. This seems necessary, as there has been no playground but the road. By acquiring this land, a wall will have to be removed and grading done. We feel you will gladly grant a liberal allowance for this worthy object. With this improvement all our school homes will compare favorably with the majority in the state.

In closing, allow me to express my sincere thanks for the uniform courtesy that has been shown me during my term of office. I know I have made mistakes for which I am truly sorry; but I trust my endeavors in behalf of your schools have not all been in vain. Let me urge you to ever let your motto be to keep your schools abreast of the times, and not be satisfied unless they are as good as the best. Taxes for the support of schools pay the best interest.
