Message From the Chair


Dear Colleagues,

As I write this message, the COVID-19 pandemic continues to sweep the world. Pakistan sits at 2450 cases and has reported 35 deaths (http://covid.gov.pk/stats/pakistan). Early last month, we made decisions to ensure physical distancing in the department of medicine. We quickly moved learning content and meetings to online platforms (I hear Zoom stocks have gone up) including Medicine Grand Rounds (and attendance there has risen exponentially :). As COVID-19 cases started rolling into AKU, our Medicine faculty stepped up in all kinds of ways to handle the crisis – Front and center have been the sections of Infectious Disease and Internal Medicine and our Medicine service line. Dr. Faisal Mehmood has been advising the government at both provincial and national levels; Dr Bushra Jamil has been leading from the front as the President of the Medical Microbiology and Infectious Disease Society of Pakistan; Dr Nosheen Nasir is spearheading efforts to start trials on COVID-19 prevention (please watch that front and help with enrollment), Dr Kiren Habib and Dr Iffat Khanum have been managing the clinical services and fielding questions/allaying anxiety 24/7. Dr Ali Zubairi and Dr Muhammad Irfan have led COVID-19 guidelines development from the Pakistan Chest Society. The medicine teams under the leadership of Dr Aysha Almas and Dr Mehmood Riaz have been managing workflow and ensuring operations run smoothly, all the while working hard to protect faculty and housestaff from exposures. As I attend the Hospital incident command center meetings every morning and every evening, it is heartening to note that our institution is walking the talk – placing patients and health care professionals protection front and center in all that we do and displaying great agility in decisions and action.

I want to give a shout out to our outstanding housestaff, nurses, technicians, and faculty on the frontlines who are doing exemplary work - we are very grateful for all that you do. I hope everyone is practicing physical distancing – every bit counts towards alleviating stress from our health care system. Finally, I do hope when we are done stamping this fire that there is national discourse and action on a re-imagined health care system, one that is well financed, cohesive and cooperative in its approach to both its resources and needs.

COVID-19: Crisis Inspiring Virtual Innovations

Challenges and ingenuity can yield innovative results which is a proven fact. The current crisis is no exception. This unfolding crisis has already hampered both the community and health care professionals. However, healthcare workers as a group of highly skilled professionals are capable of finding interesting ways to overcome obstacles, often bouncing back even stronger when faced with seemingly insurmountable challenges. The DOM used new innovations including virtual grand rounds, virtual faculty meetings, tele-health clinics and online academic sessions to help to maintain the safety of their teams while keeping them engaged in academic and clinical activities.





Nephrology and Urology Simulation-based Workshops

The kidney and bladder (nephrology and urology) service line has been offering simulation-based workshops on a quarterly basis over the past three years. The workshops include topics such as care of hemodialysis patients and hands-on training for interventional nephrology. It was a great opportunity for collaborative learning engaging both nurses and residents. The nurse specialists worked closely with the CIME team to bring innovation in teaching and learning. One of the examples is converting IV hand into mid fidelity fistula arm for customized fistula pricks. All the participants which included residents and

nurses were supervised by the dialysis master trainer nurses and got an opportunity for skills sign off on the mid fidelity Fistula arm. The CIME team acknowledged the efforts of the nursing team by entitling them as Champions in CIME. This was a great activity for competency building aimed at better patient care outcomes. Another milestone achieved in the service line was simulation-based workshop on care of renal transplant patients which now carries CME credit hours. This was conducted in the month of March to mark The World Kidney Day. The nursing team in collaboration with renal transplant team led this activity to acquire CME credit hours for this workshop. It was planned and executed by multidisciplinary team including transplant nephrologist, transplant surgeon, pharmacist and dietitian to make this a comprehensive learning experience. Nursing staffs and residents who participated were enriched with hands-on skills in managing transplant patients on high fidelity Simmon-3 G.








Featured Faculty: Dr Saad Shafqat "Take exemplary care of your patients. If you do that with honesty and ability, all good things will follow"

What made you pick Medicine as your calling in life?

I was born into a medical family and was initially inspired by my father (a cardiology professor who has spent his career at Karachi's JPMC). I remember one consequential event clearly. I was perhaps 13 or 14 years old. It had rained heavily in Karachi, leaving the city paralyzed. My father's clinic staff had failed to show up, so he made me a stand-in receptionist and gave me a quick tutorial in how to perform an ECG. We received just a handful of patients that evening but I was thrilled! I started dreaming of becoming a clinician myself. It soon became clear to me that medicine combines intellectual fulfilment, service to society, and professional rewards in a way that no other vocation can really match.

What are your hobbies/interests?

I love reading and writing - both fiction and nonfiction. I've published a novel (Breath of Death) and another (Rivals) is on the way. And cricket is something I can never tire of; I used to play for AKU during college, and to this day follow the game closely. I've also co-written a cricket book (Javed Miandad's autobiography, Cutting Edge) and have been a cricket columnist for DAWN and the popular website ESPNcricinfo. I adore crosswords too. The New York Times crossword is a daily addiction.

Had you not been a doctor, what would you have done?

My alter ego is very much that of a journalist. I have this insatiable natural curiosity. I want to figure things out, identify patterns, discern connections and causes. These traits, along with an inclination towards writing and scholarship, would've naturally pulled me into journalism, I'm pretty certain.

What advice would you like to give to your juniors?

Above all else, take exemplary care of your patients. If you do that with honesty and ability, all good things will follow.

What lessons have you learned from your seniors?

I have been fortunate to graduate in AKU's inaugural medical college batch, the Class of 1988. This enabled close and personalized interaction with a number of remarkable teachers and role models. These giants of the medical profession taught us bedrock values of sincerity, discipline, compassion, competence, and the need to keep pushing one's intellectual boundaries.

What made you choose AKU?

In the early 1980s, medical education was only available in the public sector in Pakistan. It was a turbulent era under martial law; medical college campuses had become highly politicized and kept irregular schedules. In these circumstances when AKU offered a fresh credible option, everyone flocked to it and so did I. The Stadium Road campus had begun to take shape, and you just had to drive past to appreciate that it was exceptional. It symbolized tremendous hope, rigor, and excellence - and it has more than lived up to that promise.

What in your opinion is your biggest accomplishment ?

- Personal getting my AKU classmate Dr. Anita Zaidi (former chair of AKU pediatrics and now a director at the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation) to accept me as her life partner.
- Professional Making it to professor at AKU! Our institution's standards are very exacting. It's a hard-won honor.

Tell us about one challenge/failure that taught you a lot in life

In 2005, I applied for section head of neurology but lost the position to a worthy competitor. It seems a trifling matter now, but at the time that was a bitter pill to swallow. My wife and a handful of close friends saw me through that trying episode. It taught me the value of friendship and the importance of continuing to communicate with others no matter how dark your mood.

Who/what do you draw your inspiration from (your muse if you may) and why?

Without question, from wife dearest Anita Zaidi. Why? Because she always know what to do and when exactly to do it.

What are your future goals?

I would like to keep doing my part in attracting top medical talent to faculty and leadership ranks at AKU. I would also like to write another couple of novels - one involving cricket in some way, and one about the unpredictable ups and downs, the uniquely twisted pathos, of life in Karachi. And I would like to continue my professional practice as a clinical neurologist for as long as Allah permits.

- Gloves must be changed between patients.
- Gowns need to be changed if they are soiled or wet.
- All PPEs should be changed as per TBP policy for all infected patients for e.g. MDRO (CRE, VRE, MRSA etc.).
- PPE should be removed when leaving the patient care areas, e.g. when going to the lounge or leaving the unit.
