## TOWN WARRANT

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hudson, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town, on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at ten-thirty of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1st. To choose a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, three Selectmen, and all other necessary officers for the year ensuing.

2nd. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the maintenance of the poor, for the building and repairing of bridges, and other necessary charges arising in said Town for the ensuing year.

3rd. To see if the Town will vote to return to the Single District System in relation to the construction and repair of highways under the provisions of the Session Laws of 1893, additions thereto and amendments thereof and elect highway agents.

4th. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for repair of highways for the ensuing year.

5th. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the permanent improvement of highways in addition to what is now required by law to be raised and appropriated for the permanent improvement of highways under the provision of an act entitled, "An act to provide for State aid and for the expenditure of other public moneys in the permanent improvement of main highways throughout the State," passed by the New Hampshire General Court, January Session, 1905.

6th. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the benefit of the Public Library.

7th. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

8th. To see what provision the Town will vote to make in relation to furnishing the Town with a hearse for the ensuing year.

9th. To see if the Town will vote to observe "Old Home Week" and make appropriation therefor.

10th. To see if the Town will vote to raise $\$ 1,030$ for payment on the motor truck for fire purposes.

11th. To see if the Town will vote to have the Hudson Water Company put in any hydrants if they extend their pipes up Derry Street to E. R. Reed's, and up Ferry Street to Hudson Centre, or take any vote regarding rates for same, and the making of any contract with said Company.

12th. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of $\$ 100$ from Miss Sybil I. Gordon for the perpetual care of the Robert Gordon Cemetery Lot.

13th. To see if the Town will vote to approve the contract of the Selectmen with the Nashua Light, Heat \& Power Company for the term of five years, or take any vote relating thereto.

14th. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of $\$ 100$ from the Estate of Martha A. Steele for the perpetual care of her cemetery lot.

15th. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of $\$ 1000$, or more, left by the Will of Ellenette Holland, late of Somerville, Massachusetts, for the perpetual care of the James T. Page lot in the cemetery at said Hudson, New Hampshire.

## REPORT OF TRUSTEES

During the year just closed, since February 15, 1913, when the twentieth annual report of your Trustees was published with the town report, there have been added 270 books, which, with the 5284 at that time in the Library, make the present number of volumes, 5554 .

Dr. Alfred K. Hills and his venerable relation, Mrs. Mary Creutzborg, have continued to furnish the library with a generous supply of new books, and have given 246 of the 270 .

The numerous patrons of the Library, and the citizens of Hudson generally, greatly appreciate this continued generosity and good will so liberally bestowed in such a practical and useful manner by the donors.

The third supplementary catalog, containing a correct list of all the books added to the library by gift or purchase, 985 in number, from June 10, 1910 to November 1, 1913, has recently been published by the Trustees. This supplementary catalog is at the library and may be had of the librarian at the nominal price of ten cents.

The citizens of Hudson and other friends of the library have continued to furnish gratuitiously a large supply of our best magazines and other periodicals of which the following is a partial list, with the names of the donors.

This large number, among which are many of the most popular and useful periodicals published, contributed free of expense to the Town, are most thankfully received.

They are very extensively read by a large number of the patrons of the library, and add materially to its usefulness.

The monthly average of the books loaned, as appears by the report of the librarian, has been 506.5 , with a total number for the year of 6078 , an increase from the number of the preceding year of 962 . This is the record year in the history of the library.

## SCHOOL REPORT

## To the Citizens of the School District:

We ask you to give careful attention to the report of the superintendent. The fact is once more emphasized that the amount of money received by our district from the state depends largely upon the average attendance of our school children.

If a child is permitted or encouraged to absent himself from school without sufficient reason for such action, not only is he the loser by reason of the unfortunate break in his school work, but every other child in the district is a loser by reason of the climinution in the amount of the state aid granted to us.

We also call your attention to the article in the warrant for the annual meeting of the district relating to the making of contracts with high schools or academies for furnishing instruction to our scholars.

If such contracts are made, it will be lawful for the district to pay the full amount of tuition instead of forty dollars as at present. Your Board recommends the adoption of this article.

