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

Conferring of Honorary Degrees

JOANNE A. EPPS

Doctor of Laws

Presented by Randolph M. Lee '66, Associate Professor of Psychology and Director of the Counseling Center

You, JoAnne Epps, are a trailblazer, an advocate for social justice, a gifted teacher, and a role model to many. As dean of Temple University's Beasley School of Law, you have distinguished yourself as an advocate for legal education that emphasizes institutional responsiveness. Your commitment to curricular innovation has garnered significant praise, and in both 2013 and 2014, *National Jurist* magazine named you one of the 25 most influential people in legal education.

As a child growing up in the 1960s in suburban Philadelphia, you did not envision such a future. At the time, there were few women lawyers and even fewer black women in legal professions. Fortunately, a former high-school classmate who was studying at Trinity invited you to tour the campus. In the fall of 1969, you joined the College's first coeducational class. You count your time as a psychology major at Trinity among your fondest memories and say it is where you learned the importance of institutions in shaping people. You graduated in 1973.

At Yale Law School, you were one of just 10 black students in your class of 160 and have described that time as "very, very lonely." But you persevered and went on to serve for four years as deputy city attorney for the City of Los Angeles and five more as assistant U.S. attorney for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania.

In 1985, you began your academic career at Temple Law School as a visiting assistant professor. In 1989, you were appointed associate dean for academic affairs, and, in 2008, you were named dean of the law school. Recognized as a gifted teacher, you continue to inspire first-year law students each fall in Temple's "Litigation Basics" course.

Under your leadership, Temple Law School has received significant praise, particularly for its first-year experiential courses and nationally recognized clinical opportunities. It also has launched the Stephen and Sandra Sheller Center for Social Justice, which will introduce students to the roles lawyers can play in establishing access to civil justice.

Your involvement in social justice issues goes back to your days at Yale, when you were a national officer in the Black Law Students' Association. In recent years, you have counseled lawyers from some of the world's most war-torn areas, teaching advocacy skills to prosecutors at the United Nations International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda and training Sudanese lawyers representing victims of the Darfur crisis.

A champion for women and minorities in the legal profession, you received the 2014 Justice Sonia Sotomayor Diversity Award from the Philadelphia Bar Association. This February, U.S. Senator Robert P. Casey, Jr. honored you during Black History Month at the U.S. Senate, citing your passion for advancing opportunities for women through education and law.

A member of Trinity's Board of Trustees from 1988 to 1994, you chaired the Committee on Student Life and the Committee on the Board. In 1988, the College honored you with the Alumni Medal for Excellence. In 1999, you received Trinity's 175th Anniversary Award. Your many contributions to your alma mater include co-chairing the College's first all-black alumni gathering and mentoring future law students.

For your significant contributions to the legal profession, to legal education, and to your alma mater, I have the honor of presenting you, JoAnne A. Epps, for the degree of Doctor of Laws, honoris causa.

Jon A. REYNOLDS

Doctor of Humane Letters

Presented by Michael E. Lestz '68, Associate Professor of History

Jon Reynolds, though you experienced hardships that would break many, you never lost your direction. After seven years in North Vietnamese prison camps, you went on to distinguished careers in the military and the private sector. Friends describe you as a humble man of integrity.

Born and raised in Philadelphia, you were an engineering major at Trinity and a member of Alpha Chi Rho. You said the fraternity was central to your undergraduate life, and you have remained close to the friends you made during that time. Upon graduation in 1959, you obtained your commission via the U.S. Air Force ROTC.

Following pilot training, you were assigned to the 429th Tactical Fighter Squadron in New Mexico, where you participated in Cold War deployments, including the Cuban Missile Crisis in 1962. By the time you deployed to Vietnam in 1963, you were a seasoned pilot. As a forward air controller for the Vietnamese 22nd Infantry division in Kontum, you directed air strikes against Viet Cong forces. In 1965, you deployed to Thailand, flying F-105 fighter-bombers in strikes against North Vietnam. On November 28, 1965, you were shot down and captured; you spent more than seven years as a prisoner of war. During that time, your creed was to never give up, no matter how dim the situation.

Upon your repatriation in 1973, you chose to remain in the military and taught history at the U.S. Air Force Academy after receiving your master's degree from Duke University in 1975. You earned your Ph.D. from Duke in 1980. In 1982, you joined the Defense Intelligence Agency and studied Mandarin Chinese, and in 1984, you were assigned as air and defense attaché at the U.S. Embassy in Beijing, China, from 1984 to 1988. During that time, as the senior U.S. military representative in the People's Republic of China, you were responsible for establishing nearly \$1 billion in security assistance programs. You also were the first westerner in the modern era to fly a Chinese fighter aircraft.

You retired from the U.S. Air Force as a brigadier general in 1990. Your decorations included the Distinguished Service Medal, the Silver Star with Oak Leaf Cluster, the Legion of Merit, and the Distinguished Flying Cross.

