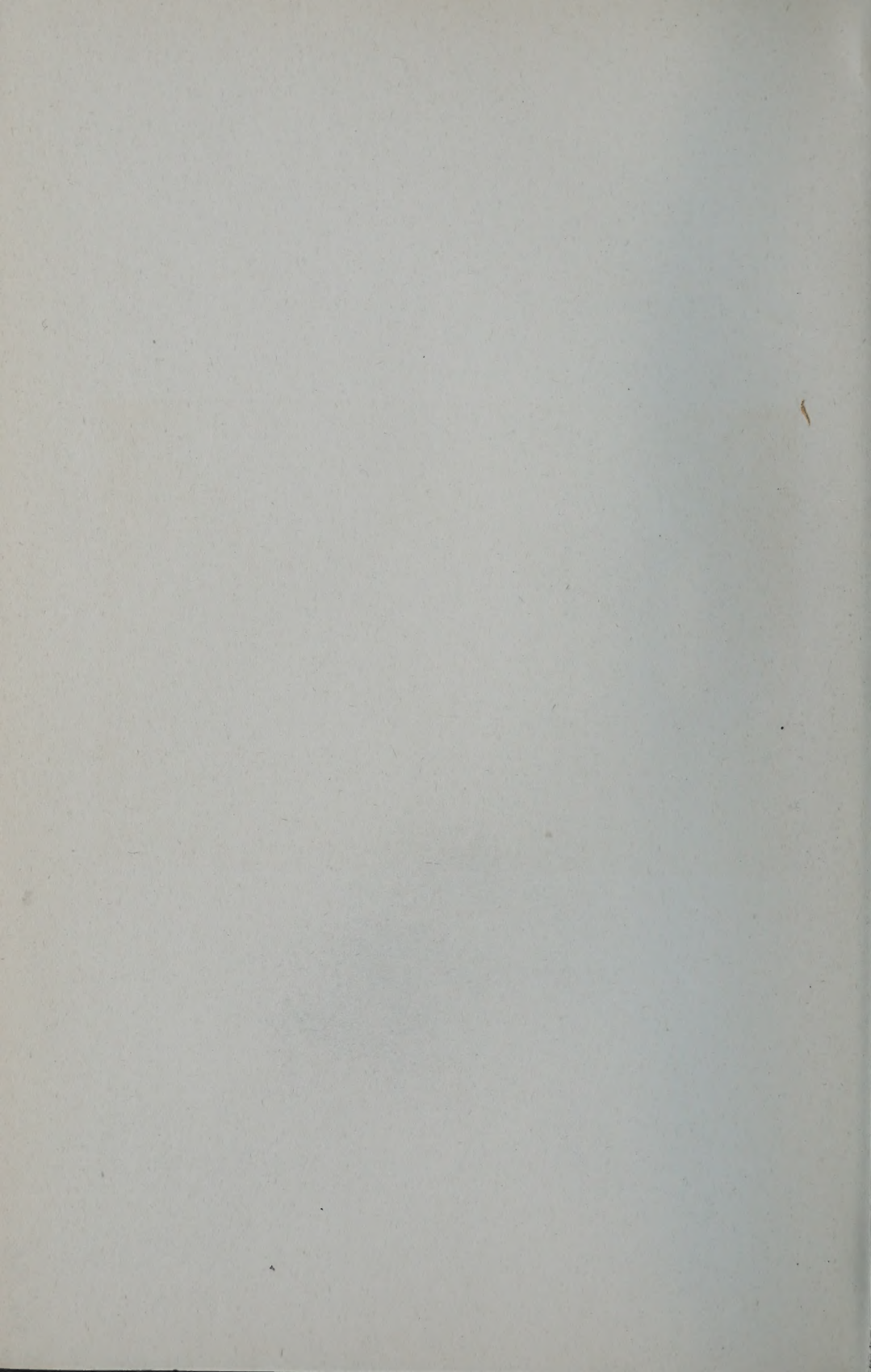

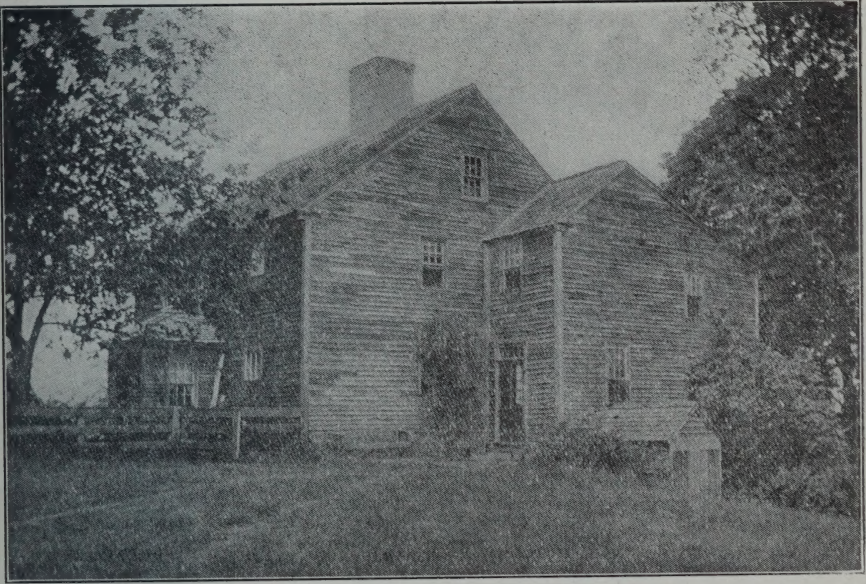

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hudson, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Hudson on Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of March next, at Ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid Construction of Roads and raise and appropriate money for the same.
4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Maintenance and Improvement of Town Roads.
5. To see if the Town will vote to readjust the wages of Town laborers or take any action relating thereto. (By Petition).
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as shall be necessary for the completion of the work authorized by vote of the Town under Article No. 23 of the Town Warrant of 1923 upon petition of David Selvis and others.

7. To see if the Town will vote to improve Gloria Ave. and raise and appropriate money for the same upon petition of David Selvis and others.

7-A. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to widen and otherwise improve the Road from the Benson Farm easterly to the Pelham Line, by petition of Mary Bickford and others.

8. To see if the Town will vote to improve Riverside Ave., Porter Ave. and River Ave., and raise and appropriate money for the same upon petition of Wm. Allison and others.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote and appropriate for the permanent construction of sidewalks.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900.00) for the purpose of purchasing a new truck for the Highway Department.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the construction of a bridge over Stearn's Brook on the Litchfield Road.

12. To see if the Town will vote to improve Kenyon St. at Kenyon Terrace and raise and appropriate money for the same upon petition of Geo. Monier and others.

13. To see if the Town will vote to collect ashes and rubbish within one mile of that portion of Hudson, known as Hudson Bridge or any portion of the town beyond this limit so decided by the Selectmen and raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) for the same upon petition of Elgin L. McCoy and others.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Maintenance of the Police Department.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Fire Department.

16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of the Bi-Centennial Celebration.

18. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee of five to investigate the advisability of adopting a Zoning System for the Town of Hudson and report their recommendations at the next Annual Town Meeting.

19. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

20. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to pledge the credit of the Town in anticipation of Taxes.

21. To see if the Town will vote to accept numerous bequests as Trust Funds, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the various cemetery lots.