During the summer a well was dug near No. 1 schoolhouse and it is hoped that an ample and satisfactory water supply has heen thereb, secured. The school buildings at No. 1 and No. 9 each received a coat of paint.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Hudson:
I respectfully call your attention to the statistical tables following this report. These tables demand your careful consideration for they show in almost every instance steady progress in the conduct of your schools.

## MEMBERSHIP

The average membership for the year ending June, 1913, increased from 170 to 193 thus giving us a little more money from the state. The percentage of attendance remained the same, 92 , which is very fair but not so high as is reported by the other towns in this supervisory district, Salem's per cent being 93 and Atkinson's 95 . Many very young children attend the Webster school with the result that the cold winter weather interrupts their attendance. The number of tardy marks, 482 an average of 2.7 per pupil is about the average for the state and would he satisfactory except for the large number reported from No. 9 school, which was 187 or $39 \%$ of the whole number in town. I am glad to report that the number of marks will be fewer for this year. Tardiness is largely a matter of habit and is usually confined to a few families.

Part of the money which the district receives from the state depend upon the average attendance. The higher the average the more money do we draw. Every day that a child is abient lowers the amount of money we re-
ceive. The state thus wisely puts a premium upon good attendance.

GRADUATES

14 pupils graduated last June, as follows: 4 from the Center school, 3 from No. 1 school and 7 from Webster school. Of these 7 entered Nashua High school.

## TEACHERS

Only two changes in teachers were made this year. Miss Russell decided to pursue her studies further and Miss Laura Joy of Hudson, a Nashua High School graduate, was appointed at No. 9 school. Miss Ellen T. Muldoon, a teacher who has been tried and proven her worth in town before attending Plymouth Normal School, was secured for the Webster Grammar School. This school has done excellent work under her instruction. The tone of the whole school has improved, and there is a spirit of work in the atmosphere. If we can keep our present efficient corps of teachers we need not fear for the progress of our schools.

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COMPULSORY ATTENDANCE AND PROHIBITED EMPLOYMENT
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Attention should be called to the amendment passed by the last General Court, to the child labor and attendance law. A child is now obliged to attend school all of the time schools are in session from eight years of age until sixteen years old, unless such child completes the prescribed course of study before the age of sixteen.

No child under sixteen can be employed at any time except as a domestic or on a farm, without holding labor certificate secured only from the superintendent of schools.

MUSIC

Miss Esther Weston refused a re-election as special teacher of music and it was decided to continue that subject under regular teachers, all of whom are capable of doing something in the work, and many of them especially equipped for it. At a teacher's meeting the work in music outlined in the State program of studies and used at the Plymouth Normal School, was explained and elaborated by Miss Muldoon, with the idea that the teaching of the subject might be standardized and made uniform. I think that we can feel that our work in music compares favorably with that of similar districts in the state.

## TEXT BOOKS

An outline course in Civil Government was worked out by your superintendent and placed in the hands of the grammar grade teachers. The town history, a copy of which was presented to each school, fits nicely into this work. A change was made in arithmetics, not because the old books were obsolete, but because they were worn out. The same books as are used in the schools of Nashua, Southworth-Stone, were adopted. New geographies have been introduced into the fifth and sixth grades and more copies purchased for the upper grades. A geographical reader has been introduced into the upper grades and considerable reading material added elsewhere. Most of our text books are now in fair condition, but some additions in reading and a possible change in the language book ought to be made next year. Teachers have been urged to encourage more home reading and a wider use of the Town library. This library should be brought into more direct contact with the pupils of the "outside" schools.

Thanks should be given to Mr. Herman McCoy, of

Hudson Center, for his gift of an excellent picture of the battle of Gettysburg to the Center grammar school. Incidentally I might remark that I can see the good work being done by this Boy Scout Master, reflected in the conduct of the boys at the school.

I would urge other patriotic citizens to emulate Mr. McCoy's example and present works of art to our schools. Under the present financial condition of the town we feel that every cent of the school money should be spent on the essentials and the walls of our rooms and corridors need beautifying. Bequests are often made to private institutions but how seldom to the public schools, whose aim is to educate all the children of all the people.

As a public servant your superintendent realizes that his position is no sinecure, but a few helpful and uplifting words dropped from time to time, have made his work as pleasant as he could reasonably expect. He takes occasion to thank the School Board and all others who have helped to hold up his hands.