After your retirement, you joined Raytheon Company as vice president for its International Technology Programs. Your first project was to destroy chemical weapons stored on Johnston Atoll. From 1993 to 2000, you and your wife, Emilee, lived in Beijing, where you were responsible for all of Raytheon's sales and operations in China, Hong Kong, and Mongolia.

Throughout the years, you have remained close to your alma mater, serving as a member of the National Alumni Association and a class secretary and sponsoring summer interns from Trinity's Engineering Department while you were with Raytheon China. You received an Alumni Achievement Award in 1973 – just months after you were released as a prisoner of war – and Trinity's 150th and 175th Anniversary Awards.

In recognition of your extraordinary service to your country, your exemplary career with Raytheon, and your dedication to Trinity, I have the honor of presenting you, Jon A. Reynolds, for the degree of Doctor of Humane Letters, *honoris causa*.

GEORGE ALLEN WEISS

Doctor of Humane Letters

Presented by Paul D. Assaiante, Paul D. Assaiante Associate Professor of Physical Education and Head Coach of Men's Squash and Men's Tennis

George Weiss, your belief in the transformative powers of education has created opportunities for thousands of at-risk children throughout the United States. In 1987, you founded Say Yes to Education when you boldly promised to send more than 100 Philadelphia schoolchildren to college if they graduated high school. Today, this nonprofit organization impacts 65,000 students in five cities, including Hartford.

You serve as chairman of Say Yes, which combines comprehensive support for students in grades kindergarten through 12 with the incentive of college scholarships to bridge the achievement gap between urban and suburban children.

In 1978, your success as a stockbroker led you to found George Weiss Associates, a money-management firm with offices in Hartford and New York. You currently are president of this firm and CEO of Weiss Multi-Strategy Advisers.

You know firsthand how education can change lives. The son of Jewish immigrants who fled Nazi Austria, you grew up poor in Massachusetts and began busing tables at age 11. You were working in a hotel coffee shop when a Boston University professor encouraged you to attend the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School of Business, where you graduated in 1965.

It was at Penn where you discovered your love of philanthropy. During your sophomore year, your fraternity hosted a Christmas party for 12 underprivileged boys. You befriended them, playing pool and basketball and listening to their stories of hardship. After working a few years on Wall Street, you returned to take them to lunch and learned that all 12, inspired by your friendship, had graduated high school. It was then that you made a vow to provide opportunities for underserved youth through education.

Along the way, you never forgot your pledge. In addition to founding and growing Say Yes, you have given most generously to the University of Pennsylvania, endowing professorships and scholarships and funding academic and athletic centers.

Your philanthropy is not limited to the realm of education. In response to a young relative's diagnosis, you founded the Orphan Disease Pathway Project, which partners with Penn Medicine to find cures and treatments for rare diseases.

Your generosity of spirit also is evident in your volunteer commitments: you are a trustee at Penn Medicine and a member of the Penn Medicine Executive Committee. In the past, you served as vice chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Pennsylvania and chair of its Development Committee. You also chaired the university's "Making History" campaign, which raised \$4.3 billion for Penn.

In recognition of your dedicated service to your alma mater, you received Penn's 1985 Alumni Award of Merit and an honorary doctor of laws degree in 2014. Other awards include honorary doctorates from Syracuse University, Lesley College, and Colby-Sawyer College, as well as the Cleveland E. Dodge Medal for distinguished service in education. You also are a life regent of the University of Hartford, which bestowed upon you its Medal for Distinguished Service in 1996.

In recognition of your exemplary educational philanthropy and your devotion to providing opportunities for at-risk youth, I have the honor of presenting you, George Allen Weiss, for the degree of Doctor of Humane Letters, *honoris causa*.

JAMES MORRIS LAWSON, JR.

Doctor of Divinity

Presented by Ellison Banks Findly, Scott M. Johnson '97 Distinguished Professor of Religion

The Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., called you the "leading theorist and strategist of nonviolence in the world." *TIME* magazine identified you as one of seven icons of the civil rights movement, paving the way for President Barack Obama's historic election. The Reverend James Morris Lawson, Jr., your contributions as a preacher, nonviolent strategist, teacher, and activist are far-reaching, and you continue to create positive change through your commitment to social justice and nonviolence.

The son and grandson of Methodist ministers, you received your preacher's license in 1949. You attended Baldwin-Wallace College, a Methodist college in Ohio. There you joined the Fellowship of Reconciliation, America's oldest interfaith peace organization, and continued your study of Gandhi.

A draft resister before the Korean War, you were sentenced to three years in prison for refusing to serve. Paroled after 13 months, you resumed your studies and graduated in 1952. You spent the next three years in Nagpur, India, where you served as a coach and campus minister at Hislop College and continued to study the principles of nonviolent resistance.

Upon returning to the United States, you enrolled at the Oberlin School of Theology in Ohio. On February 6, 1957, you and King shook hands for the first time and had a face-to-face encounter, where he urged you to move south to teach the principles of nonviolence. In answering his call, you not only changed your life but also helped to change race relations in America.

