Warrant for the One Hundred and Thirty-eighth
Annual Town Meeting

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Northfield, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house in said town, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.

3 To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairing of highways and bridges.

4 To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for highways and appropriate money for the same.

5 To see if the town will vote to accept and adopt the reports of the town officers as printed.

6 To see how much money the town will vote to raise to defray the expenses of Memorial Day.

7 To see how much money the town will vote to raise for State Highway Maintenance.

8 To choose two trust fund trustees, one for two years, and one for three years.

9 To see if the town will vote to observe Old Day and appropriate money therefor. (By request.)

10 To see if the town will vote to repair or rebuild the sidewalk on the east side of Granite St. between Cofran Ave., so called, and Howard Ave., and raise and appropriate money for the same.

11 To see if the town will vote to repair or rebuild the Shedd road, so called, and appropriate money for the same.

12 To transact any business that may legally come before said meeting.

13 To choose a Delegate to the Constitutional Convention to be holden at Concord on the first Wednesday of June, next.

14 To see if the town will vote to extend with State aid, the gravel road on the Shaker road, or called, from the end of the present gravel road to the residence of Thomas R. Payson, and raise money for the same. (By petition.)

15 To see if the town will vote to repair and improve Elm St. from the Upper Bridge, so called, to the junction of Summer and Bay Streets and that necessary drainage be provided for both Summer and Bay Streets, and to order said improvements and repairs completed not later than July 1st, 1918, and to raise and appropriate the money for the same. (By petition.)

138th Town Meeting, 1918

At the one hundred and thirty-eighth annual meeting of the voters of the town of Northfield holden at the town house, in said town, March 12th, 1918.

The meeting was called to order and the warrant read by the moderator, E. R. Gale, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon. Before any articles in the warrant were acted upon, messages pertaining to war conditions were read from Governor Keyes, The Liberty Loan Committee of N. E., Federal Reserve Committee and Forestry Department of the State of New Hampshire. Mr. Swan also made patriotic remarks.

The articles of the warrant were disposed of as follows:

ART. I. FOR TOWN CLERK—Harold A. Woodward had 82 votes, and Harold A. Woodward having all the votes cast was, by the moderator, declared elected.

FOR TOWN TREASURER—Obe G. Morrison had 82 votes, and Obe G. Morrison having all the votes cast was; by the moderator, declared elected.

FOR SELECTMEN—Gawn E. Gorrell had 82 votes, Clarence W. Whicher had 82 votes, Walter B. Hill had 82 votes, and Gawn E. Gorrell, Clarence W. Whicher and Walter B. Hill having all the votes cast were, by the moderator, declared elected.

FOR ROAD AGENTS—William C. Sargent had 82 votes, Frank J. Marden had 82 votes, Clayton M. Rogers had 82 votes, and William C. Sargent, Frank J. Marden and Clayton M. Rogers having all the votes cast were, by the moderator, declared elected.

FOR TAX COLLECTOR—Arthur L. Page had 82 votes and Arthur L. Page having all the votes cast was, by a majority of 82, declared elected.

On motion of Mr. S. E. Smith it was voted to elect a non-partisan committee of four members, for one year, to be known as the Finance Committee. The duties of this committee are to consult with the Selectmen and analyze the proposed Budgett for the following year.

Committee Chosen—Chas. P. Herrick, Chairman, D. M. Page, Obe G. Morrison, J. A. Jaquith.

ART. II.—On motion of Mr. Fred Swan it was voted to raise and appropriate \$650 (six hundred and fifty dollars) to defray town charges.

ART. III.—On motion of Mr. Stanton Smith it was voted to raise and appropriate \$3,250 (three thousand two hundred and fifty dollars) for the repairing of highways and bridges.

ART. IV.—On motion of Mr. Charles Stevens it was voted to accept State aid for highways and to appropriate sufficient money for same.

ART. V.—On motion of Mr. Charles Stevens it was voted to accept and adopt the reports of the town officers as printed.

ART. VI.—On motion of Mr. Charles Herrick it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60 (sixty dollars) to defray the expenses of Memorial Day.