Report of School Board

To the Citizens of Hudson:

Your School Board in submitting this Report of the past year and the Budget for 1933-1934 have endeavored to keep in mind the present conditions of the country.

The City of Nashua in increasing the Tuition of High School Pupils to \$125.00 per year and the larger number of pupils have made our tuition payments about \$14,000.00. We have just been notified that this will be cut to \$110.00 per pupil for next year. There are only thirteen pupils in the senior class to graduate this year and we expect about fifty pupils in the entering class next fall. So that if all attend that have expressed their intention of entering the 9th Grade we will have about 150 pupils attending High Schools or Academies for whom the district will be liable.

This large number caused us to make a very thorough study of conditions. We find that there have been many changes in the 9th Grade work and that by making certain minor changes in the building that the 9th Grade can be taken care of at the Webster building and a substantial saving in costs can be made. Superintendent's report will give more detail of this plan.

Substantial savings have been made in transportation costs, and the mild winter has helped in the amount of fuel and janitor service.

The per pupil cost for the last year was \$60.40 against \$61.62 the year before. The Hudson cost is the 11th lowest in the State out of about 250 districts reporting.

The enrollment in Webster School during the last two years has shown a marked decrease in the number of pupils starting in Grade I, but at the same time there has been an increase in the number of pupils in the upper grades.

Two years ago, there were 72 pupils enrolled in Grade I, last year there were 54 pupils enrolled in Grade I, and this year there are but 42 with a prospect of less than 35 for next year.

Where it was necessary to have an over-flow for the first and second grades two years ago, it is going to be possible next year to handle each grade in a single room.

However, it is still necessary to have a separate room for the surplus over 40, of the pupils in grades 3—4—and 6.

First Year High School in Hudson

Partially because of an increase in the cost of tuition in Nashua High School and partially because of the convenience to pupils living in Hudson and attending the 9th grade, in co-operation with the School Board, we have figured out a plan whereby the 9th grade can be conducted in the present Webster School Building.

This plan, if put into operation, would call for a full day at school for those pupils in grade 9. We feel this will add to their educational facilities two or three study periods each day, during which time they can complete a large part of their daily assignments.

Another advantage would be the convenience of attending school at the Webster Building, instead of the long walk to Nashua High School.

