Cardiovascular Omics: Results & Reflections from a Translational Science Career

Outstanding Women in Medicine OWIM 2021 virtual session was held on February 22nd at the Department of Medicine Grand Rounds. The OWIM series was launched to highlight achievements of extraordinary women who have contributed in the field of Medicine and have set examples in their respective domains. Dr Svati H. Shah was the 2021 OWIM speaker for the Department of Medicine. She is a Professor, Physician Scientist, Associate Dean of Genomics & Director of Precision Genomics Collaboratory in the Duke School of Medicine. She also serves as Vice-Chief of Translational Research & Director of the Adult Cardiovascular Genetics Clinic in the Division of Cardiology, Department of Medicine; Co-Director of Translational Research in the Duke Molecular Physiology Institute (DMPI); and a faculty member in the Duke Clinical Research Institute (DCRI).

It was a privilege to listen to Dr Svati Shah, who has clearly excelled and is breaking new barriers in discovering knowledge in a burgeoning area of science in one of the best universities in the world. During her talk she shared many important lessons around career growth especially for women. Starting with Thomas Edison's famous quote, "genius is one percent inspiration and ninety nine percent perspiration" she shared the story of her science as well as her career path. She urged the audience to be curious and not to lose sight when you decide to do something. She also shared examples of her own work, which includes discovering genetic and metabolic markers of cardiovascular disease and her collaboration with multiple universities and even companies such as Google and Verily to map human health. She ended her talk by urging everyone to be amazing, kind, happy and safe.





In-depth- featuring Dr Saira Bukhari By Maha Inam



While women make up almost half of all graduating medical school students and share equal representation in most specialties, they constitute less than 13% of all cardiologists. Dr. Saira Bukhari, Assistant Professor, Program Director and Interim Section Head of Cardiology at the Aga Khan University Hospital (AKUH), is playing her part in breaking the glass ceiling. Dr. Bukhari's tenure with AKUH began in 2004; after completing her Internal Medicine residency, she

She now aims to pursue training in Cardiac Computed Tomography (CT). As a successful recipient of the Commonwealth Scholarship in collaboration with AKUH, Dr. Bukhari has also pursued an MSc in Epidemiology from the University of London, one of the top three programs in the world.

Dr. Bukhari is part of the organizing team of PULSE, an annual Cardiovascular Conference held by the Department of Cardiology at AKUH. Despite facing numerous logistical obstacles due to the restrictions brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic, all team members redirected their focus towards conducting a virtual event in 2021. The conference brought together national and international leaders with a shared goal to reduce the burden of cardiovascular diseases in our population. With the help of dedicated teamwork and support, PULSE was a resounding success and represents the triumph of the Cardiology Section. "The most rewarding events are those where everyone pitches in," says Dr. Bukhari, taking great pride in the group effort displayed by all. pursued a Fellowship in Cardiology and was subsequently inducted as a Faculty Member in 2013.

With an inclination towards academic medicine, Dr. Bukhari mainly focuses her practice towards clinical cardiology and disease diagnosis and prevention. Having a more measured approach towards clinical practice has allowed her to develop an interest towards prevention of cardiac diseases and cardiac imaging during her training. Her primary research interests are the biochemical, clinical and imaging aspects of cardiomyopathy, valvular heart disease and heart failure - she aims to make use of pre-existing databases and echo archives to streamline her findings and generate useful evidence for cardiac disease prevention.

Dr. Bukhari believes that "Imaging is the key stone of cardiac medicine." In order to fulfil her goal of becoming a Multimodality Imaging Expert, she has specialized in the cardiac imaging modalities of Echocardiography and Cardiac MRI.

As one of the first few female cardiologists at AKUH, Dr. Bukhari credits her success to the brilliant support system at AKUH as well as her passion for the specialty. She has persevered to overcome the challenges in her path and makes sure to maximize on all opportunities presented her way. "My senior colleagues are all my teachers," she stated, as she emphasized on the privilege she felt at being a part of the renowned Cardiology Section at AKUH. She encourages her junior colleagues and medical students to adopt a more performance oriented approach and value the growth that comes from the journey as opposed to solely focusing on the outcome. She also highlights the significance of adopting a wellrounded approach to patient care and practicing kindness and empathy towards all. Dr. Bukhari has successfully made her mark at AKUH and we are so excited to see her career soar!

Any interesting/memorable encounter:

Many years ago I was called to see a patient who was having seizures in Postnatal ward in a famous Women's Hospital in Karachi. My brother in law was the Medical Superintendent of that Hospital. At 7.30am I arrived at the Medical Superintendent's Office, gave my visiting card to his secretary. He did not look at it or couldn't read it I don't know but I was asked to sit and wait outside the office in a chair. About 15 minutes passed and I was still waiting to be called in. I was becoming restless since I was getting late for my work. When I got fed up I asked the secretary if he had given my card to his saheb. He tersely asked me to wait, saying "inside a high level meeting is underway and saheb is busy". Another 10 minutes later I saw my visiting card still in his palm in a crumbled form. Then I nearly lost my cool and asked him to ask his saheb if he wanted to see me or not. Then suddenly his "saheb" came out of the office, looked at me and said, "Sarwar Saheb, you are late and we were waiting for you". Now the secretary was flabbergasted, opened his palm looked at the crumbled visiting card and then looked at me, petrified. Later I asked him why he did not give my card to his sahib. 
