## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Plainfield, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in Plainfield, in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, Treasurer, Collector, Highway Surveyors, Prosecuting Liquor Agent, one Library Trustee for three years, and all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay outstanding notes and interest and other necessary town expenses for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs of highways and bridges above the amount required by law for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.

Article 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay the School Board the ensuing year.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the expenses of Old Home Week.

Article 7. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise for the purchasing of one or more road machines.

Article 8. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise for the support of an annual free bed
in the Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital, also appoint committees or make regulations regarding the same.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to accept the gift of $\$ 150$ from Mrs. Sophia R. Baker, the income of which shall be used for the perpetual care of the Stevens lot and the adjoining lot of W. O. Kenyon in the Plain Cemetery, so called, also to see what rate of interest the town will vote to pay upon this fund.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to build a stone culvert near the Dow lot on the highway leading from Charles Williams' to Willis K. Daniels', also to see, what sum of money it will vote to raise to build the same.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to dispense with a liquor agent for the ensuing year.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to dispense with delivering inventory blanks until time of taking the inventory.

Article 13. To see what action the town will take in relation to the reports of the town officers.

Article 14. To transact any other business that may properly come before the meeting.

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

## To the Citizens of Plainfield:

According to custom we respectfully submit our report of the management of the town schools for the year ending February 16, 1905.

## FINANCES

The cost of the schools for the year is as follows: For support of schools \$1981 04

The appropriations were as follows:
For support of schools

Repairs 15000
Supplies 14189
As will be seen elsewhere, we were obliged to open a new school during the year. Therefore, only by rigid economy and by reducing the number of weeks in the school year, did we manage to keep within the appropriation. The town should appropriate this year at least $\$ 300.00$ extra for the support of its schools.

Your school board thought it advisable to open the Spencer school last spring and results during the past three terms have seemed to justify us in taking this course.

Eight of our ten schools have had three successive terms aggregating twenty-nine weeks for the year; two had only spring and fall terms in accordance with the parents' desire.

The Methodist Hill School was conducted along the same lines as last year, Enfield paying its propor-
tionate share of the cost of maintaining twenty-three weeks of school during the year.

We have endeavored as far as possible to keep each of our teachers in the same school for more than one term.

This prevents any break in the continuity of the work and each succeeding term shows better work than its predecessor. We are pleased with the standard of work maintained in the schools during the past year and believe that, judged singly or collectively, the work done will compare favorably with that of other years.

We would respectfully urge all parents to make their interest in the school manifest by a hearty and judicious cooperation with the teachers and by frequent visits to the school-room. Nothing is more gratifying to teachers or pupils than an expression of generous and hearty interest on the part of parents.

The citizens of the town could also manifest their interest in our schools by contributing pictures, portraits, or engravings suitable for school-room decoration. Our school-rooms need to be made more attractive and homelike.

In the judgment of the present school-board, schools where the average attendance is less than six should not be kept open. If the town desires its committee to maintain such schools, it should give its definite instructions to that effect.

We keep the children supplied with the best textbooks, in so far as we can. This year we have introduced into the schools the Frye geographies and the Heath readers. Both of these texts are giving excellent satisfaction. The Natural geographies and the Cyr's readers are still in use in many of the schools.
