




# Town Warrant.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Greenville, N. H., in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Town, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To hear the report of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money for the use of the town.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to decorate soldiers' graves.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the money necessary to secure state aid for the permanent improvement of highways.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the money necessary to secure state aid for repair of State road.

8. To are if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to replace building and machinery destroyed by fire last year, or see if the town desires to change location of building.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Library. 10. To see if the town will vote to install a system of public water supply, appoint a committee to look into the matter, get estimates and secure supply for same, or take any action on same and raise and appropriate any sum of money for same, or vote how same shall be financed and secured and installed, decide when the committee shall report to the town and the time when system shall be installed.

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11. To see what action the town will take in regard to street lights as the present contract expires this year. To appoint a committee to take into consideration the number of lights to have, the time the lights shall be lighted, and the cost of same and to make contract for a term of years, or take any action that may properly come under this article for the lighting of our streets.

12. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate to drain the south side of new cemetery.

13. To see if the town will vote to install an electric light near the residence of John J. Drinane on the street leading from High Street.

14. To see if the town will vote to give a rebate on taxes paid before a date to be decided upon at this meeting or take any action thereon.

# Fire Wards' Report.

The fire wards respectfully submit the following report:

During the past year the fire department has responded to a great many still alarms. The most disastrous fire of the year was the burning of Mr. Henry L. Newell's two-story house about two miles from the center of the town Feb. 12. The cause was a defective chimney.

There has been a great many chimney fires and quite a number forest fires. A fire on the Fitchburg road built for the purpose of burning rubbish was the cause of the burning of the tool house last July.

There was also a fire in the picker room of number six mill which did very little damage. The company during the year has been presented with small sums of money which have been deposited in The Mason Village Savings Bank, to be known as a relief fund for the firemen.

The company appeared on parade May 30th, Memorial Day by invitation of Herman Shedd Post G. A. R.



## School Board's Report.

To the Citizens of Greenville:

We herewith submit the following report-

The schools opened March 18, 1912 with three of the teachers who were engaged in September, Miss Keysar, Miss Harrison and Miss Parker; Miss Lyman having resigned to accept another position at the close of the fall term.

The same arrangement of grades that was adopted for the winter term has been continued throughout the year.

Miss Emma Southwick was reengaged as musical instructor and Mrs. Fannie Wheeler again took charge of the drawing at the opening of the fall term.

The upper and lower primary rooms closed on June 28th with pleasing exercises and exhibitions of the pupils' regular work. On June 21st the graduation exercises were held in the grammar room. They were well carried out and enjoyed by a large audience. Mr. C. A. Preston awarded diplomas to the following pupils:

During the summer vacation the school building was painted, and with the few necessary repairs in the interior, was in excellent condition for the opening of the fall term.

The regular yearly enumeration of children in Greenville between the ages of 5 and 16 was taken by truant officer Wm. H. Doonan as follows:

Sixty-five (65) of this number have not attended school on account of age or sickness.

At various times the subject of having a piano in the school building had been broached to the School Board. . . . . Public sentiment seeming to favor the move, the Board was encouraged to take the matter up, with the result that through Mr. W. L. Nutting of Nashua, N. H., a Norris & Hyde piano was placed in the school building September 17th, on very favorable terms.

October 25th a very successful entertainment was given in the Town Hall in charge of the teachers, to start a fund for the piano and \$70.00 was cleared.

The schools closed December 20th, for the winter vacation, with appropriate exercises.

Our proportion of expense of No. 6 school in Mason has been larger than in previous years, there being more Greenville children in that district.

The pupils in attendance at Appleton Academy for the spring term were 11: for the fall term 8 and for winter term 8.

The usual holidays have been observed: On Memorial Day the children gave a patriotic exercise at the school and then assisted in decorating the soldiers' graves. The teachers were given the usual time to attend the Teachers' Institute or to visit other schools as they preferred.

Morton's Advanced and Elementary Geographies that have been in the schools for some time were exchanged during the spring term for Tarr and McMurrays New Geographies, the edition used in our State Normal Schools.

New Reading books for the lower primary and books for supplementary reading in the upper primary have also been added.

A much needed addition to the equipment of the building has been the purchase of three dozen folding chairs and one desk chair.

During the fall term the question of improving the writing in the schools was agitated and after careful inquiry and observation, the Steadman System was introduced at the opening of the winter term. With a uniform system in all of our grades we feel certain that a marked improvement will be made in the penmanship of our pupils.

The schools closed February 28th, giving us a school year of 38 weeks.
