Right Reverend and dear Sir

I have long been expecting  
to hear from you respecting your protegee  
James George, and to receive <sup>furth</sup> Bills for  
his education - It is desirable that I should  
receive them regularly, that as my funds  
get low I may have a motive for exertion  
and an argument to influence the  
well disposed to assist me in the good  
work - Your first call I presume was



duly answered as my Bankers through  
whom I paid the money have debited me  
with the amount - I have heard once from  
Mrs George since you kindly took her son to  
Subitee in which she speaks in grateful  
terms of all that you have done for her, and  
I trust that the widow's prayer will bring down  
upon your labours of love <sup>may blessing</sup> from Him who is  
emphatically the Father of the Fatherless  
and the God of the Widow - I wrote to you  
several months ago to request you to  
send me an acct. of J. George's second year's



expenses, but as I have received no answer  
I fear my letter has not reached its  
destination - I trust that this will be  
more fortunate and that in due time I  
shall hear from you -

How gloomy at present is the prospect  
of peace between our two kindred nations.  
May the God of Peace still the troubled  
waters that love and harmony may be  
restored - With every sentiment of

respect and esteem I am Dear Sir