You dropped out of Oberlin and moved to Nashville, traveling around the South in crisis situations as field secretary for the Fellowship of Reconciliation, including counseling the Little Rock Nine. You were an architect of a plan to desegregate downtown Nashville, leading workshops to prepare participants for the nonviolent campaign. You and the Nashville students were lead supporters of the founding of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, you wrote its statement of purpose, and you delivered the keynote speech at the organization's founding meeting in April 1960. As a result of your leadership of those workshops on nonviolent strategy, the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of Vanderbilt Divinity School expelled you from the institution. You later completed your degree at Boston University.

During the 1960s, you were a mentor to King's Southern Christian Leadership Conference and a volunteer for campaigns in cities across the South. In 1968, while serving as pastor of Centenary Methodist Church in Memphis, you were chair of a strategy committee for 1,300 sanitation workers who went on strike in a successful campaign to address their grievances, which included dangerous working conditions, inadequate pay, and racial discrimination.

In 1974, you moved to Los Angeles to lead Holman United Methodist Church, serving as pastor until your retirement in 1999. You have continued to work for justice and civil rights for all people. You are a founder of the Clergy and Laity United for Economic Justice and Interfaith Communities for Justice and Peace, and you have served as a consultant for Soulforce, a group that works to end oppression of LGBTQI people.

In 2006-2007, Vanderbilt University, in an act of reconciliation, invited you back as a distinguished visiting professor and established the James M. Lawson Jr. Chair to build upon your legacy of nonviolent activism and leadership. During the last 15 years, you have served as a visiting lecturer at several institutions, including Harvard Divinity School and UCLA.

In recognition of your life's work as a leader for justice, peace, and equality, I have the honor of presenting you, the Reverend James Morris Lawson, Jr., for the degree of Doctor of Divinity, honoris causa.

The Academic Regalia

In 1895 a commission of leading American educators established the Intercollegiate Code pertaining to the academic costume. The color of the lining of the hood is that of the college or university conferring the degree. The edging of the hood and the tassel of the cap indicate the subject to which the degree pertains, in accordance with the following official designations for colleges and universities in the United States:

Trinity College differs from the above list because the colors of Trinity hoods were established prior to the formulation of the Code. Following are the colors of the academic hoods symbolizing the honorary degrees conferred by Trinity:

Doctor of Canon Law Crimson, lined with black

Doctor of Divinity Scarlet, lined with black

Doctor of Fine Arts
White, lined with white and
a red chevron

Doctor of Humane Letters Scarlet, lined with purple

Doctor of Letters
Scarlet, lined with russet brown

Doctor of Humanities
White, lined with dark crimson

Doctor of Laws Scarlet, lined with dark blue

Doctor of Music

White, lined with pink

Doctor of Sacred Theology Scarlet, lined with blue and a gold chevron

Doctor of Science

Black, lined with light blue

Master of Music

Black, lined with pink

The Owen Morgan Mace

The mace, which precedes the president in academic processions and is a symbol of his executive powers, was presented to Trinity in 1950 in memory of Owen Morgan, Class of 1906, who served his Alma Mater as a member of the Board of Fellows, as a Trustee, and as treasurer of the College. Historically, maces were first used as weapons in warfare and later became a symbol of the sovereign and his power. One of the first known uses of a mace by an educational institution was at Cambridge University in the thirteenth century. Today a number of colleges use the mace as a symbol of authority and of the power invested in the president by the faculty and trustees. The Morgan Mace is made of ebony, signifying endurance; bronze, meaning power; and gold, symbolizing dignity and glory. It is 44 inches long and weighs 20 pounds. The fluted staff represents the various components of an enduring education. It is bound by a gold ribbon, inscribed with the names of every Trinity president. On the head, or urn, of the mace are six seals of the sources of life and growth of this College: the Great Seal of the United States; the Seal of the State of Connecticut; the Charter Oak; the original seal of the City of Hartford; the Washington Coat of Arms; and the seal of the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut. Surmounting the Gothic urn is the Trinity College seal crowned by an eagle about to take flight, symbolizing the freedom and power of an educated person.

The Presidential Collar


The collar, which is worn on ceremonial occasions, is the visible symbol of the president's high office and authority. The collar was presented to the College in 1953 by former President G. Keith Funston, Class of 1932, in memory of his grandmother, Maria Briggs Keith. The chain symbolically links modern higher education with the universities of yesteryear. The golden seal of the Trinity President hangs from the collar which is fashioned of 20 replicas of the Trinity Elms and seven silver seals including the six reproduced in the mace, and the Trinity College seal superimposed on a triangle representing the religious foundations of the College crowned by a sun signifying enlightenment. In the lower corners of the triangle are the Book and a pair of student's hands extended to receive it, symbolizing the desire of youth to receive an education.
