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

Conferring of Honorary Degrees

Joanne Berger-Sweeney

LLOYD ALEXANDER LEWIS JR. Trinity Class of 1969 Doctor of Divinity

As the first African American from your hometown of Alexandria, Virginia, to be ordained to the priesthood of the Episcopal Church, for 50 years you have exercised your calling as a preacher, a teacher, a pastor, and a distinguished scholar. This has brought you back to Trinity College to be recognized for a lifetime of leadership in the Episcopal Church.

Your vocations as a priest and scholar are confirmed by the impressive résumé of your work. You have represented the Episcopal Church as a member of the Programme for Theological Education of the World Council of Churches in Prague, Czech Republic, and you have served as a member of the General Board of Examining Chaplains of the Episcopal Church, which annually writes, administers, and evaluates the national General Ordination Examination for all the church's candidates for ordination.

Your long list of accomplishments includes an academic record of which the college is proud to be a part. As one of three classics majors in your Trinity graduating class, you learned the languages of Plato and Catullus, which you would pass on to generations of your students who would learn the thought of Saint Paul and Saint Augustine.

In the preaching in this college's Chapel during your undergraduate years, you were challenged by the theology of Howard Thurman, John Meyendorff, and Abraham Heschel. At the same time in Hartford's North End, during a turbulent time in America's and Hartford's history, you found a second home in a small yet dynamic Black Episcopal parish. There you learned the values of equity, inclusion, pluralism, and bold leadership, which are hallmarks of Trinity's own values. You would return to that same parish when you were in graduate school to serve as an assistant priest.

In 1985, Yale University conferred on you a Ph.D. in New Testament studies. Your scholarly specializations have included biblical exegesis, Pauline literature and theology, the social world of the New Testament, first-century slavery, African American hermeneutics, and the theological and social implications of baptism.

Concurrent with your teaching, you have served parishes in Brooklyn and Garden City, New York; in Hartford and New Haven, Connecticut; and in Washington, D.C.

You joined the Virginia Theological Seminary faculty in 1978 as an assistant, then associate, professor. In 1991, you became dean of George Mercer Jr. Memorial School of Theology and bishop's deputy for education in the Episcopal Diocese of Long Island. In 2000, you returned to Virginia Seminary and classroom teaching. You were named the Molly Laird Downs Professor of New Testament, a position you held until your retirement in 2012.

In your writings, you have demonstrated significant connections between biblical scholarship and contemporary society. Deservedly and unsurprisingly, you are a member of Alexandria's African American Hall of Fame.

As a Trinity alumnus, you have remained a loyal supporter of the college, serving on the committee that planned the Class of 1969's 50th Reunion. You also were the chosen preacher at the 75th anniversary celebration of the dedication of the Trinity College Chapel.

In recognition of your distinguished career in the Episcopal Church and your devotion to a more just society in the world around us, I have the honor of presenting you, Lloyd Alexander Lewis Jr., for the degree of Doctor of Divinity, *honoris causa*.

CORNELIA PARSONS THORNBURGH Trinity Class of 1980 Doctor of Humane Letters

Through your service as a longtime guardian and stalwart supporter of Trinity College, you have helped guide the institution into the future. You expertly kept the college moving forward through your 17 years as a dedicated member of the Board of Trustees—seven of those years as chair—and continue to do so today, earning the admiration of all in the college community.

About a decade after joining Trinity's board in 2004, you served as chair of the Presidential Search Committee that brought the first female president to the college in 2014. That same year, you became the first female chair of the board. It is in this role that you served as an ex officio member of all committees and subcommittees of the board.

Through your strategic and humanitarian counsel, alongside your philanthropy, you have made enormous contributions to the college and, in general, to higher education that have paved a path for others to emulate. In addition to your board membership, you have devotedly served the college as a founder of the newly created Marjorie Butcher Circle, a leadership philanthropy group of alumnae; as co-chair of the Charter Committee for Building Community; as a tri-chair of the college's capital campaign to raise \$350 million; and as a member of the Board of Fellows. You also were one of the creators of and now serve as a member of the Founders Council of the Women's Leadership Council, and you are a member of the Elms Society.