ART. VII.—On motion of Mr. Charles Herrick it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700 (seven hundred dollars) for State Highway Maintenance.

ART. VIII.—On motion of Mr. Gawn Gorrell the town clerk was instructed to cast one ballot for D. M. Page for Trust Fund Trustee for two years, and one ballot for E. J. Young for Trust Fund Trustee for three years.

Mr. Young declining the office and Mr. Scribner, the

present trustee, having moved out of town, the Selectmen appointed Mr. Elmer R. Gale to serve three years and Mr. Charles P. Herrick to serve one year.

ART. IX.—On motion of Mr. Stanton E. Smith it was voted that this article be laid on the table.

ART. X.—On motion of Mr. Charles P. Herrick it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 (three hundred dollars) in addition to the \$200 (two hundred dollars) raised last year, to rebuild the sidewalk on Granite Street.

ART. XI.—On motion of Mr. Charles P. Herrick it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 (three thousand dollars) to repair the Shedd road, so called.

ART. XII.—On motion of Mr. Stanton E. Smith it was voted that all future issues of the Town Reports are to contain records of business transacted at preceeding town meeting.

On moton of Mr. Charles Stevens it was voted to give the Selectmen authority to make loans, in anticipation of taxes, as may be necessary to carry on town business.

ART. XIII.—For delegate to the Constitutional Convention, Albert S. Carter had 63 votes, Byron Shaw had 1 vote, blanks, 15. Albert S. Carter having a majority of all votes cast was, by the moderator, declared elected.

ART. XIV.—On motion of Mr. Charles P. Herrick it was voted to accept State aid and raise sufficient money to extend the road to the residence of Thomas R. Payson.

ART. XV.—On motion of Mr. Charles P. Herrick it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum \$2,500 (two thousand five hundred dollars) to repair and improve road on Elm Street. \$500 (five hundred dollars) to be raised by taxation and \$2,000 (two thousand dollars) be hired by

the Selectmen.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Tilton Union School District:

I herewith submit to you and through you to the citizens of the district my fourth annual report as superintendent of schools.

The work of our schools this year has necessarily suffered because of the epidemic of influenza and the unprecedented amount of sickness during the winter which has materially effected our attendance especially in the lower grades. Our schools were closed four weeks during the height of the epidemic. This lost time we hope to make up by shortening the vacations and by keeping one week later in June.

Dr. J. B. Erskine, school medical inspector, made an examination of the school children in the fall. Dr. Erskine reported the general conditions found as remarkably good. To supplement the work of the school physician, Miss Mary E. Davis, the district nurse, has been appointed school nurse. Miss Davis assisted in the examination of the children. While the conditions have been such that she has had many demands on her time she has found opportunity to give us valuable service. I am confident that this arrangement will prove very beneficial. The school is bound to concern itself more and more with the physical welfare of the children and no one can be of more service in this important work than the school nurse.

The contract with Tilton Seminary was renewed this year and our pupils continue to have offered them full secondary school privileges free of expense to the parent. It is

unfortunate that this opportunity is not better appreciated by parents and children. As I have said before a large per cent. of those who complete the work of our eighth grades ought to pass to the Seminary as the natural thing and there continue their school life. Too many fail to do this.

Furthermore too many of those who enter drop out for one reason or an other. At the present time there are forty-two children from the Union district attending the Seminary.

The present enrollment in the schools is 340. There are 174 pupils from Northfield and 166 from Tilton. This shows no appreciable increase over last year. For the year ending in June the average membership was 324 and the average attendance was 305.

A class of thirty-six were granted certificates of graduation at the closing exercises on June 12. The exercises were held on the school lawn and were in the nature of a patriotic pageant.

But two changes have taken place in our teachers since last year. Miss Olive Duguid, who for several years successfully taught the first grade, resigned in June. Miss Florence E. Kilburn, a graduate North Adams (Mass.) Normal school was secured for the first grade. Mr. J. Allen Whipple, who had been principal for four years, resigned at the close of the spring term. Mrs. Katharine L. Sheehan, a teacher of training and experience, was chosen to fill this vacancy. Mrs. Sheehan has demonstrated her ability to fill this position successfully.

