This presented itself in the form of information. The VA website supplies this information, but it's presented in an overwhelming manner. I wanted to condense all that information into a simple form factor. After deciding on the topic for my project and the problem I needed to look for solutions. At this point I started to ideate possible solutions. Due to the length of the course I decided to look for a simple solution. This was why I gravitated toward the booklet. It would encompass an abbreviated amount of information from what was offered on the VA website.

After deciding what form my project would take, I decided to start compiling information. I

focused on four key topics: education, employment, health services, and housing assistance. By utilizing these three stages I was able to establish a framework that has become the backbone for my project.

My approach is unique due to my methodology. It led to a three-stage approach which reduced my overall workload. The defining stage allowed me to explore issues that I was interested in. Ideating solutions showed me that there were many ways to solve this problem. From creating a website to developing a course teaching the services offered at the VA. new to them. One individual found insight on the housing assistance program provided by the VA. They were interested in buying a home so that information was very insightful. Another individual was interested in going back to school. They gravitated toward the information in the education section. Overall, many of my readers found some benefit from my work. The capstone project left a positive impact on my stakeholders. Out of the 10 readers I surveyed 90% of them found my booklet useful. This quantitative survey allowed me to see that my project indeed had a positive impact on the stakeholders.

When it comes to results I anticipated a warm reception. But it felt quite difficult to tell. The survey at the end of the booklet helped solidify my initial sentiment. Although the booklet offered a summarized version of what is offered on the VA site, my readers felt quite informed. The survey allowed me to see that 90% of my readers found the booklet useful. This survey also allowed readers to provide recommendations on improving the booklet. The consensus was that the booklet would have benefitted from more information.
