1	I totally agree with hunt for food, respecting regulations, etc. as long as it's done in complete intelligence with the existing wildlife and balance

I have only admiration for how seriously they take hunting, that includes making efforts during the rest of the year protecting and improving the wildlife habitats they hunt in. The second group should have their licenses taken away. I don't agree with trophy hunting. It's sickening to know that they don't value the animal.
