### **Course Description**

This course is a continuation from GRMN 101 (Elementary German I). Students who have successfully completed GRMN 101 with a grade of C- or higher or who have placed into GRMN 102 by language placement exam may take the course. Otherwise you must receive consent of the instructor to register. GRMN 102 is a four-skills course that covers listening, speaking, reading, and writing with a focus on communication and useful everyday situations and themes, including shopping, going out, leisure activities, and getting around. Through activities that go along with these themes, you will learn about various topics as you explore the diversity of culture and life in German-speaking countries.

#### **Learning Outcomes**

The course is designed to guide you to:

- 1. Understand basic spoken and written German in the context of common situations and in a broadening range of grammatical structures and expressions, building on GRMN 101, including expressions in each the present and past.
- 2. Produce basic, comprehensible spoken and written German, including brief verbal expressions in conversation and short compositions in writing.
- 3. Acquire useful, contextualized knowledge of the geography, history, culture, and people of regions where German is spoken and to express that through speaking and writing in German.

Outlines and explanations are concise and informative and many examples are provided to show parallels and differences between the two languages. Beyond a source for you to further ground your understanding and use of German grammar, the book is also a great way to improve your knowledge of and ability to navigate English grammar! The text is not required, but recommended, and page and section references to it will be made throughout the course.

#### **Assessment Activities**

Below is a listing of the types and categories of activities, assignments, and tests on which your assessment will be based.

### **Participation and Engagement**

Participation is essential in learning a language and engagement takes place through class attendance (see Attendance Policy below). Much of the in-class work is comprised of interactivities, language exercises you complete with other students that get you to communicate with each other. This semester you will have opportunities to initiate conversation, take chances with the language, and be open to learning from your attempts. Your participation and engagement assessment will be based on the following:

- 1. Verbal responses to written and spoken prompts in class and engagement and interaction with others
- 2. Assessment of vocabulary knowledge and use in class-based activities
- 3. Quality of use of learned and explored material from homework in class-based activities

#### **Homework and Written Activities**

Homework will consist of exercises from the eBook and electronic workbook / lab manual (WBLM), reading and preparing assigned segments for each session, as well as written work assigned in each chapter. It is important to keep up with homework as it is assigned and it is expected to be handed in on time. See deadlines given with assignments.

#### **Chapter Quizzes**

Each chapter there will be at least one brief quiz on selected material from the chapter.

#### **Chapter Tests**

Tests are given at the end of each chapter. While they focus on material covered in a given chapter, they will also include previous material as language learning is cumulative in nature.

Tests can only be made up with advance notice and only when a sufficient and documented excuse is provided.

### **Midterm and Final Conversation Activity**

In the middle of the semester while covering Chapter 7 (Freizeit und Sport = "Leisure and Sports") and toward the end of the semester during Chapter 9 (In der Stadt = "In the City") you will meet with a group of others from class and engage in a conversation that will count as an assessment activity toward your final grade. The conversation will be an authentic verbal exchange where you will have the chance to discuss topics and use vocabulary and grammar patterns covered in the course.

#### **Final Written Examination**

The written final exam for both sections of GRMN 102 will take place on Monday, May 9th from 7 - 9 pm. The exam will be cumulative based on material from the semester. Location will be announced during the semester.