In 2010, you were the first alumna to be awarded The Eigenbrodt Cup, one of the greatest honors that can be bestowed upon a graduate, given in recognition of your prominence and your unusual and significant service to Trinity. In 2013, in celebration of your cumulative lifetime giving, you and your husband, Richard E. Thornburgh, were included on Trinity's Wall of Honor, which recognizes those whose philanthropy has had a profound impact at the college. In 2020, you were named one of Trinity's 50 for the Next 50, which—in celebration of 50 years of coeducation at the college—honored 50 women who will have a lasting impact on the next 50 years at Trinity.

Your Bantam spirit is as much alive today as it was when you graduated from the college in 1980, earning a B.A. in political science, followed by an M.B.A. from Columbia University. Your professional work history includes serving as chair of the Advisory Board at New York-based Eachwin Capital, as a vice president at advertising agency J. Walter Thompson, and as a financial analyst at The First Boston Corporation.

Your dedication to serving others goes far beyond the college. You are a former chair of the board for Convent of the Sacred Heart, a pre-K–12 independent school for girls in New York City. There you co-chaired a \$75 million campaign that supported the construction of a second campus in Manhattan that houses a 50,000-square-foot athletic facility. You also are the current board chair, as well as former board secretary and former advancement committee head, of The Lord's Place, an organization committed to breaking the cycle of homelessness in Southeastern Florida; you focus your efforts there on that agency's first-ever \$20 million capital campaign and the creation of a 25,000-square-foot programming center in West Palm Beach. You also lend your expertise to the Town of Palm Beach United Way Allocations Committee. In the past, you served as a trustee of the American Ballet Theatre and the Zurich International School.

In recognition of your tremendous philanthropy and achievements in service to the college and other deserving organizations, I have the honor of presenting you, Cornelia Parsons Thornburgh, known to Bantams as "Cornie," for the degree of Doctor of Humane Letters, *honoris causa*.

RAJA CHANGEZ SULTAN Trinity Class of 1972 Doctor of Fine Arts

Your father, a kind-hearted man not defined by material wealth but a passion for a free and fair South Asia, introduced you to the arts with the gift of poetry by Sir Allama Mohammad Iqbal, a Pakistani writer, philosopher, and politician. Iqbal's poetry in the Urdu language is considered among the greatest of the 20th century and helped inspire you to lead a life of meaning.

As one of Pakistan's most prolific creatives—a painter and poet of equal stature—you can trace your interest in painting to 1967, when, after completing education in Pakistan and England, you arrived on the Trinity College campus. It was 'neath the elms that you penned your first poem, "The Mirror." Sitting in the cafeteria the next day, Trinity English Professor Hugh Ogden read your poem with the encouraging instruction to keep writing. Taking his advice, you have forged an intellectual journey where your internationally renowned poems and paintings have garnered unquestioned universal appeal.

After earning a B.S. in psychology from Trinity in 1972, you completed two master's degrees, one in journalism and the other in creative writing and painting, at Columbia University, where you were awarded the coveted Henry N. Taylor Award in the graduate school of journalism as its top foreign student.

Following your service to the United Nations and working for the World Health Organization in Geneva, you and your wife returned to Pakistan, where you worked in the tourism sector for 25 years, holding senior-level positions for the Pakistan Tourism Development Corporation. You were then appointed director general for the Pakistan National Council of the Arts in Islamabad. In this role, you continued to paint, write, and inspire while helping advance the work of artists, thinkers, writers, and the visual and performing arts in Pakistan.

Your career spans more than 50 years with more than 50 solo exhibitions and group shows to your credit. Inspired by your countless works of written poetry, your paintings have been exhibited extensively in Austria, England, Switzerland, Oman, and Pakistan. As you are an eternal optimist, your paintings have transcended boundaries, real as objects themselves, and your poems are natural and erudite. Rooted in expressionism and impressionism, your art allows another to interpret it the way it is seen, evident by several of your principal series, including *The Divided Self*, exploring the intricacies of the human psyche, and *The Himalayan Odyssey*, inspiring landscapes where dreams are endless.

