When this man was an undergraduate at Trinity, Mr. President, he excelled among other things in chemistry and as a pitcher on our varsity baseball team. Ever since then, Mr. President, he has been pitching for old Trinity, steadily, devotedly. I shall omit the catalogue of his distinguished record as Junior Fellow, Alumni Trustee, and all the rest, and present to you this son of an alumnus, a man who served his country with honor in the field of battle, an actuary of distinction, an alumnus who is deeply devoted to his alma mater, Sydney Dillingham Pinney. Bind him closer to us by the deserved honor you are about to bestow upon him.

This physician, Mr. President, graduated from Trinity and the Yale Medical School with distinction which his later career has increased. He has served his country loyally — in the First World War as infantryman and in the Second World War as Colonel in the Medical Corps with distinguished service in India. I should need, Mr. President, the inspired knowledge of Hippocrates to enumerate in detail his contributions to medicine. He has practiced pediatrics in Philadelphia, has taught it in the University of Pennsylvania and has written many valuable scientific papers. I now present to you for Trinity's laurel a choice son, who because of his ability and service has recently been elected Dean of the School of Medicine of the University of Pennsylvania — John McKenney Mitchell.

Mr. President, when this man graduated from West Point its year book, *The Howitzer*, said of him, "His most promising characteristic is 'getting there.'" He "gets there" with such distinction in service that the Muse of History will forever sing of Bradley of Tunisia, Sicily, Normandy, the Bradley who

This alumnus, Mr. President, is worthy of our honor today because of the splendid performance of his Christian mission. His education at Trinity and the Virginia Theological Seminary sent him forth a faithful vicar of Christ. Then as chaplain and instructor at St. Andrew's School he guided and shaped the lives of his boys through Christian ideals. As rector now of St. Andrew's Church in Wilmington he is very successful in seeing to it that this city, which is well known for its corporations, stores its true treasures in Heaven. I therefore present to you this faithful servant of Christ, a loyal alumnus whose career is already deserving of the honor you are about to bestow upon him — John Ellis Large.

The career of this distinguished servant of Christ, Mr. President, brings to mind that old Latin motto, *to pray is to work*. Since the completion of his evangelical preparation he has been a hard working servant of Christ's Way and Truth and Life in many churches in many cities, in many important and high councils and positions of the Diocese of New York. Because he performed his duties and missions with faith and with distinction he was consecrated Bishop of New York. I therefore present to you this worthy alumnus of Hamilton, who combines piety with executive and literary ability, one well deserving of the Church, well deserving to be called one of our own, *honoris causa*—Charles Kendall Gilbert.