All of the courses which are given to the first year High School, or grade 9, at Nashua High School, will be given in the 9th grade at the Webster School.

After successfully completing 9th grade in Hudson, pupils will be admitted in good standing in their regular courses at Nashua High School.

At the present time there are 50 pupils from Hudson attending the 9th grade in Nashua.

According to available figures, there will be between 50 and 60 pupils in Hudson to attend the 9th grade next year.

If the 9th grade is established in Hudson, and there are 50 pupils, the net saving to the town will be between \$1,700 and \$2,000. If there are 60 pupils in the 9th grade, the net saving will be between \$2,700 and \$3,000.

I feel that the same efficient instruction can, and will be given in the 9th grade which we are now giving in the 7th and 8th, and which has enabled the pupils who graduated from the Webster School, to make such good records in Nashua High School.

Should Nashua decide in the near future to operate on the 6--3--3 plan as voted two years ago and postponed because of the depression, then, with the 9th grade in Hudson, our organization would be on the same basis as that of Nashua. Pupils from Hudson would enter the 10th grade in Nashua, on the same basis as the pupils from the Junior High in Nashua would enter the Senior High.

There were no changes in the teaching staff at the Webster School at the beginning of the fall term in September. The enrollment in grades seven and eight this year was larger than in previous years. After operating for two weeks with 54 pupils in some classes and 62 in other classes it was decided to employ a part time teacher to permit the dividing of these larger classes. Miss Virginia Dunlap of Nashua was secured for this position.

In October, Miss Frances Lucien of Hudson was employed for the 3rd grade to take the position which was made vacant by the resignation of Mrs. Elizabeth Racine.

Electric lights were installed in the portable at the Webster Building during the summer months. This greatly facilitates the work of the pupils on dark days.

The number of pupils to a teacher in Hudson is extremely large, being on an average of 40 or more. Even with this heavy load the teachers are continuing the same efficient and effective work and instruction which has characterized their success in the past.

Last year, it was planned to close school No. 1, for the present year and transport those pupils to the Webster School. Last September, on checking up the number of pupils in the south part of the town, it was discovered that there were more children in that section than could be conveniently accommodated at the Webster School. No. 1 school is being maintained this year with an enrollment of about 25 pupils.

Due to the large decrease in the number of pupils in the lower grades, at the Webster Building, the matter of closing No. 1 school for next year is being considered, and the present prospects of being able to do this seem more certain than it has in the past.

The Webster School Parent Teachers' Organization, has taken keen interest in the activities of the Webster School during the last year, and through the activities and programs of the organization, the parents have become better acquainted with the school work, and a better spirit of co-operation between the school and the home has been effected.

The parents are urged to visit school whenever possible and inspect the actual work which is being accomplished by their children.

Report of School Nurse

To the School Board and Citizens of Hudson:

I hereby submit the following report as school nurse for the year February, 1932—February, 1933:

A dental clinic is being conducted by a Nashua dentist each week. Donations by the Webster Teachers' Association and the Parent Teachers' Association have made possible dental care for a number of children who could not have otherwise received it.

In May, the hearing of all children above the first grade was tested with the Audiometer.

In June, a pre-school clinic was conducted by a physician, to discover defects, and thus, give to parents the opportunity to have these defects corrected before the children entered school.

In November, an eye clinic was conducted by an optometrist.

In December, 139 children were examined at the annual clinic by Dr. Robert Kerr. Of the pupils examined, a larger per cent. than in previous years showed signs of undernourishment.

The Community Council of Nashua have extended the services of its various clinics to the children of Hudson and children have been examined at these clinics.

The generosity of interested citizens and the Community Club has made it possible to provide free milk, hot lunches, and Cod Liver Oil for a number of needy children.

The generosity of interested mothers has made it possible to supply hot cocoa or soup at noon for all the children at the Hudson Center School.

Milk at recess and a hot dish at noon has proved beneficial to the pupils who have availed themselves of this advantage at the Webster School.

Glasses for two children, and braces for one were given by the Parent Teachers' Association and the Fortnightly Club.

The school in co-operation with the other organizations of Hudson, donated and distributed about 60 baskets to needy families at Thanksgiving, and a smaller number at Christmas.

The girls of Grade 7 and 8 in co-operation with the Fortnightly Club, the Red Cross, and interested women of Hudson, have made in the sewing room, from Red Cross cloth, several garments for needy children.

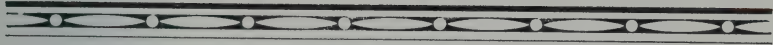
There have been no contagious diseases this year, with the exception of seven cases of mumps. Few pediculosis and no skin diseases have been in evidence this year.

School attendance has been good this year with the exception of the time during the cold and grippe epidemic. This has been largely due to the interest of the teachers in stressing health habits and to the co-operation of the parents.

I wish to thank all who have in any way helped, and manifested an interest in the health and welfare of the children.