Through diligent study and a relentless pursuit of your passions, you persevered in a country where power often was prioritized over wisdom, constraining the meaning of art and the hope of visionaries. You let individuality and your values, ideals, and moral character guide you to becoming one of Pakistan's most influential figures—even though you never sought or desired recognition, fame, or attention for your contributions, even today as Trinity bestows upon you this honor.

The college could not be prouder about how you gracefully allowed the medium of art to lead and inspire a generation. You express your values through words so eloquently written and on a canvas in a balanced approach that embodies the liberal arts and a joyful pursuit of learning and mastery.

In recognition of your distinguished career in the arts and for your devotion to a more just society for your home country and for the world, I have the honor of presenting you, Raja Changez Sultan, for the degree of Doctor of Fine Arts, *honoris causa*.

The Owen Morgan Mace

The mace, which precedes the president in academic processions and is a symbol of executive powers, was presented to Trinity in 1950 in memory of Owen Morgan, Class of 1906, who served his alma mater as a member of the Board of Fellows, as a trustee, and as treasurer of the college. Historically, maces were first used as weapons in warfare and later became a symbol of the sovereign and his power. One of the first known uses of a mace by an educational institution was at Cambridge University in the 13th century. Today a number of colleges use the mace as a symbol of authority and of the power invested in the president by the faculty and trustees. The Morgan Mace is made of ebony, signifying endurance; bronze, meaning power; and gold, symbolizing dignity and glory. It is 44 inches long and weighs 20 pounds. The fluted staff represents the various components of an enduring education. It is bound by a gold ribbon, inscribed with the names of every Trinity president. On the head, or urn, of the mace are six seals of the sources of life and growth of this college: the Great Seal of the United States; the Seal of the State of Connecticut; the Charter Oak; the original seal of the City of Hartford; the Washington Coat of Arms; and the seal of the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut. Surmounting the Gothic urn is the Trinity College seal crowned by an eagle about to take flight, symbolizing the freedom and power of an educated person.

The Presidential Collar

The collar, which is worn on ceremonial occasions, is the visible symbol of the president's high office and authority. The collar was presented to the college in 1953 by former President G. Keith Funston, Class of 1932, in memory of his grandmother, Maria Briggs Keith. The chain symbolically links modern higher education with the universities of yesteryear. The golden seal of the Trinity president hangs from the collar, which is fashioned of 20 replicas of the Trinity elms and seven silver seals: the six reproduced in the mace and the Trinity College seal superimposed on a triangle representing the religious foundations of the college crowned by a sun signifying enlightenment. In the lower corners of the triangle are the Book and a pair of student's hands extended to receive it, symbolizing the desire of youth to receive an education.

The Luther-Roosevelt Long Walk Inscription

The inscription on a stone in front of the Fuller Arch at Northam Towers commemorates the visit in June 1918 of former U.S. President Theodore Roosevelt, who delivered an address the night before Commencement and received an honorary degree at the ceremony.

The superstition holds that students who step on the stone may not graduate.

As the Commencement procession passes over the stone every year, graduating seniors make a point of deliberately stepping on it.

Taking the theme of his address from Old Testament scripture, Roosevelt commented on the emptiness of boasting and its prejudicial effect on the conduct of World War I. He cited a passage from 1 Kings 20:11, in which the King of Israel responds to a boasting warrior, "Let not him that girdeth on his harness boast himself as he that putteth it off." The passage's Latin translation is inscribed in the stone. Roosevelt indicated that, in his estimation, thoughtless exaggeration of Americans' might had reinforced the German will to pursue the war. He reminded the approximately 5,000 people in the audience that much work remained to be done and that the country had to gear itself up for the supreme effort. Less than a month later, Roosevelt's youngest son, Quentin, was shot down in aerial combat in France.