There has been an inevitable increase in the salaries paid our teachers. The minimum salary now paid teachers from grade one to seven is fourteen dollars per week, and the maximum salary eighteen dollars per week. Inasmuch as the school year is but thirty-six weeks in length this maxi-

mum pay is equivalent to only about \$12.50 for a full year of fifty-two weeks. Obviously this is small pay we are offering to those of whom we expect so much in general intelligence, training and character.

Miss Josephine Emery has continued her work as supervisor of drawing. She is now giving us one day each week instead of one day every other week as heretofore. In addition Miss Emery is giving a half day each week to the upper grade boys in wood work, and a half day to the girls in sewing. As there must necessarily be several divisions, one day of a special teacher's time is not enough. We ought

The fact has been forcibly brought to the attention of the American people that there is a large body of non-English speaking people in our country who know little or nothing of American institutions and ideals. "There is no one thing, so supremely essential to a Government such as ours, where decisions of such importance must be made by public opinion, as that every man and woman and child shall know one tongue, that each may speak to every other and that all may be informed." Our Federal Government has recognized the seriousness of this problem and has taken the initiative through the United States Bureau of Education in the work of finding a solution. Local state committees on Americanization have been appointed. The New Hampshire committee under the chairmanship of Gen. Frank Streeter is working jointly with the State Department of Public Instruction in the development of evening schools in the cities and larger towns. Our evening school at least to have two full days. Furthermore we need better facilities for this work. The providing of additional room for the manual training and household arts work which is now recognized as of large importance, is one of

our problems of the near future. In spite of our handicaps the work this year has been a success.

The appropriations made at the last district meeting were expected to met our expenses for the present fiscal year which does not end until August 31. Our necessary expenditures have been larger than was anticipated. However, we may be able to get through the year with our present balance of about \$4,700. Your attention is called to the estimated needs for another year. To meet these a somewhat larger appropriation must be made. \$400 is asked for to meet the expenses of the evening school. in Tilton was opened at the Union school building early in November. We have had a total enrollment of twenty. Twelve of these have been Albanians. This class of Albanians taught by Mrs. Sheehan has made excellent progress. The men have attended regularly, worked hard, and manifested an interest and appreciation very much to their credit.

In November Gov.-elect Bartlett appointed a committee to make a study of the educational system of the state. The legislature now has under consideration a bill which embodies the recommendations of this committee. The bill discloses a keen appreciation of present day needs and possibilities.

I wish to express to the school board and the teachers my appreciation of their co-operation during the year.

NORTHFIELD SCHOOL DISTRICT

Report of the School Board

We submit the following brief report and thank the voters and tax payers for the liberal appropriation for schools, without which the School Board would have been sorely handicapped in securing teachers.

All schools were closed in October for two weeks by the epidemic of influenza. The Bean Hill school was closed the second week in November, for the same reason, and not opened until after the Christmas vacation.

We have been able to retain Miss Colby at Oak Hill and Mrs. Fifield at the Center throughout the year. Miss Gile entered the State Normal School at Plymouth in September and Miss Maud Tilton of New Hampton was placed in charge of Bean Hill School. After teaching nine weeks she succumbed to influenza, and her untimely death was a shock to the community. After four weeks' vacation Miss Gile decided to take up the work there to the satisfaction of all concerned.

The fall term at the Tebbetts was taught by Miss Ida G. Parker who resigned at Christmas and this school has been placed in the capable hands of Mrs. Gertrude R. Stevens. The spring term at the Rand was taught by Miss Rose A. Keenan. The fall term by Miss Gladys Emerson who resigned in January and Mrs. Mae Gonyer, a teacher with training and experience, has been placed there.

The attendance has been good considering prevailing conditions.

The teachers and pupils responded heartily to the war garden campaign and products valued at nearly \$200 were harvested by our school children.

The war savings campaign also received the same loyal support and some schools have nearly \$50 to their credit in thrift stamps.

The out house at Oak Hill has been put in a sanitary condition and an appropriation will be asked for to do the

same thing at the Tebbetts school.
