### **COURSE AIM:**

This course in problems in directing will combine upcoming project-based work with readings on directing and programming. We will be observing and analyzing some projects in development, which will require some time spent in studio. We will also be applying readings and concepts to a selection of 'problem' scripts, contemporary and classical, some of which you can propose. Thematically, we will be working with the following:

#### COURSE OUTCOMES: By the end of the semester, you will demonstrate

- An ability to interpret, analyze, and conceptualize problematic scripts
- An appreciation of the heightened performance demands and staging/aesthetic possibilities of 'problem' plays which feature challenging staging elements
- A further understanding of performance project development
- An enhanced ability to approach programming, grant-writing and project proposal
- An ability to directorially re-envision or reinterpret a historical play through a contemporary staging lens
- A further understanding of the challenges of collaboration on designing 'problem' plays

### **REQUIRED TEXTS:**

<u>READINGS and SCRIPTS ON MOODLE</u> We will provide articles on Moodle by directors, on directing, on programming, and also a selection of challenging scripts for our discussion.

<u>ATTENDANCE</u>: As a graduate level directing course there are no un-excused absences. Unexcused absences drop the final grade a third of a letter and so on. Two late arrivals equal one absence.

### **OVERALL COURSE ASSIGMENTS / Criteria Grading Breakdown:**

Grades will be determined by attendance; intellectual, creative and technical process work; engagement; preparedness; and progress. Graded components are as follows:

Attendance and participation: 500 points – 50% of course total

Problem play proposal and concept, due in finals week: 500 points – 50% of course total.
