

# REPORT ON THE CITIZEN'S CORPS

The 26 Citizen's Corps await the return of the delegates.

The Citizen Corps are extremely varied in the amount of work they have accomplished, and varied in the depth and enthusiasm with which they have addressed constitutional issues. The first thing the delegates should do, on returning home, is to meet with their Citizen Corps and find out how much help they can count on for the voter information effort in their area. In some areas the task of informing voters will fall completely on the delegates, in other areas they should have considerable help from the Citizen Corps.

Citizen Corps were established for 2 reasons.

(1) To involve those people who have a genuine interest in constitutional revision - giving them an opportunity to read an discuss material sent directly from the Convention

(2) To have informed people who can help delegates with the voter information efforts in their communities.

Attached is a list of all material that has been sent the Citizen's Corps and the names of the Chairmen of, Local Citizen's Corps, and the Executive Committee of the statewide Citizen Corps.
