1. To choose a Town clerk, one Selectman for three years, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Superintendent of Burying Ground, Janitor of the Town Hall, Auditors, Highway Agents, Library Trustee for three years, and a trustee for Town Trust Funds for three years.

2. To choose Measurers of Wood, Surveyors of Lumber, Fence Viewers, Pound Keeper, Fish and Game Wardens, Police Officers, and all necessary town officers.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for all town expenses—(included in Budget.)

4. To see what disposition the Town will make of the town land and buildings.

5. To see if the Town will vote to expend a sum of money on the ceiling and walls of the interior of the Towns Meeting House, and appropriate money for the same.

6. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

To the Citizens of Newington:-

The Library Trustees herewith submit the thirtyseventh annual report, with financial statement and Librarian's report for the year ending December 31, 1928.

During the summer months the Library was open on Wednesday from 3 to 9 P. M. during the winter months from 12 to 4 P. M. the remainder of the year from 2 to 5 P. M. and throughout the year on Saturday from 2 to 5 P. M.

Some repairs seemed advisable during the year. The cement work has been repaired and a new bulk head built, in addition to work necessary on the interior of the building.

One hundred and seventy-seven volumes have been purchased. We have duplicated a few books and have replaced some which were worn too much to be used any longer, but were in much demand. The titles of the replaced books have not been printed in the catalogue supplement, for that reason. the number of books purchased will not correspond with the number of titles printed in this year's town report.

We are interested to note the continued interest on the part of the school children and the increase in the number of juvenile books both of fiction and non-fiction lent during the year is encouraging showing that the library is indeed rendering a service to the community.

In June a district meeting of the Librarian's of this section of the county was held here. Miss Boothman represented the State Commissioners office and Mrs. Ganter one of the Commissioners. An instructive afternoon was afforded all present.

Health week was observed and Miss Ida Nutter gave a most interesting and instructive talk with a good number present.

Gifts of magazines and books have been received during the year from a number of friends. We extend our sincere thanks for these gifts and to all who are interested to help promote good influence through the use of our Library.

Again we wish to express our appreciation of our Librarian for the faithful performance of her duties, we realize how much time, labor and thought she devotes to the work.

Report of Superintendent of Schools.

To the School Board of Newington:

I hereby submit to you my fourth annual report of the Public Schools of Newington.

During the past year we have made steady efforts to solve the problems of the schools of Newington.

Of our teachers, Miss Pickering and Mrs. Poore have remained with us, and continued their good work of the previous year. Miss Abbott resigned in June to teach elsewhere. Miss Madeline H. Hardy was secured to fill the vacancy. I am glad to report that her work has been effective and highly satisfactory to both pupils and parents.

It has been found practically impossible for one teacher to carry on the regular work of four grades and give instruction to the girls in sewing and cooking and to the boys in Manual Training. We have therefore omitted the work in Manual Training and some of the work in Cooking. As practically all of our pupils attend the Portsmouth High School, the work in those subjects can be taken up in that high school. This enables the teachers to concentrate their efforts upon the fundamental subjects.

The attendance still falls below the mark required for the doing of the best work. It has been often stated that one of the reasons for the success of New England people is their ability to overcome obstacles, an ability gained in braving the New England weather. If this is so, are not the parents of Newington failing in their duty toward their children by permitting them to remain at home from school whenever the weather is inclement. Regular attendance is essential for good work in school, and parents should insist upon it.

Quite a proportion of our school population change their residence during the school year, and too many make this an excuse for being absent from school for a number of weeks. Should not these parents have more regard for their children's interest than to permit this?

In the modern method of teaching, the use of reference and library books is almost indispensable even for the lowest grades. We appreciate the cooperation of the Librarian of the Public Library in supplying this need as far as lies within her power. There are, however, many books that should be constantly available in the schools. A beginning has been made in supplying such books for our Newington pupils. I trust that each year a small amount of money may be used to provide additional equipment along this line.

In conclusion I would urge the parents to visit the schools more often. In this way you will become acquainted with the teachers, appreciate their work and be able to cooperate with them more effectually. Let us also strive to make living conditions pleasant for our teachers that they may desire to remain with us.

I thank all for their co-operation.

We herewith submit the annual report of the School Board.

The fall term opened with Miss Margaret Pickering in charge of the first four grades and Miss Madeline Hardy in charge of the four upper grades. We believe there is fine co-operation between teachers and pupils and that both teachers are doing efficient work and getting results.

Owing to a decrease in the number of pupils attending school since the beginning of the year we feel that it is for the best interest of the town and school to continue with two teachers.

The Manual Training has been omitted this year as it seemed that the time could be used to better advantage along other lines of study. The girls are having instruction in sewing.

The work in music is progressing favorably under the supervision of Mrs. Poore. The individual interest taken in each pupil is a praise worthy phase of her work.

Our Superintendent Mr. Charles Perkins works faithfully for the welfare of the schools and we feeel sure good results have come from his efforts.

The work of adjusting the ventilating and heating system at the school has been done by Gardner Witham of Portsmouth. After considering the matter for some time and consulting various contractors, Mr. Witham's bid was approved by the school board and he has guaranteed satisfaction.

We believe it would be an advantage to have a Parent-Teachers association in Newington and thus promote friendly relations between parent and teacher and also help solve some of the problems. Some time in the near future we hope this will be accomplished. Parents are urged to visit the school more frequently and thus encourage both teachers and pupils.
